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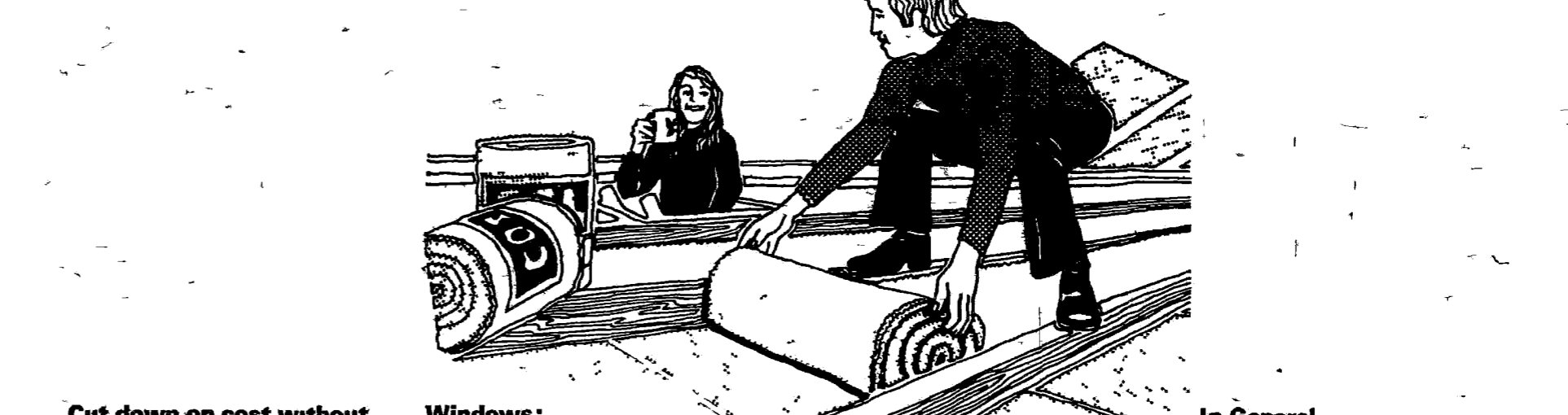
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Heating costs you too much

Here's how to cut down:



Cut down on cost without cutting down on comfort by following a few simple guidelines. The easiest and cheapest measures can bring dramatically quick results. So start with doors, floors and windows. Windows - Again, check for draughts around ill-fitting frames and seals. Draw the curtains! Heavy curtains help keep warmth in, cold out, so close curtains at dusk, even in rooms you're not using. And next time you're actually buying curtains, ask about the new insulating curtain linings. Doors - Check carefully for draughts. Seal with foam, rubber or metal stripping, fit threshold draught excluders, especially to front and back doors. Keep all doors closed whenever possible; consider springs or other closing devices for frequently-used doors, like kitchen to living room - for less than a pound, they're well worth the fuel you'll save. Floors - Up to 15% of your heat can disappear through the ground floor. Seal draughts in floorboards and skirting with stripping or suitable filler. And use a good underlay beneath all floor coverings. Attics - Unless the attic's adequately insulated, up to 25% of your precious heat goes right out the roof. Measure the area to be covered, and lay 75 mm (3 ins) or preferably 100 mm (4 ins) of insulation between the attic joists - your local hardware store will advise you on the types available. The cost? About £30-£40 for the average two-storey house. And for a job that you can easily do yourself, this is one saving that pays you back handsomely in a couple of winters. Insulation will naturally make the attic area a lot colder, so make sure to insulate the water tank too, and the pipes - but DON'T insulate the area directly beneath the tank; a little warmth there will help prevent freezing.

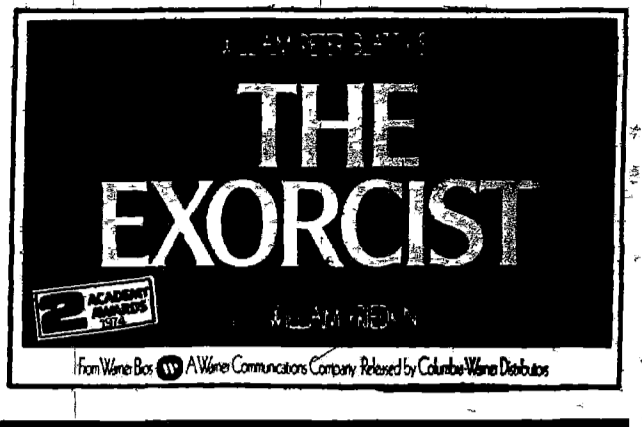
