## PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

**PURE BLOODY MURDER.** The terrible death toll in the North since New Year's Day has sickened and shocked everyone with any sense of responsibility. I have been looking around for some suitable words to describe the awful incidents of the past week and I find I can do no better than the description used by the Northern Secretary, Mr. Merlyn Rees when he called this latest spate of sectarian killings pure bloody murder for that, in a nutshell, is what it surely is.

The toll of deaths in the North since the first casualties of the current troubles began in 1969 is now more than 1,400, last year alone, 246 people died and in the first five days of 1976 the tally was 16.

On New Year's Day three Protestants died in a bomb blast in Gilford, Co. Down. This was followed by the reprisal killing of five Catholics, including two sets of brothers in Co. Armagh on last Sunday night and then on Monday evening we had the terrible toll of ten Protestants including one set of brothers being gunned to death by vengeance killers as they returned home from work in a mini-bus also in Co. Armagh. The hit-for-hit pattern shows a ratio of two to one with 3 first on one side followed by 5 on the other side and then 10 if this kind of escalation goes on, the prospect, not only for the North but for the South as well, looks really desperate.

To merely condemn these murders would seem to be a futile exercise as the extremists on both sides appear to be intent on the utter destruction of the entire Northern community. The awful thing about it is that innocent people on both sides are the victims and where the savage and brutal gunmen and bombers are concerned the passport to death is just a person's religion. What an awful depth to have sunk to in the names of freedom and democracy!

**AFTER SEVENTY YEARS**

Last week the fact that the drapery firm of W and G Hadden Ltd had completed a trading period of 70 years in Dungarvan was duly recorded in this paper. It was not, however, stated that this was to be the last year of the firm's active association with the business life of the town. This news only broke over the week-end when the announcement was made that Shaw and Sons were to buy out the three Hadden stores of Dungarvan, Carlow and Wexford.

This announcement which appeared in the daily papers on Saturday last stated that "Shaw & Sons Ltd, the department store group which has ten outlets in Munster and Leinster has announced that negotiations are at an advanced stage for the acquisition of W & G Hadden Ltd shops in Carlow town, Wexford town and Dungarvan.

"In the negotiations, W & G Hadden has been advised by Ulster Investment Bank Ltd.

"Three months ago the Shaw Group—which is controlled by the Shaw family—opened a supermarket in the Crescent Shopping Centre, Limerick, and within the past three years launched the shopping complex called Centrepoint, outside Portlaoise.

"Nine of the ten Shaw stores are in provincial areas—the exception being Shaw of Ballymun."

While the fact that the Hadden family will now end their business ties with Dungarvan, ties which have gone back honourably over the past seven decades will undoubtedly be the source of a great deal of regret amongst the people of the town and surrounding areas the advent of the Shaw Group to the town is to be welcomed as it is a vote of confidence in the

future prosperity of the Old Borough.

**THE SALT OF THE EARTH**

The Minister for Local Government Mr. Jimmy Tully, TD was very fulsome in the praise he gave to members and officials of our local authorities in the speech he made during the pre-Christmas Adjournment Debate in the Dail on December 17.

In the Official Dail Report for that date the Minister is reported as follows at page 1901:

"In my opinion the members of local authorities are the salt of the earth, the main unpaid men and women who spend their time looking after the interests of those who elected them and, indeed, of those too who would not elect them in 100 years. They leave political and other views completely out of their considerations. I do not think they get the credit they deserve. Were they not so dedicated they would not do their work so well. The officials are also dedicated people who carry out the regulations and the instructions given to them in a way which is a credit to all concerned. This is not the position in some other countries and it is something of which we should all be proud."

**THE TRAVELLING PEOPLE:** The Minister then went on to speak about "the travelling people" and the nuisance which roadside traders cause wherever they encamp. I think that the Minister's words in reference to both sections of this group are also worth quoting. He said (and I quote from the same page of the Dail Report):

"With regard to itinerants, or travelling people, as they are now called, I have made the point again and again that I consider that travelling people are not being treated the way they should be. There are two different types involved. There is the type better known as dealers, usually fairly wealthy people who make a damn nuisance of themselves wherever they go and who have no hesitation in putting their expensive cars and caravans on the side of the road irrespective of how busy that road is. They have no regard for traffic or anything else. They are people for whom I do not have a great deal of sympathy and eventually either the Department of Justice or the Department of Local Government will have to bring in regulations to deal with this menace. They are entitled to make a living and I have no objection to their doing so but they must do it without trampling on the rights of others. When they move on, they leave on their mobile amount of rubbish behind."

I find myself totally in agreement with Mr. Tully on this issue.

**TELEFIS EIREANN**

The fact that Telefis Eireann picked the Christmas period to announce a huge increase in licence fees would not appear to have been an accidental choice of timing. Hopefully the public, filled with good cheer, would not find this latest pill from RTE so sickening at such a festive time. They were right of course. The people in general did not pay too much attention to the announcement as they were busily engaged in the last preparations for Christmas when the announcement was made.

How the moguls of Montrose had the gall to make such an announcement at a time when the poor schedules fixed by RTE for the one-channel-viewers for the Yuletide period were even collapsing around them because of an economy drive and union trouble, beats me. It is absolute robbery to increase the licence fees to the extent the government has done especially in the provincial areas where we have no alternative to the poor fare put

### Multi-Channel T.V. for Dungarvan?

Tests carried out recently have proved satisfactory and it is now understood that Multi-Channel TV reception for the Dungarvan area can be both practical and feasible. It is proposed to erect proceedings for the establishment of multi-channel viewing in Dungarvan will be held in Faddy Paddy's, The Square, Dungarvan, on Friday night, next January 12th, at 8.45 p.m.

Multi-channel viewing is the answer for a little more it may be possible to enjoy four stations and eventually five. The choice is now up to the people of the area to lend support.

Too many of our clubs appear to rely on outdated methods of training and in many cases fitness seems to count much more than the need to develop the skills of hurling and football.

Discipline Continuing the Secretary says "I must very reluctantly refer to the cases of indiscipline and disorderly conduct that required investigation by the Disciplinary Committee during the year. These were occasions when players and supporters blatantly disregarded the rules of good sportsmanship and in so doing, seriously damaged the good name of the Association. The members of the Disciplinary Committee who sat for hours on many occasions investigated such matters and courageously dealing with the offenders deserve the thanks of the Board and the clubs in the Division in their efforts to rid us of such misconduct."

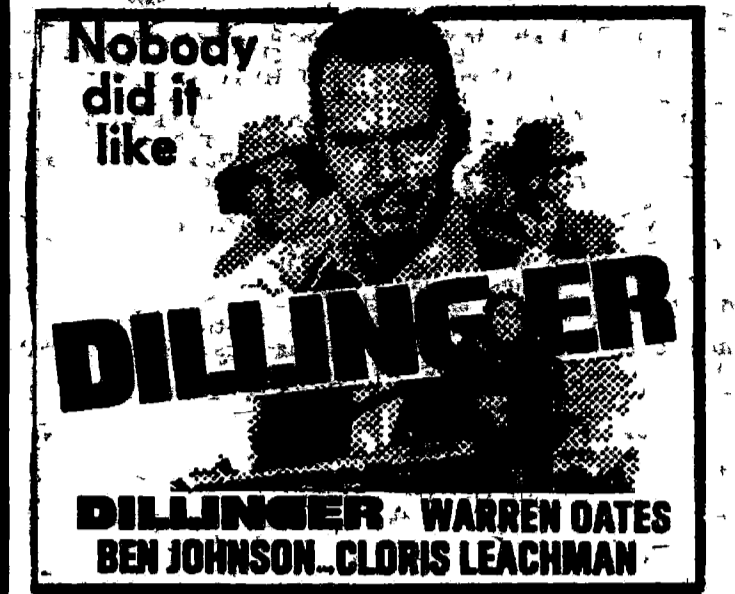
