NOT GIVING THE LEAD

With the summer of 1975 all but a memory we are facing a grim winter ahead in the economic field. Forecasts of a big increase in the already colossal unemployment figures by the time Christmas comes (it's just four months off) are by no means far-fetched and even the most optimistic are beginning to feel that their optimism is being stretched beyond the limits.

According to figures for the 12 months up to June this year which have just been released, the number of workers in this country on short time has increased by a massive 2,370 per cent in June 1974 there were only 230 Irish men and women working short time. By June of this year the figure had leapt to 5,688.

However despite these facts there seems to be no change in the life-styles of the majority. The good times are still with us if we are to take the week-end spending spree in the lounge bars and such outings as the recent Galway Race Week where a sum stated to be in the region of £2 million was spent as any indications of the public appear to want to run in blinkers which shield them from the cold facts of the looming disaster.

But greatest culprits of all are the government who have allowed things to get completely out of hand. They are opposing the lead which they should give and the policy of drift which they seem to have adopted very early on is still being followed. When signs of the approaching recession first began to show the government spokesmen talked to workers and advised them to lessen their demands and tighten their belts for the good of the country. But they were talking with their tongues in their cheeks as at the same time they had approved big increases for themselves and for all the other TD's and Senators. A Dail Deputy now receives a salary of £4,661 plus travelling and subsistence allowances and postal expenses.

And, incidentally, do we require all the TD's who at present frequent Leinster House? The Constitution provides for one representative for every 20,000 to 30,000 people but for our population of 2½ million we have 144 TD's, not to mention Senators. By comparison, Holland with a population of 10 million has only 100 members in its parliament while our ratio is four times higher than the number in Britain. We could reduce our number of TD's in this country by nearly 45 and still comply with the Constitution while we could abolish the Senate entirely and be at no loss where the administration of the country is concerned. But what a financial saving it would be over a period of 5 or 10 years! A lead could well be taken here.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR TO RESIGN?

I have heard from a number of sources that the young Fine Gael member of Waterford County Council, Mr. Michael Veale from Kilrossanty is about to tender his resignation from the Council, that is if he has not already done so. Mr. Veale became a member of the Council for the first time when he successfully contested the local elections held in June last year.

His entry into local affairs was not without a certain amount of upheaval as it marked a split in the Fine Gael party in that area when the outgoing Councillor, Mr. Phil Cusack, was passed over and later unsuccessfully stood as an independent candidate in the elections.

Since his advent to the Council and to the County Committee of Agriculture of which he was also a member, Mr. Veale proved himself a very articulate member who participated in all debates, sometimes with rapier-like thrusts, directed mainly at the Fianna Fail opposition. He got married early this year and since then he has not attended a meeting of the Council and absence from meetings for a period of six months carries with it the penalty of automatic disqualification from membership.

The question now being posed, in the event of Mr. Veale giving up his seat, is who will succeed to the vacancy. The accepted procedure at one time, as part of a gentleman's agreement between the various political parties was that it was left to the party in which the vacancy occurred to nominate the successor. This agreement however was breached and peculiarly, Mr. Veale was concerned with what happened at the time it happened on the occasion when Cllr. Jackie Fahey, TD, was appointed Parliamentary Secretary during Fianna Fail's last term in government and as a consequence resigned his seat on the Council. Fianna Fail nominated Mr. Tom Foley as his successor but he was opposed by Fine Gael who put up Mr. Veale. Mr. Veale took the seat for Fianna Fail in the division that followed.

Now it would appear that Mr. Foley who was narrowly defeated in the June '74 elections will again come into the picture. I understand that Fianna Fail may, in the event of Mr. Veale's departure, put up their own man instead of leaving it to Fine Gael to nominate a successor and in the event of this happening their man could be no one other than Mr. Foley. I understand that there is strong feeling within certain sections of the Fianna Fail party that the vacancy, if it occurs, should be contested, especially as it is Mr. Veale's seat which is concerned and, of course, if Fianna Fail should decide to follow this line then the seat will become theirs as they already have an overall majority on the Council. Things certainly have a funny way of working out sometimes. It might be opportune at this stage to also pose the question as to who now leads the Fine Gael Party within the County Council. Cllr. Norman Walsh has, as far as the general public is concerned, been the Party leader for a number of years but from observations I have made and things I have heard, I believe that there has, in the words of the old Irish proverb, been some "usage fe thalamh" activity going on and that there is a hidden hand at work. It could be, too, that the Claudia affair still throws a long shadow over the whole position.

However, it will all come out in time and all we have to do is to wait and we will see.

DUNGARVAN SWIMMING POOL TO BE REPAIRED

Mr. P. Walsh, Town Engineer, sold members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting last Monday night that he had prepared no estimate of the cost of repairing the swimming pool at the Look-Out as requested at the previous meeting because in his opinion the condition of the pool was such that it could not be repaired without rebuilding it. He said that the walls were in very bad condition and in a state of disintegration. He advised the Council that they should employ a consultant to prepare a report on the pool and the cost of repairing it if they still intended to go ahead.

Mr. O'Connor, Co. Manager, said that as far as the new heated indoor pool at the proposed amenity centre was concerned he could see no hope of having this financed at the present time and in his opinion it could be 5 or 6 years before anything in this regard could be done.

Divided views were then expressed by the members as to whether the pool should be repaired or not.

Mr. Walsh said that short of spending an enormous amount of money it would not be possible to repair the floor of the pool.

Finally the Co. Manager suggested that the Council should continue with its present repair programme at the pool. He pointed out that if the new pool was built they would have to face running losses of £7,000 or £8,000 a year as was happening in other areas where similar type pools had been built. I think we should ask the Town Engineer to prepare the best estimate he can to carry out the necessary repairs he said. The Council agreed to this suggestion.

CONTEST FOR MELVIN SCOUT TROPHY

This week the attention of members of the Catholic Boy Scouts of Ireland will be focused on their National Campsite at Larch Hill, Tibbraden, Co. Dublin, where the competition for the premier Melvin Trophy will take place there from Thursday, August 21 to Sunday August 24.

The competition is for teams of eight Scouts in the 11-16 age group from every part of Ireland and are taking part in preliminary contests. The 32 teams represent 11 dioceses or Regions of Ireland and are represented as follows: Dublin, Waterford, Wexford, Cork, Limerick, Galway, Sligo, Derry and Belfast.

Emphasis in the competition is on Scout skills and the boys' knowledge of mapping, first aid, knotting and cooking will be put fully to the test. The teams will select a number of events to take part in where their teamwork and initiative will count as much as technical skill.

The Melvin Trophy was presented to the Catholic Boy Scouts of Ireland in 1934 by the late Sir Martin Melvin, then proprietor of "The Universe" newspaper. The trophy was designed and made by the noted Irish silversmith Miss Mia Cranwill, and has enamelled panels illustrating Ireland's past, present and future. The Trophy has a link with the CBSI's founder Father Tom Farrell as his label badge is incorporated in the Trophy.

HIGHEST MEMBERSHIP

The Catholic Boy Scouts of Ireland is now at its highest membership since its foundation in 1927. There are over 16,000 members throughout the 32 counties and the demand for new Units continues at a high level. The CBSI provides a full range of adult leader training courses and publications through its National Headquarters. Considerable attention is at present being given to developing local Scout Councils and a major re-organisation has just been completed in Dublin Diocese.

The Melvin Trophy will be presented to this year's lucky winners by the Chief Scout of the CBSI, Mr. James D. Hally, B.Sc., Waterford County Engineer, Dungarvan, at the conclusion of the competition on next Sunday, August 24th at 4.00 p.m.

PROTEST AGAINST PROPOSAL TO TRANSFER DUNGARVAN DISPENSARY

When a resolution from Abbeyside branch of the Labour Party protesting against a proposal to transfer the dispensary from Priory House to St. Joseph's Hospital (Co. Hume) came before the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night, Mrs. R. O'Brien said that she had heard a rumour about this circulating in the town. She asked that the position be clarified as she knew that all the people concerned would prefer to have the dispensary retained where it was as the position was more central for them.

Mr. T. Kynne TD said that while the matter had not been finally decided he knew it was contemplated as he had checked it out. He thought that such a move would present a grave hardship especially to the people of Abbeyside who would have to walk the extra long distance to the hospital.

Mr. O'Connor, Co. Manager, said that if the Health Board found the present premises unsuitable they might consider as an alternative, locating the dispensary on the grounds of the Town Hall at a price to be agreed.

Mr. Kynne thought this would be a very good idea.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White, was instructed to write to the Regional Health Board, stating that the town was totally dissatisfied with the proposal to transfer the dispensary to St. Joseph's, and that they should consider using the Town Hall basement instead.

Other countries have altered the Farm Modernisation Scheme, the Social Fund and the Regional Fund to suit their own particular needs. Yet in our country no effort whatsoever has been made to make these plans suitable for our own needs.

In particular in the Farm Modernisation Scheme we still have the situation where transitional farmers are getting far less out of grants than the development farmers. This was promised to be reviewed by the Council of Agricultural Ministers three months ago yet nothing has since been done.

In addition to the above causes for stagnation in farming we have another serious cause, whereby many farmers have been asked to pay four separate types of taxation. This has led to a complete lack of confidence in the agricultural community.

The present problems are to be satisfactorily resolved, strong action may have to be taken by farmers.

DISAPPOINTMENT AT REDUCTION IN MILK PRICE TO PRODUCERS

The Chairman of the I.F.A's National Dairy Committee, Mr Tom Cleary, in a statement said that he was extremely disappointed that some Societies saw it necessary to reduce milk prices to pay for the new development in the dairy industry is most unwelcome.

Mr Cleary said "Coming in mid-season and directly after a campaign to increase milk production, it will do nothing to restore confidence so badly needed among dairy farmers who have been severely affected by the price of milk."

INCREASE IN COST OF GROUND LIMESTONE HAULAGE
Mr Tom Fingleton, Chairman of the National Industrial and Transport Committee of the I.F.A. said in a statement that the increase to 48 pence per tonne in the haulage of ground limestone was a very damaging factor to Irish agriculture.

He said "This increase is coming at a time when the application of limestone has fallen dramatically from two million tonnes in 1973 to 15 million tonnes in 1974 and expected to be below this figure in 1975. The present consumption is the minimum replacement rate and therefore this increase will have a damaging effect."

Mr Fingleton added "This extra increase should be borne by the Excisequer and not by the farmer."

First I would like to say I think that the letter from Mr Hickey is a load of rubbish. He starts off by talking about the article on Daitih O'Connell but apart from one quotation he does not refer to the article again in his letter which leads me to believe that Mr Hickey is not interested in the amount of publicity which any organisation gets from the Tallow Correspondent nor is he interested in whether the Tallow Correspondent has adult like responsibility, but rather he is obsessed in "mugging" the press so that the words I.R.A. never appear in print, and from his P.S. he intends to include the words "Fianna Fail" in his list of unprintable words also. I could be wrong Mr Hickey but from the lack of unconstructive criticism in your letter it is hard to come to any other conclusion.
But to get back to your quotation, you said that the Tallow Correspondent accused the Irish Government of becoming more British than the British themselves. Well what ever about becoming more British they are certainly as British as the sea and now our present government is in the process of enacting legislation to make law the last remaining piece of the Sunningdale Agreement, an agreement which was wrecked by the strike of Ulster Workers Council (a million Protestant Irishmen) as this becomes law then a person who commits a crime on one side of the border can be charged and tried for on the other side of the border. How British can you get?
From your letter Mr Hickey it is obvious that you are ignorant of the laws of this country. You state and I quote, "Daitih O'Connell—got off lightly with a year in jail." It is the influence of alcohol.
As far as I am concerned the Tallow Correspondent is a good journalist. He is not afraid to write articles which he knows will offend some people. But that's what a journalist is. Mr Hickey He had a duty to all his readers whether they be I.R.A. or anything else you like. He should the Tallow Correspondent decide to give up his job then I think the Dungarvan "Leader" would lose a very valuable asset. Grow up Mr Hickey and don't be so selfish have a bit of "adult like responsibility".
