The National Road Safety Association, in a comment or the provisional figures issued the Garda Siochani relating to road deaths during 1974, notes with regret that the overall position for th year showed no improvement on the 1973 foures This situation, it would appear resulted from a substantia increase in the number of road deaths in the las quarter of 1974, prior to thi the downward trend in death since 1972 had been main toined

The preliminary figure show that of the 591 person killed in '74, the princip classes of casualties, with '7 figures in brackets, were Pedestrians 226 (224), Pede cyclists - 65 (58), Moto cyclists and pillion passenger 68 (60), Car drivers an passengers 188 (20%), User of goods vehicles 20 (23) an
