**MOTORIST WHO FAILED TO STOP FOR TRAFFIC CORPS SERGEANT**

A motorist who failed to stop when signalled to do so by Sergeant Hurley of the Garda Traffic Corps was fined £12 by District Justice Carroll at Dungarvan Court.

He was James Cotter, labourer, Ballykerogue, Stradbally who pleaded guilty to the offence.

Supt. M. English who prosecuted stated that at about 11.15 p.m. on the night of November 16 Sergeant Hurley and members of the corps were on duty at the New Lane, Abbeyside. The Sergeant was wearing a scotch-lite belt and when he saw a car coming from the direction of Dungarvan which he estimated was travelling at about 40 m.p.h. he signalled it to pull up with a torch. The car veered round the Sergeant and passed on.

The Supt. went on to say that the Gardaí went in pursuit and that the defendant tried to avoid being caught by veering off on to another road. Finally he was caught and when asked why he had not stopped he gave as an explanation that he had not seen the Sergeant on the road.

The District Justice struck out a charge of dangerous driving on the occasion against the defendant but imposed a fine of £12 for failing to stop and ordered that the conviction be endorsed on his licence.

## COUNTY MANAGER REPLIES TO HARBOUR POLLUTION ALLEGATIONS

Mr C A O'Connor, Co. Manager in a prepared statement which he read at last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council replied to allegations made in a report which appeared recently in the "Irish Press" concerning the extent of pollution in Dungarvan Harbour which according to a survey which they carried out alleged that it was being caused by the leather factory.

The matter was raised by Cllr W. Götter who referred to the article which blamed Dungarvan Leathers for the pollution. He said that there were 250 men employed at the factory and the report was unfair because it was not stated that the tests taken of the water were not taken out in the bay but just where the factory effluent hit the water. Cllr R. O'Brien thought that the matter of pollution was a very important issue and if there was anything wrong with the harbour it should be investigated. At the same time he said that there would be very concerned about jobs and she thought the Council should enter into communication with the management of the factory to investigate what the source of the pollution was.

Mr O'Connor stated that well be a health hazard to our town she said. "If we allow pollution to occur" said Cllr O'Brien "we will be handing away our heritage and part of that is the beautiful bay which we have here. If effluent is the cause of pollution it should be treated and it does not mean if we fight pollution that we should lose any jobs."

Cllr J. Murphy said that his information was that the Board of Fishery Conservators had now interested themselves in the matter but he did not know what the outcome of their investigations would be. However he thought that anything which might be said at this stage might not be good for either Dungarvan Leathers or the town.

Cllr T. Wade said that industry firms should be made aware of the danger to the town and that they had taken precautions to avoid any pollution and because they were providing employment they should not be allowed to get away with it. At the same time he said that the Council could not shout from the rooftops about pollution themselves as they were sending untreated sewage into the harbour.

Cllr P. Whelan said that in his opinion the Irish Press report was unjust as it had put the jobs of 300 men in jeopardy. The leather factory was a long time in existence and because of the great deal of

## PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

### REGIONAL HEALTH SERVICES TO COST MORE THAN £20 MILLION

The estimate for the year 1975 which was approved by the South-East Health Board last week provides for a total expenditure in running the health services in the region of £20.6 million. It is a huge bill but according to the report which accompanied the estimate it still does not represent the full estimated cost of the services next year.

This report points out that it had been found necessary to omit several cost factors which could not be estimated at this stage but that they will be covered when they arise later on. They include such things as the threshold pay rises under the current national wages agreement and other negotiated pay increases, higher costs for the payment of fees to GPs and for Consultants.

A rough break-down of the estimate shows that 70% or £14.4 million of the total is accounted for by all the hospitals in the region, plus the costs of extra hospitals, £5.5 million is spent on Community Services which represents 26.5% of the total while 1.9% or £400,000 goes on central administration with the rest being taken up by superannuation charges. The estimate shows that the total staff numbers (medical, nursing, dental, etc.) employed by the Board in its various institutions runs to 4,210.

### TRIBUTE TO A SAINTLY PRIEST

In the September issue of the Augustinian mission journal, "News Link" a tribute was paid in the "Portrait" column to Fr. Michael Flynn, O.S.A. who was then still among us. He has since tragically died but the writer of the tribute could hardly foresee that within a matter of months what he wrote then would turn out to be a panegyric for a very saintly priest. Here is what he wrote:

"Down in Ring, Co. Waterford, the name Seamus O'heocha, An Fear Mor, is remembered with deep affection. He was a much loved founder-headmaster of Scoil na Leabha in Ring College. But there's another 'Fear Mor' close to the hearts of the Deise people down there. A 'Fear Mor' in every sense—big in physique, in determination and in missionary achievement. Michael Flynn was born in 1919 into a tradition of native Irish speakers. The 'beal-binneas na nDeise' still runs through his English and his Hausa (some would say!). He attended the National School in Ring where everything was studied through Irish. In 1935 he left the neat farmhouse on the grassy slopes above Dungarvan Bay and headed across to the old Friary College. People around Dungarvan sing his praises as a midfielder for the Friary teams in those days."

### THE PROBLEM OF POLLUTION

Pollution is a problem which is beginning to reach major proportions throughout the country. It is a problem which has been affecting the industrial nations of the world for a long number of years but up to this it has not been one of any great proportions in Ireland. Now for the first time we are becoming conscious of the need to take steps to resolve it if we are to ensure that the beautiful surroundings and natural amenities which mean so much, not only to ourselves but to our many visitors from all over the world, are to be protected.

Action must be taken to see that, as far as is reasonably possible, our countryside, our rivers and lakes and our estuaries are kept free from pollution. We cannot expect to avoid this concomitant evil of social and industrial expansion totally but every step possible to ensure that it is kept at a minimal level should be taken.

In this regard it is of more than passing interest to note an extract from the Annual Fisheries Report for the year ended March 31, 1974, issued by the ESB last week which refers to the problem of pollution. This states that the Board considers that there must now be a complete commitment by the government, local administration, industry and the general public to the principle of water pollution control.

The extract goes on to state "If there is no such

commitment it will not be possible to protect our waters from serious damage. The Board welcomed the decision by the Minister for Local Government to prepare new legislation on water pollution. The Board informed the Minister that in its view water pollution control should be centralised either in one body or in a number of authorities based on specific catchment areas and each having clearly defined responsibility. It was further emphasised to the Minister that no public bodies should be exempted from prosecution. On the general question of the enforcement of the law, the Board asked the Minister that the legislation should be drafted on a sufficiently wide basis so as to ensure, as far as possible, that offenders will not be able to escape penalty on technical grounds alone.

This commitment to the principle of pollution control is something which must be undertaken seriously without further delay as otherwise we could well find ourselves in the same predicament as other countries have already found themselves, in a very short few years.
