PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

NEED FOR CASUALTY CENTRE AGAIN STRESSED
The tragic death of a young child following immersion in the sea at Abbeyside last Friday evening compels us to once more focus attention on the need for a properly equipped and adequately staffed casualty centre in Dungarvan. It is a shocking state of affairs that in the case of an emergency in the town the nearest hospital where treatment may now be obtained lies at a distance of thirty miles which takes the best part of an hour to cover.
Efforts have been made several times in the last couple of years by the South Eastern Health Board to establish such a centre in the town but despite all the negotiations which took place these efforts all ended in failure because agreement could not be reached in regard to a medical panel from which a roster could be operated so that a doctor would be on call to deal with any casualty which would require emergency treatment.
In a town the size of Dungarvan where a number of heavy industries are located, a casualty centre is an absolute essential and no one should be permitted to stand in the way of its establishment for any reason whatsoever. Life is the most precious thing and the provision of every means to see that it is preserved where humanly possible cannot be too strongly

FUNERAL TRIBUTES TO LATE JOHN KEANE

A number of former All-Ireland hurlers, including the Plains Fall-leaver, Mr Pock Lynch, attended the funeral of Mr. John Keane in Waterford last Saturday.
The funeral of one of Waterford's greatest hurlers was on the largest ever seen in the city.
The funeral to Tramore took place after Requiem Mass in St. John's Church, Waterford, which was celebrated by a former colleague, Very Rev John Grace, P.P. Carrick Beg.
The first lesson was read by the General Secretary of the G.A.A., Mr Sean O'Siochan, and the second by Mr Lynch, who played with John Keane on several Munster Railway Cup teams between 1938 and 1948.
The present rate demand on the County Council stood at 22p and he said that it was proposed to increase this by 8p for the coming year to cover the amount set out in the estimate and leave a surplus of £37,000.
One of the main items in the increase was under the heading "Instruction in Agriculture" which jumped from £94,338 in the current year to £274,700 or by more than £180,000. The other major increases were Instruction in Horticulture up £4,959 from £14,287 to £19,246, Instruction in Poultry-keeping and Farm Home Management, up £3,618 from £11,000 to £14,618 and Administration, up £4,434 from £13,945 to £18,379.
The cost of Winter Farm Schools and Classes was up £1,700 from £1,000 to £2,700 and Scholarships were up £1,250 from £5,500 to £6,750.
Mr Michael Galvin, Area Inspector, Department of Agriculture was present at the meeting for the presentation of the estimate.
At the outset the Chairman, Mr K. O'Ryan said that in view of recent publicity given to the amount of expenditure on the Committee he wished to point out that it was mandatory on the Committee to pay all salary increases and that they had no control over them.
In reply to a question by Mr N. Walsh, the C.A.O. said that he would not be looking for any extra instructors during the next 12 months as he felt that they had an adequate staff to cover all areas in the county.
EXTRA DEPUTY C.A.O.
Mr Frost then went on to state that included in the estimate was a sum of £3,500 to cover the appointment of a new deputy C.A.O. to take charge of education. This amount would only cover a 6 months period as he felt that even if they were to approve of the appointment at this stage it would not be filled until next June.
Pointing out the need to approve of such an appointment, Mr Galvin said that with the exception of 3 counties of which Waterford was one, all other committees in the country had appointed such a deputy C.A.O. whose sole job would be to take charge of education and to co-ordinate the educational efforts of all the advisory services in the county. In addition he would have to take charge of the new EEC educational scheme in regard to Farm Modernisation and this would be additional to all existing courses.
The Chairman Mr O'Ryan said that he would be opposed to such an appointment already had one deputy C.A.O. and he thought this was going too far as they already had sufficient staff at present. "It looks peculiar to me" said Mr O'Ryan, "that at a time when more and more people are leaving farming we are appointing more and more instructors."
Mr P. Kennelly proposing that they approve of the appointment said he thought it would benefit young farmers and consequently the country as a whole.
This was seconded by Mr M. Hennebery who thought it would be short-sighted on the part of the Committee not to make an appointment which had been made by practically

TRAGIC DROWNING TRAGEDY AT ABBEYSIDE

Mr Patrick Morrissey Murphy, the time saw the girl in the water and succeeded in wading out and bringing her ashore. Artificial respiration, which the child responded was applied and an ambulance was called which took her to the local District Hospital from where she was rushed to Ardkeen Hospital, Waterford where she died some hours later.
