THE ECONOMIC CRISIS

The seriousness of the economic situation in the country in general was reflected in the discussion which took place at the special meeting of the County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday when members had under consideration a review of the Council's financial position submitted by the County Manager.

The stark reality of the situation is that we are in the middle of a very grave crisis which is rocking the economy to its very foundations. Councilors freely admitted this at Monday's meeting when such comments as follows were made: "this is a frightening document for both the workers and the ratepayers" (one member's description of the Co Manager's Review), "I believe we are in a terrible financial crisis at the moment", "there is a financial crisis and anyone who thinks there is not is foolish".

But this crisis has the whole economic fabric of the county in a strangle grip and employers and employees should be equally concerned with the efforts to solve the problem. Inflation, generated both from without and within the country, is the primary cause of the terrible position but as was also pointed out at last Monday's Council meeting an unprecedented increase in wages was another of the main reasons. Demanding more money merely because some other section has

CAPPOQUIN RESIDENTS COMPLAIN ABOUT POOR WATER SUPPLY

A deputation from Cappoquin attended a special meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday and complained about the inadequate water supply especially in the Shanbally area of the town where it was stated more than one-quarter of the population reside.

The five members of the deputation, Mr T Kerton, Sr, M de Lourdes, Mr W O'Donoghue, Mrs Lena O'Brien and Mr Eddie Fraher were introduced by Mr Norman Walsh. As principal spokesman Mr Kerton referred to what he described as the very serious situation which existed due to the lack of an adequate water supply especially in the Shanbally area which included O'Donoghue Terrace and which was the most populated part of the town where a big number of young families with young children lived. The water problem was going on for the last 5 to 12 years and had got increasingly worse and he pointed out that on the previous Friday night there was a stoppage which went on until Saturday night. The position was that if there was a serious fire in that part of the town there would not be enough water available to contain it while the lack of water could also lead to an epidemic in the town. He referred to a petition signed by 52 residents of the Shanbally area demanding that something should be done. "The residents will take very strong action if something isn't done soon", he said.

Mr Kerton then referred to the fact that at present there were two tractors working 24 hours a day, 7 days a week pumping at the boreholes. When he visited the place he saw water squirting out over the place from the hoses. It was a disgrace, he said, and he asked how much all this was costing.

Clr Walsh supported Mr Kerton on this and said that he also saw this happening. "I was rather appalled by the entire thing," he said.

Mr J D Hally, Co Engineer said that the position was that the reservoir at Glenafalla might be harnessed or that the old water scheme could be used or that a borehole be sunk at the rear of the Convent.

Mr W O'Donoghue, Fire Station Officer at Cappoquin spoke about the situation in relation to fire-fighting. He said that he was far from happy about the position.

CRISIS POINT

Mrs Lena O'Brien said that she spoke as a housewife living in O'Donoghue Terrace and said that from Friday night to Saturday night last there was not even enough water available to make a baby's bottle. The people were very fed up about the situation and would not take much more of it.

Mr Eddie Fraher said that because of the lack of water the chances of getting any new industry in Cappoquin at present were nil. The matter was snowed out of the point, he said, and something should be done. "The residents will take very strong action if something isn't done soon", he said.

The solution he said was a 2-stage operation. In the short term they had sunk six boreholes and while the supply from one had been disappointing the other was fairly good. A third borehole was being sunk and he said the diviner was very optimistic about this. A fourth would be sunk in Affane. In regard to the complaint about using the tractors for pumping he said that they had to use them as the BSB was not readily available there. The long term solution would, Mr Hally said, require an examination of the needs of the whole area and they were about to start a major investigation along these lines over the entire area.

CARETAKER NOT TO BLAME

In reply to questions by Mr Walsh, the Co Engineer said that he hoped to have the third borehole in operation within a week or ten days and if they got the quantity of water which they expected from this it would solve the whole problem.

Mr Walsh—How much do you expect it will give?

County Engineer—10,000 gallons an hour.

Mr Walsh—If we get half of that it will do.

Mr Walsh then asked the caretaker at the Cappoquin waterworks was to blame for the stoppage of the last week and Mr Hally replied that he was not serving. Problems which they had included a pipeline from the intake point which had a very definite limitation in capacity and the major problem of pressure.

In reply to a question by the Chairman, Mr O Curran, who said that a complaint had been made to him about the failure of the Co Engineer to attend the public meeting at Cappoquin, Mr Hally said that he had been invited to attend but having considered it he decided to refuse.

Mr C O'Connor, Co Manager pointed out that it was costing very big money to provide the 24 hour pumping service to keep the supply at present level.

Finally it was agreed that the County Engineer should meet the local members of the Council and examine all possible water supply sources in the area in an effort to augment the existing supply.
