**PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT**

**WHAT A SPENDING SPREE!**

Despite (or maybe it could be more correct to say because of) the gloomy predictions for 1976, Christmas 1975 will be remembered as one on which the greatest spending spree ever was indulged in by the public. There was no shortage of money anywhere as people seemed intent on having one last desperate fling before facing the dismal prospects of the New Year. For practically everyone it was a very happy Christmas and the absence of fatal traffic accidents and the prevalence of beautiful weather that allowed shoppers and revellers to move about freely helped this happy situation in no small way.

But now the spending is over and 1976 is already upon us. We have been told that the future of the country is balanced on a knife-edge between even greater depression or if we act sensibly—recovery. We are already aware of the huge increases in postal and telephone charges which came into force on New Year's Day, we know about the huge increases which RTE are going to impose for television licenses as from February 1 and we know also that car insurance rates are to be pushed up by almost 25 per cent.

In their own way these all represent mini budgets as they impose additional taxation on the general public. But on top of these we must now face the terrifying prospect of what has been forecast as the toughest budget since the war years, the terms of which will be made known on budget day towards the end of the month. The grim fact that £1,000 million must be found by additional borrowing or taxation leaves little doubt as to what the outcome will be.

Although there are more than 108,000 out of work or on short time and despite the fact that the country has been borrowing heavily to keep its head over water, it did not prevent one group from looking after themselves although they had already started shouting "tighten your belts" to the ordinary man in the street. On the Thursday before Christmas before the Daily went into "recess" for the holiday period, numerous supplementary estimates were passed almost unnoticed. One of these was to provide the money for the increases in the salaries of TDs and Senators under which Daol deputies got a rise of £742 and senators a rise of £437.

These latest increases mean that in less than two and a half years the Daol members' "allowances" have moved up from £2,500 to £5,403 per annum (annum in this case meaning about seven or eight months) while senators now draw £3,087 per annum (and the annum in this case can be very much less). But in addition to the allowances, there are the expenses payable to both TDs and senators which also make up quite a hefty figure.

The latest available figures for Deputies' travelling expenses show that for the year up to March 31, 1974, the 82 rural deputies had drawn a total of £1,272,920 or an average of £15,560 each. Senators' travelling expenses for the same period totalled £39,567 for the 55 in the Seanad. In addition each has the privilege of free postage (up to 300 letters a week) as well as free trunk calls to a specified number and also unlimited local phone calls.

So it can be said that the TDs and Senators did alright in ensuring themselves a happy Christmas and a Prosperous New Year. For the rest of us it could be grim and while 1975 may well be a year that most will wish to forget it could well be that 1976 will prove a real back-breaker. **DOCTOR WINS DRAW FOR CHAIRMANSHIP**

At the annual meeting of the South Eastern Health Board held in December Dr. Hugh O'Brien-Moran, Traamore, was elected Chairman when his name was drawn from a hat after he had tied with 12 votes each with Mr. Charles Curran who is one of the two elected representatives from Waterford County Council on the Board.

The outcome of this election once more focuses attention on the composition of the Health Boards. A number of the members are publicly elected representatives who represent the various local authorities in the region where the Board functions, other members comprise of doctors and nurses who have been nominated by their associations and organisations and some are nominees of the Minister for Health.

The publicly-elected representatives hold their mandate from the voters who elect them at the local elections and it is to the voters that they have to give an account of their stewardship when they seek re-election. The professional members on the Board have not to face any such test and are consequently freer when they come to make decisions, particularly on financial matters. This is the crunch issue as the elected members feel that they can be disadvantaged at times when such decisions are taken.

**WHAT MASTER McGRATH LOOKED LIKE**

At some time or other practically everyone has heard of Master McGrath, the hero of the coursing world, whose memory is immortalised in the ballad bearing his name. But how many, beyond the coursing enthusiasts, know anything about the greatest of all greyhound's physical appearance. Many romantic tales have been told but last week a "Carbery's Annual" of Christmas 1940 which contains what appears to be an authentic account of the little black wonder dog was loaned to me. The source of the account was an old greyhound trainer who was stated to have kennelled dogs with the great McGrath. It came at first-hand and went as follows:

"A little 54 lb dog with a sour looking, plamish head. He'd look up at you as if he owned the universe. He had a good killing neck that ran into muscular shoulders. His chest was of fairish depth but he had a wonderful spring of rib and the best-muscled back I ever saw."

The description went on: "McGrath had strong quarters and the neatest legs and feet that were ever set under dog. He had the shortest and finest of rat-tails, sometimes you'd think he hadn't a tail at all. He had a long white streak on his chest and a small white patch over one of his shoulders, carrying two white toes on all feet. Over his back he was ticked with white as if a shower of hail fell on him."

Master McGrath died in 1873 having won the Waterloo Cup, the blue ribbon of coursing three times. The monument to the great dog at the junction of the Clonmel and Cappoquin roads at Ballymacogue just outside Dungarvan still attracts a big quota of tourists and is referred to in the following lines:

Though thrice victorious on Altcar's plain, McGrath's fleet limbs shall never speed again. Stoy, gentlemen, the dog's memorial view. Then run your course as honest and as true.

**WASTING MONEY**

If people have enough money to be able to indulge in the traditional customs of Christmas then no one can

find fault with them on the score of needless and unnecessary spending. Having made that point I would like to thank all who assist in getting ready for the festive season and I would wish to acknowledge receipt of them in this way as it is a custom which I can no longer afford to indulge in myself.

Among the cards which arrived at the office in the days prior to Christmas was one from the Department of Posts and Telegraphs which expressed, in three languages, greetings for Christmas and good wishes for the new year. Now here is a department which has been in dire financial trouble in recent weeks because it simply was not able to pay its way, but despite that they went to the expense and trouble of sending out these cards.

It is typical of State concerns to waste money on trivia in this manner and then go back to the taxpayer and seek reimbursement which in the case of the Department of Posts & T comes in the form of increased postal and telephone charges. Economies brought about by good management would be more appreciated by the taxpayers than wasting money in this fashion.

GAMBLING—AN EVIL TO SOME BUT IT HAS ITS COMPENSATIONS

Some years ago when the gramophones had not yet been superseded by radio, and TV was a rare wild moon-biting from the country was for some time enjoying a gramophone record entitled, "A Fence Bach Way". It was an amusing monologue by the late Jimmy O'Dea. Although we were one of the first counties in the world to run a state-sponsored lottery in which millions of pounds were paid out each year, gambling as a serious factor in our everyday life was slow to emerge. For years it has been the foundation of gross mismanagement, culpable impoverishment and even crime in one form or another.

In a country like ours, where the economy is based on fragile foundations where housing, education, and health services suffer to one extent or another through lack of necessary funds, it is surprising that we can indulge in gambling to such a surprising extent without any apparent remorse of national conscience. It is a community weakness, without any doubt, for which no government can be entirely blamed.

Gambling is decidedly an individual trait, so individualistic that thousands gamble to a greater or lesser degree in such an unobtrusive way as to make it, what one may term, a secret sin. It is a practice, like drinking which in moderation is certainly commendable, but in excessive form its aftermath can be as destructive and as degrading.

It is not only in extremes it can completely alter one's character and outlook. The urge to plunge outweighs all other relevant considerations.

The considerate father who when bitten by the betting-bug, sets his aim on the distant world of a dream-built fortune, the husband who risks his existence and his family's security on the flimsy pretext that the great big moment will near a fur coat for his wife or a cash-down car for the family is far more likely to be found sitting the children's play-back or spending the money allocated for the monthly electricity account in a crazy eleventh hour attempt to retrieve his extensive losses.

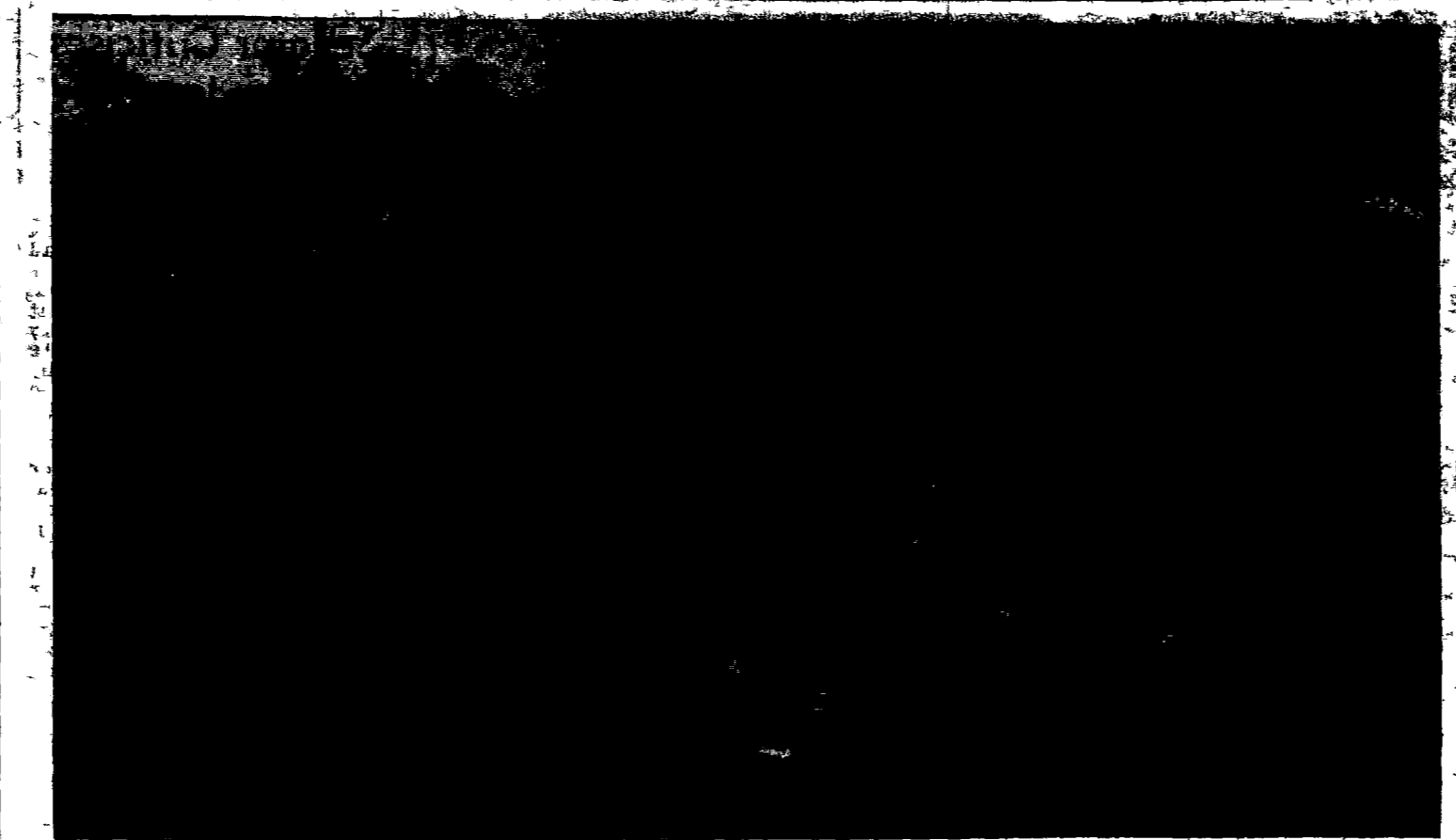
Gamblers who descend to this level explain their attitude to the inevitable risks involved by the fact that the company they are in is generous but very rare cash pay-offs. But social experts who have devoted many years to the investigation of the results maintain that the comparatively lucky generally prove to be the greatest victims of their own child-like optimism.

No other human habit is so keenly followed as gambling. While being forcefully condemned in many spheres for its evil effects both to individuals and to communities, it is widely popular, and is availed of for the provision of much needed funds for a host of meritorious ventures ranging from the research in the field of freedom from hunger and from church missions to rehabilitation of the disabled.

Mentioning contradictions—Bingo, which is so widely popular, and considered harmless—is banned in the state of Virginia. For the thousands of followers here at home let us hope that coming events will not cast their shadows before.

State run lotteries are in operation in over 80 countries, which as an incontrovertible admission of the overwhelming power of gambling in the provision of funds for the needy. The establishment of state run lotteries is an accepted form of counteracting the influence of illegal gambling and it is expected that gangster infiltration can be diminished if not eliminated, by the widespread acceptance of the doctrine "if you can't fight them, join them."
