IT MUST BE THE PEOPLE'S CHOICE

There can be no doubt whatever as to the method which must be followed if the next President of Ireland is to be properly chosen. It must be done in accordance with the Constitution which lays it down that the President shall be elected by the free vote of the people. It is an issue on which the people expect to be given the right to vote and this right should not be taken from them by any back-room negotiations among the political parties to find what they would like us to believe was an "agreed" candidate.

Following the great interest in the Presidency aroused among the people by the emotional sequences of the obsequies of the late President Childers as depicted in the extensive coverage by television, radio and press, of the State funeral which took place only last week, it must be ensured that his successor is indeed the choice of the people and must be seen to be so.

Because of the new dimension which President Childers brought to the highest office in the land during his seven-month tenure in Arus An Uachtaran, of which such great play was made by the commentators and writers covering his regretted and sudden demise, anything other than an election by the people would reduce the status of the Presidency rather than enhance it.

As I write this no definite steps have been taken to select candidates but I trust that this procedure will be followed and that at least two candidates will be presented to enable the people to make their choice on December 18 which has been fixed as polling day. The democratic process must not be tampered with for the sake of expediency or because the politicians find this an inopportune time to face an election.

ROAD MARKINGS AND TRAFFIC SIGNS

Controversy continues in Dungarvan as to the need or otherwise of traffic lights at Mary Street corner at the Square. A further collision at the junction between two cars last Sunday afternoon has added to the heat of the arguments I have said before and despite this latest accident, I repeat, that I do not believe traffic lights will solve the problem here.

There have been doubts expressed as to who has the right of way there and from enquiries I made during the week the official attitude is that the only vehicles with the right of through passage at the junction are those coming across the Square from the Bridge Street end. Stop signs at the bottom of Mary Street should effectively control traffic approaching from that side while a yield sign at Main Street should control traffic approaching the junction from that end.

Perhaps the erection of another yield sign at the O'Connell Street approach would help to slow drivers coming from that direction. At least this should be a help as I have also said before, the co-operation of drivers in using more care and attention.

While on this matter of traffic I feel I must also refer to the corner at the top of Mary Street which is almost as much a hazard as the one at the bottom. I was told that during the past week a few of those huge continental juggernauts ran through the junction on to Market Street before the drivers realised they were off course. Had any cars been selling on to the junction from Mary Street at those times it would have been just bad for the occupants. Perhaps if the direction sign beside the Presbytery at Market Street were properly placed these drivers, strangers to the town, would realise

that there was a sharp right-angle turn ahead of them. As it is at present the arrow on the sign really sends traffic trundling on down to the swimming pool!

And just one other thing, would someone remove the direction sign in O'Connell Street which points Tramore in the direction of Cappoquin. It has been there for several months now. Attention to these few details, minor as they appear should also be a help.

REGIONAL HEALTH BOARDS

In the course of an article in last week's issue of the "Irish Medical Times" under the heading "Health Boards, Little Improvement On Old System," an anonymous medical correspondent has this to say "One of the big criticisms of the area health boards is the remoteness, in every sense of the word, of the headquarters from the local scene. Added to this is the elaborate administrative set-up. There are programme managers for this and that, finance officers, functional officers, personnel officers, senior and junior administrative officers and a host of others. The poor county manager, with all his faults or shortcomings had a county secretary and a staff officer to help him out in health matters and it could be convincingly argued that the health services ran equally well, or badly, under the old system."

The article then states "The question must be put whether the present imperial-scale administration earns its keep and further whether it has brought about a worthwhile improvement in health services. Any recent changes in health services could have been dealt with by the county councils. It would be a very interesting exercise to compare the administrative costs of health boards with those of the health (authorities or sections of the county councils). We could then see whether in fact we are getting value for money. I suggest that the difference in costs is enormous and I don't see the value for the extra money spent."

I indeed I have heard similar criticisms about the remoteness of the regional health boards as they function at present voiced on several occasions in the past by members of our own county council. County Waterford has only two elected representatives on this board and all representations on health matters in the county must be made through them to the monthly meetings which are held in Kilkenny where the headquarters staff of the board is located.

The question as to the administrative costs and whether the services now being provided represent value for money is another which could well be examined.

THE CAPPOQUIN-LISMORE ROAD

My comments on the continued good work being done by the County Council in clearing and extending the pathway along the Cappoquin-Lismore road has prompted a reader from Lismore to write as follows "I agree wholeheartedly with your remarks concerning the pathway on the Cappoquin-Lismore road. However do you not consider that the same roadway needs widening, particularly the Salterbridge ("Kitchenhole") area. Now that portion of the wood has been cleared at the "Kitchenhole" isn't the time now ripe to remove this embankment for widening purposes as the Blackwater has undermined portion of the main road at this point. Keep up the good work!"

When I put this point to the County Engineer, Mr J D Hally, during the week he assured me that the County Council had definite plans for the acquisition of land at this point for the purpose of widening the road. The ero-

DUNGARVAN RATE WILL BE £6.44

TOWN SERVICES TO COST OVER £101,000 IN '75

Dungarvan Urban Council unanimously adopted a rate of £6.44 for 1975 at their annual estimates meeting held last Monday night. The rate provides for a total expenditure of £122,870 of which £101,461 will be for town services and the balance to meet the statutory demand from the County Council. The rate is an increase of £1.35 over the current year. The service which accounted for by far the highest increase (£21.02 of the £1.35) was the Sanitary Service which covers the scavenging, street cleaning, sewerage and water. The other 33p was spread over the urban roads, the county demand and general purposes charges (total £70p) while there was a reduction of 35p in the housing charges, the only service to show a reduced figure. This was due to the policy of the government in phasing out the rate contribution for this service over a 4-year period which commenced in 1973.

Commenting on the jump in expenditure for water supplies from £20,137 this year to £17,958 for 1975, Mr P Whelan was informed by the Acting Town Clerk, Mr B White that the ESB pumping charges were escalating month by month. They had to pump continually by day and did not have an adequate storage tank. The pumping charges at the moment were running at £700 per month. When Senator A Deasy suggested that the water meter charges be increased from 12p per 1,000 gallons to 15p which would bring the charge more in line with the average charged in other towns (up to 35p in some) the Co Manager Mr G A O'Connor said he did not think this would be an opportune time to increase these charges.

In reply to Mr John A Murphy, the Town Clerk said that the cost of producing water varied from town to town if they had a gravity supply in Dungarvan there would be no pumping charges. When Mr Whelan pointed to the huge increase in the scavenging service from £7,997 this year to £16,443 the Town Clerk said that as far back as 1968 the Council had never provided sufficient money to cover the cost of this service and they had always to overspend. Before the end of the present year he estimated they would overspend the figure of £7,997 by between £2,000 and £3,000.

E.S.B TREATING PEOPLE WITH COMPLETE DISREGARD SAYS COUNCILLOR

Members of Waterford County Council strongly criticised the E.S.B at a special meeting of the Council in Dungarvan last Monday at which proposals for road works in the county for 1975, as submitted by the County Engineer, Mr J D Hally, were considered in detail and approved.

At the time the criticisms were made the Council were informed that the E.S.B are erecting of extra public lights in 1975. These totalled 32 and included the following 1 each at the churches at Afrane, Glengine and Piltown 3 in Ardmore/Clonacree, 5 in Dunmore East 3 in Tramore, 3 on the Kilmachomas/Newtown road, 5 on the Leamybrien/Carrick-on-Sur road, 5 in Lismore, 1 in Farnham and 2 at Bishmeigh Heights approach road in Waterford.

At this stage Mr P Kenneally asked what had happened in regard to the extra lights which had been approved for this year. They had not been provided so far and he asked what the reason for the delay was. Mr Hally pointed out that the Council's estimates meeting for 1974 had been held only last March. He had placed the order for all lights then approved by the Council with the E.S.B a couple of months ago. Mr Kenneally said that the E.S.B who are holding up the matter so.

Mr Kenneally said that this showed that the E.S.B were treating the people with complete disregard. They are like a big octopus grabbing up everything and they are just using the people he said. He said that just like all other semi-state bodies when they get a grip they just stood on people.

NO APPLICATION FOR CABLE T.V. SYSTEMS IN COUNTY SAYS P & T MINISTER

Mr E Collins TD raised the matter of a cable television system for the county in the Dail lately when he asked the Minister for Posts & Telegraphs if it could be expected that cable television would be installed in Dungarvan, Kilmachomas Portlaoighailow, Lismore, Cappoquin and Ardmore. In his reply the Minister Dr Cruise-O'Brien stated:

No applications have been received for licences to provide cable television systems in any of the areas mentioned by the Deputy. I am advised that there is doubt whether signals of sufficient strength and reliability are available off air in the areas in question to provide satisfactory multi channel cable television systems. However if any interested cable operator or group submits to my Department evidence from tests taken over a reasonable period that usable signals which would provide acceptable reception are available off air the question of holding competitions for licences to provide multi-channel cable systems will be considered.

DUNGARVAN'S NEW SCAVENGING SERVICE UNSATISFACTORY Council To Revert To Old System

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council discussed the new schedule for the collection of domestic refuse in the town introduced a few weeks ago at their meeting last Monday night and it was generally agreed that as this had proved unsatisfactory to revert to the old system which had been in operation up to the time of the change-over. It was also agreed to find out the cost of providing a double collection in all areas of the town and this will be discussed at the next meeting.

Opening discussion on the matter, Mr P Whelan said that the new schedule had now been in operation for a number of weeks but from what he had heard it had proved unsatisfactory from the point of view of both the general public and the men engaged. He said that the latter had now to be out half the night making the collections which was a serious matter. As the change had proved so unsatisfactory he said they should go back to the system that was in operation before.

Mr T Wade agreed with this and said that when he was leaving his house at 7.30 pm that night the dust bins had still not been collected and were being attacked by dogs. Mr Whelan said that the present position was most unsatisfactory. It was 9 pm before bins were collected in some areas.

Mr P Walsh Town Engineer, asked for his comments on the change over. He said that it had not worked as he hoped it would. All he knew was that the new system had not worked. It was taking the men a lot longer to do the work and he really did not know why this should be so.

When Mr Whelan asked whether it was proposed to go back to the old schedule the Co Manager Mr C O'Connor replied that if the Council wanted that it would be done. But he warned the Council that there would be financial implications. They had been concerned with the cost of the service and wanted to ensure that the present scavenging truck was not overtaxed. The new schedule had been introduced to find out if this could be done but obviously this had not proved satisfactory. The town was expanding very rapidly he said and the services would have to be extended but a new truck would be very costly and there was a long delay in delivery.

NO SPARE CAPACITY

The Manager replied that this showed that they had no spare capacity for refuse collection and therefore alternative arrangements would have to be made.

Mr Whelan referring to the point made by the Town Engineer said that in having a single collection a week in each area it was taking the men twice as long as before as they had to collect twice as much from each house. It was dangerous to have the collections made at night he said as the men could not see what they were picking up and consequently the truck could be more easily damaged.

Mr John A Murphy said that people in housing estates in the town who had only one collection where others had two under the old system should now be given two collections each week if the status quo was going to be reverted to. Houses in all areas should be treated equally in this regard he said and before any decision was reached he thought the Town Engineer should go into the financial implications which this would mean and report to the next meeting.

Mr Walsh Town Engineer said that if this were to be done it would mean that the Council would either have to have a bigger staff or to have two vehicles and two crews.

It was agreed that the present system should be changed back and that the Town Engineer would report on the cost of a double weekly collection for all areas of the town for the next meeting.

FIRST COUNTY HURLING TITLE FOR STRADBALLY

Deserving Win In Great Final

Stradbally 1-10
Mount Sion 0-9

Stradbally made club history at the Fraher Field, Dungarvan on Sunday last when they won their first ever county hurling title in any grade with a well deserved win over Mount Sion in the junior hurling county final.

Four points separated two gallant sides after a game which will be long remembered for its sheer hurling splendour and the attitude of both sides and the nerve which, under uncertainty of a second half loaded with hurling at its brilliant best.

Indeed, it was one of the best finals in this grade in a long time and far surpassed the intermediate final which followed it. It was a deserving title win for Stradbally who pressed hard throughout the hour and at one stage in the second half when things looked dangerous for them and there was a danger that they would succumb to a typical Mount Sion rally the Reds mustered their forces magnificently, scaled new heights of hurling splendour reasserted superiority and went on to register a fine win.

They had first use of the strong breeze and after three minutes had a tonic start when Robin Ahearne shot a goal a minute later. Meehan had Mount Sion's first score at the point. Three minutes later Sean Ahearne had the best point of the game when he scored from all of 85 yards for Stradbally. Tom Hearne who emerged as the 'man of the match' shot a Stradbally point from a free in the 8th minute to leave them 1-2 to 0-1 ahead. This tally was boosted by points from Richie Dunford and Hearne by the 17th minute but then came a period of intense Mount Sion pressure which yielded only one point from a free by Frankie Walsh in the 23rd minute. But it was Stradbally who finished the half strongest as Tom Hearne had points (free 25 minute, play 29th minute) to leave the winners 1-6 to 0-2 ahead at the break.

Mount Sion started the second half in fine style with the wind behind them and within sixty seconds Frankie Walsh sent over a point. Thirty seconds later he had a point from play and had another from a free in the 33rd minute. Two minutes later J O'Connor had a point to leave it 1-6 to 0-3. Matty Reilly had a Stradbally point in the 37th minute. Mount Sion were rampant and points followed from T Somers and F Walsh and there was only two points between the sides.

Things looked serious for Stradbally but they met the challenge head on and it was in the final twenty minutes that they showed their true worth as they produced the best hurling of the game to hurl back defiance at Mount Sion.

Tom Hearne pointed a free in the 43rd minute. Joe Curran added another in the 46th and Matty Reilly's point a minute later left Stradbally 1-10 to 0-8 ahead. Agam Mount Sion came back and for the last ten minutes exerted relentless pressure but the Stradbally defence were unshakable on two occasions the Mount Sion pressure almost brought about scores but on both occasions the ball was taken off the line and Sion's only reward was a O'Connor point which left Stradbally holding a 1-10 to 0-9 lead at the finish.

TALLOW BACK IN SENIOR RANKS

RUNAWAY WIN IN I.H. FINAL

Tallow 4-11; Clonea 1-2.

There is very little one can say about this intermediate hurling county final played at Fraher Field, Dungarvan on Sunday last. So great was Tallow's dominance and so polished their performance that the game was over literally before it even started.

It was a poor game, more by reason of the fact that Clonea just failed to match Tallow in every department coupled with the inevitability of the result from very early on.

However, it was a great day for Tallow who produced some excellent hurling despite the one-sidedness of the affair. Historic too in that it marks the Bridesiders return rather belatedly, after a lapse of almost four decades to the senior grade.

It was in fact an honour long delayed for a club which had done so much to foster the game. But it is one which will also be long savoured up Tallow way.

This was Tallow's title from beginning to end and Tom Doyle's point after four minutes heralded a deluge of scores. Eddie Condon pointed from frees in the 5th and 6th minutes. J Curley goalied in the 12th minute and S Treacy had a further point before J Walsh had Clonea's first score a goal in the 22nd minute.

It was Tallow again however as Eddie Condon pointed frees in the 23rd and 25th minutes and when Billy Ryan goalied to leave Tallow 2-5 to 1-0 ahead at the break there could be just one outcome.

The second half continued in the same vein as all hopes of a Clonea revival were dashed by a Tallow point seconds after the restart and Billy Ryan's second goal in the 36th minute. There was little fight left in the losers after this and even though they had two points Tallow were worth every bit of their 4-11 to 1-3 winning total at the finish.

Waterford suffered their third successive defeat in Div 1A of the National Hurling League and their fourth in the current campaign at Tulla Co. Clare, last Sunday when they were well beaten by the home county.

This last defeat must all but put paid to Waterford's battle to stave off relegation, and must highlight the slump which has hit Waterford hurling at a time when they seemed to be on the way back to prominence.

Last Sunday they were truly outclassed by Clare in a game which never rose to any great heights. Conditions were extremely poor but the home county's eight point margin stamps them as worthy winners while Waterford's total of five points is an ominous sign of things to come. The Waterford attack promised much when in possession but invariably failed to find the finishing power and most of their best efforts were negated as a result.

On the change-over they went on the offensive in earnest and points from Mossie Walsh, Stephen Greene and John Kirwan left them only three points behind Clare. But they could not sustain the effort and when Clare came back at them they had nothing in reserve.

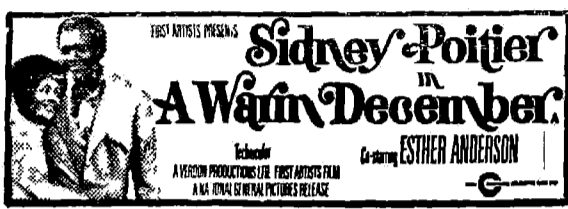
