HEAVY FINES IN INSURANCE CHARGES

District Justice B. J. Carroll imposed heavy fines on a number of defendants who appeared before him at Dungarvan District Court on charges of driving without insurance coverage. John Carrick, Knock, Clonsa was fined £12 for driving a car without insurance at Fitzgerald Terrace, Dungarvan, on May 11 and a further £8 for having 4 bad tyres.

Sean Fitzpatrick, Agricultural Contractor, Clashganny, Newcastle was fined £30 for driving an uninsured tractor at Crawa Modeligo, on May 23. As he had a similar previous conviction he was suspended from driving for 3 months. He was also fined £5 for having no tax on the occasion.

Francis Lally, Old Parish, was fined £20 for having no insurance on his car at £10 for having no tax at Duckspool, Dungarvan on February 22. The conviction was ordered to be endorsed on his driving licence. Castlelyons Co-op Creamery were fined £20 for allowing a milk tanker with 6 bad tyres to be used at Ballymacogue on Dungarvan on May 18.

Joseph Reed, Ballinamona Old Parish was fined £20 the conviction to be endorsed on his licence for driving without insurance at O'Connell Street, Dungarvan on January 30. A fine of £15 was imposed on Marion Connor, Clonsa, Leamybrien, for driving without insurance at Downey's Cross, Leamybrien, on June 13, the conviction to be endorsed on his licence. She was additionally fined £3 for having no driving licence and £3 for having no tax on the same occasion.

A fatal accident in which a young motor cyclist lost his life at Shanbally, Leamybrien on January 28 was recalled when Maurice Keane was fined £20 for driving without insurance on the occasion the conviction to be endorsed on his driving licence. The P.O.A. was applied in a charge for having no tax.

MR. D. J. COGHLAN OUTLINES IFA OPPOSITION TO WEALTH TAX

At a special meeting held in Dungarvan recently to discuss Wealth Tax, Mr. D. J. Coghlan, Chairman of IFA National Rates & Taxation Committee pointed out to representatives of the political parties present that IFA is opposed to the principle of an annual Wealth Tax. Due to the cyclical nature of farm incomes and the loss of situations can and do arise on farms and within certain systems of farming for example, because of disease occurring naturally or due to statutory disease eradication programmes or adverse weather conditions and that in an underdeveloped country such as ours we need capital for development more than our extra taxation.

Mr. Coghlan pointed out that the rate of return on capital from farming is very low relative to the market value of agricultural land. The present level of 2% average return on capital leaves very little room for reinvestment and development, which are necessary prerequisites if the industry is to keep pace with present requirements and at the same time make a worthwhile contribution to the development of the country. Mr. Coghlan pointed out that there is no provision in the Bill to take account of inflation. This is very serious at present with inflation running in excess of 20%.

Mr. Coghlan also said that farm land situated in or near an urban area is no more productive than land in a rural area, therefore to impose a premium on its agriculture value while still used for agriculture is unjust.

Speaking on Capital Acquisition Tax Mr. Coghlan stated that the threshold limits were properly reverted to a parent or passes to a brother or sister or of premature deaths are too low and that there is no provision in the bill to adjust thresholds in line with inflation. This was the major criticism of the death duty legislation now abolished. It is not rectified, this tax will be as bad if not worse than death duties within six years.

Senator Austin Deasy stated that he would put these points before Mr. Ryan at the earliest opportunity. All IFA branches in the county were represented at this meeting. Senator Austin Deasy was thanked by Mr. D. J. Coghlan, T.D., at the conclusion of the meeting.

All members present expressed concern that only one Fine Gael representative was present at this meeting considering the seriousness of the matter being discussed.
