## PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

### ON TIGHTENING OUR BELTS

Government Ministers, individually and collectively, have been issuing warnings in recent weeks about the necessity for tightening our belts if we are to survive in the hard times that are ahead. Workers have been told that they should not make excessive pay claims, and stress has been laid on the need to conserve our usage of petrol and oil and of the obligation which rests upon each and everyone of us to support Irish industries by buying home produced goods.

No one can quibble about this. The Minister for Finance, Mr. Richie Ryan speaking in Roscrea last Friday night is reported as saying that confidence in our ability to weather the economic storm was essential and that confidence was the basis of the government's economic strategy.

But it is in this matter of the government's strategy that the confidence of a big number of the ordinary people falters. While advising a tightening of the wage claim belts for workers, the government slipped in a fine fat round of wage and salary increases for themselves and for the deputies and senators of the Dail and Seanad while the "perks" which go with these jobs, such as travelling expenses and subsistence allowances, also got a big lift.

At this week's meeting of Waterford County Council, the Minister for Local Government informed the members that if they wished to approve of a proposal to increase their mileage allowance to 15p per mile and also to increase their subsistence allowances for attending meetings, he would raise no objection. With no more than two members objecting to the Minister's proposal, the increases were passed.

When those involved in government at central and local levels take decisions of these kinds at times like the present one may well be excused for asking if the belt tightening exercise is one that applies not to them but only to those who in the long run must foot the bill—the ordinary man in the street. If there is a need to tighten belts, as those who recognise the fast gathering signs of the economic crisis which is fast overtaking us will readily agree there is, then it should be a matter for belt tightening at all levels and the example should come down from the top. But it has not been so. The politicians have first feathered their nests and have left the hair-shirts for John Citizen.

**WAS HE HONEST**

Another decision which has shaken the confidence of the people in the government was the shock announcement made by the Minister for Finance "merely as a courtesy measure to the Dail" last week, increasing the price of petrol by almost 30 per cent to a record 65p per gallon. The fact that the announcement was initially made as it was, displays the type of arrogance which several government Ministers have shown more and more in recent times.

The announcement was made in the Dail but without any opportunity being afforded for a debate on the decision. This debate has since taken place, due to the insistence of the Opposition, but irrespective of what was said in it, and I write this before any report on the debate was published, I believe that the Minister was not honest in stating his reasons for the huge increase.

He wished us to believe that his action was motivated by the need to cut down petrol consumption and that the £30 million plus which the government would collect as a bonus in taxation was merely incidental. He could have curbed the use of petrol more effect-

ively by introducing a rationing system but then there would have been no tax bonanza for the almost empty coffers of the government—money which they require, among other things, to pay their own salary increases.

In treating the public in this cavalier fashion and in rating our intelligence quotient at something less than zero, the Minister can hardly escape the accusation of being guilty of scandalous conduct. Certainly actions of these kinds by Ministers for which the government must accept collective responsibility do very little to maintain the confidence and respect of the public.

## COUNTY COUNCIL MOTION ON GAELTACHT ROAD SIGNS "ILLEGAL"

### But No Change For Present

A new twist was given to the controversy concerning the erection of road signs in the Gaeltacht at the quarterly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday. Following a request from Ogras Na Rime (A Youth Organisation in Ring) to have the signs in Irish only, the Council at a meeting last month decided by 10 votes to 7 that the signs should be bilingual with the Irish name being shown in larger characters than the English.

At last Monday's meeting Mr. W. Kennedy T.D. who favoured the request of Ogras in the first instance referred to a section of the Road Traffic Act and said this laid it down that in an area which was determined to be Gaeltacht area the names of the districts displayed on road signs shall be in Irish only. For this reason he claimed that the Chairman had been wrong in accepting the other motion at the previous meeting.

Mr. C. Curran, Chairman said that he or the other members of the Council were not aware of this fact at the time. He pointed out, however, that under the Constitution there were two official languages and he thought that the Council had acted reasonably in the circumstances. He said that he had met members of Ogras since and also a number of people from Ring and they had all been satisfied with the attitude of the Council.

Mr. P. Kennedy said that according to the regulation in the Road Traffic Act the motion to have bilingual signs in Ring was illegal.

Mr. J. D. Hally Co. Engineer pointed out that there were no road signs at all in the Ring area at present. Those that were there had to be taken down because they were illegal. The Chairman claimed that this interference with the existing road signs in Ring had been the work of only a small minority in the district. He said that the majority of the residents there were satisfied with the bilingual signs.

The matter was deferred to allow the Co. Engineer to look into the point raised by Deputy Kennedy.

The Minister could have been a little more "approximate" and merely said that the total was £150 million. But it surely is a fat yield from VAT for the year no matter what way you look at it!

## DUNGARVAN CREDIT UNION REPORT EXCELLENT YEAR

The sixth AGM of Dungarvan Credit Union Ltd was held on Wednesday November 27. Mr. E. P. King, President, welcomed the delegates and spoke of the excellent year which the Credit Union had had in 1974. He said that being good members of the Credit Union they were doing something that was Christian. Mr. King went on to ask those who are deeply involved in the Credit Union to become more involved and those who do nothing to come along and help where they can. I advise you that Morlaix city and Waterford are going to be twinned and that we are studying the creation of a straight maritime line from Roscoff to Waterford.

## BIG JUMP IN TRAVELLING EXPENSES FOR CO. COUNCILLORS

A letter from the Minister for Local Government Mr. Tully, in which it was stated that he was prepared to approve of new rates of travelling expenses and subsistence allowances for members if they applied for them came under strong criticism at a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday.

The Minister's letter stated that the rate for travelling expenses could be increased to 15p per mile (up 4p on the existing rate of 11p) while the subsistence rate could be increased from £1.60 to £2.25 in respect of an absence of 3 hours from home at a meeting and from £2.25 to £3.25 where the absence lasted 7 hours. The increases would be payable retrospectively from the first meeting held after the Local Elections in June.

Mr. T. Kyne, T.D. proposed and Mr. Cahill seconded a resolution to approve of the new rates.

Mr. K. O'Ryan said that he wanted to protest against this proposal just as he did in the case of the increases which the Dail Deputies and Senators had granted themselves. It was absolutely outrageous he said. It was only a couple of days previously when he was looking at the latest increases more closely that he saw that they came to more than many working men took home altogether in their weekly pay packets.

"We have 80,000 or 90,000 unemployed in the country while some people are getting £200 a week," he said, "and all this as poor consolation for those who are drawing the dole." He said that those responsible for all this should be ashamed of themselves.

**TOTAL DISASTER**

Mr. C. Curran, Chairman said that the simple solution was that any member who did not want to take the increases offered could refuse them.

Mr. P. Crotty retorted that this was a "loopy backhand" on the part of the Chairman. He went on to say that they had been hearing a lot from the government about tightening their belts and using less petrol but the government had now bought a fleet of new Mercedes cars and had given themselves big increases. They should show the example instead of doing what they are doing and I agree with Mr. O'Ryan in this," he said.

MALICIOUS INJURY CLAIMS AGAINST WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

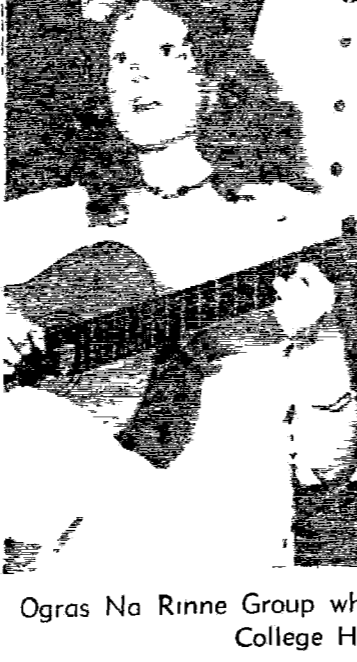
Claims under the Malicious Injuries Act were dealt with by Judge Fawcitt at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week.

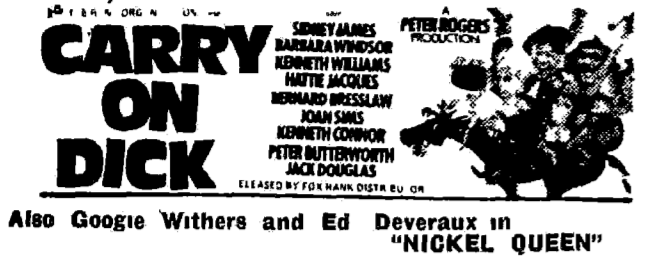

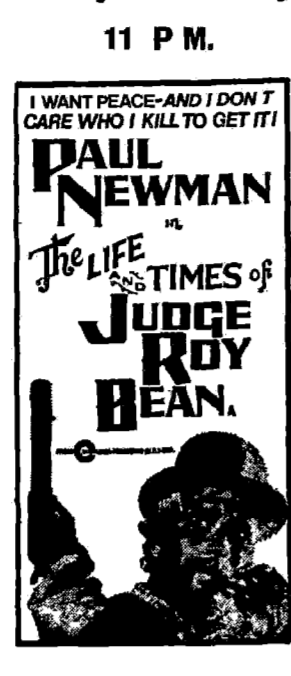
