OUT OF ORDER

It's amazing, or is it, that when a person goes to make a call from a public telephone kiosk how often it is found to be out of order for one reason or another. Recently when a bomb scare saw the O'Connell Street area in Dublin cleared, people found themselves separated from each other and caught in traffic jams which resulted from the clearance of the centre city area. One person caught in this situation told me that as a result she was unable to keep an appointment and went to make a phone call to explain the position. The first three kiosks she tried were all out of order. However she eventually found one which was working and succeeded in making her call.

The manner in which public telephones are vandalised is not peculiar to Dublin nor indeed to Cork or other city areas. Prior to the Dail summer recess last month, a question was asked whether the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs was aware that on the night of Sunday, June 13, all six coin boxes in Tullamore were out of order and that this was becoming a regular feature in the town.

The Minister in his reply said that most of the service difficulties with the kiosks are caused by the jamming of coin slots by bent coins or by being stuffed with paper or other material. All fault reports, he added, were dealt with on a priority basis.

During the discussion that followed, another Dail member claimed that the two-penny slot in these machines was in some way defective and that the jamming of coins was caused by this inherent defect in the mechanism. While this might be so in some cases I am convinced after some little investigation which I have carried out myself that in the majority of cases the damage is the result of downright blockguarding and vandalism.

One good point with which I agree was raised during the Dail discussion. This concerned the adjusting of the coin boxes in these public telephone booths to accept a two-penny piece so as to obviate the necessity of inserting large numbers of five-penny pieces which at times can prove a great inconvenience not to mention the unnecessary over-use of the machinery which it entails.

The Minister stated that this point was under consideration. That, as we all know, could mean anything and eventually nothing.

The telephone service is a

very costly one and public kiosks are located in places where they can best serve the needs of the local communities. It is a service of the greatest importance especially when emergency situations arise like calling a doctor or fire brigade. In some instances it can be a matter of life or death. But a telephone is good only while it is operational—a dead phone is not only a useless thing but also frustrating.

It is essential therefore that the equipment in the public telephone booths should be in good working order at all times. Routing faults are bound to crop up from time to time and coins can genuinely become jammed in the slots. These are reasonable and understandable. But it is the wanton destruction and damage that puts the phones out of order which must be condemned. This is happening too often and those responsible might do well to remember that when they deliberately do something to put a public phone out of order they are killing a vital line of communication which might otherwise prove a life saver.

WARNING FROM D.J. IN UNUSUAL CASE

There was an unusual case at Dungarvan Court last week when a 31 year old mother of three children was charged that on April 26 last at Bridge Street, Dungarvan she did wilfully ill-treat her 20 months old daughter in a manner likely to cause unnecessary suffering.

The defendant was Mrs Mary Sinnott, Sexton Street, Abbeyside, and having heard the evidence District Justice B J Carroll dismissed the charge on the grounds that while the mother's action might have been negligent it was not wilful.

Evidence was given that on the day in question the child was left in a locked parked car and appeared to be suffocating when Sergeant Hayes and Garda Twomey came along and had to break one of the windows to get the child out.

Nurse M Burke in evidence said that at about 5 o'clock on Monday, April 26 her attention was drawn to a car in Bridge Street around which there were a number of people. She saw a Garda breaking one of the windows of the car. There was a child swaying in the back seat and she appeared to be very distressed. When the child was taken out she was perspiring freely and was very overheated. It was a very warm day. She took the child into the hotel and got it a drink of water and it recovered quickly. She said that about a quarter of an hour later Mrs Sinnott came back to her car and she then handed the child back to her.

Mrs Sinnott in evidence said that at about 10 to 5 that evening she went to the Post Office to make a phone call. She took her 4 year old twins in with her and left her 20 months old daughter in the car having first opened the air vents located in the dashboard. When she came out 15 minutes later she saw a crowd around the car and the child was gone. When she asked a Garda what had happened he said that he did not know what had happened it and later a woman came along and handed the child back to her. She added that the child did not appear to have been distressed in any way. It had cost £118 to have the window which had been broken in the car.

District Justice Carroll said that if it could not be said that what Mrs Sinnott had done on the occasion had been wilful it might have been negligent and he said that no child could lie against her and be accordingly dismissed the charge. However he said that this was a matter which should be taken to the attention of the public. Every one involved in the case had acted very properly but it should be noted by anyone leaving children in a car, even an infant, that the windows should be left down a fraction to enable proper ventilation. Opening the vents in the dash was no good as these only operated when the car was in motion, he said.
