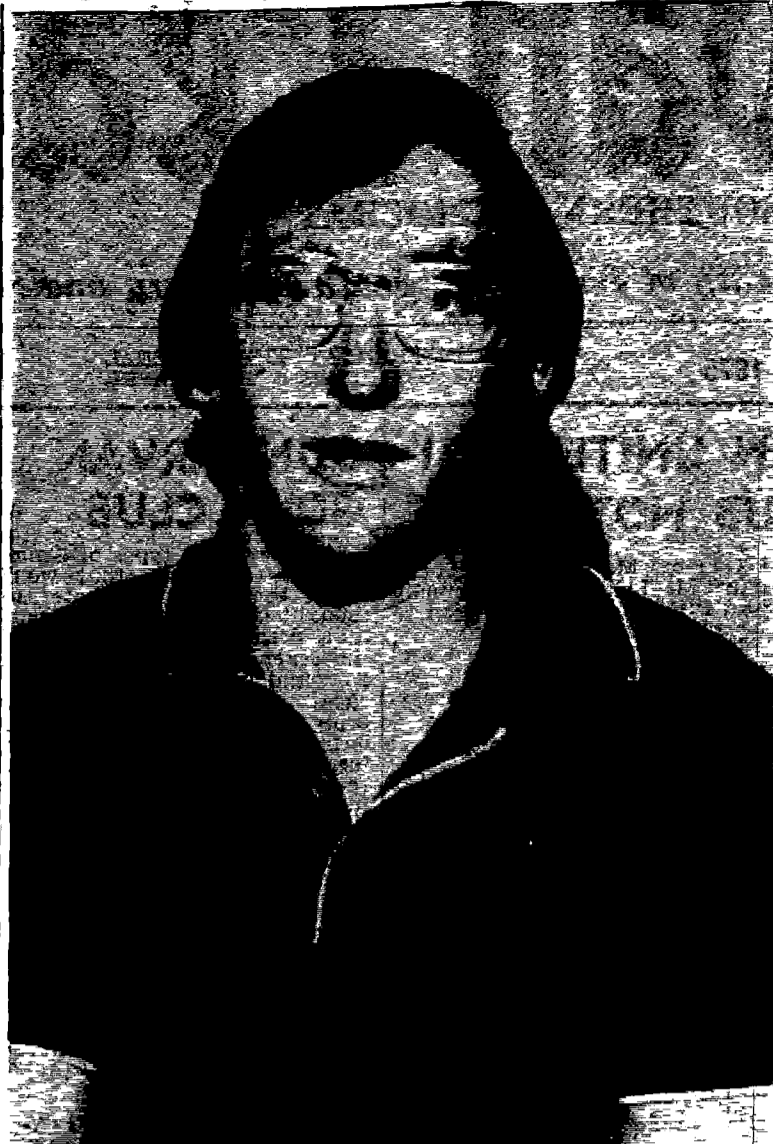

IRISH HORSES BOUND FOR MOROCCO

A group of six Moroccan buyers left Ireland recently having bought 40 horses and one pony for a total of £43,000. The group, which was divided into three purchasing units representing the Royal Stud of Morocco, the Royal Guard and the Defence Forces was led by Col Ben Aissa of the Morocco army. It is believed to be the first time that Irish horses have been sold to Morocco. The majority of the horses were young, unbroken animals - yearlings to four-year-olds - while two stallions and a brood mare were also purchased. The pony was acquired for the son of the King of Morocco. Co. Waterford owners figured largely in the transactions accounting for nine of the animals sold as follows: Mr Marshall, Parkhill, Butlerstown House (3) 3-year-old bay filly and gelding, Mr Michael Connors, Pallas, Woodstown (4) 2 3-year-old geldings, 3-year-old filly and 2-year-old filly, Mr Nick Connors, Park, Stradbally (1) 3-year-old gelding, Mrs Roche-Perks, Monaree Hotel (1) 4-year-old filly and Mr James Maher, Cusheam, Dungarvan (1) 4-year-old filly. The buyers were shrewd judges of horse-flesh and were deliberate and careful in their choice of animals. They paid market prices and were not slow to reject horses offered to them at inflated prices. The horses will be flown to Rabat in a week's time.

IRISH HORSES BOUND FOR MOROCCO

MINOR TRIUMPH. Tallow minor hurlers gave a superb display in shattering the challenge of Eastern champions, Clonea, when taking the championship title by 3-17 to 3-3 at Walsh Park last Sunday. Clonea got off to a fine start when they goalied from the throw-in but some brilliant hurling from Connie Curley (whose 1-2 before the 13th minute left Tallow holding a 1-8 to 1-0 lead) spurred the Western champions to unprecedented effort and Michael Delaney's 20th minute goal helped the winners to a 2-10 to 2-0 interval advantage. The Tallow defence deteriorated early in the second half and Clonea shot home 1-1 to cut the arrears to 6 points. But when Don Henley moved to full-back with Dermot Cullinan taking over at corner back the road to goal was sealed tight as the Tallow rearguard repelled attack after Clonea attack. Tallow went on to register an easy win after this and though Clonea looked dangerous at times they could never match the winners over-all ability. For Tallow Don Henley, Pat Daly and Stephen Curley in defence gave sound cover to "keeper Ned Curley who could in no way be blamed for Clonea's three goals. Kieran Ryan and Raymond O'Brien were always in command at midfield while up front Connie Curley who had a personal tally of 1-10, gave a brilliant display, getting good assistance from Michael Delaney, Michael Curley and Frank Ryan. Great credit is due to selectors Eddie Cunningham, P. 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I.F.A. WEEKLY BULLETIN

I.F.A. ASSESSMENT ON FARM INCOME SITUATION CONFIRMED. The drop by 24 per cent in farmers' real incomes last year, revealed by the official statistics of CSO, confirm the I.F.A. assessment of the farm income situation in 1974. This was stated by Mr T. J. Maher, President of the Irish Farmers' Association, in a statement. "Some sectors of farming were much more severely affected than others, in particular the producers of small store cattle and farmers with suckling herds where incomes were down by as much as 50 per cent in certain regions. The reduction in price of major farm products, such as cattle, beef and pigs and the substantial increases in costs in particular of fertilisers compounded the problem. The main factors contributing to this disastrous farm income situation. The most serious aspect of this whole development is that it has created a lack of confidence in farming today."

LAST MINUTE GOAL BLASTS LISMORE HOPES

Lismore learned the hard way that the agony and the ecstasy of the senior hurling championship was all about at the Fraher Field Dungarvan on Sunday night last. On Friday night last, Abbey-side, fielding without two of their best players shocked the Nire in what was one of our best minor football finals to date and they will play John Mitchels or Edin's Own in the county final at Dungarvan on Sunday next unless the Mitchels and Erin's Own play a draw in the Eastern final which was due to be played on last night (Wednesday) at Portlaw.

Tallow became the first club to win a county title this season when they defeated Clones at Walsh Park on Sunday last. This was a brilliant and very stylish display by Tallow who were never really in trouble. Well done Tallow and our sincere congratulations to both players and officials.

It is good too, to see such progress being made in the under 21 hurling championship and after Ring have played Dungarvan only four teams will remain in the winners here will play Tallow in the semi-final and Shamrocks and Cappoquin are through in the other semi-final.
