Behind the SPOTLIGHT

GROWING TOWN—SHRINKING SERVICE

Dungarvan is a developing town which is growing fast but while this is so, the oddest thing is that one of the most essential of public services for the urban area, the collection of domestic refuse, is being cut by fifty per cent as from Monday next, November 11.

Up to this, most areas of the town have had a double refuse collection each week but from next Monday on there will only be one collection for each area. This despite the fact that the cost of the urban scavenging service has soared and the number of men employed by the Urban Council to either service the scavenging truck or sweep the streets has jumped enormously in the last few years.

The normal working week for most workers runs to five days at present in this country—unless there is some industrial crisis which calls for a four or even three day working week. But it is only when such a crisis crops up that the working week is so cut. However the members of Dungarvan Urban Council seem to have swallowed, hook line and sinker, the proposals put forward by the officials of the Council to cut the refuse collection service to a four day week. Only one member, Mr. P. Whelan, objected and when he proposed an amendment to the proposal made by Senator Deasy seconded by Mr. R. Walsh that the new four-day schedule be approved, he did not even receive a seconder.

The recommendations to cut back the service show little appreciation of what it is to hold household refuse and food left-overs from a normal sized household of six or seven people, including children, for a full week. Neither do they seem to recognise the predicament in which flat-dwellers in the urban area will find themselves in this regard, either. The refuse and old food will just have to be kept and it will readily be understood that this will at once constitute a fresh health hazard as it could well encourage the appearance of rats and the dangers that go with them.

One of the ideas behind the reduction of the existing schedule is to afford an entire day for the servicing of the scavenging truck. This is a vehicle which costs in thousands of pounds but even at the farthest stretch of the imagination it should not require one full day every week to service it so that it can remain in action. Its capital cost was so large that to have it out of action, even for one day, can be counted as a heavy loss for the rate-payers and because of the officials' recommendation, backed by the majority of the Council members, this loss is going to be multiplied by two.

Another point that strikes me is that a few years ago we had an electric truck on scavenging service in the town but this survived only a comparatively short time compared with a similar truck operated by a private commercial firm in the town and which is now being scrapped after a service career of sixteen years. When we inquired what happened to the Council's electric truck we were told that it was sold to a farmer in the Modeligo area, a sum which could only be described as pin money. The proposed cut-back in essential service of domestic refuse collecting is not good enough and the residents of Dungarvan should be rumpus about it. What is a democracy do we have or indeed what kind of Council that they accept a kind of recommendation from official sources little or no demerit. What is good of building more more houses if we cannot have the required essential

services for the people who are to live in them? There should be second thoughts about this.

A RECORD OF EIGHTY YEARS AGO

I am indebted to a Dungarvan reader who has passed to me a copy of "Egan's Waterford Guide" which has lately come into his possession. The "Guide," compiled by P. M. Egan was published, as far as I can gather, in 1894 and while it deals more comprehensively with Waterford City, it covers most areas of the county by describing a number of "tours."

As we will be referring to the Tower of Ardmore (again) later on in the column, I thought that some excerpts from the "Guide," as they refer to Ardmore would prove of some interest. Describing the tower which included Ardmore, the author has the following to say:

"If we reach by an early train at Dungarvan, it is possible to drive to Ardmore and back so as to catch the late train in the evening for Waterford. Ardmore means the great height on this bay stands a small lonely village, fronted by a magnificent beach, and backed by the Drumfeneen mountains, where in olden days the seeds of ecclesiastical history were sown by St. Declan, who consecrated this spot as one of the very earliest upon which the Cross was planted in pagan Ireland before the coming of St. Patrick. The Annals of Innisfallen announce that Ciaran and Diaglan came from Rome as bishops Ciaran founded Saighir (Queen's County) and Diaglan erected another cathedral in Ardmore among the Desis. And at the Synod of Cashel, held by St. Patrick, both were confirmed in their respective sees. It is even alleged that St. Declan when seven years old was baptised in this vicinity by St. Colman, who preceded him, and that after some years he travelled to Rome, where he was ordained, and returned to Ardmore in the year 402 to found an Abbey and a bishopric."

The "Guide" then goes on to deal with the ancient buildings which are still to be found in Ardmore and has this to say:

"The buildings which make Ardmore so famous are three, viz. St. Declan's oratory, the round tower and the old church. The oratory is a small building measuring 13 feet 4 inches by 8 feet 9 inches in the clear, and is the smallest and most ancient ecclesiastical building in Ireland. It is sometimes called Leaba Declan, that is, the bed of Declan. It bears the impress of a church raised in the earliest ages of the christian faith having low, narrow apses, arches cut out of single stones, horizontal lintels, angular headed windows, etc. St. Declan died in 450, and his grave is pointed out as occupying a corner of the oratory. Some people think this building was simply the tomb of the saint but this cannot be, as it is plainly an ancient church built east and west, and was used by him during his life as his place of worship, where he was subsequently buried. It was roofed about the year 1726 by Bishop Miles."

Author Egan then goes on to describe three Ogham stones bearing inscriptions which were found one of which had been built into the eastern gable of the oratory and has this to say about it:

"The inscription, if readings of such can be at all considered credible has been deciphered by the eminent authority Mr. Brash as follows: 'Lugud died and was the son of

STOLE BECAUSE SISTER WAS IN SHEER POVERTY

A 27 year old married labourer who returned from England to find his sister living in "sheer poverty" in Tipperary, committed a number of offences, District Justice B. J. Carroll was told at Youghal Court last Friday.

Patrick Connors, c/o 24 Glenview Square, Tipperary, appeared in custody, and pleaded guilty to three charges of breaking and entering between October 24 and 26 and stealing property to the value of £19.50.

Inspector J. Walsh said when Connors arrived home from England he found his sister living in "sheer poverty". Her husband was in England and there wasn't food in the house or a fire in the kitchen. When apprehended, the defendant claimed he committed the offences to help his sister. He arrived home from England with about £80 in cash but spent it all in a very short time. He had no previous convictions and all the stolen property had been recovered.

The Justice said that in view of the defendant's previous good record, the fact that all the property had been recovered and the fact he had broken into unoccupied houses, he would send him to prison.

Instead he sentenced him to three months imprisonment, to be suspended on his entering a bond to keep the peace and be of good behaviour for 12 months.

NO SALMON FISHING WITHIN THREE YEARS UNLESS PROBLEM TACKLED NOW

A call to tackle the problem of disappearing salmon stocks on a European basis was made at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday. It came from Mr. P. Crotty who said that the matter was so serious that unless steps were taken now there would be no salmon fishing within three years.

Mr. Crotty said that several reasons, including overfishing, were being quoted for the drop in the number of salmon in Irish waters. He held that despite the dangers of pollution we still had the cleanest rivers in Europe but salmon stocks were still disappearing.

"I think that the answer to this problem is to build massive hatcheries in the rivers and to literally hatch out millions of salmon."

He went on to say that this was not just an Irish problem but also a European problem and probably a world problem as well. It should be tackled on a European basis and Brussels should be prepared to finance the erection of these hatcheries so that the European demand for salmon could be met in the years ahead. He agreed that Bord Iascaigh Mhara had done great work but he did not think B.I.M. was big enough to deal with this problem on its own.

Mr. Crotty then proposed that they ask the Minister for Agriculture & Fisheries to raise the matter in Brussels and to see if he could get backing for the necessary development aid.

Mr. C. Curran who seconded the motion said that it was one of the most important to be discussed by the Committee as the livelihood of thousands of fishermen depended on salmon fishing. There was no doubt that Mr. Crotty was correct when he stated that salmon stocks were facing extermination unless massive conservation steps were taken. He thought they could do a lot in this country to help the situation by the proper protection of spawning salmon in rivers during the close season. At present he said that salmon were being killed in big numbers during the close season.

The resolution was passed unanimously.

Mr. J. Cullinane pointed out that up to a few years ago when it was closed there was a salmon hatchery in Lismore which he understood was operated by the Lismore Board of Fishery Conservators in conjunction with the Lismore Estate. He suggested that the Board be written to and asked why this hatchery was closed as there may have been a good reason for doing so and it would be as well to find out.

SEPARATE MINISTRIES

Earlier the Committee adopted a resolution from the Kerry County Committee calling on the Government to set up a separate Department to deal with fisheries as distinct from the Department of Agriculture which at present dealt with both.

Mr. P. Crotty said that Mr. Byrne had always been most courteous and helpful to everyone who sought his advice. He congratulated him on his new appointment and remarked it is our loss that he is going from us.

COURT SEQUEL TO INCIDENTS ON TALLOW HORSE FAIR NIGHT

Incidents on the night of Tallow's annual horse fair during which a number of gardai were assaulted, were recalled at Youghal Court last Friday when a 20 year old factory worker, Paul Heaphy, of Sarsfield Terrace, Youghal appeared on three charges.

The defendant who it was stated had got married five weeks ago, pleaded guilty to a charge of assaulting Garda Patrick Kirby in the execution of his duty at Convent Street, Tallow, on September 3 last. In reply to charges of taking up a collection without a permit and refusing to give his name and address to the gardai Heaphy replied nothing to say.

The defendant declined to give evidence under oath and added that he had nothing to say in relation to the charges.

Commenting that Heaphy's record was very bad, District Justice B. J. Carroll said it would be as well for him to turn over a new leaf. He fined the defendant £10 on the charge of making a collection without a permit bound him to the peace for 12 months for assaulting Garda Kirby and marked the remaining charge of refusing to give his name and address "proved".

Frank Landers (26) and Brendan Whyte (23) both of Sarsfield Terrace, Youghal, who failed to appear on a charge of assaulting Sergeant J. Barrett at Tallow, on September 3 had bench warrants issued for their arrest.

AGRICULTURAL INSTRUCTOR RESIGNS

Members of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture at their meeting in Dungarvan last Monday joined in congratulating Mr. Michael B. Byrne who has been senior Agricultural Instructor in the county for a long number of years on the occasion of his resignation from the County Agricultural Advisory Service to take up a position as Deputy Chief Agricultural Officer in Co. Kilkenny.

In his letter of resignation Mr. Byrne thanked the members of the Committee and the officials for their help during his years in the county. His resignation will date from December 31 next and he will take over his new position on the following day.

Mr. K. O. Ryan, Chairman said that Mr. Byrne had given excellent service to the farmers of Waterford for a long number of years and he had been Acting CAO for a period following the retirement of Mr. Pat Conroy.

Because of increased costs which the ESB has to pay for its supplies of oil electricity bills have since the beginning of the year been subject to a fuel cost variation. The fuel cost variation for the September/October billing period (these bills will issue this month) is 0.478p on every unit of electricity used in that period.
