Behind the SPOTLIGHT

THE COUNTY RATE
The County rate for the year 1975 will be £6.47 in the £ and this will provide £1,682,783 which when added to estimated receipts of £1,260,650 will make a total of £2,943,433 which it is estimated will be the expenditure required to provide the various services for the year. This is almost £500,000 more than was spent in the last full year in 1973/74 and indicates the high upward trend of expenditure in the public sector.

The one big word which we now hear almost daily is inflation and one of the things which is generally accepted where this is concerned is that it is accelerating at a faster rate in this country than anywhere else. One of the factors which contributes to this high rate of acceleration in inflation is accepted by most economists as the big increase in expenditure in the public sector. One of these economists suggested last week that if County Councils and other such bodies were to cut their annual expenditure by as little as 5 per cent it would help in great measure to slow down the inflationary tendency. Where Waterford County Council is concerned a reduction of this order would mean a sizeable saving on a budget of over £3 million.

Of the total estimate passed, it was stated that only about 5 per cent could be approached with a pruning scissors and this included the money for the County Roads Scheme I again go back to this economist in regard to the latter when he said in relation to cutting public expenditure that there did not appear to be a great deal of logic in spending millions of pounds in building 100 mph autostradas when the speed limit of 60 mph on our roads.

This certainly sounds sensible and perhaps it is time that we began to cut our cloth according to the measure we can afford. But the instructions must come down from the top before anything can be done.

DUNABBEY HOUSE
The name which the Waterford Health Committee has chosen for the new welfare home in Dungarvan is "Dunabbey House" and provided this is approved by the Regional Health Board it will become the new home's permanent name.

Although I have not checked it would appear to me that the new name is a combination of part of the names of Dungarvan and Abbeyside. It was announced last Monday that the Taoiseach and Minister for Health, Mr. Brendan Corish, T.D., will visit Dungarvan on Monday November 11, to formally open "Dunabbey House" and all members of Waterford County Council have been invited to the function at the Minister's request as it is expected that he will avail of the occasion to make an important statement in regard to the hospitalisation plans in Dungarvan.

THE APPOINTMENT OF LA ENGINEERS

Over the past couple of years there has been much discussion at meetings of the Waterford County Council about the difficulties encountered in staffing the Council's Engineering Section. During the period the western part of the county has been particularly badly hit and names generally have been badly held up that there have been threats, at times from the ratepayers in the area that unless some moves were made to ensure that the work would be serviced by an engineer, they would instigate a strike as a protest. One of the reasons which have been stated several times,

though never as far as I am aware, publicly admitted, for this failure to find an engineer willing to take up duty in West Waterford is the aftermath to the "Claudia" affair which resulted in the dismissal of the engineer then in charge of the area. Since then it has more or less been accepted that there has been a boycott operating following the refusal of the government to reinstate the engineer in question to his position.

However at a recent meeting of the Council when it was agreed to create two new posts of Chief Assistant County Engineers, one of the members, Cllr T. Healy, said that where local authorities were that no engineers wanted to enter the public service because adequate salary scales were not being paid. Cllr Healy is quoted as having said at that meeting "I think if we don't do something about this matter (Salary Scales) soon, we will have no engineers in the public service."

However the matter goes deeper than this and it appears that the Institution of Engineers of Ireland has more or less "black" local authority posts. This information comes to me this week from, of all places, Nigeria, where a reader who saw the report of the Co. Council meeting in the "Leader" concerning the appointment of two new chief assistant engineers was prompted to send me a cutting from the British Civil Engineers Journal.

Under a heading titled "IEI warns engineers off local government jobs," the article states, among other things "Graduate engineers in the Irish Republic are being advised not to apply for local government posts by the Institution of Engineers in Ireland, the republic's equivalent of the ICE, though it embraces all engineering disciplines."

"This shock advice is in protest at what the IEI describes as 'the antiquated structure of local government' in the country and comes at a time when most large local authorities report a chronic shortage of technical staffs including civil engineers. The shortage is holding up the implementation of major road and sewerage schemes."

"Salaries lower than those paid in the private sector are thought to be the major factor in the present situation although working conditions, antiquated procedures and interference from local politicians are also playing a part."

This, seemingly, if the article is correct, is now the attitude of the engineers to local authority posts. But it beats me how those employed by local authorities can think of comparing themselves to engineers employed in the private sector. As local authority employees they occupy insecure positions and are secured for all time. They need never fear that the firm will go bankrupt or that they may have to transfer to foreign parts. They can look forward to an early retirement with a golden handshake. Surely then they should be prepared to accept less than those who do run the risks!

LISMORE TOWN RATE BENEFITS FROM IMPROVED INVESTMENT INCOME

At their estimates meeting, held at the Town Hall Lismore Town Commissioners unanimously adopted a rate of 10.18p for the coming year, a decrease of 3.07p on the previous nine months. Estimated expenditure was £594,000 with estimated receipts of £353,000 leaving an amount to be raised of £241,000. The reduction was made possible by improved investment income.

The adoption of the estimate was proposed by Mr. Frank Geoghegan and seconded by Mr. H. R. Dowd.

£300,000 LOAN APPROVED FOR NEW DUNGARVAN HOUSING SCHEME

Dungarvan Urban Council at their meeting last Monday night approved the raising of a loan of £313,000 to finance the building of a further 54 houses at the Council's housing site at Ringnasillogue (Quann's). The loan to be repaid over a period of 50 years provides for the estimated cost of the houses, £303,000, payment of a Clerk of Works, £2,000, land costs, £6,000 and fees, £2,000.

Sanction by the Department of Local Government for the building of the houses, had been announced by the County Manager Mr. C. A. O'Connor at the previous meeting of the Council.

TWO NEW BOREHOLES COST £10,000

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council were informed in a report from the Town Clerk, Mr. B. White at last Monday night's meeting of the Council that the Department of Local Government had authorised the expenditure of £10,000 on the provision and testing of two extra boreholes at Ballinacuck for the augmentation of the town water supply. The report stated that the work of boring had been completed within the past few weeks and arrangements for the testing which would commence in the near future were in hand. The report requested the Council's approval for the raising of a loan to cover the expenditure, towards which a subsidy of 60% would be payable by the Department. The Council passed a resolution granting the necessary approval.

AFFANE ASSAULT CHARGES ADJOURNED

SUGAR COMPANY TURNOVER

INCREASED TO RECORD £40 MILLION—BUT PROFITS DROP

The Irish Sugar Company has returned profits of £667,000 on its latest trading year and increased its turnover by £3.6m to over £40m—the highest in its history.

The losses on Ernt Foods were again further reduced by £213,000 to £546,000 and there is a firm forecast of a breakthrough next year. Ernt now has a turnover in excess of £10m an increase in the past twelve months of almost £1.5m.

The Chairman of C.S.E.T. Mr R B Godsil in his annual report published today (Thursday, October 31) expresses disappointment at the drop in profits and attributes it to inflation to the oil crises last winter to failure to secure a price increase for sugar early last year and to the company's decision to hold down its fertilizer prices to assist beet growers.

Mr Godsil said that last year the Sugar Company produced its highest quantity of sugar ever from home beet—174,000 tons—but in the current year a shortfall of 10,000 acres in the potato under beet will make it impossible to maintain that level.

However there will be sufficient home produced sugar available to meet domestic needs in the coming year but imports will be necessary to meet requirements of those who export goods containing sugar. The greatest part of this sugar has already been purchased by the best acreage drop he attributes to "competition for land from other farming enterprises, especially milk and beef production".

Government success opens new opportunities. However the recent success of the Government in securing a far bigger EEC quota for Irish sugar than previously obviating has opened new opportunities for the industry. Referring to the new situation he said: "We welcome the recent decision of the EEC Council of Agriculture Ministers to increase this country's sugar production quota to 260,000 tons which gives us an 'A' quota of 179,000 tons equivalent to our present market requirements and in addition allows a B quota of 81,000 tons. Farmers can therefore look with confidence to the future of beet growing conscious of the fact that a guaranteed market exists for their crop at remunerative prices company is pleased to encourage farmers to produce at least sufficient sugar to meet our full home and export requirements and we hope that we will have their full cooperation in reaching this target. The Community also plans to subsidise a quantity of sugar to member countries experiencing a shortfall. This will mean the valuable export market for sugar goods can only be maintained if a realistic pricing policy is adopted which will ensure our competitiveness with the UK and other EEC countries. The vulnerability of the home market under free market conditions must also be kept in mind as we could find ourselves in a situation where alternative supplies would be made available at more attractive prices."

COUNTY RATE IS £6.47 IN £

COUNCIL WILL EXPEND MORE THAN £3M IN 1975

Waterford County Council, by unanimous decision adopted a rate of £6.47 in the £ for 1975 at their estimates meeting held in Dungarvan last Monday. The produce of this rate together with receipts of grants etc. will provide for a total expenditure of £3,152,433 during the year. The new rate is an increase of £1.31 on the rate of £5.16 which operated in the current year which because it ran for only 9 months has been called a 'short' year. The rate for the last 'full' year in 1973/74 was £5.84. Preventing the estimates, the County Manager, Mr. C. A. O'Connor stated in his report for 1974 had seen increases in prices far beyond the provision envisaged in some areas when the 1974 estimates were prepared. In compiling the estimates for 1975, the figures of 20% had been generally used but only time would tell whether this assumption was correct or not. The rates for the various services were varied on 1974 brackets, were detailed as follows: Roads £2.60 (+ 81p) Health 60p (-30p) Public Assistance 21p (+ 12p) Sanitary 50p (+ 30p) Housing 50p (- 8p) and General Purposes £1.63 (+ 47p). The Co. Manager pointed out that the public demand for improved and expanded services for roads, housing, water supply, scavenging, public lighting etc. inevitably meant a higher rate but while substantial advances had been made in the expansion of these services throughout the county in recent years, the rate of progress is sometimes hampered by the availability of adequate finance. Mr. O'Connor's report went on to state: "There are some who may be affected more than others by rising rates. But here it may be instructive—even if not as helpful as he might wish—for the householder who has a valuation of say £15 to £25 and lives in a town or village to compare his rates payment with other household charges such as those for electricity or a telephone. Rates after all are intended to meet a great part of the cost of what is today a very wide range of public services such as roads, water, sewerage, lighting, scavenging, fire brigades and libraries. To a lesser extent, nowadays rates meet the cost of Health and Housing Services. The rise in rate has not the same impact for all ratepayers and the effect of yearly additional allocations to the Agricultural Grant must be taken into account. The amount received by the Council each year is substantial and it is allocated so as to give the largest measure of relief to the small farmer."

reason he proposed that the estimate, as placed before them by the Co. Manager, be adopted. The Chairman said that the Council was legally obliged to go through the estimates and it was agreed to do so but after discussing various aspects of expenditure (for almost 2 1/2 hours) it was found that they were back where they started. Mr. O'Ryan again proposed that the rate, as submitted, be adopted and this time it was seconded by Mr. T. Healy who complimented the Council's staff for keeping the rate as low as it was. "However," he said, "if you want services you must pay for them."

An amendment by Senator Deasy that the striking of the rate be deferred to allow the Council another full meeting to again go through the figures was not proceeded with and the resolution was declared carried. Mr. P. Crotty congratulated the Co. Manager and officials on the good job they had done but said that while the rate increase might be reasonable it would still place a very heavy burden on farmers who would be hard pressed to find money to pay their rates next year. Mr. O'Connor Co. Manager said that while his name was at the foot of the report the preparation of the estimates was a team effort and he thanked the County Engineer, County Secretary and Mr. Tom Cunningham who he said had a most meritorious task of doing the job of County Accountant for the great co-operation and assistance he had received from them.

CALL TO MINISTER
A proposal made by Mr. P. Crotty which was carried by a big majority called on the Minister for Finance to pay the amount of the rate increase for the coming year from revenue which would be received from farmers on foot of the income tax they would have to pay in addition to rates under the government's new proposals.

ACCUSED OPTS FOR TRIAL BY JUDGE AND JURY
Philip Handorf, with a present address at Main Street, Cappoquin, opted for trial by judge and jury when he appeared before Justice B. J. Carroll at Dungarvan Court last week on charge of larceny.
Handorf is charged with breaking and entering the joinery works of Waterford Joinery Ltd., at Ballinacree, Dungarvan, between August 15 and September 12 last and stealing doors to a total value of £39.50. He is also charged with receiving the property knowing it to have been stolen.
When the charges were read to Handorf he said he wanted to be tried by judge and jury rather than summarily in the district court.
Adjourning the charges to December 11, Justice Carroll said this should enable the State to present the book of evidence.
Supt. M. English prosecuted and Mrs. Geraldine Bonner Soler (Farrell & Morrissey, Dungarvan) appeared for the accused.

UNCONTROLLABLE TENT-DWELLERS AT HELVICK CARAVAN PARK

Waterford County Council at their meeting in Dungarvan last Monday unanimously agreed, on the proposal of Mr. P. Goode seconded by Mr. P. Crotty, to prohibit as heretofore the use of the area used as a caravan park at Helvick. Reporting on the present position in regard to this controversial matter the County Manager, Mr. A. C. O'Connor, stated that during the year legal proceedings were instituted against the Council in regard to the use of the land at Helvick which the Council permitted (at a charge) the parking of caravans and tents.
The report went on: "The Council decided that the area should be developed as a caravan park. The estimated cost is approximately £4,000 and on the basis of providing spaces to the standards applicable to licensed caravan parks in the county the area could not be made a self-supporting venture. The Council succeeded in having the proceedings adjourned until the end of the season."
The report then referred to future prospects and stated: "The Council are now faced with the position of constructing an uneconomic caravan park or prohibiting the use of the area as heretofore. From inquiries made caravans using the location were mainly first-time users in the current season. In addition considerable annoyance to permanent residents and caravanners was caused by tent-dwellers on the site who were uncontrollable. It is clear that from an economic and environmental view the continuation of the use of the location as a camping site is not fruitful. The Council should now make a decision one way or the other in this matter."
Mr. M. Harty dissented from the decision to prohibit the use of the park stating that this would prove a big loss to local shopkeepers especially during the summer.



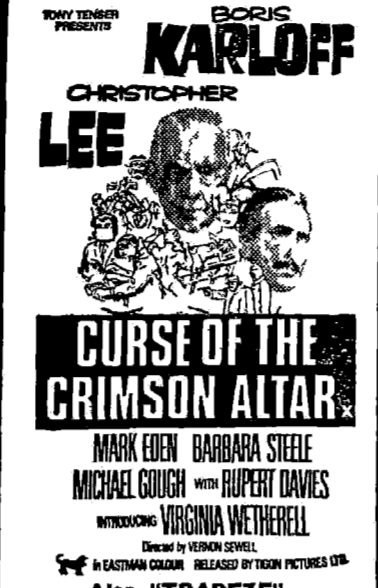
