PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

A PROBLEM WE CANNOT IGNORE

Irish people like most heavy drinkers don't like to have their drinking problems mentioned but they have been getting a fairly good airing these times. The Minister for Labour, Mr Michael O'Leary, in a speech made a few months ago in Cork warned that we were fast becoming a lounge bar society, our leisure dominated by drink and our cultural and economic life impaired by drink values.

In the current issue of 'Africa' the bi-monthly journal of St. Patrick's Missionary Society, Kiltegan, an article under the heading 'Man Versus Alcohol' tracing the alarming increase in the consumption of alcohol in the Irish Republic points out that in the five-year period 1965 '70 the overall increase in spirits consumption was 37 per cent ranging from 26.6 per cent increase in brandy intake to a staggering 265 per cent in vodka! A remarkable fact disclosed by the article also is that while the percentage spent on drink increased, the amount spent on food was going down. It added that all recent surveys showed an increase in drink consumption among young people and an increase in young addiction.

On this latter topic the editorial in the July issue of 'The Vintner', the official journal of the Irish Licensed Trade, issues a very strong warning to members of the trade regarding their responsibility where under age drinking is concerned. It points out that the National Executive Council of The Vintners Federation of Ireland were very perturbed about teenage drinking with particular emphasis on the increase in the number of young people under the age of 18 years who are now indulging in intoxicating liquor.

Pointing to the fact that the Council passed a resolution that members should take all necessary precautions not to encourage this type of unwelcome business, the article states "They must face up to their responsibilities in the matter and should lean on the side of strictness if there is any doubt about the age of young persons who seek to be served with intoxicating liquor for consumption on or off the premises. We are aware that in every town in Ireland there is at least one licensed premises which, unfortunately, caters for or is stuck in dealing with teenagers. We hold no brief for the persons who own these premises and we will not support them if they are taken to task. In fact we hope that they get what they deserve."

The statistics which the surveys have thrown up and the articles and the airings which our drinking habits have been the subject of with ever increasing frequency add up to a problem we cannot ignore or hide or bury and which demands something to be done by way of solution than talking or writing about it. We need a comprehensive educational programme that will tackle the dangers of alcoholism at the level of the individual, family, school and community. But coupled with this knowledge a salutary education will also have to be created and fostered well that alcoholism, as well as drinking flourish now equally well that all tackle the problem in a combined effort that it will not be under control.

THE NO 1 SPOT

I had written the fore before reading the report of a discussion at last night's Dungarvan Council meeting and ended giving it a minor

placing in the column. But having read that discussion in which a member of the Council stated that he had it on good authority that in the past, alcoholic drink was brought into youth club activities in the town, I think it becomes our most important topic of the week and merits the No 1 Spot in the column.

WRONGLY ANGLED ?

The County Council has now completed its new herring bone pattern of lining for parking cars at Dungarvan Square but it has been suggested to me that whoever made the blue print for the markings angled them wrongly. I have not had the opportunity of looking closely at the new pattern at the time of writing nor have I had any experience of parking there since the old box pattern was changed. I shall return to this topic again next week (DV) when I see how the new system is working.

ICE PLANT AT HELVICK

Moves for the establishment of an ice plant at Helvick to facilitate not only the local fishermen but also the many other visiting trawlers who use Helvick as a base from time to time for their fishing activities have been going on now for some considerable time.

The plant is to be erected by Bord Iascaigh Mhara and their initial plan sought to locate the plant at the far end of the pier. BIM applied to Waterford County Council for the necessary planning permission to enable them to go ahead with the work but this application has been refused.

The refusal was contained in an order made by the County Manager on June 28 and the grounds set out for the refusal were that because of its location the proposed development would, first of all, obstruct the view and secondly, that it would reduce the working area of the pier by too large an amount.

There is no doubt but that most of the activity where mooring boats and landing fish at Helvick is concerned goes on at this end of the pier and any building that would encroach to any great extent on the existing area of operations would prove a draw-back.

From inquiries I have made, however, I understand that the Planning Authority would have no objection if the new ice plant were to be located at the entrance to the pier and in this regard the old boathouse has been mentioned as the most likely site now. The matter now rests with Bord Iascaigh Mhara and whether they would be satisfied to proceed with the development at this site remains to be seen.

An ice plant is a facility which has long been overdue for the fishermen of Helvick and I hope that BIM will see their way to proceed with the project on the site suggested without much further delay.

DISCOLOURED WATER SUPPLY

My reference to the complaints about the dirty and discoloured domestic water supply in several areas in Dungarvan last week has brought the explanation that the condition of the water is caused by the sinking of a new borehole adjacent to the existing boreholes at Ballinamuck from which the present town supply comes. The position will, I have been told, clear up when the drilling operations at the new bore are completed.

It is a pity that the Urban Council did not explain the position officially to the public at the beginning as this would have avoided a great deal of worry to those who have been at the receiving end of these

REPAIR DUNGARVAN QUAY OR BOATS WILL BE DIVERTED

Referring to an old and much discussed problem at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night—that of repairing the quay wall—Mr P. Whelan said that the question was one which had now been put off for too long. He said that he had read some time ago that there would be no money forthcoming from the Department for this repair work (reported exclusively in the 'Dungarvan Leader') and he asked what the present position in regard to the matter was.

Mr Whelan went on to say that he had been informed that 56 boats had been booked to discharge cargoes in Dungarvan during the next twelve months but unless something was done soon to put the quay in order these boats would be diverted to Cork. Such a thing would cause a great deal of unemployment in the town and he proposed that the Council proceed to do something to get one section of the quay in order at once.

"Fifty-six boats in a year is more than one every week and it is a long time since we had that kind of a prospect for the quay and for Dungarvan," he said.

Mr T. Wade supported the proposal and said that the Council should take full responsibility to make at least one of the berths at the quay safe. If the boats promised for Dungarvan were diverted to Cork it would mean that a lot of workers who depended on the quay for their livelihoods would suffer.

Mr T. Kyne T.D. said that he was not aware that any proposals for the repair of the quay wall had been turned down by the Department. However he admitted that there were no funds from which provision could be made at present but he added that the Minister was still considering the matter.

Mr D. Goode, Chairman, said that he was sure that all the members of the Council were concerned about the condition of the quay and he pointed out that they had already agreed to devote the £10,000 which they had received for the site of the new Post Office to repairing the quay.

In reply to a question by Senator Deasy the Town Engineer said that he could not make a guess at what the rough cost of making one of the berths safe would be. He would say that the £10,000 referred to would only be a fraction of the cost.

COUNCIL CONGRATULATES RESCUERS AND RECOMMENDS BRAVERY AWARDS

On the proposal of Mr D. Goode, Chairman, Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting last Monday night unanimously congratulated the following Dungarvan residents who had taken part in successful rescue operations in recent weeks: Mr John Hamilton and Mr Billy Goode (son of the Chairman) who had saved two young boys from drowning when they were swept out to sea while floating on a tractor tube; Mr Cathal O'Doherty who had helped to revive a young girl who had got into difficulties in the water off the Cunnigar Point and Mr John Eastford, Coolagaur, who had succeeded in getting a young man off the rock at Helvick.

Mr Goode further proposed that the Council recommend to Comhairle na Mire Galle that certificates for bravery should be presented to the four men concerned.

Mr P. Whelan who seconded the proposal said that he was sorry but he could not couple with this a condemnation of the vandalism which had gone on around the sea-front with the slashing and damaging of several lifebelts. He also condemned the vandals who had broken bottles and thrown the glass into the swimming pool. This was an absolutely disgraceful act he said.

The Chairman agreed that it was a deplorable state of affairs that they had to speak out against this type of vandalism in the town but he wondered what the solution to it was.

Mr T. Wade said that he was sure somebody must have seen these vandals at work and if so they should report such matters to the Gardaí.

The Council also agreed to recommend the actions of the men concerned to the Authorities for bravery awards as proposed by the Chairman.

TEA CONGRATULATED
On the proposal of Mr. Wade the Council also unanimously agreed to congratulate the Village (Abbeyside) under 16 hurling and football teams on scoring a double in the Western championships for the second successive year.

SUGGESTED CIVIC RECEPTION FOR PRESIDENT GIVEN COOL RECEPTION

There was a rather cool reception to a suggestion made at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night that on the occasion of his forthcoming visit to Villiers town at the end of the month the Council should accord a civic reception to the President Mr Erskine Childers.

The suggestion came from the Chairman Mr D. Goode who said that when the President came to Villierstown on August 30 to open the Festival of Flowers there it would be his first official visit to the County and he wondered whether it would be in order for the Council to give him a civic reception to mark the occasion.

Mr P. Whelan thought that this would be more a matter for the County Council as the President was not coming to Dungarvan.

Senator Deasy said that they could find out whether he would be coming through Dungarvan on his way to Villierstown or whether he had any other plans.

As from the 2nd September 1974, a national artificial insemination service in pigs will operate from the Veterinary Research Laboratory, A.I. Research Unit, Finglas, Dublin, with semen obtained from high quality performance tested and progeny tested boars.

The cost per sow inseminated is— Inseminator Service Within a radius of 25 miles of the centre £2.50 for one insemination and £1.50 for each additional insemination carried out at the same time.

Semen Delivery Service £2.00 for each dose of semen and £1.50 for each additional dose supplied at the same time. If more than 10 inseminations are carried out in a six month period subsequent charges will then be £1.50 and £1.00 respectively.

BAITS
When fishing for Conger and using Mackerel for bait one can obtain three good baits from each side starting below the head and cut to the tail. The third and really useful bait is the head with the guts still attached. This bait is most useful for all large fish feeding on the bottom.

When using the fillets make sure you tie above the eye of the hook with either a bit of wool or elastic thread. This keeps the bait in position as a fillet that finishes up in a lump on your hook will not attract fish. The best bait is a large piece of fresh squid.

If you use a small mackerel for Skate or Conger scar both sides of the whole mackerel with a very sharp knife and allow the juices to escape and thus attract fish. Hook your mackerel just above the tail. If using a live bait, a small mackerel hook through the upper lip.
