## PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

**BY-PASS ROAD IDEA NOT DROPPED**

Reliable information that came my way during the week indicated that the Dungarvan Town Engineer stated recently at a meeting of the local Urban Council, that the proposed by-pass road for Dungarvan is far from being a dead letter.

However because of the present financial difficulties, the proposal, originally estimated to cost something in the region of £350,000, has to be shelved but I have been assured that as soon as the crisis passes and money again becomes available plans for the construction of the by-pass will be implemented.

Personally I see no other solution than this if the Dungarvan town centre is not to become completely strangled, not to mention the danger in which houses and shop premises in such streets as Mary Street stand from the constant heavy vibrations set up by the huge "artics" and container trucks which pass through the town in ever-increasing numbers.

**IT'S ONLY POOR CONSOLATION**

This summer thousands of school leavers and university graduates all over Ireland have found themselves in difficulty because of the chronic unemployment position in the country for vast numbers it has been a case of from the classrooms to the dole queues.

Starting a career is always difficult, but for this year's crop of would-be career entrants, the prospects are grim. The trouble is that there are just too many for too few jobs or careers and with the removal of the marriage bar in so many of the public services there seems very little hope that the position will improve, the probability is that it will get worse.

But the position is not one peculiar to this country. The figures now available show that the problem is an immense one and one that is not likely to disappear overnight. One in three of all jobless people in the nine member countries of the European Community is under twenty-five years of age.

In the past year unemployment as a whole has been on the increase but young people and young workers seeking their first job seem to be particularly badly hit. The average increase in unemployment in the Community countries last year was 32%. However, the average for the youth sector was nearer 50%.

Some countries fared worse than others in Denmark, for example, there was an astounding 405% (yes four hundred and five per cent) in unemployment among the young last year in Germany and Ireland the figures were 210% and 121% respectively.

Young people in Britain were perhaps the most fortunate for there the increase was only 13%.

It can only be poor consolation for the thousands of jobless young in this country to know that they share a similar plight with the young people in Britain and Europe.

**BUT AT THE OTHER END OF THE SCALE**

While the foregoing reveals the difficulties of the young, the following shows that there is still plenty of gravy around. Under a caption, "Holidays With Pay £1000 A Week," the "Irish Medical Times" of last week carries the following story:

"Irish doctors can earn up to £1,000 a week by working as locum in continental hospitals during their holidays."

A trend is now developing where doctors can spend four to six weeks in a continental hospital earning between £500 and £1,000 a week.

"Apart from the attraction of higher fees in these countries there is a high rate of overtime due to shorter basic

progress. No doubt housing is needed with so many new industries boosting the population."

It is certainly true to say that Dungarvan has changed a lot in the last two decades and is continuing to expand at a rapid rate. But the expansion is something which has been welcomed as it illustrates the prosperity which the town and its people now enjoy.

**GO HOME WALL TO BE LOWERED?**

It seems that all the agitation that went on in this column to have the wall at St Joseph's Hospital (County Home) Dungarvan, lowered has not been in vain and that at last a decision has been taken to remove or at least alter the wall which has given a prison-like look to the hospital for so long.

Besides the visual affect of the wall on the whole surroundings it has created a hazard for traffic passing along the roadway outside and also entering and leaving the hospital grounds.

Now the Special Hospitals Committee of the South Eastern Health Board have recommended that the limited improvement of vision by lowering the wall at a cost of approximately £1,000 should be considered in conjunction with the estimates for 1976 and that Dungarvan Urban Council should be asked to consider the provision of a footpath on the hospital side of the public road.

I hope that having reached the "recommendation" stage the decision runs into no further snags.

**COUNCIL DEFERS CONSIDERATION OF SCOTTISH OIL TRIP REPORT**

When the report from the group who recently went on a tour of oil and gas installations in Scotland came up for consideration at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday it was unanimously agreed to defer the matter to a later meeting.

Mr K O'Ryan described the report, which had been circulated to the members as a very comprehensive one and said that it had come as a disappointment from reports in the previous week that oil had not been found off Ardmore. He asked what the cost of the trip to Scotland had been.

Mr O'Connor, County Manager, said that they did not know this as yet. In regard to the cost of the boring off Ardmore he said that he would like to point out that the benefit to the economy of the country as a whole was not confined to the actual area where the oil was found. They had found this out as a result of the Scottish trip.

Mr O'Connor said that the drillship was only moving on to the next block of Kinsale and Waterford could still benefit from the oil.

Mr O'Connor agreed that the spin-off benefits from any finds of Cork could still come to Waterford. One of the big things he brought home with him was that he had assured those using it that they should spend no money until things had actually materialised. From this angle alone he thought the trip was well worth the money spent on it.

**EUROPEAN HERITAGE YEAR**

It has been drawn to my attention that the Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Urban Council are among the only local authorities in the South-East region which have done nothing to mark 1975 as European Heritage Year.

There was a project at one time in which the Board of Works expressed some interest which would appear to be admirably suited as an undertaking for the occasion—the renovation of St. John's Castle in Dungarvan. It is hardly likely that either of the Councils concerned will show any interest in such work at the present time when they are being put to the pins of their collars to keep the bare essentials going.

The plain truth is that there is no money for such necessary things as housing, sewerage and water (except in smaller amounts than those required) so the "luxury" of such historic ruins will have to be deferred to some later (and hopefully, better) times.

## Councillor Alleges Threats Over Dumping Complaints

Councillor P. Croft at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday said that while the dumping of detritus matter which he had previously complained of had been abated at Bonmahon, it had now been started by the same firm at Halfway House. He alleged that lorry loads of the stuff were being dumped in a place prepared on a local farm. He said that he would be stopping this indiscriminate dumping because the way it's going on is polluting the entire area.

He said Cllr Croft went on to say that the Council would have to take action to see that it was stopped and he alleged that certain threats were made against him when he first raised the matter of the dumping — at Bonmahon. But, he added "this is something that will have to be stopped and I'll keep going at it until it is stopped."

Cllr F. King supported what Mr Croft had said. He had no objection to verbal abuse on the subject but he assured those using it that they were only wasting their time. The Co Manager Mr C O'Connor said that they had received a letter from the firm concerned and officials of the Council were to meet the representatives of the firm about the matter. He said that he would be at the meeting and assured the members that the interests of the Council would be fully looked after at it.

I.F.A. WEEKLY BULLETIN

FINANCING OF CEREAL RESEARCH BY FARMERS AND THE GRAIN TRADE

A minimum of £20,000 will be contributed jointly by IFA and the Irish Grain and Agricultural Merchants Association

This is a new departure in having research directly financed by farmers and the grain trade

From the monies collected during last year's harvest IFA have made available a minimum of £10,000 for this research

IGAMA will contribute an equal sum. The Government for their part will contribute an amount equal to the sum of the total contributions of both organisations

Farmers and Grain Trade have now a strong influence in directing research programmes and as these are the people who are most affected by the ups and downs of the market

The priority areas designated for immediate research are: (a) To investigate the factors which are holding down cereal yields and income from enterprises at farm level

(b) The relationship between soil type, climate, yield and quality of grain

(c) Extension of work on continuous Malting Barley to Feeding Barley plus Catch Crops using higher nitrogen levels

(d) Early harvesting of Feeding Barley

The working group emphasised the fact that if cereal growing was to remain competitive with other agricultural enterprises every effort must be made to increase income per acre

Intervention is one of the dominant factors in the EEC grain market and there intervention criteria has become important

Consequently, the Agricultural Institute are studying the problem of adjusting the intervention criteria
