MINISTER'S PROPOSAL A NEGATION OF DEMOCRACY

Mr Norman Walsh, official leader of the Fine Gael Party in the County, severely criticised the proposals of the Minister for Agriculture Mr M Clinton, to have all Committees of Agriculture in future comprised of 50 per cent of non-elected representatives, at last Monday's meeting of the County Agricultural Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan.

Mr Walsh, who said the Minister's proposal would sound the death knell of all committees of agriculture, stated "we have democracy here because we have the votes of the people, but Mr Clinton's proposal is nothing less than a negation of democracy."

Mr J Fahey TD (FF) said the Minister's proposal was a disgrace and that he would support the support of the General Council of Committees of Agriculture in opposing the idea.

Mr J Quirk urged that all Committees of Agriculture should unite in this issue and throw down the gauntlet to the Minister. He also suggested that if committees were comprised of 50 per cent of non-elected members then all of those who signed up to the electorate should walk out in protest.

Mr S Whelan said that no Minister should be allowed to see the sense of logic of the Minister's proposals. He clearly wanted to wipe out the voice of the people, he said.

Finally on the proposal of Mr D Ahearne the meeting unanimously denounced the Minister's proposal and called on the county representatives and the General Council of Committees of Agriculture to oppose it.

Mr J Quirk proved unsuccessful in his proposal to have the Waterford Committee plans to circulate all of the 27 Committees of Agriculture to arrange a national meeting to plan a campaign of vehement opposition to Mr Clinton's proposal.

FRENCH BAN ON SHEEP
IMPORTS ANGRERS IRISH
FARMERS
The legality of the French
Government's decision to close
and open their market at will
to Irish sheep meat may be
tested in the European Courts.
This possibility emerged fol-
lowing a two-hour meeting in
Dublin between the Ministers for
Agriculture, Mr. Mark Clinton
and a deputation from the
Irish Farmers' Association led
by the Deputy President, Mr.
Paddy Lane.

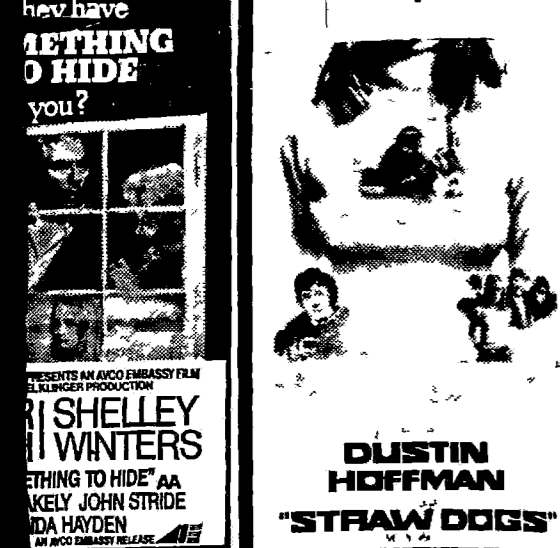

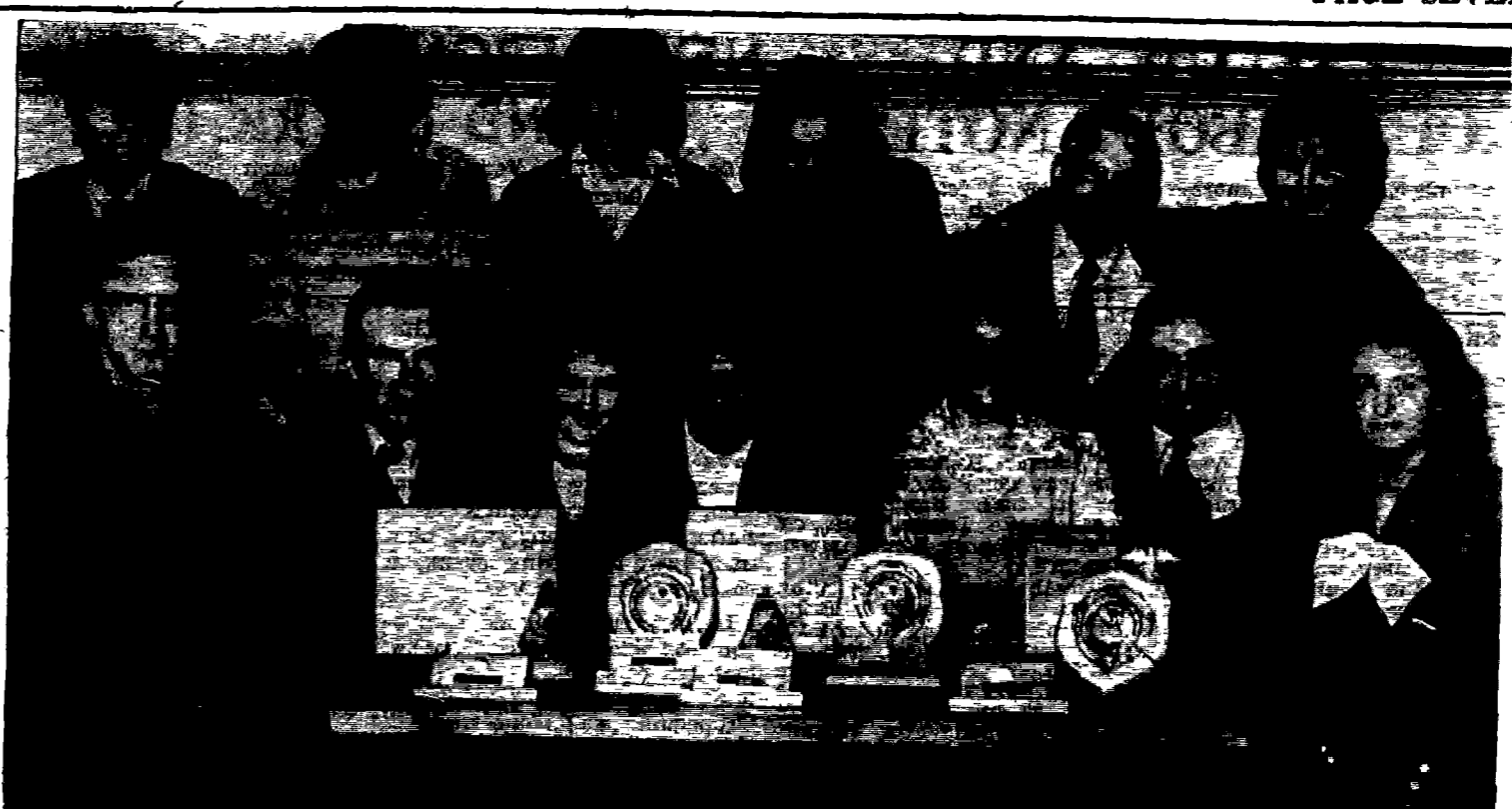

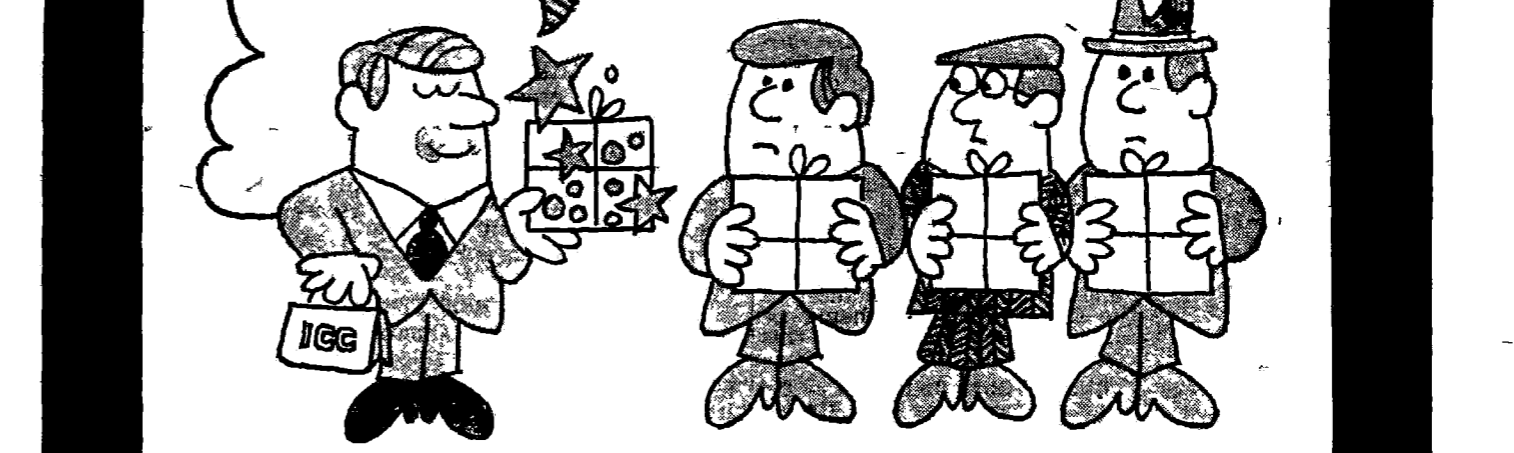
