FENSMAN TAKES YOU BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

MUHAMMAD AND THE MOUNTAIN
 When Muhammad went to the mountain then the Fenians must go to the mountain. It would seem an apt way of describing the decision taken by Waterford County Council at its meeting in Dungarvan last Monday.

The Council invited the Chief Executive Officer of the South Eastern Health Board to a meeting to discuss comments that the health services based at the hospital in Dungarvan were being systematically run down but the invitation was not accepted.

First reactions of most of the members were rather angry and they voiced their views in no uncertain fashion. However when the County Manager pointed out that under the government scheme to phase out the health services at local level, the Council were only paying a 12 1/2% contribution towards the total cost of the Regional Board budget this year and that next year this would be reduced to zero with the government taking up the tab for the full amount, tempers cooled and the Council settled for a suggestion that they should send a deputation to the next meeting of the Health Board to take up the points at issue. This meeting will take place in Kilkenny next month. So in fact the Fenians will have to go to Muhammad in this instance.

It is that as it may, the big issue is whether it is the official policy of the Board to downgrade Dungarvan and to phase out the various services which have been in operation there up to now and in the recent past. I have been hammering at this over the past three years and it is only now that some people are beginning to wake up to the fact that what started off as a minor move has now almost reached completion.

First the hospital was closed for even minor surgery, then the casualty service which was supposed to start never became a reality, then the physiotherapy service disappeared and now it looks as if the dental service and the maternity unit will also go to be phased out. Whenever a storm blew up about one of these things in the past it was diplomatically hushed with assurances that the services would be restored in time when staff or money or something else became available.

The Co. Councillors now appear to be fully aware of what is happening and hopefully the fire and brimstone which they were breathing at last Monday's meeting will not have blown themselves out before they take issue with the Board on these matters next month. It is about time that a firm stand was taken and that the wishes of the people at local level be taken to mean something more than the convenience of the bureaucrats.

THE ERIN'S HOPE
 Last week I referred in this column to the finding of a Fenian trawler, "Deo Volente," at a point about five and a half miles south-east of Helwick Head on the previous Saturday which was claimed to come from the famous Fenian ship "Erin's Hope" which the article stated had sunk at that point after having landed a number of men with arms and ammunition for the Fenian Rising near the pier at Ballinagoul, Ring, in 1867.

I took the story from a number of the daily and Sunday papers of the previous week-end but I must hasten to correct the position. The fact of the matter is that the "Erin's Hope" did not sink at the point stated nor did she ever sink. The error which I should have noted myself, was drawn to my attention by Donal O'Connell, a member of the teaching staff

of the Vocational Education Committee.
 He passed me a book written by his late father Michael O'Connell, one of the most loved and respected teachers at Coláiste na Rinne for a long number of years, in which a complete chapter is devoted to the Fenians and the landing in Ballinagoul in 1867. The last chapter in the states, and giving a rather free translation of what is written in Irish, "The Erin's Hope" reached the port of New York on the 1st day of August, 1867, after having sailed 9,000 miles (on the round trip) and as long as the Captain lived after, he always said that he would like an opportunity to make another similar voyage to Ireland."

I will deal with the matter at greater length next week (D.V.) but suffice it to say that the winch picked up by the Deo Volente could not have come from the "Erin's Hope," whatever other vessel it came from.

A SEA ANGLER PAR EXCELLENCE
 The unexpected death last week of Mr. Kevin J. Coughlan, P.C., Carrigrohane, and formerly of Youghal, was the source of genuine regret in many areas throughout West Waterford and East Cork. In latter years Kevin became deeply and actively involved in the administration of Sea Angling affairs not only at local level but also at provincial and national level. For many years, too, he was the local correspondent in the Ardmore area for this paper and the great interest which he had in the affairs of the community in which he lived made him an ideal choice in this regard. His untimely passing will be a great loss to us all.

The interest in and love for sea angling which the late Kevin Coughlan had was shared by at least one other member of his family and a few days before he passed to his eternal reward, it came so quickly in the end, he sent me a cutting from "The Miami Herald" of July 12 which related the high standing in which his brother, Gerald N. (Jerry) Coughlan, is held in sea angling circles in the fashionable Palm Beach area in the U.S.

Columnist Jim Hardie in his column "Palm Beach Outdoors" writes under the heading, "Go Out and Reel in a Swordfish" in "The Miami Herald" of that date described Jerry Coughlan as one of the all-time greats among the many important personalities in sports fishing which Palm Beach County had.

This is what Columnist Hardie had to say "Gerald N. (Jerry) Coughlan lives in quiet retirement in Boca Raton, but he still keeps up to date on important developments in sports fishing.

"Keep the information coming on the swordfish," he said in a conversation Sunday.

"We want to learn everything we can about them. Do you think this is a seasonal thing?"

"We were discussing the new developing sport of catching swordfish on rod and reel along the Southeast Florida coast. It is new in that for the first time anglers are going out and trying specifically for swordfish and catching them."

"Over the years there have been catches from time to time, but in each it was an accidental or incidental catch.

The fishermen were after sharks or grouper and accidentally got a swordfish strike. Or they were trolling for anything that might come along, and got a swordfish."

"But in the past week, at least four swordfish have been decked as a result of a specific attempt. And others have been hooked and lost. The sizes have ranged from 24 to 368 pounds. They are known to grow more than 1,000 pounds."

To dress a moment, Jerry Coughlan used to come to Florida from his home in Essex Falls, N.J., and regularly make newspaper headlines with catches of tarpon or flyrod and plug rod. He fished with Captain Jimmie Albright of Islamorada.

"Coughlan won the Florida Keys Award for outstanding angling achievement so many times that they finally retired the trophy and gave it to him. At last count I think he won it nine straight years."

"It is my opinion that Jerry Coughlan and Jimmie Albright did more to give national attention to plug casting and fly-casting than 100-pound tarpon, than any other angler-guide in Florida history."

"In 1958, Coughlan caught the first 125-pound tarpon on flyrod. The photo of Albright and himself with the fish, was published in newspapers and magazines across the country."

"Coughlan was an all-around light tackle expert. He caught and released sailfish with the same skill that he took tarpon."

"An Olympic athlete of the 1930s, Coughlan was always in splendid physical condition, and had exceptional reflexes. A skillful angler, ardent conservationist and real sportsman."

"Even though his fishing effort is tempered today, his enthusiasm for angling has not declined one iota."

"He has always been a modest man, ready to help a beginner and eager to discuss tackle and fishing methods in great detail."

"The first time I met Jerry Coughlan was on a cold winter night in Wilmington, N.C., a group of us had been seeing big tarpon along the Carolina coast in summer, but we didn't know how to catch them. Coughlan travelled from Essex Falls at his own time and expense to give us the benefit of his experience. That was in 1955. Armed with the knowledge he gave us the following summer we went after and caught the first tarpon. Twenty were landed that season."

"Palm Beach County has many important personalities in sports fishing, including G. N. (Jerry) Coughlan, one of the all-time greats."

I had hoped to reprint the foregoing in time to enable the late Kevin to read it in the "Leader" but God ordained otherwise. It just shows how fast we can pass from the scene. Kevin has left the turbulent, stormy waters of this world behind him and has gone to a quieter haven of pleasant rest. Go, dearie Dio trocure air.
