PENSMAN TAKES YOU

Behind the SPOTLIGHT

CONTROVERSIAL DRINK PRICES

Controversy concerning the prices charged for drinks served in licensed premises in Dungarvan and several other areas has not abated. It has gone on for a considerable period and was given a fresh impetus by references made in regard to the matter by the Minister for Industry and Commerce, Mr. Justin Keating, on an RTE radio programme last week.

The main bone of contention centres on the Maximum Prices Order for the Sale of Intoxicating Liquor in the Urban Area of Dungarvan made by the Minister. This specifies the highest prices which may legally be charged in licensed premises for the various types of drink. Customers have claimed that these prices have been exceeded in all cases and have been complaining constantly, especially since the most recent increases imposed in the budget.

Replying to questions from Waterford listeners on the RTE radio programme referred to, last Thursday, the Minister said that he was aware of overcharging for stout, ale and spirits in the city as well as in other areas of the county. Asked why he had not enforced the Maximum Prices Order in these cases the Minister said that the Order had been challenged by the licensed victuallers as unconstitutional and the matter had not yet been decided by the courts.

I am aware that a number of prosecutions under the Order have been issued in Dungarvan area but these must remain in abeyance, as must those for all other areas, until such time as the constitutional issue concerning the Order has been decided. If the courts hold that the Order is unconstitutional then the prosecutions will be dropped but on the other hand if it is found to be legal in order then the prosecutions will go ahead.

Understanding that the Minister has intimated so much to the local branches of the Labour Party and Union in Dungarvan who made representations to him on the matter in the recent past.

On the radio programme the Minister also said that pending the decision of the court, customers should shift their custom around and stay away from premises where the higher prices were charged. He said that pub customers were unaware of the power they possessed to prevent overcharging, and if they organised properly they could do far more to stabilise prices than any legislation.

I was pleased to note that the Chairman of the County Council made a good effort to keep discussions within bounds and members in order at the Council's special meeting in Dungarvan last Monday. The result was a satisfactory meeting with the agenda being completed in about two hours.

But although the meeting was brief it was fiery and was punctuated by quite a few "incidents." The first came when Cllr. O'Ryon crossed swords with the County Engineer on the score that members of the Engineering staff were not being as helpful as they might where those building their own houses were concerned. Then we had quite a fiery outburst from Cllr. Frank King who erupted when he was accused by Cllr. Paddy Cahill of alleging to residents that a motion to set aside the provision of public lights and footpaths at a new housing estate near Waterford city was framed. Fair inspired Cllr. Sean Whelan came into this when he called on the chair to be more firm and not to allow some members to run the entire meeting.

Further spice was added to the meeting when, following a flare-up between Cllr. Jimmy Quirke and the Co. Engineer concerning dumping in Ballinloughane in which the chairman also became involved when he refused to accept a motion from Cllr. Quirke, the latter gathered up his papers and left the meeting in protest, accusing the chairman of giving preferential treatment to officials.

Then to round it off we had the attack made by Cllr. O'Ryon on the members of his own Party for failing to provide proper opposition in the Dail on the occasion of the closing debate on the budget last week. All in all there was hardly a dull moment throughout the evening.

Another first for Dungarvan U.D.C. Dungarvan Urban Council can now make the proud boast of being the first local authority in the country to have met its full housing demands. At a special meeting of the Council held last Monday night to deal with housing, there were 88 houses to be allocated from the new scheme at Quanns and, would you believe, there were just 88 applicants on the approved list, so each one got a house and the list was completely exhausted—for the first time ever.

At the monthly meeting of the Council held last week the Co. Manager, Mr. C. O'Connor, referred to the construction for 1975 made by the Department to the Council and described the amount of £320,000 in very rosy terms. He said that a great deal of credit was due to the Council for the foresight they had shown in going ahead with the various schemes which have been undertaken in the Urban area in recent years. The only requirement now to be met by the Urban Council is to completely clear the slate where the housing needs of the urban area are concerned. The problem is one which is being actively pursued at present and should soon be solved. I have so often found fault with and criticised the Council in the past that it is a pleasure for me to give them this accolade in the very important field of housing.

JUDAS MACCABAEUS
The oratory on which Handel's Oratorio 'Judas Maccabaeus' is based is taken from Scripture and deals with the history of the Jews in Palestine during the 40 years from the accession of the Syrian King Antiochus Epiphanes to the death of Simon Maccabaeus in 134 B.C. It was a life-and-death struggle between the Jews and Syrians who wanted to impose Greek culture on them. The book recounts the heroic deeds of the three great leaders, Judas and his brother Jonathan and Simon who were in turn at the head of the Jewish people until death overtook them. Handel was 61 years old when, in 1746 he composed this oratorio. The author of the libretto was the celebrated Rev. Thomas Morell, D.D., who died in 1784 at the age of 76. There will be a performance of the oratorio by the Waterford Singers with the Waterford Orchestral Players in Christ Church Cathedral, Waterford (by kind permission of the Dean and Chapter) on Sunday, March 9 at 8.30 p.m. The soloists will be Patricia Maybury (soprano), Chris Hagerty (contralto), David English (tenor) and Norman Myers (bass). The Waterford Singers were founded in 1953 by the late well-known tenor William F. Watt and since its inception the choir has performed many of the major oratorios and masses in no less than five different Waterford Churches.

The Fourth Waterford Open Drama Festival concluded its twelve night run at the CBS Hall, Dungarvan on Thursday night last with the presentation of P. V. Carroll's play *Shadow and Substance*, by St. Anne's Mullin Na Tír Drama Group, Stradbally. The festival provided an outstanding success providing a feast for Drama lovers from far and near. Adjudicator James Knolly, Dungarvan, had an unenviable task so light was the standard, and he was loud in his praise of the twelve productions staged during the festival.

A new trophy (Carlton Cup) was presented this year for the best play.

NOTES FROM DUNGARVAN JUNIOR CHAMBER

INTER-SCHOOLS DEBATE
As you will see from a separate report in this issue the Presentation Convent narrowly failed to qualify for the National Semi-final of the Inter Schools Debating Competition going down to St. Peter's College, Waterford, on Friday night last. All that is left for me to do is congratulate St. Peter's and wish them luck in the semi-final, and we hope, the final. The Presentation Convent were warmly congratulated in reaching the latter stages of the competition. They have maintained the high standard which this town and area has achieved in debate.

CHARGED WITH ISSUING FORGED CHEQUES
Denis McHugh described as an electrician with an address at Mary Street, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty at Dungarvan Court yesterday to charges of uttering two forged cheques to a total value of £25 to a shopkeeper in Dungarvan on March 18 and August 18 last. Garda P. Nector in evidence said that on the first occasion McHugh presented a cheque for £10 and on the second occasion for £15 to pay for clothes which he had purchased at the shop. The defendant told the court that he had already paid back some of the money and undertook to pay the balance by that evening. Garda Nector said that he would be prepared to accept the defendant's undertaking in the matter. Justice Garavan applied the P.O.A. on the understanding that the defendant would fully compensate the injured party and remit the amount to the Garda Nector. He said that he had learned his lesson from this, otherwise it could be very serious for him.

SENATOR DEASY'S SUPPORT FOR ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN BILL
Speaking on the second stage of the Illegitimate Children (Maintenance and Succession) Bill which was introduced in the Senate by Senator Mrs. Robinson, Senator Austin Deasy said that he supported certain aspects of the Bill. He said that it was to be deplored that the law as it stood did not treat all children equally as the Constitution provided. "It is wrong," said Senator Deasy, "that a child who is born illegitimate has not got the right to succeed to his father's property. It is also wrong that if affiliation proceedings have been taken that the child cannot be maintained after the age of 16. The fact that the child or children of a marriage which has been declared by the courts to be null and void can suddenly be regarded as illegitimate is again unjust. There are many stigmas attached to illegitimacy which should be got rid of, and maybe this legislation would be the forerunner of getting rid of the remaining injustices."

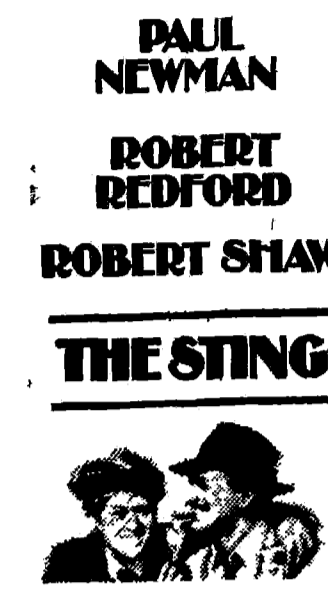

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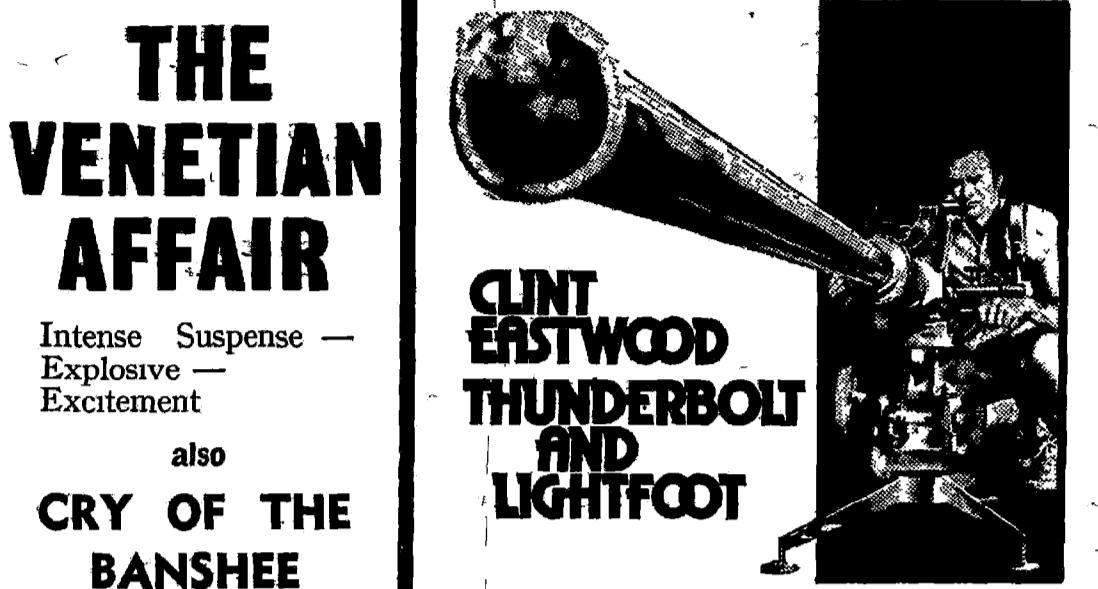

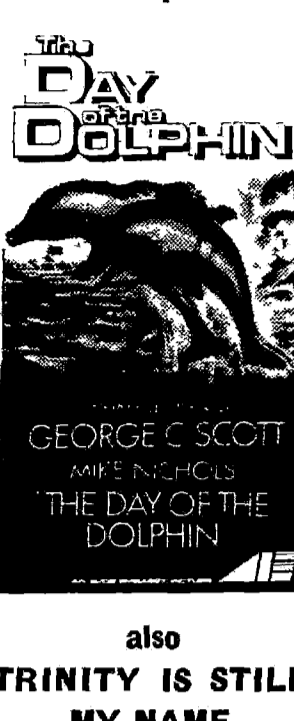

We regret to announce the death at the Presentation Convent, Lismore, of Sr. M. Benignus O'Connell, R.N.S.J., who was a devoted religious and was in the convent from 1919, being professed in 1921. She spent all her life teaching in the convent and then in Secondary classes.

The training of the pupils in the basic principles of the Catholic Faith was an object dear to her heart. Her main secular subject was Irish and all her pupils will recall her hard work in the classroom.

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PIE IN THE SKY?
The debate on the possibility of having cable television introduced to Dungarvan has been hotting up the past few months and usual where such matters concerned there are at least two schools of thought. Critical remarks have been conveyed to me because I have not already entered the fray. These criticisms have been voiced by members of a group who want to see the introduction of cablevision to the area made with the least possible delay. My reason withholding comment even this point is that I know a little about this matter.

However I have discussed the position in broad terms with some people who appear to know something about the subject and my opinion, for what it is worth is that it is still rather immature to be any way deciding in making a forecast as to whether it would turn out to be a success or not.

Many people believe that the only thing which is keeping cablevision away from only from here but from other places like Cork and Galway is the failure of the Ministry for Posts and Telegraphs to issue the necessary licence. There is a lot more to it than this.

Where Dungarvan is concerned the matter was discussed at the January meeting of the local Urban Council and it was agreed to nominate representatives of a cablevision company in Watercity to discuss the position. This meeting was cancelled at short notice at the request of the company due to circumstances beyond their control. However they supplied information to the Council on the principal points. This included an undertaking to carry out tests in the area, if requested to do so by the Council, to determine the strength and availability of signal. When this survey was completed they would report back to the Council and indicate whether they would be prepared to guarantee by way of reaction Charges which the company operate in Watercity were given as follows: Connection fee £7.47 (it is stated that this could vary from £10 in Dungarvan) while annual rental (which could be paid quarterly) was given as £17.52.
