

QUIN WINTER FODDER ACTION NEEDED NOW

The extremely mild weather last winter saved the country from the worse effects of fodder shortage. A repeat of the same favourable conditions can hardly be expected next winter when fodder may be scarce again. 1975 has not been a good year for grass growth. The yields of hay and silage are down due to the harsh frost in May and to the prolonged period of dry weather in May and June. Roots also have been badly affected by the drought and straw is unlikely to be plentiful. All these factors suggest that several steps be taken immediately to ensure an adequate supply of fodder next winter.

FERTILISERS

Fertilisers should be applied for Autumn silage and for late grass. Land adequately fertilised with phosphate and potash and receiving 2 cwt CAN (or its equivalent) per acre now will give some 8 tons of quality silage in an Autumn cut. Seasoned bales or cocks of hay in the field should be taken in for storage without delay. Autumn grass should be used efficiently by rotational grazing. Italian Rye Grass should be sown as a catch crop in early harvested fields.

If necessary farmers should seek the help of their Instructor. They should work out the roughage requirements of their stock and compare with the amounts of hay and silage on hand.

PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

CAPPING THE PIPE DREAM

The announcement last Friday by Marathon Petroleum Ireland Ltd that a well recently re-entered 35 miles south of Ardmore Head and which showed encouraging signs of oil and gas last year, had now been plugged and abandoned would seem to end any hopes which County Waterford might have had of cashing in where the expected oil and gas bonanza off the south coast was concerned.

The well was the subject of a series of tests by the "Gloria North Sea" drillship since it commenced operations there on June 21, but these only recovered non-commercial amounts of heavy, emulsified oil and natural gas. The original drilling operation commenced last year but was abandoned when the hole was cased and sealed in December when bad weather was experienced by the drillship. Initial reports that hydrocarbon signs were encouraging on the well provided considerable grounds for speculation but these have now been shattered.

The latest report states that the "Gloria North Sea" is moving to a new location which lies 36 miles east of the Old Head of Kinsale and it is hoped better results will be found at this point.

It is of interest to note that 5 days before the "Gloria North Sea" moved into position off Ardmore, a group of 24 public representatives and officials representing Waterford County Council, Waterford Corporation, Wexford County Council and the Harbour Commissioners of Waterford and New Ross flew to Glasgow on June 16 on a 6 day visit to four centres concerned with oil development off Scotland. The representatives from Waterford County Council of four Councillors and two senior officials accounted for 25 per cent of the entire delegation and nobody has questioned who took up the tab for the expenses incurred in the trip or what the total amount involved came to.

Just prior to the trip there was a great deal of euphoria about the oil finds and the frantic need for plans which would have to be made to beat the other fellow to the draw in cashing in on the finds. Now the dream has been shattered with the capping of the source from which the liquid gold was expected to flow.

What a great pity that the County Councillors did not wait a little longer before they took off on their Scottish trip, at least until the drillship had come up with something positive. The ratpayers would then have been spared the cost of what is described at the time as "a tureen of oil" (freely translated as "a wild goose chase"). The cost from what can gather, included flight tickets, transport, first class hotel accommodation and very generous allowance to meet out-of-pocket expenses and all this must have run into a fair amount. Was the venture worth it in the terms of value where the ratpayers of the county are concerned? That is of course if it is the county ratpayers who had to take up the tab for the tour.

INFESTION SPREAD BY FLIES

In recent weeks many people and children in and around Dungarvan have been suffering gastric attacks of varying degrees of intensity. These attacks are accompanied by a great deal of discomfort and in most cases they have left the patients in a weak and very inert condition.

The prevalence of this type of illness would appear to be related to the great plague of flies which in recent weeks seems to be everywhere. At least one doctor in the locality had no doubts but that it was the fly menace which was at the root of the trouble.

I mention the matter here because in many instances people are inclined to underestimate the great danger to health which flies in reality are. The greatest precautions should be taken at all times to ensure that foodstuffs are protected from flies and where possible all steps should be taken to eradicate them.

QUOTE OF THE WEEK

Garda John Morrison, National Secretary of the Garda Representative Body which represents 6,500 rank-and-file members of the Garda Síochána was quoted in a daily paper last Tuesday morning as saying "There is very little scope for reduction in overtime and, anyhow, earnings are only a secondary consideration." He was commenting on the decision of the Department of Justice to cut back on the £8 million plus per annum paid to Garda in overtime, by 12 per cent, as an economy measure.

REILG AN tSILE

I was asked a few weeks ago to draw attention to the present overgrown condition of Reilg an tSile ("the mountain graveyard") at the top of the Sweep on the Yaughal Road outside Dungarvan where hundreds of famine victims found their last resting place in the last century.

Some years ago a monument marking the spot was unveiled and it promised to become a location of interest not only for tourists and visitors but for locals as well for a number of years the old

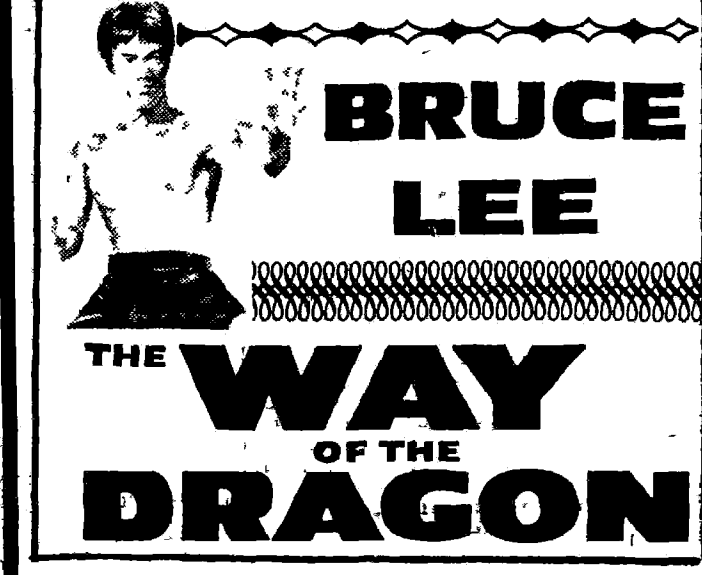

NEW ORDER TO PROTECT GAME BIRDS

In accordance with an order made by the Minister for Lands the grouse shooting season will open on the 12th August in all counties and the opening of the season for Mallard and for Wigeon Teal and other Wild Duck is being deferred to the 1st October. The breeding season for duck was particularly bad this year because of the cold spell in early May followed by the prolonged drought conditions. The deferral has the support of the National Association of Regional Game Councils which organised a survey of duck breeding and stock densities by its affiliated Regional Game Councils. The Forest and Wildlife Service will be initiating a Ringing Scheme for hand-reared mallard next year. The ring is in course of production and will bear the following inscription: Inform Forest and Wildlife Service, Dublin 2, Ireland. All who are interested in ringing mallard should contact Mr O'Leary, Wexford Wildlife Reserve, North Slob Wexford. The scheme will provide further information about the survival, dispersal and migration of this important game species. Research on Woodcock will continue in 1975/76. The following species are completely protected and it is prohibited to take or to kill them anywhere in the country save under licence for the period of one year from the date of the Order. (The list is unchanged from previous years) Green Plover (otherwise Lapwing), Hen Pheasant, Barnacle Geese, Brent Geese, Greylag Geese, Quail Landrail

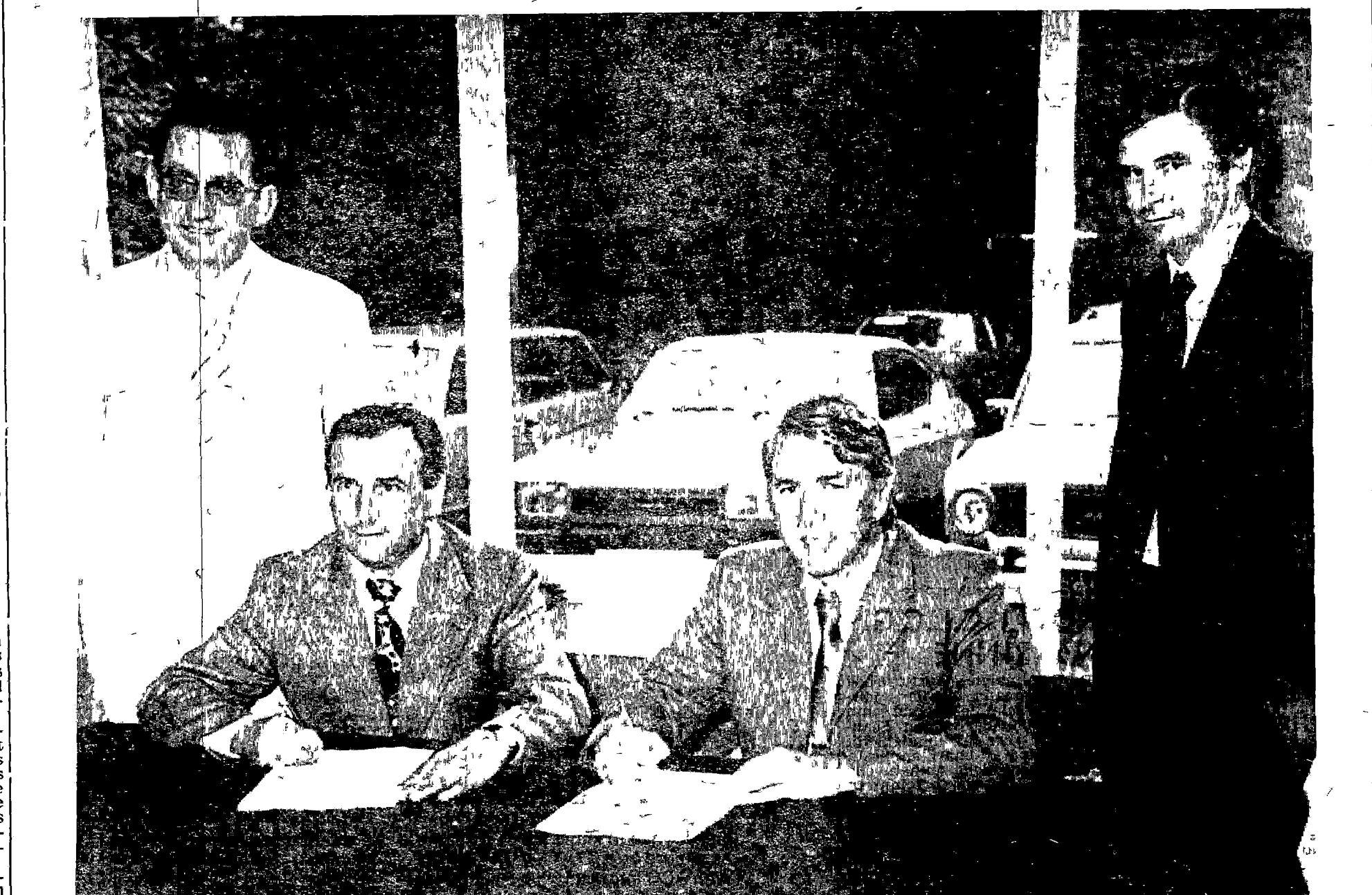

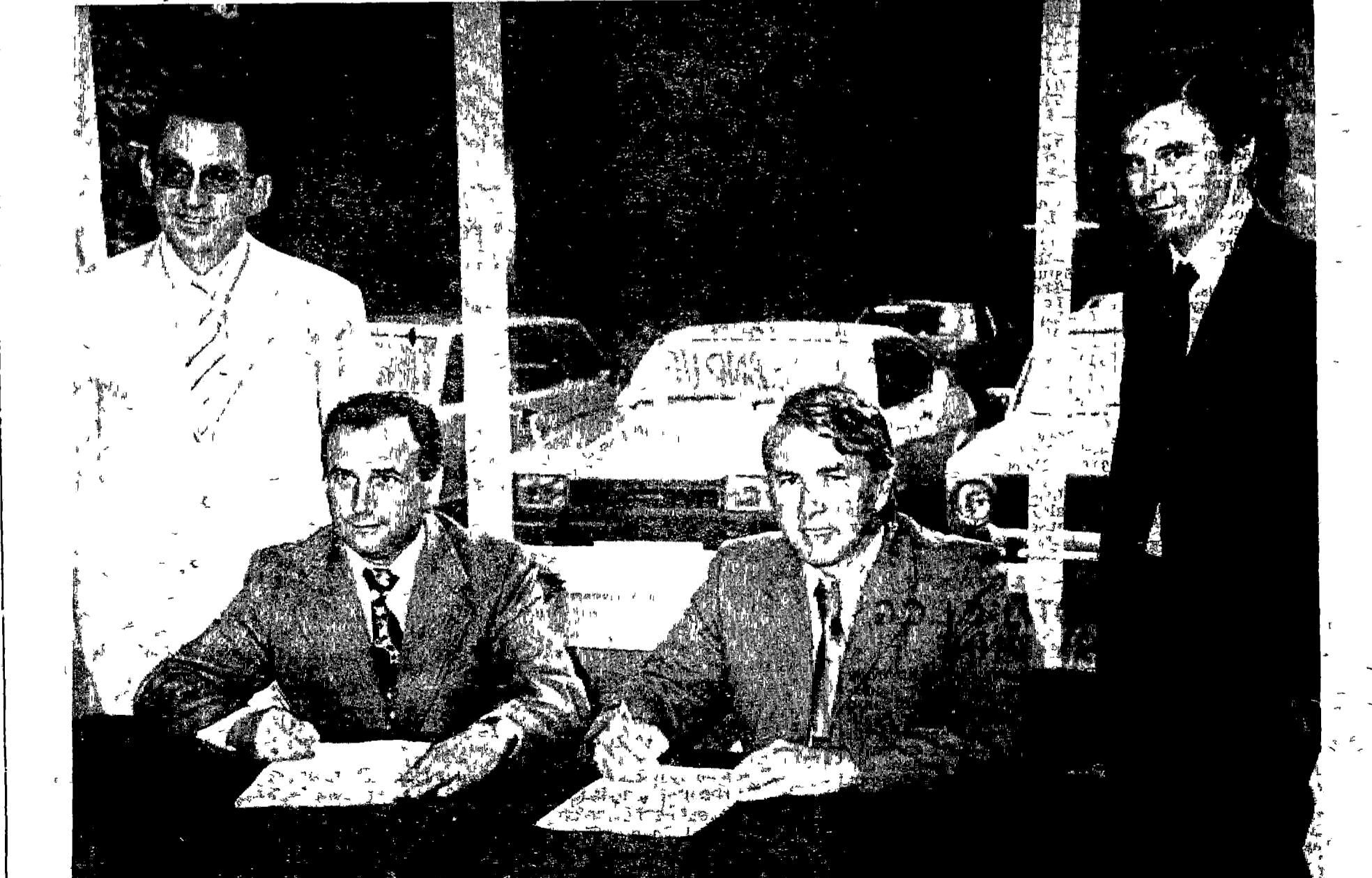

PENSMAN TAKES

Behind the

BY-PASS ROAD IDEA NOT DROPPED

Reliable information that came my way during the week indicates, contrary to what the Dungarvan Town Engineer stated recently at a meeting of the local Urban Council, that the proposed by-pass road for Dungarvan is far from being a dead letter.

Personally I see no other solution than this if the Dungarvan town centre is not to become completely strangled, and to mention the danger in which houses and shops premises in such streets as Mary Street stand from the constant heavy vibrations set up by the huge "artics" and container trucks which pass through the town in ever-increasing numbers.

IT'S ONLY POOR CONSOLATION

This summer thousands of school leavers and university graduates all over Ireland have found themselves in difficulty because of the chronic unemployment position in the country. For vast numbers it has been a case of from the classrooms to the dole queues.

Specifying a career is always difficult, but for this year's crop of would-be career entrants, the prospects are grim. The trouble is that there are just too many for too few jobs and with the removal of the marriage bar in so many of the public services there seems very little hope that the position will improve; the probability is that it will get worse.

But the position is not one peculiar to this country. The figures now available show that the problem is an immense one and one that is not likely to disappear overnight. One in three of all jobless people in the nine member countries of the European Community is under twenty-five years of age.

In the past year unemployment as a whole has been on the increase but young people and young workers seeking their first job seem to be particularly badly hit. The average increase in unemployment in the Community countries last year was 32%. However, the average for the youth sector was nearer 50%.

Some countries fared worse than others. In Denmark, for example, there was an astounding 405% (yes four hundred and five per cent) in unemployment among the young last year. In Germany and Ireland the figures were 210% and 121% respectively. Perhaps the most fortunate for there the increase was only 13%.

It can only be poor consolation for the thousands of jobless young in this country to know that they share a similar plight with the young people in Britain and Europe. BUT AT THE OTHER END OF THE SCALE While the foregoing reveals the difficulties of the young, the following shows that there is still plenty of gray around. Under a caption, "Holidays With Pay £1000 A Week," the "Irish Medical Times" of last week carries the following story: "Irish doctors can earn up to £1,000 a week by working as locums in continental hospitals during their holidays. As trends are now developing in the States, doctors can spend four to six weeks in a continental hospital, earning between £500 and £1,000 a week. Apart from the attraction of higher fees in these countries there is a high rate of overtime due to shorter basic hours."

TALLOW AND ROUNDABOUT NOTES

The Murder of the Miami Showband Members - A feeling of disgust and shock was felt in Tallow and surrounding areas on Thursday last, when the news of the murder of three members of the Miami Showband and the serious wounding of another member became known.

The Miami was well known in Tallow where with Dickie Rock fronting the band they performed the opening of Tallow Horse Fair Festival, more than one occasion. Though some of the members who were so foully murdered were not with the band at that time it nevertheless retained a wide corner in the hearts of the people of the Brideside town. They were frequent visitors to Redburn Ballroom, Youghal, and there too they were held in high respect.

It is indeed sad to think that the boys who brought such happiness to many were laid low by the hands of a madman. The words of our carter to the stricken mothers, fathers, wives, brothers, sisters and relatives of the murdered men the sorrow that this horrible crime has evoked. Perhaps the knowledge that the entire country may in some way help to lighten their grief and sorrow.

It only remains for us to pray that God may have mercy on their souls and also on the souls of those who died whilst perpetrating the foul deed.
