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Behind the SPOTLIGHT

ARROGANT INCREASES

The huge increases in television licence fees and postal and telephone charges announced within the last couple of weeks by the Department of Posts and Telegraphs have left the public generally in a state of frustrated shock. First came the news that the charge for black and white television sets would go up from £9 to £12 and that the licence fee for coloured sets would go from £15 to £20. These increases of one-third of the original amounts can be called nothing less than shocking and the instant angry reaction which followed the announcement should be maintained and followed up by the public.

The increases are a downright scandal especially in southern areas like County Waterford where viewers are confined to single-channel viewing and are captive audiences of the Montrose moguls who have the full power to decide what we are to see on our television screens.

Announcing the increases the Department of Posts and Telegraphs put out a statement through the GIS which said (among other things) "As RTE salaries and operational costs have risen during the past 12 months, the Authority finds that without an increase in revenue it is unable to discharge its statutory obligation under the Broadcasting Act, 1960, to be financially self-supporting."

Whatever about the rise in operational costs I challenge the Department on the salaries issue. It is about time that RTE implemented a few priorities and stopped extravagant spending. They sent an army of commentators and support people to the World Cup Soccer games in West Germany a few months ago even though Ireland had no team in the finals and so were not directly interested. I have been told that as a result this cost RTE as much as £15,000 when a far better service and this includes viewing and commentators could have been got from the BBC at one-third of the cost.

A few weeks ago we had the European Games in Rome and again we had the spectacle of at least four commentators, probably with the same additional entourage, from RTE travelling out "to do their thing" in sunny Italy. The interest displayed by viewers here at home in these athletic routings certainly did not warrant this kind of expensive coverage by RTE.

And the news section of the Montrose complex is equally as extravagant in spending as the sports department as we find "special" correspondents cropping up here and there all over the world covering stories which would be far better covered at much less expense by the recognised international agencies. Things went so far in this department last week that I heard one staff reporter of RTE "interviewing" another about a particular situation. This surely is the limit and the sooner RTE comes to its senses and realises that the television service is for the people and not something being run for the benefit of a select group the better for all.

The public should really maintain its protest about these new charges which now put us in a higher bracket than in Britain where the licence fees are £7 for black and white and £12 for colour. They should let the government and RTE know in no uncertain fashion that they regard these increases as being absolutely unwarranted and as if these increases are not hump enough to the people the same Department followed up last week with the announcement of further increases of up to 50 per cent in Postal

and other rates. The new rates will see the stamp charge on an ordinary letter jump from 5p to 7p. The postal service is one which is not noted for any great efficiency and such colossal increases coupled with the new TV licence fees requires much more than the statement put out by the Department that they are required to bridge the gap between revenue and expenditure caused by pay and price increases arising from current inflationary conditions to justify them.

AN EXCELLENT JOB BUT—

I intended to refer over the past few weeks to the very excellent job which has been done to convert the Cove at Helvick into a first-class amenity centre. The work was carried out by Waterford County Council under a grant provided by the Department. Until this job was done, the Cove remained inaccessible except for those who were agile and nimble enough to traverse the rough track which then led to it. Now, however, with a well-surfaced pedestrian pathway leading all the way from the pier at Helvick it is possible for everyone, young and old, to walk without difficulty to the Cove.

There are seats provided where those who might wish to do so can sit and rest and admire the seascape and the Comeragh mountains across the harbour and all in this newly developed area proved very popular during the past summer (sic).

Concrete steps lead down to the sandy beach of the Cove and this too is an area which is now much frequented. On the terrace and steps there are safety railings of tubular steel which are, of course, very necessary for the protection of those going or coming from the beach below. However it is in regard to these railings that the "but" arises.

As I have said the job is indeed a very fine one in all respects but could it not have been possible, especially for a project carried out in the Gaeltacht, to have secured Irish made materials for the job? Stamped on the tubular steel safety railings at a number of points at the Cove is the mark "Made in England" and this mark is there for anyone who wishes to look for it as I did when this matter was drawn to my notice by someone who had already spotted it and thought it was a bit much that materials used in a job financed by a government department and carried out in an area officially recognised as an Irish speaking district should have displayed or stamped on any part of them "Made in England" and not even "Deanta sa Bhreatain". I leave the matter at that.

NO QUEUES FOR CARS

People who have an interest in cars or any type of mechanically propelled vehicle will have noticed that in recent weeks the County Registration letters for the purposes of motor taxation in Waterford have reached the RKI stage. Many also noticed that the letters jumped from PK1 to RK1 and that there was no QK1 in the series.

When I enquired at the County Council offices in Dungarvan I was informed that it was the accepted policy by the taxation authorities in every one of the local authority areas which deal with such matters throughout the country to omit the letter Q from any of these combinations.

The explanation I was given for such a decision was easy to understand. It was simply that the letter Q is too similar to the letters O and C and could easily be mistaken for one of these, especially if it happened to

DEATH OF MR. JAMES FOLEY, DUNGARVAN

SECRETARY AND FORMER GENERAL MANAGER
 WATERFORD CO-OP SOCIETY

The news of the death of Mr Jim Foley which occurred unexpectedly at his residence at Friar's Walk Abbeyside Dungarvan on last Sunday, September 22, caused a widespread regret not only throughout Co Waterford but in many other parts of the country where he was known as one of the most respected and best loved figures in the Irish Creamery Industry. He was watching the minor footballers of his own beloved rebel county of Cork on their way to winning another All-Ireland title at Crook Park on Tuesday when he suffered a heart attack and died within a very short time.

Educated at St Coleman's College, Fermoy he graduated from University College, Cork and initially joined the staff of the Irish Sugar Company. He came to the Dungarvan Co-op in 1936 when it was still more or less in its infancy and became General Manager in 1954. Ten years later Jim Foley was the central figure in the vitally important pioneer work of creamery amalgamation. Dungarvan was one of five Waterford Co-ops which merged then to begin the growth which has now made it one of the mammoth complexes of the Creamery Industry in this country with an annual turnover of £30 million and covering an area stretching from East Cork to Wicklow. He remained at the helm during this period of great stress and strain but retired as general manager in 1969. However he remained on as Secretary of the Co-op and continued to watch over the continued growth of the concern which under his guidance had, through the years, grown like the great oak tree from a little acorn. Having survived a serious illness he returned to work last year and was at his desk as Co-op Secretary as recently as last Friday.

Mr Foley was a former Director of Wexford Creamery Ltd and former Managing Director of Kilmegaden Creamery. He was still a Director of Milkco Ltd at Carrick-on-Suir up to his death.

In private life Jim Foley was a most unassuming man possessed of a gentle and rather shy character. He was an Irish man through and through and possessed an ardent love for Gaelic games and Irish music and song. He was a most enthusiastic and very active officer of the local branch of the Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann for a long time and in fact was associated with all organisations and movements which were concerned with the industrial and cultural improvement of Dungarvan—the town of his adoption.

An outstanding catholic his life was a living example to all of what a good Christian should be. His unexpected passing is a great loss to the town and to the country and to his wide circle of friends but to none more so than to his widow.

I.F.A. WEEKLY BULLETIN

DEPARTMENT MUST BEAR COST OF WARBLE FLY SCHEME "The successful completion of the Warble Fly Eradication Scheme, which is now in sight, will suffer a serious set-back in the coming weeks unless there is an immediate undertaking by the Department of Agriculture to bear the cost of the treatment for this year. This was said in a joint statement from the I.F.A.'s Livestock and Dairy Committees. The statement pointed out that with the increased charge for warble dressing this year coupled with the fact that many farmers are incurring serious financial losses on livestock there was a danger of big numbers of cattle being left untreated. This would lead to re-infestation next year. In view of the record number of cattle in the country, a successful treatment campaign will require maximum effort during the longer days of September and early October. There is therefore a particular urgency about the need for a decision by the Department of Agriculture to meet the full cost of the Scheme this year. The I.F.A. advises farmers to go ahead with the treatment of their cattle for warbles but to defer payment pending a decision from the Department of Agriculture. PRESIDENT ON DISASTROUS BEEF TRADE One of the major causes of the disastrous beef trade has been the hopeless market management by the European Commission, said Donal O'Sullivan, Deputy President of the Irish Farmers' Association in a statement. He said "The I.F.A. through COFA the farmers' organisation of the Nire have been called for the outright ban of imports of meat from Third Countries since January of this year and the Commission has steadfastly indicated that this was impossible. "The Commissioner for Agriculture, Mr Lardinois has been on record as saying that it would be a break-even price for pigs, Mr Hugh Larkin Secretary of the I.F.A.'s National Pigs and Bacon Committee said in a statement. He emphasised to the Minister the absolute importance for the continuation of the EEC aid of £280 per cwt dead-weight.

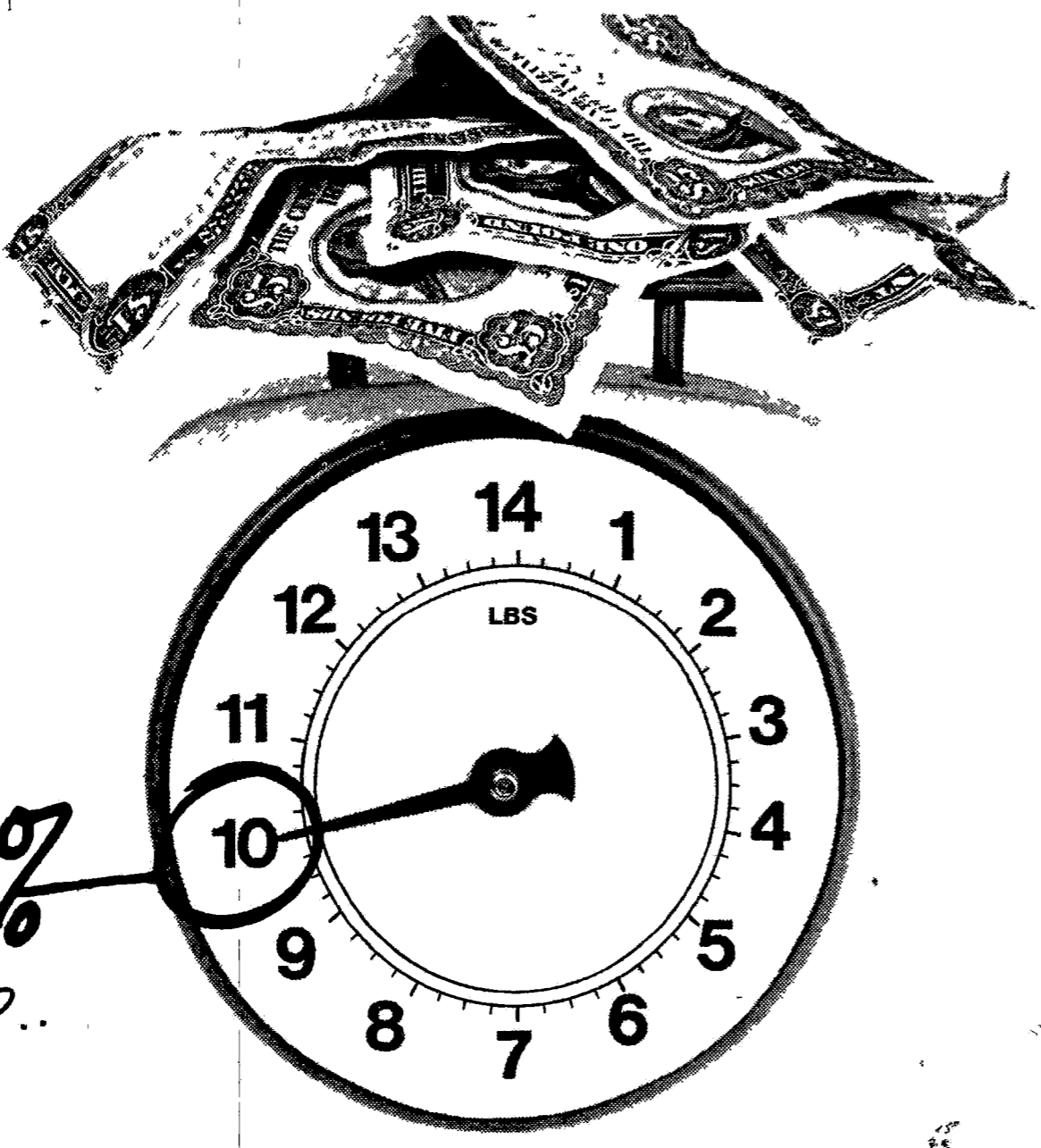
