### T D HONOURED

Dungarvan born, Abbeyside resident T D Tom Kyne was paid a signal, honour by his colleagues in the Parliamentary Labour Party of which he is Chairman when at Lanster House last week he was presented with an illuminated address to mark his 70th birthday The presentation was made to Mr Kyne on behalf of his past and present colleagues by the Towniste and leader of the Labour Party, Mr Brendan Consh, T D At the function held to mark the presentation Deputy Kyne was accompanied by his wife and all her friends were pleased to note that she was now fully recovered from her recent illness

Kyne was also interviewed by RTE Political Correspondent Arthur Noonan in the Radio Eireann programme "Dial Report" last Sunday evening to mark the occasion In this Mr Kyne recalled his associations with the Trade Union Movement and the Labour Party going back as far as 1926, "a long, long time," as he remarked himself He also referred to his political career which commenced with his election to the local Urban Council, of which in later years he was Chairman for nineteen years, his election to the County Council and to Waterford Corporation of which he was an Alderman for a period and finally his election to the Dail as member of the Labour Party for Waterford County and City

Mr Kyne who is still very actively associated with public life at national and local levels belies the three score and ten years which are chalked up against him Up to this he has had a most eventful career which has kept him to the forefront in the political field in the County for several decades He still remains a big force in politics

I would like to join with his many friends to also mark the occasion of Deputy Kyne's 70th birthday by wishing him continued health and happiness and to extend that wish to also include his good wife

Talk of the town in Dublin last Friday as far as the fashion world was concerned was the "Easter Parade" of fashions designed by fashion designer, Kathleen Barron, which was coupled with the official opening of her school of home dress-making

The name Kathleen Barron is synonymous with the Dublin fashion scene She has been designing high-fashion garments in the city for the past ten years and her salon at 55, Lower O'Connell Street is well-known to the connoisseur of style and chic

Last Friday evening the place to be was the Georgian Room at the Berin Inn in Dublin where Miss Barron displayed her most recent designs in a special capsule collection which she described as an "Easter Parade" An eye-catching feature of the show was a selection of period evening wear which included gowns of Gothic, Puritan and Victorian design

The evening was also marked by the announcement by Miss Barron of the official opening of her school of home dress making She said that she first recognised the need for such an enterprise when, as a result of repeated requests she organised instruction classes on a small scale The idea snowballed and she now finds herself mistress of a most successful school

A Co Waterford woman, Kathleen Barron was born in Ballinamult She was the only Irish designer to recognise the potential of traditional red flannel and in her first ever collection presented in 1970, she displayed a range of garments made from this

In the five years since then, Miss Barron has made a big name for herself in the fashion world and I am sure I am but voicing the wishes of her many friends here in the home county when I wish her continued success in the years ahead

**SHOULD BE RESURFACED**  
I have been asked on more than one occasion in recent weeks to draw attention to the dreadful condition of the road surface at Strandside South, Abbeyside The position has been altogether unsatisfactory since the road was excavated for the laying of sewer pipes Following the pipe-laying, the cuts were re-filled but shortly afterwards there was a marked subsidence all along the roadway

Shortly before Christmas the County Council moved in and carried out a resurfacing operation but the end result has turned out to be no better, than the condition it had been in, if anything it has become worse and driving over it now is like travelling on a switch-board railway I know that money is probably scarce this year but surely this is something which the contractors who opened the roadway in the first instance should be responsible for where the cost is concerned I am sure that a proper job of resurfacing done before the summer arrives would be much appreciated

### THE TRUE PICTURE

Following the tragically sudden death of President Childers towards the end of last year and the emotive scenes which took place during the lying-in-state and the State funeral which marked his obsequies, much play was made about the role of the President vis-a-vis the armed forces of the country Commentators of the State radio and television services were at pains to stress the fact, time and again, that the President was Commander in chief of the forces as they described the elaborate honours mounted by the various wings of the army and navy during the funeral They were not alone in this as the politicians—members of the government as well as the opposition—also joined in projecting the same image of the President

So well did they do this job that it was quite common at the time to hear the topic drawn up wherever groups gathered to discuss current affairs and many who should have known otherwise, accepted as a fact, what they heard being pumped out from the radio and television that Uachtaran na h-Eireann was indeed the chief executive and had full powers to direct what the defence forces of the country should or should not do

Of course it was a big 'con' job put on by the politicians and the members of the establishment so as to vest the office of President with an importance which it did not possess The charade was kept up during the political cat-and-mouse game which followed as to the procedures to be adopted for selecting a successor When all this had been accomplished and the new President and his been had been installed in Arus An Uachtaran the dust settled and the matter was conveniently forgotten

Last week, however, the matter once again had the spotlight turned on it by Mr John Kelly, T.D., Parliamentary Secretary to the Taoiseach who now also has had additional duties for the Department of Defence placed upon his professional shoulders Mr Kelly was speaking at a dinner organised by the North Kerry Constituency Executive of Fine Gael in Tarbert on last Monday night The theme of his address was "The Army

and Democracy" and he used the occasion to reply to a statement made by what he described as "a professional lawyer" The lawyer was a Mr Doolan who had told the Association for Legal Justice a few days previously that "the Army, being now at its highest strength since the Emergency, could become a danger, to our civil democracy"

Mr Kelly said that in the further course of his remarks, having told his audience that the Defence Forces owed loyalty "not to Mr Donegan (Minister for Defence), not to the Oireachtas, but to the President"

Now this avowal was on all fours with what the people of the country had been told several times less than a few months ago and was something which they had come to accept as true and Mr Doolan could not, therefore, be greatly faulted for the assertion which he made concerning the role of the President

But now we come to the reality of the situation, with a Junior Minister of the Government, making a public speech, really laying it on the line I will quote his exact words in case I might be accused of misrepresentation Mr Kelly said "He (Mr Doolan) seems to me to be quite wrong; a look at section 17 of the 1954 Defence Act will show that the executive authority over the Army is exercised by the Government and by the Minister for Defence, and the President's 'command' and 'direction' is and has always been accepted to be—a purely ceremonial one The President on his own account has not so much as enough authority to order a private soldier to slope arms"

This then is the 'fact' of the matter The function of the President is merely ceremonial at all levels It is an office which we could well do without because of its costly upkeep It is an office which could, for all practical purposes, be merged with that of the Taoiseach

## ALL TENDERS FOR PROPOSED HOUSING DEVELOPMENT AT ABBEYSIDE REJECTED

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council unanimously decided at their monthly meeting held last Monday night to reject all tenders for 54 houses came to a total of £27,000 "That's a considerable difference," he said

Mrs O'Brien then proposed and Mr J. A. Murphy seconded that the Council should give an opportunity of discussing the matter of the amount offered for the licence fee with the officials of the Council

In reply to Mr P. Whelan who asked if the Co Manager had the last word irrespective of any other tenders, Mr O'Connor would decide, Mr O'Connor said "I have an obligation to accept the highest figure The Co Manager went on to say that he could not accept the recommendation made in Mrs O'Brien's proposal "If I were to accept anything but the £10,000 licence fee, I would refer the matter to the Auditor," he said

**DECIDING FACTOR**  
Mrs O'Brien then said that in the first instance the Council should have asked for a tender for a licence fee irrespective of the price of the houses to be built as that now seemed to be what the deciding factor was

Mr W. Cotter said that in the report submitted to the members at the previous meeting there had been no mention about the central heating How has it come in now," he asked

The Co Manager said that a request was made at the last meeting for a breakdown of the tender submitted by the Town Engineer had now included that in his report

Mrs O'Brien said that it was difficult to understand that a sum of £500 or £600 had been included for the central heating and this was now one of the deciding factors of the entire tenders This was not referred to in the last report and she again asked how it now came in

Mr P. Whelan asked if this sum for central heating had been included by Gallaghers in the tender initially submitted by them

Mr B. White Acting Town Clerk said that this was not referred to in the official tender submitted by Mr Gallaghers but it had come in by phone before the tenders were first opened

Mr Kyne said that he was becoming so confused by the whole matter at this stage that he would propose as a way out that the Council re-advise for tenders If the £500 now mentioned was genuinely included in the tender it made a terrible difference as it came to a total of £27,000 "But," he said, "I don't know whether it was or not"

Mr Whelan seconded Mr O'Brien's proposal and Mrs O'Brien then said that she would be prepared to withdraw her proposal in favour of this

The Co Manager said that the Council should do that stage was to reject all the tenders and they could later discuss the conditions on which new tenders could be sought

Finally this procedure was unanimously agreed to

## KERRY MEN CHARGED WITH ARMED ROBBERY IN DUNGARVAN

Daniel O'Sullivan (22), Barrow, Ardara, Co Kerry, was charged at Cork District Court last Monday before District Justice D P O'Donovan, B.L. on September 27, last at Kilbeg, Co Kerry, with being armed with an offensive weapon, and with two others, he robbed Thomas O'Connell of £74,000 cash

He was also charged with unlawful possession of a firearm with intent to endanger life and membership of the IRA

Mr. Martin Ferris (22) Churchill Fenit, Co Kerry, was charged that at Killergin on April 13 last year he had in his possession a revolver which he had obtained, a copy of a poster "Join the Provisionals" and with membership of the I.R.A

Each of the accused were also charged on Monday, that on January 23 last, at Dungarvan while armed with offensive weapons, and with two other persons, they robbed Aidan Peggan of the sum of £5,466.49 in cash They were additionally charged with unlawful possession of firearms with intent to endanger life at Dungarvan on January 23rd and having firearms with intent to endanger life

Both men were remanded in custody to Cork District Court on February 24

The accused were taken into custody following a raid by a strong force of gardai under Supt Byrne, Middleton, on a house in Youghal last Friday (Feb 14) at 2.30 a.m. The raid was for the Director of Public Prosecutions

## CLASHMORE MAN MURDERED IN LONDON

A man was charged in London on Monday last with the murder of Mr Fintan Baker (46) married a native of Clashmore Co Waterford Mr Baker who was proprietor of the White Harp public house in Clapton East London died shortly after admission to hospital on Saturday night last

A spokesman at New Scotland Yard stated on Monday that David Edward Cunningham (21) with an address at 11 Mildenhall Road, Clapton London had been charged with murder and would appear in court again on Monday next He was remanded in custody

The dead man is survived by his wife, May, who is English born, and by his brothers, Mr Michael Baker who resides at Elnalebeg, Mr Martin Baker Clashmore and Mr Jerry Baker of London

## NO MONEY FOR PROPOSED SPORTS COMPLEX IN DUNGARVAN

That the proposal to establish a super sports complex in Dungarvan to include indoor swimming pool, squash and badminton courts, athletic and tennis pitches, and other amenities and which was estimated would cost in the region of £300,000 was only so much pipe dream when the proposal was first put forward or less proved at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night

The matter came up for consideration when the members proceeded to consider proposals for the future use of land at Ringna-shogue (Quans) where the sports complex was to be located

Mr T. Kyne T.D. said that from what he could see there was no hope now of going ahead with the project The matter had been discussed at a meeting of the Co Vocational Senator Committee that evening and it was decided to hold a meeting of the joint committee which had been formed at the time to deal with the project in the immediate future to discuss the present position

He went on to say that there was no hope of getting any money for the project from the Department of Education for at least 5 or 6 years said that it could be seen for the last 12 months that this was going to occur

Mr P. Whelan said that where this project was concerned they had been depending too much on the Department and on the schools They had to get out and get the people involved and let us call a public meeting and see what can be done," he said

Senator Deasy supported this and said that as the Department were not now going to put up the cash it was up to the project to come out and put their shoulders to the wheel

Referring to the lay-out proposals for the site the Town Engineer, Mr P. Walshe said that he was awaiting the report of the Consultant and when this came to hand some arrangements could be made

It was agreed to defer the matter until next meeting and to request the Consultants to have their report submitted by then

BI-WEEKLY REFUSE COLLECTION WOULD COST EXTRA £13,000 PER ANNUM IN DUNGARVAN

Reporting on a proposal made at a previous meeting by Mr J A Murphy that a bi-weekly refuse collection should be extended to all areas of the town, the Town Engineer, Mr P Walsh, informed members of the Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting held last Monday night that, while he had no objection in principle to the proposal, the cost of doing so should be considered.

He said that in order to carry out the proposal, a new scavenging vehicle (current cost £5,000) would have to be purchased. The year's cost of driver and crew plus fuel and maintenance costs would amount to an additional £9,770 if the vehicle was purchased over a seven year period the annual loan charge repayable would be £2,422. This would mean that an extra £13,198 would have to be provided out of the rates each year and at the current return it would increase the current rate by 56 pence in the £.

Replying to questions by Mr P Whelan, the Town Engineer said that the present truck was not capable of doing more than it was doing at present and to give a bi-weekly collection to all areas would require two additional work days. The new truck would be a bigger vehicle. Mr Whelan then asked whether all areas could be done in a 6 day work week. The bigger truck was purchased and Mr Walsh said that this would involve overtime and the possibility that the crew would get fed up.

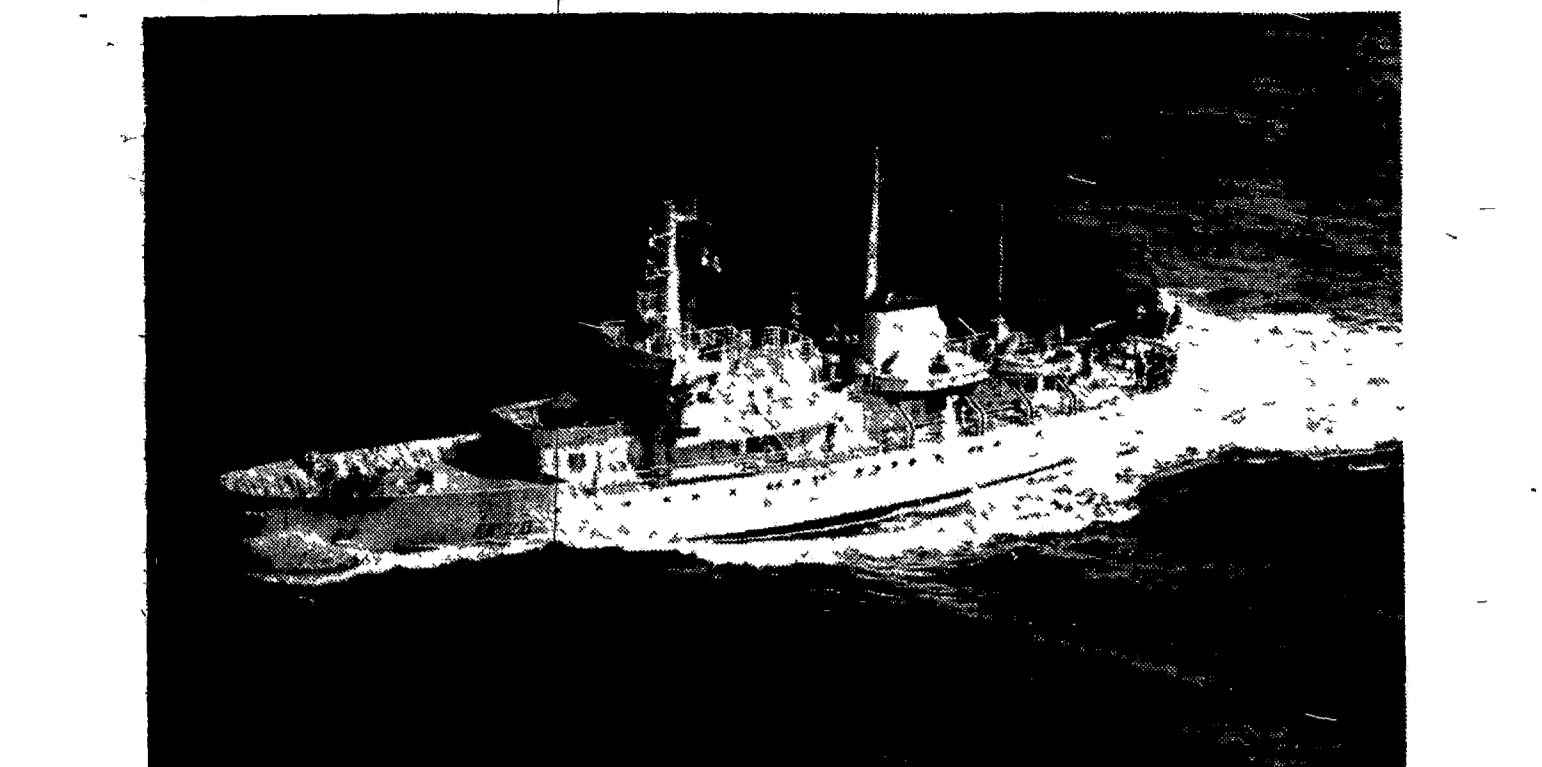

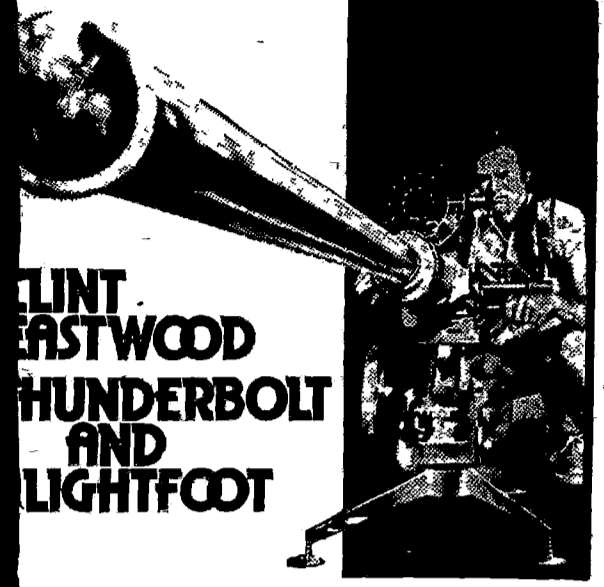

On the radio progr the Minister also said pending the decision of court, customers should s their custom around and away from premises where higher prices were char He said that pub custo were unaware of the po they possessed to pre overcharging, and if a organised properly they co do far more to stabilise pr than any legislation
