





MEDICAL CARDS REVIEW OF GUIDELINES

Every application for a medical services card is considered on its merits. In order to assist the public to know who generally has entitlements to a card the Board publishes from time to time the income guidelines used for assessing eligibility Persons receiving certain social welfare benfits for which they already had a means test (e g non-contributory pensions)

can get a card without any further means test The income counted is the current gross weekly income of the husband and wife only Special allowances are made for high rent and rates or house loan repayments and for reasonable cost of travelling to work

After making these allowances any person can be entitled to medical card with an income within these figures £1900 per week (living alone)

£1650 per week (living with family) Families Husband and Wife £27 50 per week Children (under 16) £250 per week

(over 16) £350 per week Husband and wife and dependent children aged 4, 6, 12 & 16 will qualify if their income (after allowance) is £38 50 or less
