FACTION FIGHTS IN WATERFORD
Apapros my reference in last week's column to the latest publication by Anvil Books Ltd., Tralee, "The Irish Faction Fighters," by Patrick O'Donnell, I came across another reference in it to the faction fighters which apparently were quite common in Co. Waterford at the time.

The main factions were known as the "Caravats" and the "Shanavests" and in an appendix to the book which sets out some official reports by agents of the British administration the following passage appears in regard to a possible major faction fight at Kilibogin.

The passage forms part of a report made by an officer of the Tipperary Militia to the Military Under-Secretary in Dublin Dated December 3, 1808 it goes as follows "In addition to my last communication, the death of a man of the name of Prendergast, who was murdered at Fethard Fair a fortnight ago—being the greatest villain in the country and a leader of the Caravats—has put both parties on the alert and both are now mustering and have received orders to assemble at the Fair of Kilibogin near Dungarvan on the 27th of the month, where each intend to try their strength—for in that county the system is now also established perfectly. Instructions are now gone out to have everything ready against Christmas to try strength and the Co. Waterford factions will not be prevented."

If it ever came off, there is no further record about it in the book, it must have been a whole of a fight!

THE BALLAD OF BILLY BYRNE
Billy Byrne of Ballymanus in the Co. Wicklow was a well-loved and respected figure in his native county. A member of the United Irishmen he was betrayed after the '98 Rising and executed in Wicklow town.

URBAN COUNCIL HAS NEW CHAIRMAN

Mr Paddy Whelan who has been an independent member of Dungarvan Urban Council for the past 15 years but who joined the Fianna Fail Party a couple of weeks ago was elected Chairman of the Council at the annual meeting held last Monday night. He received the support of the Fianna Fail members of the Council and defeated Deputy Mayor Kyne (Lab.) on a 5-4 vote.

Mr Whelan's election was proposed by the outgoing Chairman, Mr. D. Goode (FF) and seconded by Mr. J. Murphy (FF).

At this stage Deputy Kyne said that as this was an international women's year he thought it would be a fitting gesture to elect their only lady member to the Chair. He then proposed Mrs. E. O'Brien (FF) and pointed out that her election would not take the position from the party.

Mrs. O'Brien thanked Deputy Kyne and said that she would deem it a great honour to be elected but a member of her party had already been nominated and she was pledged to support him.

Mr. Kyne was proposed by Mr. R. Walsh (FG) and seconded by Senator A. Deasy (FF). Mr. Goode Murphy, who had been elected and was invested with the Council's chain of office by Mr. Goode who congratulated him on being elected chairman of the Council for the first time.

Mr. Whelan then took over the chair and thanked the Council for the honour. He assured the members of the co-operation in the past year and that they would all work for the good of the people of the town.

A new Vice-Chairman was also elected in the person of Mr. John A. Murphy (FF) who has been a member of the Council only for the past year.

He was proposed by Mrs. O'Brien and seconded by Mr. W. Cotter and was proposed by Mr. R. Walsh (FG) who was proposed by Senator Deasy and seconded by Mr. Kyne.

The voting was the same as in the case of the chair rotation.

The arrangement to rotate the Chair agreed at last year's annual meeting was referred to by Mr. Wade who said he hoped that the rotation was not going to operate solely within the Fianna Fail party but that it would also include the other two parties. He said that he was democratic.

Mr. Murphy replied that for 19 years the Fianna Fail party "didn't get a smell or a look-in" in these matters although they were the largest single party in all that time. He said, "Mr. Wade does not expect us to now show the kind of goodwill that he now looks for after all that."

PENSMAN TAKES Behind the

IN THE RED FOR FIRST TIME

The County Committee of Agriculture created a new record last week when it was announced that for the first time in its history it was going into the "red" and would have to borrow to keep its financial head above water until the end of the year. That the usually solvent local authority now finds itself in financial straits is but another indication of the chaotic condition which the country is in as if such a further indication was required at this juncture.

As one member of the Committee pointed out, the fact of the matter is that the day of reckoning has at last arrived. But what has brought on this day of reckoning and what has landed us in the financial mess in which we now find ourselves? Paying ourselves too much for what we do? Looking for more than we put back into the kitty? Inflation? Or could it just be selfishness and an absolute disregard for the welfare of society as a whole?

Even in the last two years when the prophets of doom were forecasting disaster, demands for bigger pay packets, higher salaries, more expenses, additional "perks" and shorter hours have been pressed at all levels. There never seemed to be any question of who could pay where all the extra money was to come from. It was just a case of give, give, give, and the big stick was the strike threat or the go-slow or work-to-rule manoeuvre.

It is all so ridiculous and apparently irresponsible that the goose that lays the golden egg should be choked off so quickly. It was ridiculous last week when the members of the County Committee of Agriculture having agreed to borrow to meet their financial commitments, spent the afternoon approving all sorts of expenditures—spending money which they did not have—so which they had to borrow to spend. One of the expenditures was for the "removal expenses" incurred by an official who came here on promotion. A "perk" amounting to £1,450. Borrowing money to meet these kind of expenditures does not display a great deal of sense, it is something which we just cannot afford, now more than ever before.

It was equally ridiculous, also last week, when the local Urban Council approved the borrowing of £35,000 to renovate and reconstruct the
