Did anything come of this suggestion?
 There are two round towers in Ballinacourt which are now in a dilapidated condition. According to tradition they belonged to a certain Baron. I recently visited there and gandered it saying "a Baron he found him but barren he would leave him". These two towers are connected by a family it appears, lived in the towers and the cattle were driven through the large gates connecting them, the gates were shut and the cattle and family were safe for the night.
 There are Ogham stones to be found in Old Parish also and in a churchyard. The story of the landlady's lackey comes to mind. When returning from Dungarvan with a cartload of padlocks which were to be put on the doors of the people to be evicted next day, he met two men near where the creamery now stands. Both hit him with a 'grit' and killed him. It is said that the local Parish Priest, Very Rev. Fr. Casey, is said to have told his people in his sermon about the incident on Sunday in Irish, of course "Don't be talking in your homes about what has happened as the ditches have ears. The men who did this were committed to a 'ventil sin'. Their blood-stained shirts were burned in the local public house and the people who were to be evicted were told that the flames produced.
 Did you know that there is a man buried in the Old Graveyard in Ballinacourt who was run faster than a hare, and that there was a Mass Rock down by the river?
 And the Urban District Council, one of whom is an Old Parish man, had no objections to the exclusion of Old Parish from the Official Guide. Sad!

COUNCILLOR CLARIFIES STATEMENT ON AMBULANCE INCIDENT

At a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday Cllr. F. King asked for and was granted permission to make a statement in reference to statements made by him at the previous meeting of the Council when the matter of the provision of a casualty service at the District Hospital in Dungarvan was discussed.
 Mr. King said that at that meeting he referred to an accident which had happened near Dungarvan at which a passing ambulance had taken up an injured person. He wanted to clarify what he said on the occasion and explain the position. Because no ward was available for the treatment of the injured person involved in the accident could not be accepted into the District Hospital and was in fact treated in the ambulance by the driver.
 He said that every effort was made by the ambulance people to deal with the injured person and that it was not a case of neglect on the part of the staff at the District Hospital on the occasion as the person concerned had not in fact been taken to hospital, after a long time, transferred from one ambulance to another. He had raised the matter as a criticism of one particular doctor who, he alleged, was responsible for blocking the casualty service at the hospital. He hoped that this statement would now clear that point.
 Cllr. Curran, Chairman said that when Cllr. King had made his original statement he thought that the injured person had been taken to hospital and was left unattended. This was not so as the person had never been taken into the hospital but had been left in an ambulance.

National Farm Accounts Service

Despite its obvious importance, one of the most neglected areas in Irish Agriculture is farm accounting. It is not that it is due to a variety of factors, not the least of which is the apparent belief among many farmers that it is a social and not a business based on either guesswork or tradition, has served their purposes well enough over the years. But the fact is that the highly competitive situation in which he now operates, the old ways are just not good enough.
 Modern farming is just as dependent on having adequate and timely information on both the physical and financial side of things as any other business. Indeed it is generally recognised and becoming more obvious to farmers that it is an essential requirement for anyone who wishes to achieve the full potential of his resources.
TIMELY MOVE
 The formation of the Irish Farm Account Co-Operative Society Ltd and the establishment of the National Farm Accounts Service is therefore a timely, progressive and businesslike move by the farming community and the organisation has been transferred to a net cost of some 100,000 in the region of 225 a farmer can now have his accounts kept by a trained recorder and analysed for him. The best scope for expansion lies in the future.
 Already the response to the service has been encouraging. In over 1,000 farmers participating in the service in the Counties of Wick, Wexford, Roscommon, Wicklow, Carlow, Laois, Wexford, Waterford, Kerry, Tipperary and Cork.

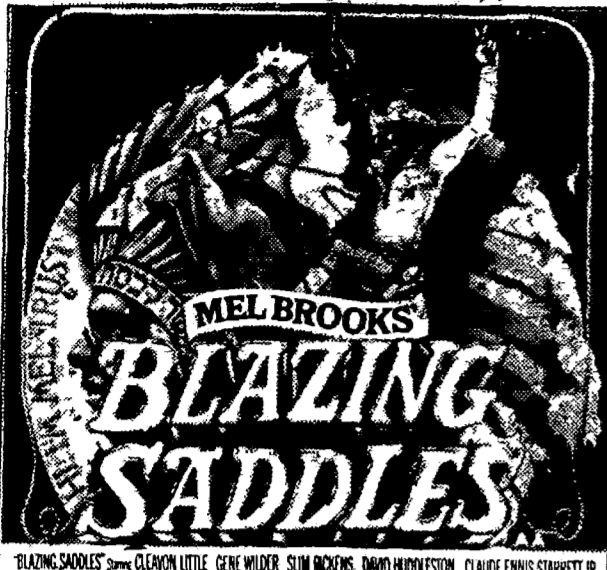
Dungarvan 22, Fermoy 6
