VITAL TO DEMOCRACY

Intelligent, responsible, independent, free and pluralism was vital to democracy, the Bishop of Ardagh, Dr Cahill, stated at a recent meeting of the Religious Press Association.

Because of ever-mounting costs this was being threatened more and more and the government might have to accept the need for special measures or exemptions to safeguard the future of the press, he asserted.

These views expressed by Dr Daly were expanded at a meeting in Athlone last Friday at which representatives of more than 40 of the Republic's provincial newspapers met to plan a new campaign for the abolition of VAT on newspapers and to secure a better deal for the provincial press.

The imposition of Value Added Tax on the sales of newspapers has been opposed from the very beginning and the agitation for its removal has been going on since this additional burden was placed on the provincial papers. The tax was first introduced by Fionna O'Leary and despite a promise by the then Opposition that they would remove it if they ever became the government, it was just another promise that has been broken. Rather than removing the tax the present government increased it to 10% in the last budget at a time when many of the papers throughout the country were fighting for survival.

Ireland is one of the few countries in Europe which has its newspapers and in this regard they are at once placed at a disadvantage vis-à-vis their opposite numbers in the radio and television fields. As was pointed out at the Athlone meeting, there are ethical reasons why any sensible democracy does not tax its source of information. Democracy could slowly destroy itself through misinformation of the public or ignorance by the public of vital economic or social or political realities.

In seeking the removal of VAT from sales of newspapers are merely looking for justice but it appears that the manner in which they have been agitating up to this cuts to the bone with the government. Does it mean then that like the farmers, the managers and staffs of those firms engaged in the printing and publishing industry throughout the country will have to take to the streets to draw attention to this injustice by public protest marches, demonstrations and meetings?

People look forward each week to reading their local papers, public representatives on local councils and other public bodies are never averse when they get a "good press" and are more than satisfied when representations they make bring the required results and are so reported. The local paper provides a vital and necessary service in every community in which it circulates. This is a service which should not be subject to government taxation.

The campaign now being mounted has as one of its aims the enlistment of the sympathy of the general public. In addition a special committee has been established as a result of the Athlone meeting and this will meet to formulate the exact nature of which will be reported to the Provincial Newspapers Association of Ireland before any moves are made.

Councillor states Regional Development Organisation for neglect in West Waterford

This body was a "penitentiary" which they could not afford to ignore, said Cllr P. Kenneally, when he mounted a full-scale attack on the South Eastern Regional Development Organisation at a meeting of the Council in Dungarvan last Monday. He said that as far as West Waterford was concerned it had never anything to help in getting some kind of industry for any of the towns and he would be very reluctant to forward the objects of the Organisation in any way.

Cllr P. Kenneally who is Chairman of the Regional Development Organisation pointed out that SERDO was not a statutory body and had no funds and its function was only to assess the position in the region in regard to future industrial needs. It was not there to provide industry as this was the function of the Industrial Development Association. He agreed that Bort Falte had been a failure but he still thought it was a useless body as it had no statutory powers and no money to spend.

they should again call on the government to classify the region as an underdeveloped area. Cllr Kenneally pointed out that an industrialist could not be compelled to establish a factory anywhere. However, the IDA did promise full support if West Waterford could secure some class of industry. Mr. C. Curran, Chairman said that down through the years several attempts had been made to locate an industry in West Waterford but they had all failed not due to any lack of effort by local voluntary bodies. West Waterford, he said, must be the most neglected part of the entire country.

On the proposal of Mr. Coffey seconded by Mr. J. Curran, the Council agreed to again request the government to classify West Waterford as an underdeveloped area. It was further agreed to defer the matter of setting up a County Development Team to the next meeting.

THE NATIONAL DEBT

During a brief debate in the Dail recently following questions as to the amount of the debts incurred to run the country, the leader of the Opposition, Mr. J. Lynch, said that from the information supplied, the total national debt now stood at £3,300 million.

The cost of servicing the debt was stated to be roughly £350 million and this represented about 30 per cent of the country's total tax revenue.

DERRY MAN WHO SPENT MOST OF HIS ADULT LIFE IN PRISON AGAIN SENTENCED

"I was an alcoholic but when I sobered up I was a thief. I'm as honest as any man in this courtroom," John Denis Brennan, no fixed abode, but stated in his defence in the Circuit Court at Derry, where Justice O. A. Macklin at Dungarvan Court when he pleaded guilty to a spate of breaking and entering and larceny charges committed in counties Waterford, Cork, Kerry, Clare and Sligo.

Supt. M. English told the court that Brennan was arrested in County Sligo and placed in a mental institution from which he discharged himself two days later. He then worked his way around the country committing most of the crimes for which he was now before the court. The defendant had a very serious drink problem and had more than fifty previous convictions for larceny.

FINANCIAL STATE OF COUNTY COUNCIL

In an interim report on the financial position circulated to members of Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday, Mr. B. McNally, Co. Secretary, stated the balance position in 1976 has been largely a debit one and at June 2 stood at £28,150.

The general level is not as high as has been anticipated," the report stated "due to a relatively good start to the rate collection and a vigorous pursuit of outstanding debts. In general the over all net cash position is running at 1975 levels and as indicated in previous reports there is an increased reliance on overdraft."

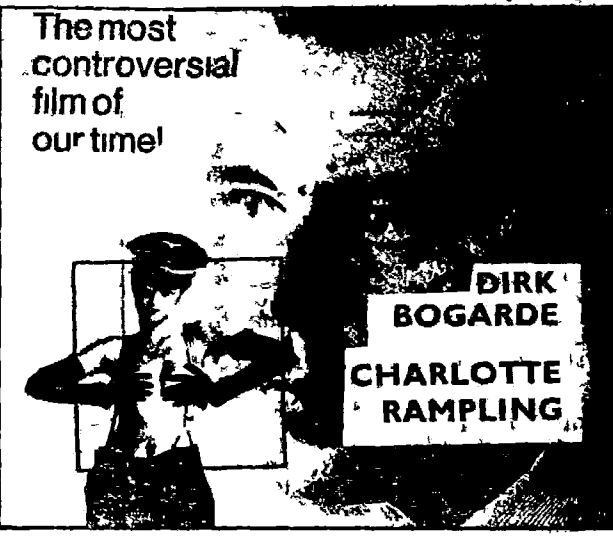

CIVIC SPIRIT OF WITNESS COMMENDED BY DISTRICT JUSTICE

The story of how a 28-year-old County Tipperary man dashing rushed into a Dungarvan licensed premises went behind the counter and made off with £43 in notes from the cash register, was told to District Justice Oliver Macklin at Dungarvan Court

Before the court in custody was Charles Cooke a father of two, from St John's Terrace Carrick-on-Suir, but he pleaded not guilty to the larceny of £43 in cash the property of Desmond Keane publican O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, on May 28 last

Desmond Keane in evidence said that as a result of something he had been told he checked his cash register and found that £43 in notes was missing

James Crotty Shandon Dungarvan, said he was drinking in the licensed premises when the man entered the shop and took a bundle of notes from the cash register and made for the front door

Another man with him, John Costigan Cathal Brugha Place Dungarvan, turned to the customers and said "none of you saw anything" Later witness identified Cooke at Dungarvan Garda Station as the man who snatched the money

Sergeant M Hayes Dungarvan, said he went to another licensed premises after receiving a report of the robbery and took Cooke and another man to the barracks When searched Cooke had only £10 on him He was also present when Mr Crotty identified the defendant

Cooke in evidence denied that he stole the money He was in the licensed premises with his brother and some friends but left when his brother was inclined to be getting awkward

Corroborative evidence was given by two other witnesses, John Costigan and Michael McCarthy, who claimed they were in the defendant's company that night

Justice Macklin however said Mr Crotty was a sensible, decent man and he accepted his evidence in full "This was a quick, daring robbery which did not come off and I have no reasonable doubt as to the guilt of the accused," he said

When told that Cooke had been deported out of England and had served numerous prison sentences both in Ireland and in England, Justice Macklin said he must impose a sentence again in this case However following a strong plea by Mr E P King, Solicitor who said Cooke was the father of two young children and had just moved into a new house Justice Macklin imposed a nine months sentence suspended on him paying £43 compensation within one week

The Justice also fined him £20 payable within one month

Justice Macklin said the most also publicly complimented Mr Crotty on his civic spirit and on having the moral courage to come to court and give evidence "There are too few people like him around today," Justice Macklin added

PROVINCIAL NEWSPAPERS TO PLAN NEW CAMPAIGN AGAINST V.A.T.

Representatives of more than 40 of the Republic's provincial newspapers met last Friday in Dublin to plan a new campaign for the abolition of V.A.T. on newspapers and a better deal for the provincial press

The two-hour meeting heard several demands for radical action, including street protests by managements and editorial and printing workers, and the withholding of V.A.T. payments

But there was no enthusiasm for a suggestion from an earlier meeting of provincial papers in Connacht that speeches by Government Ministers and leading Coalition politicians should be blacked

Eventually the meeting set up a 13-man committee to report to the Provincial Newspapers' Association of Ireland on the exact nature of the campaign (Most of the attendance on Friday were members of the FNAI)

The main subject of the current protests against V.A.T. were "neither political nor anti-Government," it added (The meeting was introduced by Flannia Fall and was increased by the present Government in the January Budget to 10% It was an effort to enliven the sympathy and help of all public representatives "in our fight for justice and survival")

ACTIVE PROTEST One of the first speakers was Mr William O'Hanlon of Cavan who is president of the FNAI He produced a bundle of notes which, he said, were his file on V.A.T. It was totally wrong and misleading to suggest that the news paper industry either provincial or national had been passive in its protest It had been extraordinarily active but, frankly, it had got nowhere The need for further representation was clear

Mr O'Hanlon said there were ethical reasons why any sensible democrat should not tax its source of information in this way

The chairman, Mr Nicholas Nally of Mullingar, said the censorship idea should not be entertained It would be quite an amount of publicity but the provincial newspapers were a free press

CAVALIER NOTE Mr O'Hanlon said that there was not a bonanza in the abolition of V.A.T. for the provincial papers He estimated that for a newspaper with a weekly circulation of around 10,000 copies it meant £30 a week or £1,500 a year Mr Ryan Minister for Finance, had estimated that it would cost £2.8 million if V.A.T. was abolished on newspapers, but the net cost to the Exchequer, he thought would be about £1,250,000 He explained that with the removal of V.A.T. there would probably be a higher rate of advertising

He also said that the Dublin newspaper managers had presented an extremely well-documented case for the abolition of V.A.T. at a cost of £4,000 "It was dismissed with exactly the same cavalier note that we in the FNAI have experienced ourselves," he said "While we may make a case again to the Minister it will not be any different from any of the other cases that have been made"

Mr Lucius Farrell (Longford) said that at a meeting of the FNAI he had suggested that they should refuse to make VAT returns The only way forward now was through some kind of drastic action

Another speaker said there should be a national protest campaign with management and printing and editorial workers taking to the streets

We might at least draw attention to ourselves," he said (Mr Paddy Smith (Monaghan) said that one of the biggest costs was newspaper Perhaps instead of looking for a concession on VAT they should look for a subsidy towards the cost of newspaper Perhaps the Government could be persuaded to promote a plant in Ireland for the manufacture of newsprint (Mr Cecil King (Ballyshannon) was worried that VAT might go to 30% "The problem for me is the case, having to pay out money before I get money in."

CO. COUNCIL MEETINGS TO START WITH PRAYER

Stating that it was already happening in other counties Mr P Cahill proposed at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday that in future the commencement of each meeting of the Council be preceded by an appropriate prayer "It would be a nice thing to start meetings with a little prayer in Irish as prayer is now the only hope for the country"

The motion was seconded by Cllr K O'Ryan and after a brief discussion the motion was carried by 9 votes to 7
