Writing in the current issue of "The Irish Banking Review," Mr E. A Attwood, Chief Econo-mist, Department of Agriculture has the following to say about the outlook for Irish agriculture in the year ahead

Farming in Ireland is inex-tricably linked to developments in Europe—and this is valid whether we are inside or out-side the Community We are in many ways more open to the effects of external factors than other European countries, for we depend on export markets for the sale of over half our farm output and we are geographically on the periphery of the main European markets for farm products

There is nevertheless every reason to expect a substantial recovery in the economic prospects for Irish agriculture in 1975 In the first place it is the unlikely that our weather will the as a measure of the page of the control of the page of the control of th be as unfavourable for farming as it has been for the past two years—although this has yet to be proved! Of more immediate significance is the market for beef and cattle, which has passed through such vicissitudes over the past year There is general agreement that prices will improve substantially in 1975-indeed there has already been an improvement at the end of 1974 How far this improvement will go is, however, not so

widely agreed. Some commentators have forecast very significant increases with prices for beef cattle rising to £25 per cwt and over This would involve an increase of over 60% on the prices prevailing in the Autumn of 1974 In terms of the current EEC Guide Price for Irish cattle of £22 45, with the next accession step to the full EEC guide price due early in 1975 and the increase in price to be decided in the 1975 EEC farm price negotiations, such a figure of £25 per cwt does not look unrealistic

At the same time the pressure of cattle supplies in our main markets is likely to be very considerable during 1975 and the output of Irish fat cattle is likely to be substanand tially above the level achieved in 1974 The basic question in 1974 seems to be that of the timing of the expected sharp improve-ment in cattle prices, rather than whether or not it will take

GREAT FALLACY TO SAY T.B. HAS BEEN **ERADIÇATED**

One of the great fallacies of our time states the 24th Annua Report of the National BCG Committee (for the year ended December 31 1973) is that tuberculosis has been almost completely eradicated in this country Much has been said and written about the decline of tuberculosis during the past or early 1976 before any major improvement in pig supplies can be achieved.




