THE COST — CAN WE AFFORD IT?

The one clear fact which emerged from the meeting in Dungarvan last Thursday night between RTE executives and a selected group of locals was that irrespective of whether the second television channel will be RTE 2 or BBC 1, it is going to cost more money which will, in the main, have to be provided by the viewers through increased licence fees. While much stress was laid on the point that the availability of a choice for viewers was the prime reason for introducing a second channel into the one-channel areas, it was clear that as far as the RTE people were concerned their principal interest was to see that control of the second channel remained in their hands.

The discussion which took place was, at times, quite interesting but when crunch questions as to the costs and standards, in the event of RTE being afforded the responsibility for the second station came up, the RTE people were inclined to prevaricate and play for touch. In most instances it was almost impossible to secure the information sought and in many respects it was difficult to assess the real purpose of the exercise which RTE set themselves in sending their representatives to Dungarvan in the first place.

We were informed about the longer-viewing hours and about the new autumn schedules which the Programme Controller, Mr Jack White thought we would all be pleased about. However we were not told that RTE would have to find another £2.5 million to arrive at a break-even figure next year, nor that RTE was considering applying for an immediate increase of £3 on black-and-white television licences and £5 on colour licences to achieve this. One cannot be blamed for being confused nor indeed for asking what is going on at all.

We have, on the one hand, groups of RTE executives and personalities touring the country in recent weeks meeting groups of people at local level as they did in Dungarvan last week. I presume that promises of a similar nature about the better schedules and longer viewing were also made to these groups. Obviously these promises were to show what RTE could really do when the pressure was on in an effort to win support for their claim to the second channel.

But these visits must have cost quite a lot of money when the expense accounts involved in them all were totted up. And so, too, I presume will the longer programmes and new autumn schedules. And who is to provide the money to meet these bills? The poor licence-holders of course. So in the long term it will all come back to the licence holders. But the Director General and the other RTE executives should get it through their heads that we cannot continue indefinitely to pay the higher and higher charges as they have been asking us to do. Having this and having that is all very fine but when it comes to paying the question is can we afford it?

SOFT DRINKS AND HARD DRINKS

Some months ago when I criticised publicans in Dungarvan and some neighbouring areas for attempting to bring in their own mini-budget by further increasing the prices of various intoxicating drinks, we in turn were criticised by the publicans for (they claimed) writing about something concerning which we knew nothing. One publican went so far as to say that I just did not have a clue about the matter and that my claim that these increases

were unjustified had no relationship to the reality of the matter.

I took those criticisms with a grain of salt as I was well aware at the time that there were still some truths in the old saying that there is no smoke without fire and I refer to this now again merely in the context of the new outcry which is going up concerning the prices being charged for soft drinks wherever they are being sold.

Midleton Urban Council was responsible for this latest controversy when they called on the Minister for Industry and Commerce to have an inquiry held into the manufacturing costs, sale prices and profit margins relating to minerals and other soft drinks.

This matter was also the subject for comment by "Quidnunc" in his column "An Irishman's Diary" in a recent issue of the "Irish Times". Referring to a letter which he had received from a reader on what was described as "the astronomical extortion that your friendly neighbourhood publican imposes on his sucker customers in the matter of soft drinks and mixers," Quidnunc quoted his contributor as saying that he did not altogether blame the publican for the present position but that "the people I blame most of all are the publicans' customers. Irish drinkers must be the most gutless bunch in the drinking game as well as being the most gullible."

Quidnunc then goes on to deal with prices as follows: "For Soda Mixers—that is, for Soda, Tonic, Lemonade, Ginger Ale and Bitter Lemon, the publican pays 50p per dozen. He then retails these singly at prices ranging from 14p to 19p each showing a profit of from 100% to 200% on each bottle. For Spirts—the slightly larger bottles—your jovial host pays 65p per dozen. He sells you these at 14p to 20p each, again with a minimum profit of over 100%." Six-packs of minerals are bought at 99p for two and sold at 72p for one!

Because of the existing unsatisfactory position in regard to the government orders purporting to control the price of drink it could be well if whatever test case in regard to their validity is to be brought before the High Court could be decided as a matter of urgency without further delay. I think that the Minister could do a little more than he has been doing in bringing this matter to a head. If the Court holds the Minister's Orders to be valid and enforceable then the question of the prices of intoxicating drinks will be solved in a very short time. In the meantime, however, someone should also examine the claims that huge profits are being made from the sale (at present prices) of soft drinks.

The inventor of the Palliser Gun, he also invented bolts for securing armour plating, chilled shot for piercing, and a conversion of smooth fire guns into rifled guns. An accomplished architect, he planned Barons Court Estate in Lon-

I.F.A. WEEKLY BULLETIN

MODERNISATION OF TELEPHONE SYSTEM URGED
The modernisation of the telephone system should be given priority, said Mr T. J. Maher, President of the Irish Farmers Association in a statement.

He said that at this time when the country is going through such a serious economic plight with high unemployment and tremendous difficulties facing the agricultural and business sectors, the question of an extra TV channel should be left in abeyance.

There were other priorities in communications for instance the absolute necessary improvement of the atrocious telephone service.

He said "From a commercial point of view the existence of a modern up-to-date and effective telephone system is absolutely essential. Both domestically and in relation to telephone contacts between this country and outside an up-to-date system is absolutely essential to the development of industry generally, particularly on the marketing side."

He added "I would urge the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs that he would treat the modernisation of the telephone system as a priority before any further consideration is given to the introduction of a second TV channel."

THIS YEAR'S WHEAT PRICE FIXED
The price for this year's milling wheat based on 20 per cent moisture is 265.00 V.A.T. exclusive. It was announced in a joint statement by the Irish Flour Millers' Association and the Irish Farmer Association.

The statement said that this adjustment in price is as a result of the provision in the joint agreement between both associations of January last on prices and conditions.

Both parties unanimously agreed on that occasion that the production of quality milling wheat should be encouraged.

This agreement gave the grower some protection in the event of a weak market while it now allows the benefits of a stronger world market to be passed on directly to the grower.

The £450 per tonne upward adjustment in price has been calculated on the basis that for every £1 increase in price of French Wheat 1 a g ex store over £77 the grower receives 92 pence per tonne. The average import price was based on the quotations of four importers over the reference period the 21st August to the 4th September 1975.

Mr Michael Conway on behalf of the growers expressed his appreciation of the co-operation of the Irish Flour Millers' Association in dealing promptly with the required price adjustment and also the other Organisations who supplied the import price quotations.

COMMENT ON GRAIN BOARD MONEY
While the allocation of farmers money in Grain Board funds to pig research is in accord with I.F.A. wishes nevertheless Mr Pat Dunne, Chairman of the I.F.A.'s National Pigs and Bacon Committee, expressed his disapproval of the decision to delay transfer of the funds for up to two years.

Mr Dunne said the facts of the situation are that the Institute in general has been starved of money for capital investment purposes and there has been no capital investment by Government in pig research since 1968. If this situation is allowed to exist for the next two years the Institute will fall further behind the standards set by commercial production units instead of leading the way for producers.

He pointed out that already a certain amount of extra work was being carried on in commercial units on a trial and error basis — sometimes at great expense to the farmer involved.

He added "If this money is not allocated for another two years it will be worth only half its present value in real terms having already been allowed to be idle for the past two and a half years."

In regard to the £22.8M which has not as yet been allocated to farmers arising out of the wheat levy, Mr Michael Conway, Chairman of the National Grain Committee of the I.F.A. said that any balance should not be allowed to lie in the Exchequer but should be applied, following consultations with the Grain Committee, for the benefit of cereal growers.

General Liam Lynch Commemoration — The annual commemoration to the memory of Gen Liam Lynch was held at Fermoy on Sunday last. Rev J. Corkery St. Coleman's College Fermoy presided at the commemoration Mass at St. Patrick's Church and afterwards a Colour Party and members of the O.I.T.A. under Comdt. Paddy O'Brien led a parade from Fitzgerald Square to Kilmurphy where Liam is buried. The Liam Lynch Pipe Band, the Castlebliss Pipe Band and the Thomas Davis Pipe Band, Mallow, led the parade.

Mr Matt Flood, Fermoy, was parade marshal. Dr. John O'Mahony, B.L. in his oration attacked the Government and Ministers especially Dr. Conor Cruise O'Brien. He said Ministers of our government are daily waging war on our culture and traditions our national language was an outmoded appendage not deserving any pride of place. Our history books we are told must be re-written. Our most cherished songs and ballads are being banned our very National Anthem we are told is too provocative. Commemorative ceremonies must be continued and Conor Cruise O'Brien still furnishes abundant material for British propaganda. Concluding O'Mahony said "our government tells us we must maintain a low profile even though the six counties 'time bomb' may go off at any moment. It is our government cannot read the writing on the wall. It is not a bounden duty on our government to help with the plans to meet such a horrific situation should the worst befall."

He went on to pay tribute to the late Liam Lynch whose motive he said was full freedom for our country. Concluding he said "The partitionist mentality of our government must be seen for what it is a gimmick for their own protection but for the detriment of all our people."

COURT WARNING TO TEENAGERS WHO STOLE

They can prepare themselves for St. Patrick's Institute if they step out of line again, District Justice J. Carroll commented at Dungarvan Court when two 18 year old unemployed labourers pleaded guilty to a larceny charge.

On Kevin Carlton and Michael O'Neill, both of Cathal-Brugha Place, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty to stealing six dozen half pint bottles of Harp valued £9 the property of Mary Keane, Frary Street, Dungarvan on March 27 last.

Supt M. English said the defendants left for England after being arrested and charged. They had previous convictions. A court order was made against both defendants to the November Court Justice Carroll said he would review the situation when in the light of their behaviour in the future. PENSMAN TAKES

IN CRITICAL FINANCIAL POSITION
Despite the cut backs in expenditure by the County Council in an effort to cope with the present recession it was admitted at a special meeting in Dungarvan last Monday that the present financial position of the Council remains critical. Nor is the crisis solved or the worst of the recession over. There is no good news for the ratepayers of the county for the coming year as forecasts for the 1976 rate mention "sharp" and "substantial" increases.

Pressed by some members to place a rough figure on the increase which might be expected, the County Manager stated that last Monday's meeting that he would not like to hazard a guess at this stage but from the serious mood in which the matter was discussed it was evident that the outlook could not be more bleak.

The estimates for the coming year are at present in the course of preparation and are being based on the Council's existing priority policy (adopted at the June meeting) to maintain employment at existing levels at the expense of a cut-back in the use of machinery and the amount of road surfacing which might otherwise be done. But even to maintain employment and the ordinary services at present levels for the coming year and to cover shortfalls in the cash provided for in the current year, there will, it now seems, be a very steep rise in the rate. Without doubt the situation is very serious but what is worse is that we cannot as yet see any light at the end of the tunnel.

AN ABSOLUTE DISGRACE
In the results of the Bord Failte Tidy Towns Competition released last week it was announced by the adjudicators that they were not making any national award this year in the case of the larger towns of 5,000 population and over. The reason for the decision was that none of the entries in this category reached the required standard. Apathy on the part of residents and above all the old problem of litter were the two prime reasons cited by the adjudicators for downgrading these areas.

"Why we already have not come to grips and solved this problem of litter is hard to understand. If anything, since the time the first anti-litter campaigns were mounted years ago, the problem has worsened and the damaging effect which litter has, not only in the streets of our towns but over many parts of the countryside, must now be most obvious.

This litter problem ranks alongside proper hygiene enforcement as one of the blackmarks frequently cited by visitors to this country. How those concerned can still show such apathy to it is hard to understand. Rural areas, obviously influenced by the Tidy Towns competition appear to have shown considerable improvement but litter control continues to be a major headache in the larger urban areas.

I do not ground Dungarvan last Sunday evening and all I can say is that the streets were an absolute disgrace. Most of them were strewn with litter and I could not help thinking that anyone passing through the town could not be blamed for forming the opinion that Dungarvan must be the dirtiest town in Ireland. It reflected no credit on those living in the town and roundabout nor indeed on the local authority.

And as if this was not bad enough I found the way between the Spring and Lisfenel blocked by a profusion of broken glass bottles which littered a patch of the road where someone had opened an "unofficial" dump. We
