WHO MAKES ALL THE PROFIT

A survey recently completed by a team from the Glouchomas branch of Moira na Feirme, aimed at improving relations between urban and rural dwellers, came up with some very interesting and revealing information. The survey concerned the price of foodstuffs with the emphasis on the cost of production and the price which the consumer eventually paid and in view of recent allegations about overcharging and exorbitant profiteering the figures of the survey team show that all the money does not go back into the farmers' pockets.

For the purpose of the survey, seven items were chosen and an accurate costing of the production of each was made. Shops and other outlets of the retail trade were then visited and the prices charged recorded. The comparison showed that milk had a production price of 23p per pint and that the price which the consumer received from the creamery was 4p per pint. Consumers pay 7p per pint.

The next item costed was potatoes the price for which is certainly sky-rocketing this weather. The cost of growing one ton of potatoes (everything included from ploughing to harvesting) was given as £306. When broken down this worked out at 40p per stone in round figures. The price which the farmer received was given as 50p, representing a profit margin of 10p per stone but when they got in to the shops the price had zoomed to from £1.11 to £1.36 per stone! There must surely be something wrong here that would need to be looked into.

The cost of producing an Irish apple which would at present cost you 6p or 7p in a shop was given as less than half the cost of growing a head of cabbage was stated to be only 23p with the farmer getting 5p but the price being marked up to 12p or 13p by the time it reached the shopkeeper's stall. The other item costed in the survey was onions and the production price per lb for these was 3p but the farmer was getting 5p but again the mark-up price for the consumer jumping to 12p and 15p per lb.

In general the main jump in the price occurs from the time the produce leaves the farmers gates and arrives in the shops. It is no wonder that the survey showed that as many as 50% of the people interviewed over-estimated the price which farmers got for the items concerned. The main blame for the high price of the food was placed on the shoulders of the government and the EEC with 38% and 33% respectively of those interviewed holding this as an opinion. Particularly enough 10% blamed farmers for the high food prices while only 4% thought the middle-man was responsible.

Certainly the huge gap between the production costs and the consumer prices charged would indicate that some examination of the marketing and handling transactions are called for.

MORE POSTAL DELAYS

Because of a recurrence of postal delays in the West Waterford area last week we had to go to press without a number of items including Notes, Letters posted in the Lismore and Tallow areas on Tuesday, April 6 did not reach us until Thursday April 8—in other words for distances of 15 or 20 miles it took two days to deliver these letters. On the same Thursday delivery we had letters which had been posted in London on April 6 also delivered so in fact it took as long for letters to come from Tallow and Lismore as from London!

COMMUNITY GAMES SEEK GRANT FROM COUNCIL

The Secretary, Waterford Community Games had a letter before the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday seeking a grant towards the cost of running the games in the county this summer.

Mr. T. Healy, Mr. S. Whelan and other members said that these games should be supported in every way and the Council unanimously agreed that they should be given some financial assistance. The Co. Manager Mr. C. O'Connor pointed out that the Council's Amenity Grant amounted to £10,000. He would have a number of proposals for the grant prepared for the Council within a month or so and he would include the application from the Community Games in the list. The Council could then decide how the money should be allocated. This was approved.

SENATOR DOUBLY BEREAVED

The monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday was adjourned for 15 minutes due to the double bereavement suffered last week by Senator Austin Deasy on the occasion of the death of his father-in-law and of his uncle. The formal resolution of sympathy was moved by the Chairman, Mr. C. Curran and seconded by Mr. D. Gordan.

SHIP WRECK IN TRAMORE AN EYESORE

At the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday, Mr. C. Casey Tramore, again referred to the disposal of the wreck of the M.V. Michael which has been lying in Tramore harbour since the ship foundered in a storm there in January 1975. Mr. Casey said that he understood that the wreck was at present being broken up and he wanted to know where the Council stood in the matter.

Mr. C. O'Connor Co. Manager said that permission had been given to the owners to sell parts of the vessel. Mr. Casey was worried about the position because the Council could be involved in financial expenditure if the wreck was not completely cleared. Mr. C. Curran Chairman said that it was a terrible eyesore in Tramore now.

Mr. T. Healy said that the vessel was now partly broken up and had, as a result, become very dangerous. If the Council was to be involved financially in having it eventually cleared then it would be just as well for them to face up to the situation now and get it done.

TRIBUTES TO FIRE BRIGADE UNITS

Tributes to the efficiency and dedication to duty of the members of the Fire Brigade Units from Cappoquin, Lismore and Dungarvan were paid at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday.

Mr. Norman Walsh said that what could have been a very serious fire at the Cappoquin Bacon Factory on the previous Saturday night had fortunately been caught in time due to the wonderful work of the Cappoquin Fire Brigade which was later supported by the Brigades from Dungarvan and Lismore. He said that if anything happened to the bacon factory it would mean that the very life line of Cappoquin would be gone so by their great work the fire brigades had averted what could have been a very serious situation. In the circumstances he said that he would like to go on record in expressing his appreciation of what they had done and in doing this he said he felt sure that he was also voicing the sentiments of the management and workers at the factory.

NO PROGRESS ABOUT LISMORE DERELICT AREA

When Mr. G. Armstrong at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday asked for a progress report on the Compulsory Purchase Order in respect of the derelict area at Church Lane, Lismore he was informed by the Co. Manager, Mr. C. O'Connor that they had been instructed by the Department to restrict these orders to areas in need of housing this year. As that did not apply in the Lismore case it would have to be put in abeyance.

Mr. Armstrong said that the Church Lane area was a terrible eyesore in the town. It was being used as a dump and was a danger to children who were in the habit of playing there. The problem was one which should have been dealt with years ago he said. It had now become so bad that he wanted to see St. Carthage's Cathedral and had to pass the place asked whether there was any local authority in charge.

The Co. Manager said that the matter had been delayed up to the present because a question of private ownership arose in regard to some of the property involved. Senator Deasy said that the place was an absolute disgrace and it was terrible that it should be left in such a condition for so long.
