PHYSIOTHERAPY CLINIC

Readers will recall that some weeks ago I criticised the action of the Regional Health Board in closing down the physiotherapy clinic which operated twice a week at St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan. I am glad to be able to record that following my article the matter was taken up by local public representatives and a full discussion on it took place at last week's monthly meeting of the Health Board in Kilkenny.

Mr. C. Curran one of the two representatives of Waterford Co. Council on the Board, pointed out the reason for the closure was lack of finance and then he went on to develop the case originally made in this column that patients in West Waterford requiring physiotherapy treatment would now have to travel 20 miles to Waterford because it was no longer available in Dungarvan.

Mr. P. G. McQuillan, the Board's Chief Executive Officer, disagreed that the cost factor had anything to do with the situation. He said that there was a national shortage of physiotherapists and pointed out that the Board actually subsidised people from the South East taking part in the training course for physiotherapists in Dublin. They were at present awaiting students to qualify.

He then went on to explain that one of the physiotherapists at Ardeken Hospital had resigned last October and the Board held open the post for a student who was qualifying in April. However this student decided not to take the training. A condition of the training subsidy was that a student should do two years with the board after qualifying or else repay the grant. The girl in the case he referred to opted to repay and went to work elsewhere. At present five students were being subsidised but they would not qualify until next January.

Mr. McQuillan then said that in April another of the Ardeken physiotherapists resigned and this meant that the staff was reduced to two. It was as a result of this that the clinic in Dungarvan had to be closed. The CEO informed the members of the Board that in an effort to bring the staff up to its original strength, two temporary posts had been offered to two people who had competed in a competition for such posts at Ardeken in the past and he was awaiting a reply from them. He said that the Board had also advertised the permanent post nationally.

The matter of the closure has also been the subject of correspondence between Senator Deasy and Mr. McQuillan in a letter dated May 14 to the Senator. The CEO explained the position as he had already outlined it to the members of the Health Board and ended the letter as follows: "I am very sorry that a number of people in the Dungarvan area who have been availing of a service have had it suspended. I hope it will be resumed for them at the very earliest moment."

I trust that the hope expressed by Mr. McQuillan is a sincere one and not just an awkward wish to get out of a painful situation. It is important for the people of Dungarvan and for the region of West Waterford in general that this clinic is reopened as soon as it is ever possible to do so.

WHY SO LARGE?

The recent issue by the Post Office of four special stamps to mark the Bicentennial of American Independence is, perhaps, an opportune occasion to pose the question why should stamps be so large?

I know that the Post Office people go to great lengths in having the various stamps designed and some are quite colourful and artistic. I know also that quite a great deal of money is realised in the sale of stamps to philatelists. But as far as the ordinary man in the street is concerned a stamp is merely a symbol to show that the proper charge to ensure the delivery of a letter or package has been paid. To stick them they have to be licked and licking ten or twelve of those of the present day size can be quite an unenviable occupation. It wouldn't be half so bad if the stamps were reduced by half as they wouldn't require so much licking!

APPLES FROM SOUTH AFRICA

A priest home on holidays during the week drew my attention to the fact that when he went to a local supermarket to buy some Dungarvan apples all he found on offer were Cape apples which come from South Africa.

He was highly critical of the fact that any produce of South Africa should be even imported into this country not to mind placed on sale in the shops. I am aware that very large consignments of these apples are being stored locally for sale, presumably, in other parts of the country.

With such a rigid policy of apartheid being practised in South Africa which deprives the native black population of practically all the basic civil rights which people in democratic countries normally enjoy (and take so much for granted) it is no great wonder that the Reverend Father found it necessary to comment about the apples and the fact that in importing them we are supporting the economy of a country which casts the black majority of its population in the role of common slaves.

ARE YE RIGHT THERE MICHAEL?

The echoes of the production of the "Golden Years" by the Dungarvan Musical and Choral Society, part of the life-story of the French are still lingering in the air and have brought requests for several of the songs that were featured in it. We have already published "Paddy Billy" and in deference to repeated requests we have chosen another of the great songs from the show, "Are Ye Right There Michael?" for our ballad corner this week. It deals, of course, with the West Clare Railway.

Courthouse in Waterford could cost Co. Council £250,000

The Mandamus Order obtained by the Waterford Law Society against the Minister for Justice regarding the provision of suitable courthouse accommodation in Waterford City could cost the County Council a £2m, which it hasn't got. And when the matter was discussed at this week's Council meeting in Dungarvan the Law Society came under attack from several members who said this expenditure would place an intolerable burden on already over-burdened ratepayers.

The County Manager, Mr. C. O'Connor explained to the meeting that the Waterford Law Society had brought proceedings against the Minister for Justice to get him to exercise his power to direct Waterford Corporation and County Council to provide suitable courthouse accommodation in the city. A Mandamus Order had been obtained against the Minister and as a result the Minister was now obliged to provide accommodation and having done so would recoup the cost from the Corporation and the County Council.

Also before the meeting was a letter from the City Manager, Mr. M. Doody, in which he referred to the Mandamus Order against the Minister for Justice. It seemed reasonable to assume, Mr. Doody said that a decision to proceed with the reconstruction of the existing courthouse at Catherine Street will be taken at an early date by the office of public works. "Can we take the County Council's opinion in that it should be left to the Office of Public Works to execute the undertakings?" Mr. Doody's letter expressed the view that by allowing the Board of Works to reconstruct the existing courthouse they could be giving them a blank cheque. Seeing that the Council was going to have to pay half the cost they should have control or at least a major say in the type of building that was to be built.

Mr. P. Coffey said the new accommodation would cost about £2m. and that would involve the Council in an expenditure of £2m which it hadn't got.

The Manager said they would seek discussions with the Board of Works regarding the design and standards of the proposed work.

VERY SELFISH

Mr. P. King said he felt the Law Society was "very selfish" in pressing the case for the new courthouse knowing the general economic position. "We are having to cut back on essential services but must not foot a bill of £2m or more for a new building."

Mr. Thomas J. (Tom) Casey

News of the death of Mr. Thomas J. (Tom) Casey which occurred at his residence, 9 Bellvue Terrace, Cobh, on last Sunday morning, May 23, was received with feelings of genuine and sincere regret in Dungarvan and district. In failing health for the last few months his passing has come as a grievous blow to his wife Mrs. Angela Casey, daughter of Sharon Foster, Miss. Maureen Casey, Mary Street, Dungarvan and to his other family relatives and large circle of friends.

Son of the late Thomas and Mary Casey, Harbour View, Dungarvan, he worked as an insurance official for many years in the Dungarvan district where he won widespread popularity and esteem. Some years ago he moved from Dungarvan to settle in Cobh where he joined the Clerical Staff of Irish Steel Ltd. at Haubowline and there, as in Dungarvan, he gave himself up to a wide circle of friends.

Always a gentleman to his fingertips he was actively associated with the Tennis Club and the Swimming Club in Dungarvan in his younger days. His calm and placid nature coupled with a quiet but firm character, a favourite with all and his death at a comparatively early age is now genuinely regretted by everybody.

We extend our deepest sympathy to the bereaved ones in the great loss which they have suffered.

His remains were removed to St. Colman's Cathedral in Cobh on Sunday evening followed by a large and most representative cortege which included a very large number of friends from Dungarvan. They were received by Rev. Fr. John Boyle C.C. Ballybricken (cousin) and Very Rev. Fr. Thornton, Adm. Cobh.

Requiem Mass was offered for him on Monday morning and he was then left for Dungarvan. On arrival at St. Mary's Parish Church the coffin was received by Rev. Fr. Boyle with whom were Very Rev. T. Canon Cassidy P.P., V.F. Rev. W. Callanan C.C., Rev. J. Bracken, C.C., Rev. G. Carey, C.C., Rev. J. McGrath, C.C., Canon Rev. J. Gould, O.S.A., Rev. P. J. Callaghan O.S.A., Prior, St. Augustine's, Mass was again offered, the gathering of mourning relatives and friends. Fr. Boyle assisted by all the other clergy read the final prayers at the graveside. The immediate chief mourners were Mrs. Angela Casey (wife), Miss. Sharon Casey (daughter), Miss. Maureen Casey (sister), Rev. J. Boyle (cousin). Funeral arrangements were carried out by James Kirby & Sons Undertakers, Dungarvan.

DUNGARVAN CIRCUIT CASE TRANSFERRED TO HIGH COURT

After hearing medical evidence in the £2000 civil action brought by a 19 year old Stradbally youth injured in a traffic accident on February 15th, 1974, the Circuit Court judge ordered the plaintiff permission to transfer the case to the High Court.

The plaintiff Raphael Power, Williamstown, Stradbally, claimed £2,000 damages for alleged negligent driving against John O'Brien, Knockateamore, Dungarvan.

The court was told that Power was injured while on a motor cycle involved in a collision with the defendant's van at Abbeyside.

Evidence was given by Surgeon John O'Reilly, Waterford who stated that he treated the plaintiff following the accident. He had a laceration of the mouth and swelling of the right knee. As a result of the knee injury he believed arthritis would set in in the knee in the future.

Judge Fawcitt said the plaintiff was going to be a recurring problem and early arthritis was also likely to set in. That to me seems worth the £2,000. I am sure that if the court is he is claiming in this court if he succeeds in proving his case." The Judge added that on the application of Mr Donnell, Barrister at Law, advised by E. A. Ryan & Co Solicitors for the plaintiff, Judge Fawcitt granted permission to have the case transferred to the High Court.

Mr Sean Ryan, B.L. (Instructed by J F Williams & Co Solicitors) appeared for the defendant.

COUNCILLORS DENOUNCE SHEEP SLAUGHTER
The widescale slaughter of sheep by dogs throughout the county was denounced in Dungarvan when there was unanimous support for a notice of motion tabled by Cllr P. Kenneally appealing to all dog owners to ensure that their dogs are kept in and under control during the hours of darkness.

Cllr Kenneally said that only twelve days ago a young married man had sheep valued at more than £1,000 slaughtered by marauding dogs in other areas of the county also. Dogs had ravaged sheep by night and he knew of tremendous concern among sheep owners at the situation.

Unacceptably very few dog owners have a sense of responsibility where sheep are concerned. Cllr Kenneally said "All dogs should be looked up at night and if they were much of the recent sheep slaughter would not have taken place."

Seconding the motion, Mr P. Croxley said in many instances it was "pet" dogs who were to blame.

MALICIOUS INJURY CLAIMS AT DUNGARVAN CIRCUIT COURT

Stating that the damage was clearly malicious, Judge Fawcitt at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week granted a decree for £793.11 the full amount claimed, together with costs and expenses to Marlowe Cleaners Ltd., O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, in their malicious injury claim against Waterford County Council.

Mr Brian Keenan, Manager of the firm gave evidence of finding the front window of the premises smashed.

Det/Garda T. McDermott said that a man had been charged and convicted in connection with the incident at Tallow Court and given a prison sentence.

STOLEN SAFE
An incident at Cappoquin on the night of June 13, 1975 resulted in a malicious injury claim brought also against the County Council by James Russell, Main Street, Cappoquin.

Plaintiff in evidence said that on the night in question a safe was removed from his shop and when found later it had been damaged by a pick-axe.

Fawcitt awarded a decree for £50 with costs and expenses.

PEGULAR WAY OF CELEBRATING
Two incidents which occurred in Dungarvan on the night of March 17 last left to further malicious injury claims against the Co Council and prompted Judge Fawcitt to remark that some people had a peculiar way of celebrating the National Day.

In the first, John Landers, Mary Street, gave evidence that on the night in question a cash register in his licensed premises had been damaged to the extent of £278 while in addition a sum of £150 in cash had been stolen from it.

The Judge granted a decree for £278 together with costs and expenses.

The second incident involved damage to a car totalling £30.40, the property of Patrick J. Kineen, Rice's Street.

The applicant in evidence stated that he parked his car outside his shop on the night of March 17 and the following morning he found the back window shattered and a large stone inside the car.

Judge Fawcitt awarded a decree for the full amount with costs and expenses.
