clarified I think that the people of Dungarvan and indeed from all other areas which may have been similarly affected could do no better in the interests of their own communities than support the shops and business premises in their own areas.

**HEALTH CENTRE IN DUNGARVAN**

At the February meeting of the committee which deals with Community Care under the South Eastern Health Board a progress report on Health Centres and Clinics stated that the present practice premises at Dungarvan was in such a bad state of repair that alternative accommodation would have to be provided as a matter of urgency.

The Programme Manager, Dr V Barry, explained to members of the committee that it was hoped that the Board would be able to lease a property which was on the market in Dungarvan for a health centre which would also include accommodation for the Community Care staff and Public Health Clinics.

However, Dr Barry said that as this property would not be very suitable and would require an expenditure of £7,000 for alterations he was making enquiries regarding the leasing of a premises from the Bank of Ireland, which was now vacated. He expressed the hope then, that he would have further information concerning these premises, which would only accommodate the General Practitioner services for the next meeting.

When I mentioned this matter last Monday to Mr C Curran who with Mr J Quirk are the two elected representatives of the County Council on the Health Board he informed me that he knew nothing about the proposal and added that as the Health Boards were the most secretive of public bodies in the country, public representatives, in many instances, knew very little of what, in actual fact, was going on.

The March monthly meeting of the Board will be held in Kilkenny on Thursday of this week (the 13th) so perhaps we may learn more of what the proposals for Dungarvan are, after that.

Incidentally there is a notice of motion down for the same meeting in the names of Mr Curran and Mr Quirk calling for the provision of a bathroom at the Maternity Unit at the District Hospital, Dungarvan. This motion was inspired by a discussion at a recent meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council during which it was stated that this most essential facility was not, as yet available for the maternity patients of this unit. Not a very good record, you will surely agree, for those in charge of our health services.

**PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT**

**PLAYING POLITICS**

How often in the past have we heard the members of the County Council make big play about the manner in which the affairs of the Council are conducted without political acrimony. There have been several occasions when we have heard of what a fine happy family they constitute with nothing but the welfare of the ratepayers at heart.

Last week's monthly meeting of the Council could be said to come under neither of these headings as it broke up in disorder with members from all sides of the house demanding the right to talk, a right which was denied to them.

That the manner in which the subject which gave rise to the uproar was introduced was not politically motivated is very difficult to accept while the limitations which were placed on the Council members once permission was given to have such a controversial subject raised was impossible to understand and certainly far removed from the usual democratic standards.

Nobody will doubt but that the Wealth Tax Bill is a rather explosive topic and its passage through the Dail at present is causing more than its ordinary share of trouble for the government. It has generated a great deal of heat and several TDs even on the government benches, find more than a little of what it contains too much for them to stomach.

This being so, there could not be much room for doubt when the Council Chairman decided to let it be introduced at last week's meeting that he knew he was playing politics. He granted the permission to one of the independent members of the Council, who in the past made no bones about the fact that he had left the party of which he had been a life-long member because of the Wealth Tax Bill which they were now advocating as members of the Coalition Government. It was a good opportunity to embarrass the government, no doubt, and the Chairman, as a good member of the opposition, must have been conscious of this when he allowed this member to raise the issue.

If politics are to be played, let them be played. I have no illusions but that they have always been underlying what appears to be going on on the surface. It is the hypocrisy that gets me. Let us hear no more about no politics at Council meetings because that is what it is all about. But politics apart, the thing that surprised me most about the lost meeting was the manner in which discussion was stifled. Perhaps we have not heard the last of this yet.

**THOSE E.S.B. BILLS**

Despite the efforts to explain the manner in which the accounts are prepared, ESB bills continue to create a big headache for practically everybody. Unit prices have increased and on top of that there is the fuel variation charge while to cap both of these off there is the added VAT charges. Added together they all have driven the cost of electricity sky high.

The manner in which these additional charges are affecting the everyday cost of living has been pin-pointed by the Lord Mayor of Cork Alderman Pearse Wyse, TD. In the course of a speech at a public function last week he called on the Government to remove VAT from consumers' ESB bills and for the subsidisation of the cost of electricity.

Complaints about the high increases have been numerous in recent months as people in all walks of life feel the pinch and so great have they been that on more than one occasion people have received accounts which at first glance appeared to them to be completely wrong. The matter is,

without doubt, one of which the Government should take a very serious look. At present VAT at the rate of 6.75 per cent is chargeable on every bill while the fuel variation charge adds approximately one-third more to the account.

If the charges are to continue to rise as they have done over the past twelve months then the Government will have to take some steps to subsidise the cost of electricity because of the affect which it has on the cost of living. Most of the motive power for our industries comes from the ESB and the present high charges are contributing in no small way to very steep increases in production costs. Both of these aspects would warrant a re-assessment of the position by the Government, especially where the VAT charge is concerned.

**OF INTEREST TO ANGLERS**

River anglers will, no doubt, learn with more than a little interest that the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries is having second thoughts about his intention to make a by-law to prohibit the use of plastic bubbles or floats for many trout anglers in these areas for fly-fishing and maggot fishing.

An announcement issued last week by the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister pointed out that the proposal had evoked numerous objections and that, pending detailed consideration of the objections, he has decided to defer the making of the by-law for the time being.

**A CHANGE IN THE WEATHER**

The introduction of 'summer' time last week-end appeared to have been the signal for a change from the field weather which we have experienced through most of the past winter. Frost, sleet and chilling winds while in some cases, snow, have replaced the conditions which made the winter one of the mildest in a century.

Over the Christmas period we referred to the many unusually early blooms which were everywhere evident in mid-January some mountain ewes along the foothills of the Knockmealdowns produced lambs, another most unusual occurrence as one local farmer who had seen sixty-five winters come and go remarked saying that he had never seen mountain lambs born so early during his life-time.

The forward position of growth in general has been very marked in recent months and it is to be hoped that the harsh conditions which the month of March has now brought us will not cause too much damage.

**CHRISTMAS DINNER WILL TASTE THE SAME**

I heard the fear expressed many times last Christmas that it was the last occasion on which, because of EEC regulations, we could have fresh turkeys for the Yuletide feast. I was glad therefore when I read in the European Community Newsletter during the past week that fears that fresh chickens and turkeys - including giblets - were in danger of becoming unavailable because of these EEC food health regulations have been dismissed by the European Commission.

Under the regulations, fresh poultry, meat, all parts of chickens, turkeys, ducks or geese which are fit for human consumption and which have not undergone any preserving process other than chilling or freezing range, poultry, chilled or unchilled also qualified so that "those who like their poultry the way grandmothers cooked it need have no worries."

I have been asked by a reader in New York for the words of the request reached me some time ago but it

was only this week that I came across the words in a collection of old songs and ballads. The story which is told in the song has a similarity to that in 'The Face On The Bar Room Floor' which we published not so very long ago.

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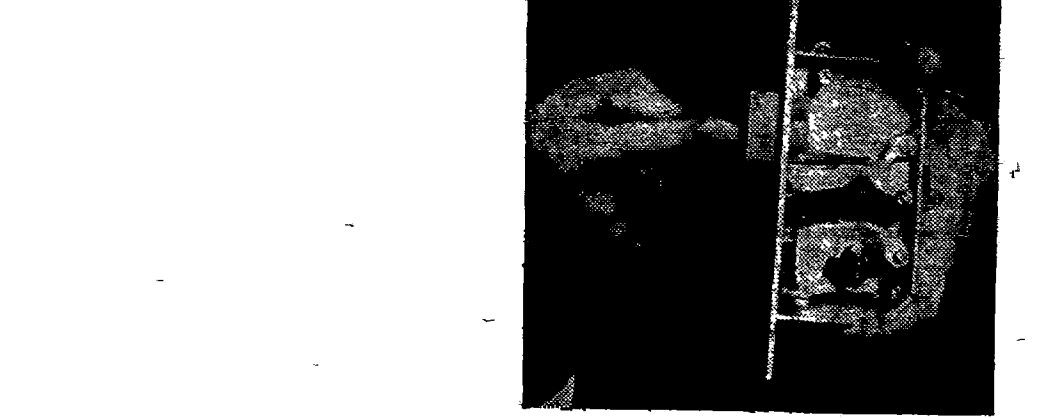

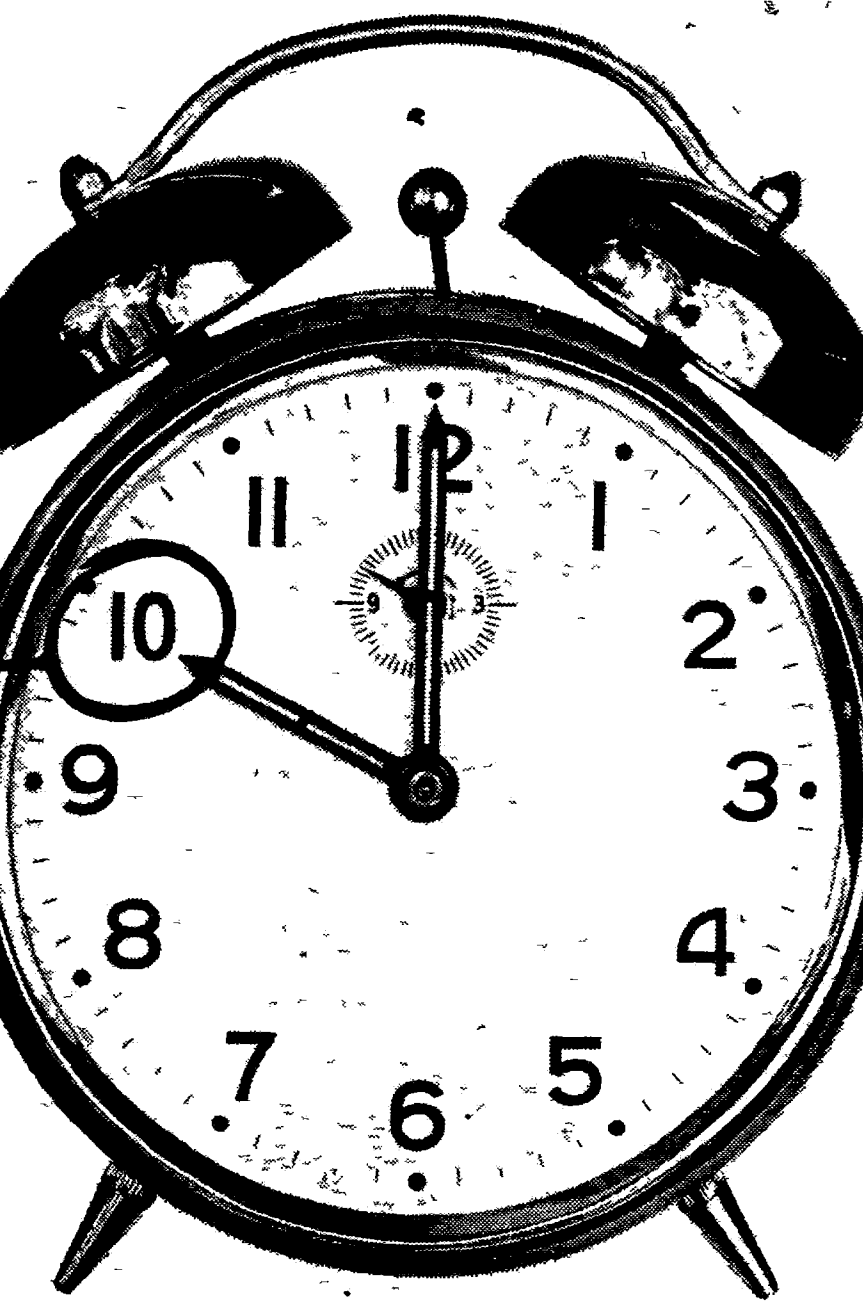

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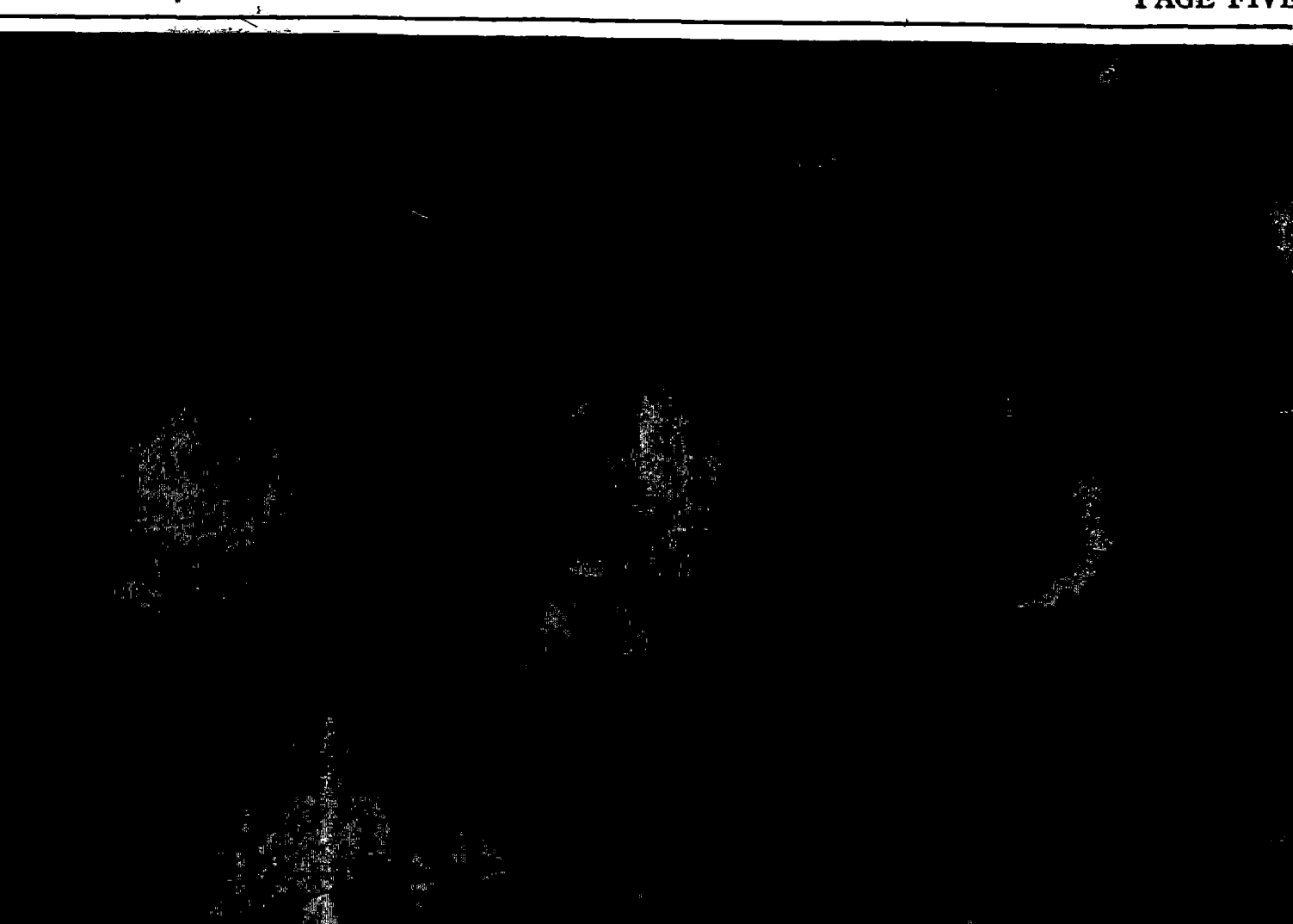
