PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

NEW SCHOOL AT LAST
The John's Association for Mentally Handicapped Children which embraces the entire Waterford region has now been in existence for seven years and 1976 will be a noted year in the history of the Association and the region where, for the first time, the children from the region who require special education will be taught and trained. Thanks to the co-operation and help of the Presentation Community in Dungarvan a school has been operating there for a number of years past in accommodation provided for the purpose by the good nuns but from the point of view both of the Community and the Association the position was unsatisfactory for this reason the Association has been pressing for several years to have a separate new school built for their own teaching staff and pupils.

TOWARDS A TIDY TOWN

The Dungarvan Junior Chamber of Commerce has launched its campaign to make the town cleaner and more pleasant place to live in and have appealed for the co-operation of everyone - both residents and visitors - in combating the litter problem which has been one of our biggest block marks in recent years. Additional litter bins are being placed at vantage points around the town this week by the Urban Council as their contribution to the Junior Chamber campaign and people, young and old, who find themselves with litter such as cigarette and match boxes, wrappings of any kind or any types of containers should think and not discard these on the streets but wait until they come to one of these litter bins where such items may be disposed of. Another problem which does not arise very often has occurred in the town over the last two week-ends. This refers to shattered glass. One irate resident has drawn my attention to the fact that on the week-end of May 9 the windscreen of a car was shattered in O'Connell Street near the junction with Keating Street and the roadway was covered with glass for two days until a local swept it up and had it removed. A similar situation of which I am personally aware occurred in Bridge Street last week-end when another big deposit of shattered glass littered the roadway. How long this was left there or who removed it in the end, I do not know. This glass presents a major traffic hazard as passing cars must pick up a certain amount of it which becomes embedded in tyres and could ultimately cause a burst resulting in a fatal accident. From this point of view it is extremely dangerous and consequently should be removed as quickly as possible. But whose responsibility is it to clear it away? I understand that even where the Urban roads and streets are concerned the responsible authority is the County Council but they are responsible only to repairs and maintenance work. The collection of refuse and the street sweeping is done by the Urban Council. However as I have said this problem of shattered glass is one which occurs only on rare occasions but it would be well for whatever local authority is responsible to have some plan for its immediate removal when the hazard does arise. Having made this comment let us return to the overall problem of cleaning up the town. Bord Failte will commence its adjudication for this year's Tidy Towns Competition at the beginning of June and the results will be announced at the end of August. There will be a National Anti-Litter Week commencing June 5 to 13 and this should help to strengthen awareness of local level in all towns of the problem of litter and to involve people, especially the youth, in creating a cleaner and tidier country. As the Junior Chamber and the Urban Council in Dungarvan so rightly point out, the success of the clean-up campaign will rest to a great extent on the co-operation which the public in general are prepared to give it.

SURVEY OF MUTE SWANS

The Irish Biological Records Centre in conjunction with the Irish Wildlife Conservancy is carrying out a survey of Mute Swans in Ireland. The aim of the survey is to count the number of breeding Mute Swans over a seven-year period from May 22 to June 9 and in addition to collect information on the nesting site, number of young, distance between nests, etc. Some Mute Swans do not nest for one reason or another it is intended to count these birds at the same time. It is hoped to get as complete a cover of the country as possible. Readers who would like to help can receive further particulars and survey forms by contacting Eoin J. So widespread has become the damage caused to sheep in several areas in West Waterford by marauding dogs that the matter is to be raised at next Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council. Time and again we have asked dog-owners, especially in sheep-rearing areas, to keep their dogs tied up at night and not let them wander through the countryside killing and mauling flocks of sheep and lambs. The request has fallen on deaf ears as the slaughter goes on. A sheep farmer in the Old Parish area suffered losses which he estimated at £1,000 last week when dogs attacked and tore a big number of sheep to pieces. There seems to be only one thing to do now and that is to make the punishment fit the crime. Those who won't keep dogs under control and are responsible for this type of wanton damage should be heavily fined or sent to jail.

CALL FOR STREET CLEANING

When Mr P. Whelan, Chairman, moved a motion at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night requesting that the Town Engineer be instructed to draw up a schedule for the cleaning of streets in the urban area, the town and Abbeyside which were not being swept at all and this was very unfair to the residents of those areas. There was some discussion in operation but apart from the centre of the town which was swept regularly they did not know where it was. APPEALS AGAINST DISTRICT COURT SENTENCES DISMISSED

When a Dungarvan man failed to appear at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday last, to pursue appeals he had lodged against the severity of sentences imposed on him by the District Court, Judge Fawcitt, dismissed the appeals and affirmed the decision of the District Justice in each case. The appeals had been lodged by William Fraher, Catholic, Brigha Place, Dungarvan, and involved sentences of 12 months and one month on foot of conviction for a number of larceny charges and malicious damage. He had been on bail since the last sessions when the appeals had been adjourned. When the cases were called on Tuesday and the defendant failed to appear, Mr. E. P. King, S.O., said that at the last hearing he had been assigned to the case. On Monday, the day prior to the present hearing, he said that Fraher had come to his office with a document from a doctor. It was not a certificate but stated that Fraher was being referred to a Consultant at Ardskeen Hospital for a surgical operation. He said that he had informed Fraher that it would be necessary for him to appear at Court if the appeals were to go on. Dr. D. P. Counahan, State Solicitor, said that the convictions were admitted in each case as the appeals were only against the severity of sentences. Judge Fawcitt said that as the defendant was not present to prosecute the appeals he would dismiss them and affirm the decision of the District Justice in each case.

COULD BE MADE FINEST INLAND LAKE IN COUNTRY

Dungarvan Urban Council are to ask Bord Failte to examine a proposal which it was agreed would provide a great tourist attraction and an amenity for the townspeople if it was carried out. This was decided at the monthly meeting of the Council last Monday night following a brief discussion on a motion in the name of the Chairman Mr. P. Whelan. He asked that the County Engineer be requested to incorporate a scheme for the provision of a lake at the northern side of the Causeway Bridge during the reconstruction of the Bridge. Mr. Whelan said that this was a matter which had been discussed time and again in the past and it came to his mind during the recent regatta. The tide was in there on the occasion and it was a pity to allow it out. He said he would like to see a fine inland lake in the country and would prove a great tourist attraction for the town. He suggested that the Council should seek an Amenity Grant to have the scheme carried out in conjunction with the proposed widening of the Causeway Bridge. Mr. D. Goode said that it could be made into a fine fishing lake also if it were re-stocked and this would make it an added attraction. Mr. C. O'Connor, Co. Manager said that the County Engineer had got only sufficient money to do the job which was planned for the bridge and there would be nothing available for such a scheme. Senator Deasy suggested inviting a representative of Bord Failte to a meeting to discuss the proposal and see whether any grant for such a job would be available. Mr. T. Kyne, T.D. said that any move to erect a ramp would not be looked on in the same light by the river fishermen as it would stop salmon travelling up and this could not be done. Finally it was agreed to contact Bord Failte on the matter.

Three players were put off, several were cautioned. In this particular case both patrons and participants of the clubs concerned were inclined to place the blame on the shoulders of the referee. It was said that he was lenient and had to take stronger action with a greater number of players than would have been well. What utter nonsense.

Having seen much of the game I agree that more players should have been sent to the line (I am even tempted to name them). But to suggest that a referee can be held responsible for the misconduct of ill-tempered players while doing his best to handle the game is certainly beyond my understanding. I wonder which one of the thirty players on the field in this game would have switched places with referee Finbar Harrington on Sunday night? Yes—which one? None can be held responsible for what they continued to make his task almost impossible. A state of affairs surely not to be repeated in this sport.

Of course there were good footballers and good sportsmen on both sides and this is one of the many good reasons why the clubs on both sides should take action against the offenders. Both clubs are big enough for this—so let us hope that they act now before there can be a repetition of this sort of business.

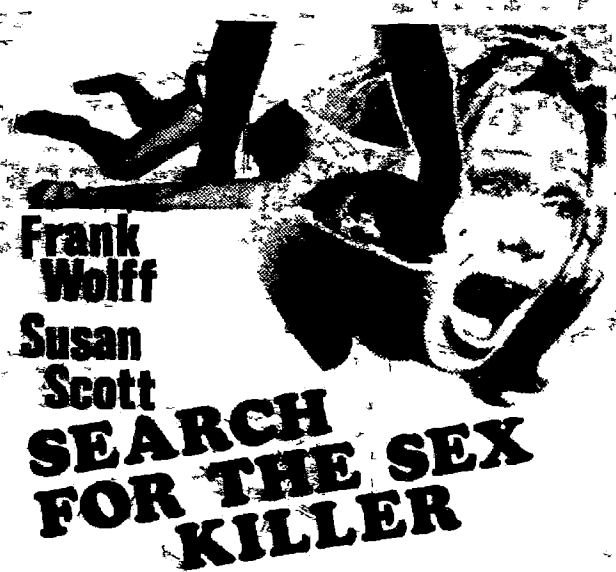
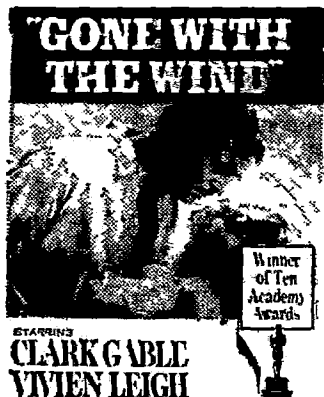

PHYSIOTHERAPY CLINIC Readers will recall that some weeks ago I criticized the action of the Regional Health Board in closing down the physiotherapy clinic which operated twice a week at Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan. I am glad to be able to report that following my article, public representatives and full discussion on it took place at last week's meeting of the Health Board in Kilkenny.

Mr C. Curran one of two representatives of the Board Co. Council on the Board, declared that the reason for the closure was to finance and then he went to develop the case originally made in this column.

Mr G. McQuillan, Board's Chief Executive, C. Curran disagreed that the factor had anything to do with the situation. He stated that there was a shortage of physiotherapists and pointed out that the Board actually subsidizes people from the South taking part in the training course for physiotherapists in Dublin. They were at present awaiting students to qualify.

He then went on to explain that one of the physiotherapists at Arden Hospital resigned last October and the staff was reduced to four as a result of this. The CEO informed the members of the staff in an effort to bring staff up to its strength, two temporary had been offered to people who had completed competition for such posts. Arden in the past was awaiting a reply from them. He said that the Board had also advertised the most national.

The matter of the closure of the clinic in Dungarvan has also been the subject of correspondence between Mr Deasy and Mr McQuillan. In a letter dated May 10, the Senator, the CEO explained the position as he already outlined it, and ended the letter with the following: "I am very sorry that a number of people in the Dungarvan area who have been availing of a service have had it suspended. I trust that the hope expressed by Mr. McQuillan, a sincere one and not a pious wish to get out of an awkward situation. It is important for the people of Dungarvan and for the people of West Waterford in getting that clinic is reopened as soon as it is ever possible to do so."
