Behind the SPOTLIGHT

A NOTE OF CONFIDENCE IN DUNGARVAN

The news of the major expansion plans announced this week for the Quigley Magnesite Plant at Ballinacourty, Dungarvan, will undoubtedly prove a big fillip as well as being a great vote of confidence by the Quigley Magnesite Division of Pfizer Chemical Corporation in Dungarvan and in the future viability of their Ballinacourty plant

The \$12 million undertaking which commenced operations in 1970 is now to have an additional \$7.5 million expended on it. Work on the new installations is scheduled to commence in November and when it is completed in 1977 it will increase the output of the plant by 25 per cent and result in a finer quality product. It will also mean a conservation of the sources of energy used at the plant to generate power and heat which are based on oil and electricity. At present the annual fuel oil consumption runs to 40,000 gallons with the output at 75,000 tons of magnesite. When the new plans come into operation the annual output will increase to 90,000 tons for the same consumption of oil

Between their three areas of operation at Ballinacourty, Cork and Bennettsbridge, Co. Kilkenny, the Quigley project which is an industry of high technology, employs well over 200 who it is responsible for generating a great deal of employment in other fields in the concerns which provide them with outside services

The plant has come a long way since the first sod was turned at the Ballinacourty site in 1968 by Mr Jack Powers, the then Chairman of the Board of the Pfizer Corporation and his colleague Mr Jack Mulcahy who was primarily responsible for bringing the industry to his native Dungarvan in the first instance. Mr Mulcahy's foresight and faith in the Ballinacourty project has been well justified up to this and the new plans show, by the magnitude of the expense involved, that the company has the fullest confidence in its future prospects

The good news of this latest expansion will, without doubt, be welcomed by the people of Dungarvan and its environs as it will ensure the continuation of a great amount of excellent employment which contributes in no small way to the prosperity of the town and for this happy state of affairs, especially in these trying times of economic crisis, the Management, staff and work force at Quigley Magnesite are to be congratulated

MORE CONTRADICTIONS
Last week I referred to the contradictions contained in statements about the present economic state of the country made by the Managing Director of the Industrial Development Authority and by the Taoiseach, Mr Liam Cosgrave. This week I must ask my readers to bear with me when I focus the spotlight on a similar situation in another field I do so in an effort to get the record clear

On July 23, Mr J. A. McGraw, Director-General of AnCo, the Industrial Training Authority, stressed the need for employers to maintain their intake of apprentices this year despite the economic depression. He was commenting on a series of reports on the first national manpower survey which were published last week by AnCo. The survey was carried out in October 1974 and covered the construction, engineering, textiles, food, drink and tobacco, clothing and footwear, chemical and allied products and printing and paper industries. But while the Director-General of AnCo made this statement last week, the Director-General of the Training and Employment Commission, Mr J. J. O'Connell, in a recent report stated that the number of apprenticeships in the country had fallen by 10 per cent in 1974 compared with 1973. This is a contradiction of the statement made by AnCo last week.

AnCo, Mr Rory Doyle, was saying something quite different. I have in my possession a letter typed over Mr Doyle's signature in reply to an application for permission to the printing trade. The letter dated June 27, 1975, sent to the applicant firm states, among other things, "Your application for apprentices for this year was considered by the Printing and Paper Industry Training Committee at its meeting of 6th June. Your application did not receive a favourable recommendation from the committee because of the present economic recession in the industry"

This looks to me as if AnCo is speaking with two tongues but they are not saying the same thing. While the Director-General is emphasising the need for employers to maintain their intake of apprentices, his advisers are turning down applications to do just this from employers. It is the type of contradiction to which I referred last week and is something which does not inspire public confidence in the government or in state services such as AnCo and the IDA

It might be a good thing for all the people concerned to compare notes first and at least agree among themselves on the policies they enunciate before going on public record.

SUGGESTIONS
It has been suggested, to me that the Urban Road Authority in Dungarvan might erect the necessary road signs to regulate the traffic at the T-junction at Skehacrine, Abbeyside. Since the housing development at Skehacrine, the Parklane Estate, there is a great deal of traffic passing through this junction and this coupled with the traffic from the McCarthyville and Murphy Place estates now makes this junction a rather dangerous place for both motorists and pedestrians

A further suggestion was made to me that the fascia over the old Post Office building at the Square which still has the legend "Orig An Phoist, Dungarban" pointed out it might be obliterated. The suggestion came from a person who saw some tourists trying to post letters there during the week

Another suggestion concerns the condition of the seafloor at Quanns and at the Look-Out. Anyone who has been in the vicinity at either place recently will have noticed the filthy condition of both. Although the summer is well advanced it is still not too late to have a little cleaning up done in these areas. A bit of action would be appreciated

NOMINATED FOR NURSE OF THE YEAR AWARD
A 22-year old student nurse who was educated at the Mercy Convent, Dungarvan has been nominated for Ireland's top nursing award, the "Nurse of the Year 1975". She is Mary Fitzgerald who is in her 3rd year as a student nurse at the County and City Infirmary, Waterford. Mary's home is at Kilmagogue, Portlaw, where her widowed mother and brothers (she is one of a family of five) run their 150 acre farm. Mary got her first real interest in nursing while still at school when, as a member of the St Vincent de Paul and the Legion of Mary she visited local hospitals in the area. When she qualifies in November she hopes to go on to midwifery. We wish her the best of luck.

\$7.5 Million Expansion Plan For Quigley Plant At Ballinacourty

A \$7.5 million expansion plan which will boost refractory output and at the same time cut fuel and energy use was announced at a press conference held at the Quigley Magnesite Plant at Ballinacourty, Dungarvan on Tuesday. The major process improvement programme outlined in the plan will increase refractory plant production at the plant by 25 per cent while at the same time cutting fuel oil requirements.

Work on the turnkey project, developed by Quigley's engineering staff at Ballinacourty, is due to commence in November and is scheduled for completion in 1977. Besides cutting fuel consumption it will also result in an upgrading of product quality. A contract was recently signed on behalf of the Quigley Magnesite Division of Pfizer Chemical Corporation with the West German firm of Buetner-Schilde-Haas of Krefeld to carry out the re-equipment and energy conservation programme. The firm has been tested in pilot plant trials over the past 18 months. Agents for the German firm in Ireland are E. P. Hollet, Dublin Messrs. G. Pettit & Co. Consultant Engineers, Cork. They have been engaged for the building and civil engineering work involved in the expansion plan and in this regard a spokesman for Quigley stated:

that in conformity with usual company policy, Irish contractors would be used wherever possible which was due to the fact that the plant is situated in Ireland. The expansion programme is a definite date though so we will need to be well prepared if we hope to get over this difficult second round hurdle.

WINTER FODDER ACTION NEEDED NOW

The extremely mild weather last winter saved the country from the worse effects of fodder shortage. A repeat of the same favourable conditions can hardly be expected next winter when fodder may be scarce again.

1975 has not been a good year for grass growth. The yields of hay and silage are down due to the harsh frost in May and to the prolonged period of dry weather in May and June. Roots also have been badly affected by the drought and straw is unlikely to be plentiful. All these factors suggest that several steps be taken immediately to ensure an adequate supply of fodder next winter.

FERTILISERS — Fertilisers should be applied for Autumn silage and for late grass. Land adequately fertilised with phosphate and potash and receiving 2 cwt CAN (or its equivalent) per acre now will give some 6 tons of quality silage in an Autumn cut. Seasoned bales of cocks of hay in the field should be taken in for storage without delay.

Autumn grass should be used efficiently by rotational grazing. Italian Rye Grass should be sown as a catch crop in early harvested fields.

If necessary farmers should seek the help of their instructor. They should work out the roughage requirements of their stock and compare with the amounts of hay and silage on hands.

CAPPING THE PIPE DREAM

The announcement last Friday by Marathon Petroleum Ireland Ltd that a well recently re-entered 35 miles south of Ardmore Head and which showed encouraging signs of oil and gas last year, had now been plugged and abandoned would seem to end any hopes which County Waterford might have had of cashing-in where the expected oil and gas bonanza off the south coast was concerned.

The well was the subject of a series of tests by the "Gloram North Sea" drillship since it commenced operations there on June 21, but these only recovered non-commercial amounts of heavy, emulsified oil and natural gas. The original drilling operations commenced last year but these ceased and the hole was cased and sealed in December when bad weather was experienced by the drillship. Initial reports that hydrocarbon signs were encouraging on the well provided considerable grounds for speculation but these have now been shattered.

The latest report states that the "Gloram North Sea" is moving to a new location which lies 36 miles east of the Old Head of Kinsale and is hoped better results will be found at this point.

It is of interest to note that 5 days before the "Gloram North Sea" moved into position off Ardmore, a group of 24 public representatives and officials representing Waterford County Council, Waterford Corporation, Wexford County Council and the Harbour Commissioners of Waterford and New Ross flew to Glasgow on June 16 on a 6-day visit to four centres concerned with oil development off Scotland. The representation from Waterford County Council of four Councillors and two senior officials accounted for 25 per cent of the entire delegation and nobody has questioned who took up the tab for the expenses incurred in the trip or what the total amount involved came to.

Just prior to the trip there was a great deal of euphoria about the oil finds and the frantic need for plans which would have to be made to beat the other fellow to the draw in cashing in on the finds. Now the dream has been shattered with the capping of the source from which the liquid gold was expected to flow.

What a great pity that the County Councillors did not wait a little longer before they took off on their Scottish trip, at least until the drillship had come up with something positive. The ratepayers would then have been saved the cost of what I described at the time as "a turog an aise" (freely translated as "a wild goose chase"). The cost from what I can gather, included flight tickets, transport, first class hotel accommodation and a very generous allowance to meet put-of-pocket expenses and all this must have run into a fair amount. Was the venture worth it in the terms of value where the ratepayers of the county are concerned — that is of course if it is the county ratepayers who had to take up the tab for the tour?

REILG AN ISLE

I was asked a few weeks ago to draw attention to the presence of Reilg an tSle (the mountain "graveyard") at the top of the Sweep on the Youghal Road outside Dungarvan. Where hundreds of famine victims found their last resting place in the last century. Some years ago a monument marking the spot was unveiled and it promised to become a location of interest not only for tourists and visitors but for locals as well. For a number of years the old
