more Cumann which asks that "this convention recommends that more time of party meetings be spent in criticising and finding fault with the opposition instead of finding fault with fellow party members," and one from the Glenbeg Cumann requesting that "this convention recommends that when vacancies arise through death or resignation of a Co. Councillor, Urban Councillor or Corporation member that the Chairman/Councillor involved be the deciding body on the question of co-option."

The continuing problems arising from the position of ground rents, especially in the Cappagh area, is reflected in a motion from the Cappagh Cumann which calls on the Fianna Fail parliamentary party to urge the government to introduce legislation dealing with ground rents as a matter of urgency.
A number of Cumann, including Touraneena, Kilm and others are sponsoring a motion which requests that the banished Deagel Deputy and former Minister, Neil Blaney, be invited back into the party. This should undoubtedly cause a great deal of interesting discussion and its outcome should show whether there is any real swing away from the conservative policy on Northern Ireland as enunciated by the Party Leader and the Party Spokesmen on Northern Affairs in recent years.
All in all the Convention should provide the members of the Party with the opportunity to have frank and full discussions on the many matters affecting policy and organisation within the party not only at county level but at national level as well.

PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

A SIGNIFICANT YEAR FOR FIANNA FAIL?

The very large attendance at the special Fianna Fail Constituency Convention in Dungarvan last Sunday night showed that the party is still very well organised and is to be reckoned with in the County. The spacious function room in Lawlor's Hotel was filled to capacity and while the first session was rather tame and boring the second was pretty lively and was climaxed by the guest speaker of the night, the Party Spokesman on Health, Deputy Charlie Haughey stood up to address the delegates.

The Convention is fairly fully reported elsewhere in this issue and readers will note that many aspects dealing with policy and organisation within the party both at national and local level were discussed.
When Mr Haughey rose to address the Convention he was given a standing ovation from the house and forty-five minutes later when he ended his remarks his seat was similarly acclaimed. Mr Haughey held the interest of the entire Convention throughout his address and proved very impressive in what he had to say and in the way he said it.

Much interest centred in what he would have to say on what was called "the Blaney motion" but he was content to refer to this matter to the rules of the Party which govern the application for membership. Having reviewed and commented on the other motions discussed by the Convention he concluded his address by stating that he believed that 1976 would be an important and significant year for Fianna Fail. Besides being the 50th anniversary of the founding of the Party in 1926 it was also the 60th anniversary of the Rising of 1916. In the current political situation he told the cheering delegates "it could be an important and eventful year for Fianna Fail."

A SPECIAL SERVICE OF REPARATION

Every responsible person must be concerned by the continuing terrible situation in Northern Ireland and the apparent failure of those concerned to reach a solution which would bring to an end the litany of murders, shootings and bombings which have claimed so many lives and left so many maimed and crippled in that unhappy part of our country since the beginning of the present decade. Despite a series of conferences, secret talks and meetings at all levels, the killings go on and there seems to be no end in sight to the sectarian bitterness, hatred and fear which continue to generate more and ever more appalling tragedies.

No human agency seems competent to formulate a solution which would bring peace to the North and in consequence of this failure the Standing Committee of the Irish Hierarchy at their recent meeting felt that the deteriorating situation in Northern Ireland called for a special day of prayer to implore God's help and forgiveness and also to give expression to the widely held horror among our people at the affronts to the sanctity of human life especially in recent weeks.

The occasion, it was suggested, ought to be marked by a strong element of reparation for the offence to God's majesty for these killings and should also be marked by a spirit of repentance.
As a result of this decision of the Irish Bishops, Sunday next, February 8, has been selected as the day on which people throughout the country should join together in appealing to Almighty God for help in bringing to an end the bitterness, hatred and misguided loyalties which have

resulted in the tragic and for us all, the very frightening situation in the North.
For people in the Dungarvan and Abbeyside districts there will be a Special Service of Reparation in St. Mary's Parish Church on Sunday evening commencing at 3 o'clock and everybody is urged to attend this Service and to send up a plea to God to show His Divine Providence by restoring peace, goodwill, reconciliation and harmony to the people of the strife torn counties of the North.
A PRIEST REMEMBERED
He wanted to show by his presence the great esteem which he and the authorities at University College, Cork had for the late Fr O'Leary stated Dr M D McCarthy, President, UCC, when he unveiled a plaque in Dungarvan Vocational School recently to the memory of the late Fr Jerome O'Leary, M.A., Cork-born lecturer in Sociology at the College and one of the leading organisers of the Adult Education courses which have been conducted at various centres throughout Munster over the past 25 years.
The late Fr O'Leary's association with Dungarvan went back to 1950 when he came there to establish one of the first of these courses in social and rural science in which he was the director and lecturer in sociology. This was reflected by the attendance at the unveiling ceremony last week of more than a few of his former students who showed by their presence how much they appreciated what Fr O'Leary and the authorities of UCC had done for them by bringing University education to the people and making it available at local level.
Fr O'Leary died last year and the memorial to him which now hangs in the foyer of the Vocational School in Dungarvan comprises of a map of Ardmore which was the subject of the thesis which Fr O'Leary did for his Master's Degree together with his picture and the inscription "to the memory of Fr Jerome who did so much in his lifetime to further Adult Education in County Waterford".
The attendance at the function included Most Rev Dr Michael Russell, Bishop of the diocese, Mr P Kennelly, Chairman, Co Vocational Education Committee, Mr Donald Kelleher, CEO, and members of the Adult Education Courses, UCC, and officials of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Urban Council. The guests and general public were welcomed to the function by Mr E Feehan, Headmaster at the School.

WILL START SHORTLY

Work on the reconstruction of the old railway bridge at the New Line, Abbeyside is due to commence towards the end of this month. Within the last couple of weeks I saw a member of the Engineering Staff of Waterford County Council busily engaged taking levels at the site so I was not surprised when a public notice from the County Council was published in last week's "Leader" notifying the public that the road over the bridge would be closed for the duration of the reconstruction.
As I have pointed out more than once in this column the need to remove the "hump" from this bridge is a vital necessity. It is a most dangerous place and the fact that there has not been a fatal accident there does nothing to disprove this as it was only by God's providence that many, especially where young children have been concerned, have been avoided.
The build up of the area at Lands End has greatly increased the danger of this bridge as the volume of traffic now passing over it taking people not only to Murphy Place and McCarthyville but

Objections for Mr. Haughey at Dungarvan F.F. Convention

Mr. Charles Haughey, T.D., Opposition Spokesman on Health Affairs, gave a standing ovation when he addressed a very largely attended special Constituency Convention in Dungarvan on Sunday night. Mr. Haughey was greeted by a standing ovation when he rose to speak and he was again given a standing ovation when he resumed his seat after speaking in a very impressive manner for approximately 45 minutes.

Major opposition to the motion was mounted by Cllr John A. Murphy, Dungarvan, who prefaced his remarks from the podium by saying that he would welcome the day when Mr. Blaney returned as a Fianna Fail member and T.D. but he urged the Convention to oppose the motion because of the manner in which it was tabled. "We," said Cllr Murphy, "have laid our cards on the table and have stated our current policy on Northern Ireland and that was the point on which the break took place. He knows what it is and I don't see why he should come back and ask him to come back into the party if Mr. Blaney thinks that Fianna Fail is the right party for him then he should come back without having to be invited."

Mr. Denis Keating, Sean T. O'Keilly Cumann also opposed the motion and said that the door was open if Mr. Blaney wanted to make a move. "Why should we go after him and ask him to come back," he said, "if he is not a member of the party? He should be invited to the Convention; it was declared carried by 76 votes by 60 on a show of hands."

MATTERS OF ORGANISATION

The only division at the Convention occurred during the second session when motions dealing with organisation were considered. This occurred when Touraneena Cumann proposed that the Convention request that Deputy Neil Blaney be invited back into the Fianna Fail Party. The motion was briefly proposed by Mr Danny Cotter, Chairman of the Cumann who said he felt that men like Neil Blaney were needed in the party. The motion was seconded by Mr Tom Connell, Touraneena.

Support for the motion came from Mr Bobby Keane, Dungarvan who said that Mr Blaney had been correct when he stated that he had not left Fianna Fail but that Fianna Fail had left him. He said that they needed a lot of Blaneys in their front bench and his absence considerably weakened the party. Mr Keane went on to say that he could not say a lot for the present Party Leader who had done and said very little since the party went into opposition.

Mr Liam Doyle, Ferrybank, also supported the motion and said that Mr Blaney should not have been expelled from the party in the first place as he was a dedicated republican and they needed men like him in the party. As far as he was concerned he said that Mr.

Blaney had committed no crime in what he had done. In fact, said Sean O'Keilly Cumann, pointed out that he caused a certain amount of quiet among the party supporters and had projected a bad image where the public in general was concerned. The only way they could hope to return to power was with a united party.

ANTI-FARMER BIAS

The Convention highlighted when reached with Mr Haughey's address which more or less was taken with comments on the motions. Referring to the present unemployment position he said that the present figure of 117,000 would increase in the months ahead and could reach 150,000 or 160,000 before very long. These were startling and very frightening figures he said and the position was due entirely to the inept government which the country had at present.

Referring to the budget increases on petrol and car tax he said that in this day to regard a motor car as a luxury to be taxed in this savage way was an appalling imposition and for this alone it for nothing else, the budget could be condemned as being anti-social. He added that he had always held the belief that the present government had a strong anti-farmer bias and this belief was totally vindicated by the manner in which the farmers had been attacked in the budget.

Mr Haughey then briefly referred to the Blaney resolution and said that according to the Party rules there were only two

ways of joining the party one was to apply for membership of a Cumann and the other was to be accepted by a Convention as a candidate for election. "I do not think it would be in keeping with the dignity of a great national movement like Fianna Fail to go to anyone and invite him to become a member," he said.

On the question of the Parliamentary Party's call for a phased British withdrawal from the Six Counties, Mr Haughey said that he regarded it as an imperimence for anyone inside or outside the country to think that Fianna Fail was not entitled to have its own policy in regard to Northern Ireland and calling on the British government to indicate a time for ultimate withdrawal was the only and lasting solution to the tragic situation which now existed. He said that they also supported any moves to initiate discussions in the next quarter which might lead to the establishment of better understanding among all those concerned.

OTHER SPEAKERS

The Convention was also addressed by Mr Sean Whelan, Mr P. Wall and by Mr N Andrews.

MORE SERIOUS COAST EROSION AROUND ARDMORE

The coastal area around Ballinacorney, Crusheha and Ardmore had got a considerable battering from the storms of recent weeks. With the result that, in some places as much as another 9 yards had been swept away by the sea. This was stated by Mr. P. Curran when he again referred to the recurring problem of coast erosion at the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday. He said that farmers in the area had been given to understand that there were some funds available from EEC sources to finance protection works and he asked that inquiries be made to find out if this was so.

Mr. P. Kenneally agreed that untold damage had occurred in the Ardmore area during the past fortnight while over last week-end Council property in the area had also suffered severe damage from the storms. The Ballinacorney area was particularly vulnerable, he said, but despite this he did not think it was an area which would qualify for any EEC funds.

Mr. P. Curran pointed out that when the EEC came to a survey in Ardmore in conjunction with the proposed nuclear power station they had discovered that the tides in Ardmore come in from the south-east and then went out at right angles and consequently did considerable more damage.

Mr. J. Fahey, P.P., said that the present of coast erosion was one for the State rather than the Co. Council as the costs involved were beyond the resources of the Council. Funds will have to be contributed by the State to tackle this very urgent problem, he said.

Mr. N. Walsh said that the only hope was for the County Council to continue with their holding operation in the worst hit areas such as Ardmore as funds could well take years.

THE CONGER KING'S ANGLING NOTES

MPC & I.F.S.A.—Some weeks back His Majesty drew attention to the insistence of anglers. Now there are many difficulties about coverage it seems, as the emphasis is on competitions granted as open shore and open boat ones and the I.F.S.A. offer same as £6 for deep sea and £2 for shore, but what provision is made for club events? It is necessary to send in the total premiums for deep sea and shore competitions in advance. What provision is made for cancellations owing to blow outs? Is the premium paid just forfeited or will the insurers cover the alternative date and what is the procedure to cover in time and how will a club know if they are covered.

The Licensing of Sea Anglers—All clubs should not default by neglecting to undo the harm that the Commission suggested that a license be charged. Did our representatives, members of the I.F.S.A. protest against this suggestion? Did they submit a minority report or was it an unanimous report? If the latter well it is just too bad indeed that we anglers had no fighting representatives who would have put our views and doubt of the reaction of such a licensing scheme. Remember it is a sport that encourages anglers to the many fishing spots in our country and are we going to penalise our sporting anglers by collecting revenue from their pleasurable pursuits?

It is monstrous and now the MPC are asking clubs and anglers to inform Mr. Clinton the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries in London, Dublin, that they protest against the suggestion and there should be no need to make such a protest if we had the necessary knowledge of the wishes of all anglers that rods should not be licensed. We pay enough, for example a year at sea can cost from £20 to £50 per angler, plus membership fee and of course additional expenses in travelling to the venues. The clubs must let the anglers know their views without delay their views and these should be hands off angling. Ask also why there was a majority report.

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NOTICE BY THE REVENUE COMMISSIONERS

Value-Added Tax
changes effective from 1 March 1976

On and from 1 March, 1976, the following changes will be introduced:

- goods and services of present chargeable to VAT at 6.75% will become chargeable at 10%, and goods and services at present chargeable at 19.5% will become chargeable at 20%;
- passenger motor vehicles (including motor cycles) at present chargeable to VAT at 6.75% on sale by persons who are not assemblers of those goods will become chargeable at 10% the 36.75% rate applicable at present to sales by assemblers, and to imports by non-assembler, will become 35%;
- radios, television sets, record players, and records at present chargeable to VAT at 6.75% on sales by persons who are not manufacturers of those goods will become chargeable at 10% the 36.75% rate applicable at present to sales by manufacturers, and to imports by non-manufacturers, will become 40%;
- articles of clothing made wholly or partly of natural fur skin, at present free of VAT, will become chargeable at the rate of 20% Clothing of woolled sheep or lamb skin, clothing trimmed with natural fur skin to an extent not exceeding one-fifth of the area of the outside material, and all footwear will remain free of VAT;
- short-term hirings of passenger motor vehicles at present exempt from VAT will become chargeable at 10% bringing these hirings into line with other hirings;
- building and certain associated services at present chargeable to VAT at an effective rate of 3.0375% (6.75% on 45% of the price) will become chargeable at an effective rate of 3% (10% on 30% of the price);
- dances at present chargeable to VAT at 11.11% will become chargeable at 10% bringing the rate into line with the rate on other forms of entertainment;
- the arrangement under which a registered person is entitled to a tax credit equal to one per cent of the price paid in respect of the purchase from unregistered producers of agricultural produce or fish will be discontinued; and
- sales of cattle, sheep and pigs by registered persons, at present liable at an effective rate of 1% (6.75% of 14.81% of value), will be maintained at that rate by charging them at the new 10% rate on 10% of the value.

There will be no change in the VAT treatment of clothing generally (other than certain fur skin clothing) or of food, electricity, gas and certain other fuels. These will continue to be free of tax. A leaflet setting out full details of the changes will be distributed shortly to all persons who are registered for VAT.
