PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

BACK AGAIN
Here I am back again after a two weeks break, part of which was spent in the isolation of south Kerry. I never cease to marvel at the majestic breath-taking beauty of the scenery there and no matter how often I go back it always seems to be new. Now I must try to take up again where I left off three weeks ago and forget, for another year at any rate, the beauties of Kerry.

ST JOHN'S SCHOOL
The annual collection for St. John's Special School for mentally handicapped children will take place at all Masses at the church gates in all parishes throughout West Waterford on next Sunday with the exception of Dungarvan and Abbeyside. The collection is later than usual this year—the usual Sunday in recent years was the last Sunday in May—but this year it had to be postponed until now.

I know that the public are bombarded by collections and flag days and hardly a Sunday goes by without somebody making an appeal. Nobody can get by without music and sporting and social clubs and organisations, feeling the financial pinch, find themselves forced to queue for a collection date and because there are so many it means, in Dungarvan at any rate, that Mass-goers must run the gauntlet of the collectors box practically every Sunday of the year.

Despite all this I feel I do not need to make an apology in appealing to the public to be as generous as they possibly can when they meet the collectors for St. John's School on next Sunday. This school caters for the educational needs of the mentally handicapped children from the entire West Waterford region and this year—in the very near future—the dedicated members of the Association attached to St. John's hope to see the realisation of a six years old dream by the opening and occupation of a beautiful new school where every amenity will be available for the education and comfort of the children.

This year also marks the appointment of a new principal teacher at the school and it is the earnest hope of the School Manager and the members of the School Management Committee that they have now surmounted the last of the many disappointments which they had to face since the building of the new school commenced three years ago.

However all this takes money and because of the desperate rate of inflation, prices have soared since construction work first started and more than was first anticipated will now be required to meet the local contribution towards the entire cost. Added to this the day-to-day running costs have also increased enormously. But in the end the effort will be well worth it all as the children concerned will have a beautiful new school.

It is for this reason then that I would add my voice to the appeal to the public to be as generous as they can where St. John's is concerned on Sunday next.

For it was the Fair Day of Affane sure and the Pattern Day of Lismore
To my neighbours of Tubberna-Cartha I'll leave to relate
How they recalled old St. Carthage's glory and piety
Honoured his day
But we, heaven pardon our fathers, who left us no saint of our own
The festival kept in a fashion we had at the "Old Cornerstone"

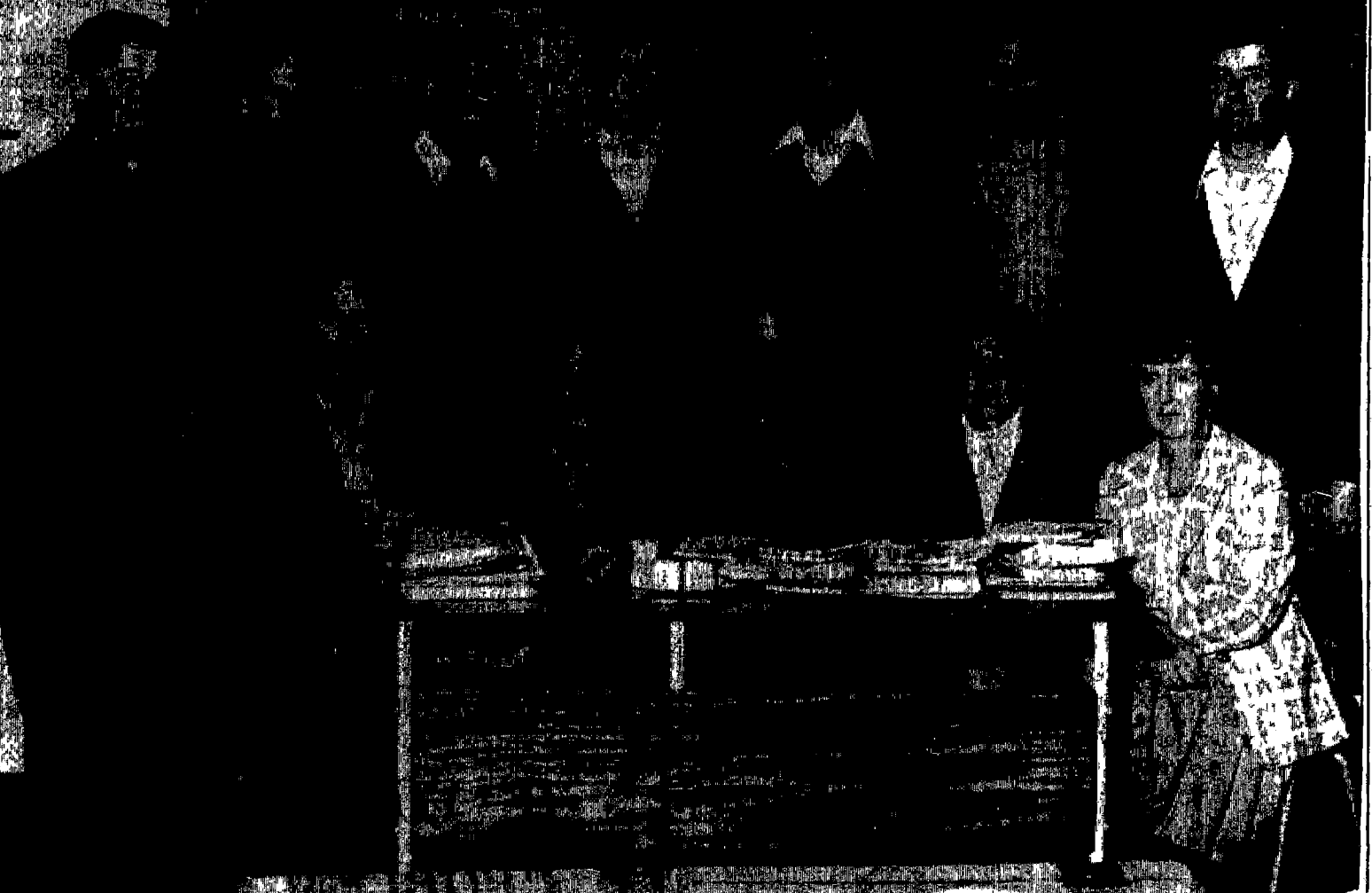

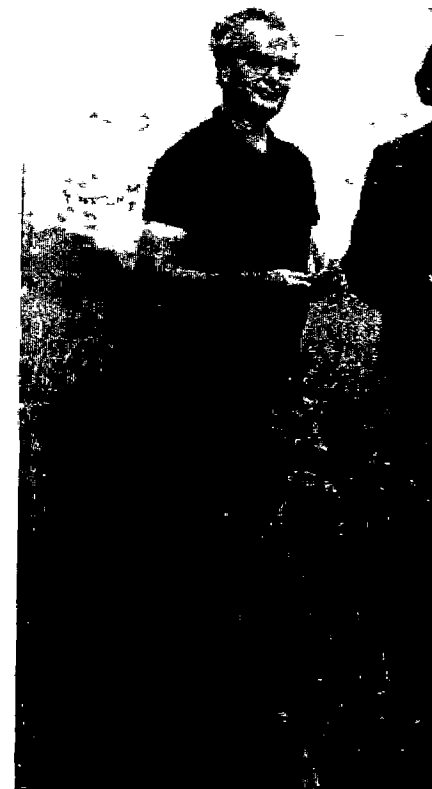

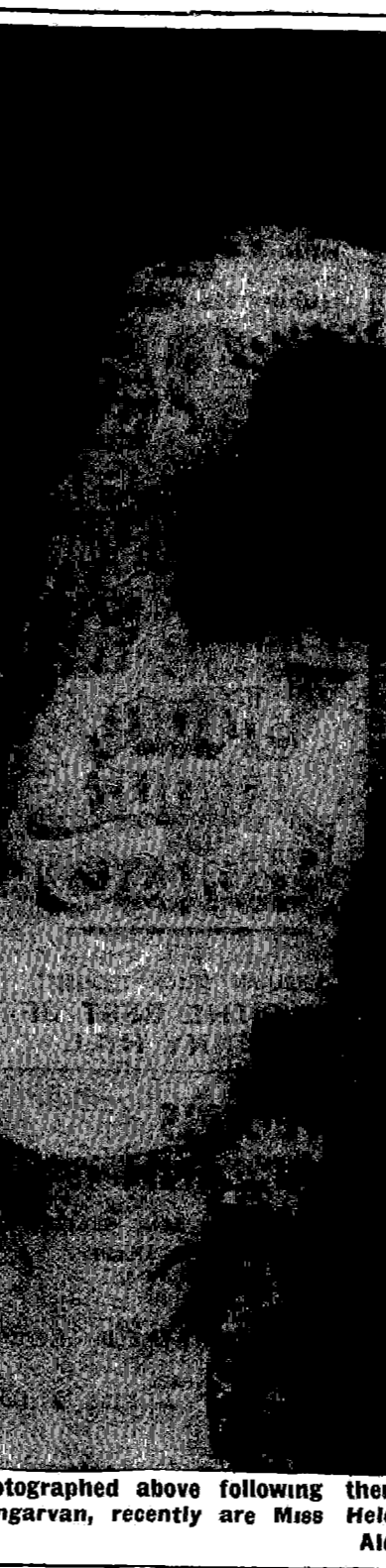

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

The Editor DUNGARVAN LEADER Dear Sir — Further to my notice of motion at the last meeting of the Urban Council concerning the chaotic traffic conditions at the Mary Street, Emmet Street, Mitchell Street, junction, I would like to convey to your numerous readers the grave dangers which exist at this junction on Saturday evening, 23rd ult., in company with a good many more, I was standing in front of the Parish Church awaiting a funeral, in the space of 10 to 15 minutes, 7 cars approaching from the Youghal direction, headed down Emmet Street, obviously in error, because eventually they all came back, and having gaped at the sign post, which was of no help whatever the pressman had to ask the bystanders the way to Waterford, or Tramore. However, one incident very nearly had serious consequences. One of those cars who had no idea that one had to take a sudden left turn to remain on the main road, proceeded fairly quickly straight through the junction, at the same time, a car was coming up Mary Street and turning right. The two vehicles headed straight for one another, and it was only the last second swerve of the stranger that avoided a very serious accident. All the bystanders (including myself) got a terrible shock. When they regained their composure, they turned on me and demanded that the Council should do something to remedy the situation before somebody is killed. I explained the situation to them as well as I could, but it broods on me to all of us who witnessed the incident, the absolute necessity of remedying the position right away. Now that the Council of the County Council had witnessed what we did on Saturday evening, I feel that they would not be breaking the Sabbath doing something to try to prevent a serious accident at this junction.

I would like to take this opportunity of thanking my fellow Councillors for the general support which they gave to my proposition. However it was decided to defer it to the next meeting of the Council at which the Co Engineer Mr J Hally will be present. Now, this meeting will not take place until the end of September, and the County Engineering staff will require time to study my proposals. All in all, it could take 2 months before anything is done. Now, to my mind, and to the minds of the members of the public who were present on Saturday evening, this is just not good enough. Something should be done immediately.
