THE SMELTER LOBBY

Since the announcement was made that a State Zinc Smelter was to be established in the country local lobbies have been set up in many areas to secure the smelter. Not to be outdone, Waterford and no coast is being lost to focus the spotlight on the suitability of the environs of Waterford harbour as the ideal site.

Waterford County Council this week threw in its weight behind the local lobby when a motion in the name of Cllr. Pat Coffey, Portlaoigh, called on the Minister for Industry and Commerce to receive a deputation comprised of representatives of the County Council and Corporation to allow them to "state their case for the siting of the smelter in this area".

Pressure in this regard is being built up too by the Waterford Council of Trade Unions which has issued circulars to all unions in the area and to members of the Oireachtas and local public bodies requesting individual signatures to build up a strong vox populi.

It would be relevant to mention here now a letter which the Mayor of Waterford, Deputy Eddie Collins, received from the Minister on the subject only last week. Signed simply "Justin," it set out what the facts of the matter are and the most important of these is contained in the last paragraph which states "It has not been decided where the plant will be located. Location will be decided on the basis of economic and environmental suitability. You will appreciate that since the project must be commercially competitive the views of the promoters in this regard will be important."

The Minister's letter was in reply to representations made by Mr. Collins to have the zinc smelter sited in Waterford and it also pointed out that the government, following preliminary studies by the I.D.A., intended to promote the establishment of the smelter to process the zinc concentrates from the Navan mines. It stated that the I.D.A. were handling the relevant negotiations and had already invited proposals from established companies to participate on a partnership basis.

Despite these cut and dry conditions and the oft stated view that local lobbies have little or no influence on the eventual outcome of negotiations such as are mentioned in the Minister's letter, I believe that every pressure should be mounted by whatever source possible to secure this industry which could bring further prosperity to the area. After all they have become very vocal in Cork, Limerick, Shannon and other areas and it would be a poor effort indeed were we not to raise our voices as well where this matter is concerned.

RESPONSORED ROW-IN

The Irish Amateur Rowing Union have organised what is to be described as a National Row-in to take place during the week-end of Saturday/Sunday, March 20/21. The row-in which will be a pre-sponsored affair will take place in every centre throughout the country where a rowing club exists.

The proceeds from the event will be divided equally between the participating clubs and the Union's fund for international activity which must hit a target of £2,000 and will include financial support for this country's Olympic rowing squad in Montreal.

Each competitor in the row-in whether a sculler or member of a pair, four or eight, will be issued with the usual type sponsor card and as rowing now has generated such tremendous interest following the performance of Irish crews at

international events and in particular at the World Championships at Nottingham last August public support should be very good.

The two big centres of rowing in West Waterford are Dungarvan and Cappoquin with Fermoy further along the river Blackwater while Clonmel and Waterford City with other strong centres where the sport flourishes.

Plans for the row-in are now well-advanced in Dungarvan and during the week-end of March 20/21 all active members of the club—male and female—will spend a lot of time on the water clocking us as much mileage as possible. People will be asked to sponsor rowers for whatever amount per mile they may decide and the actual mileage covered in each case will be certified by the Club President, Mr. Maurice Mullins and by the Club Captain, Mr. John Walsh.

A CHAIN OF OFFICE

Deputy Jackie Fahey made a proposal at this week's meeting of Waterford County Council that a chain of office should be provided for the Chairman of the Council. It was only right and proper he said that the Chairman should have such an insignia to wear at official functions just as the Chairman of other local authorities and bodies had. The Council unanimously approved of the proposal.

I certainly agree that the Chairman of the parent body in the local administration of the county should have such a chain of office. There is one snag though. The Council have no money with which to purchase it themselves and are looking for a suitable sponsor. I understand that such a chain of office was handed over to the South Tipp County Council last week by one of the Banking concerns.

Can we have any offers for a similar gesture here in Waterford?

ENTRANCE TO DUNGARVAN HOSPITAL

Down through the years we have referred on a number of occasions to the need for an improvement to the entrance at St. Joseph's Hospital (formerly known as the County Home) in Dungarvan. It may well be that something will be done soon about it provided that the money required is available.

Last month a sub-committee of the South Eastern Health Board met members of the local health committee at the hospital and discussed the position. I understand that because of the financial restrictions being experienced by the Board a proposal to lower or remove entirely the front wall along its full length was not considered and the members concentrated on the need to improve the visibility for traffic leaving the hospital and proceeding towards the town.

Having discussed two possible alternatives the committee recommended that the wall at the town side of the entrance be removed and replaced with a wider, flat, curved lower wall and railing at an estimated cost of £1,200 provided this could be met from maintenance funds.

Let us hope that this can be done as this is a job which should have been done years ago.

A WHITE ELEPHANT?

Trowermen around the south-east coast are questioning the plans of the Department of Defence to spend an approximate £2 million on building a sister vessel for the corvette Derride. Fully conscious of the extent of the poaching of Irish territorial waters which is carried on by foreign trawlers off the Waterford and Westford coastlines they feel that the plan will do very little to bring about any improvement in the situation.

County Council financial position getting worse

The worsening position of the finances of Waterford County Council was again referred to at the monthly meeting of the Council in Dungarvan last Monday when Secretary, Mr. B. J. Walsh, informed the members that for the quarter ending 30th June next an overdraft of £200,000 would be required.

Speaking in a question time Mr. Walsh, the Secretary said that they were £200,000 worse off now than they were at the same time last year and the position would get gradually worse towards the end of the year.

The County Manager, Mr. C. A. O'Connor, pointed out that the fact that they had got no State allocation towards the cost of the Dunmore East Sewerage Scheme meant that the Council had to bear the cost of the scheme on overdraft. They would have to make as strong a case as possible to the Department to get the allocation and if they were successful it would be a step in the right direction.

The Manager added that as far as the Council's capital Account was concerned they were stretched as far as they could go where the overdraft would be the services that would suffer and this would not be fair as these were being provided for other people who were actually paying the rates. He said that everybody knew that things were becoming more difficult but the only economy which he could see was to try for a special State allocation for the Dunmore scheme.

"There's something like £200,000 involved in this," he said, "if we got an allocation it would be a big help."

Senator Deasy said that the position was that they did not have the same kind of money to spend as last year and consequently they could not provide the same kind of services.

Mr. Walsh said that he had asked at each of the last three Council meetings what all this would mean on next year's rates but he had so far not got an answer. He said that if he wasn't given an answer, he would leave the meeting in protest.

The County Manager said that it would be very difficult to answer the question now as there were so many imponderables involved. If the Council were to continue with its policy of maintaining full employment there would be substantial increases in next year's rate.

Mr. P. Crotty then referred to the very large numbers who were drawing unemployment benefits at present and he proposed that they ask the Minister for Finance that those drawing it should make some return by going to work on public schemes. It was not good he said to be paying people money just while they were idle.

Mr. Walsh asked how all this would affect next year's rates and the Manager said that there would be an increase as a result but that at this stage it was extremely difficult to say what extent.

Mr. J. Fahey, T.D., said he thought the Council would have to stop and take a long hard look at their financial position. They had been going ahead on assumption that money would be made available by the government for this scheme and the other but this had not been happening and they now found themselves in a desperate position as a result.

The ratepayers of the county had to meet an increase of £2 in their rates last year but God only knows what the increase for next year will be, he said.

Mr. Fahey added that he thought they could go no further and would have to stop now otherwise the ratepayers would not be able to meet the huge demands that would be made on them next year. "The whole situation is just terrible," he added.

The County Manager agreed that it would be better to take a look at the position now rather than wait until later in the year. There were certain decisions which could be taken now and which could affect the position later on.

Mr. D. Goode said that the county was on the brink of bankruptcy due to the incompetence of the Coalition government.

ATTRACTION SCHEME Commenting on the new scheme Mr. Michael Culligan, General Manager A.C.C. said the new facilities will encourage further investment and continue to provide finance for planned development.
