**NO SIGNIFICANT IMPROVEMENT IN DROUGHT CONDITIONS**

The rain over the last few days has done very little towards relieving the effects of the drought. Pasture all over the south east is practically bare. At this stage one can only hope that there will be a mild autumn to bring back some grass growth. At the moment milk supply is dropping at an enormous rate and O'Connor, Chief Executive of Waterford Co-Op, says that the drought will result in a loss of about 3,000,000 gallons of milk through their district. The Co-Op is also charged with a potential loss of income to Waterford Co-Op farmers from the drop in milk yields in the current year could be as high as £1 million. In addition this drought is accentuating the problem of low winter supply to the intake plants. It is going to make it very difficult for the Co-Op to expand its range of fresh dairy products. These products depend very much on a constant supply of milk throughout the winter. Apart from the effect on milk yield, cow condition is dropping at a drastic rate. The normal ration of concentrate for the lactating cow is made up by feeding good quality silage. However, this year because of the drought, silage requires supplementary feed to get back into condition. Progressive farmers are beginning to realise more and more the importance of ensuring optimum yields in silage. This is done by a regular feeding of meals in a wide scale Provender mills are reporting a boom trade in dairy silage. The Co-Op is also reporting a boom trade in home-grown barley or molasses supplemented with a protein source.

**COURT HEARS OF VICIOUS AND SAVAGE ASSAULT ON ST. STEPHEN'S NIGHT**

A savage St. Stephen's Night brawl in Dungarvan in which one woman was slashed across the face with a drinking glass necessitating eleven stitches, and another beaten and kicked into unconsciousness, had a sequel at Dungarvan Court when a number of people appeared on assault charges. Gerard Moylan, 19, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan was charged with assaulting Miss Breda Duggan, Caseyville Dungarvan, at Main Street and O'Connell Street, thereby occasioning her actual bodily harm. Moylan was also charged with assaulting John Duggan, Caseyville, but pleaded not guilty to all three charges. Miss Josephine Moylan, also pleaded not guilty to assaulting Breda Duggan, thereby occasioning her actual bodily harm. John Duggan (19) and his sister Breda Duggan (21) both of Caseyville, also pleaded not guilty to assaulting Mrs. Josephine Moylan. A fifth defendant, James Costigan, Cathal Brugha Place, pleaded not guilty to assaulting Breda Duggan. Mrs. Josephine Moylan told the court that around closing time on the night of December 26 last she was attacked by James Duggan at her premises at Main Street. While she was scuffling with her John Duggan stuck a drinking glass into her face and she had to have eleven stitches inserted in the wound. Cross-examined by Mr E. P. King Solr, the witness denied the attack. She also denied throwing a glass or its contents at the Duggans. John Duggan in evidence said Mrs. Moylan struck her with a glass on the side of the head and as they both struggled she could see her brother John being attacked by Gerard Moylan and Costigan. Glasses and bottles were flying all over the place but she could not say how Mrs. Moylan's face got slashed. Miss Duggan said she was struck across the face by Costigan and kicked by Gerard Moylan. Moylan also followed her up O'Connell Street where he beat and kicked her until she became unconscious and she knew nothing more until she was at the doctor's surgery. As a result of the assault her back was cut, her two knees badly torn and her face was black and blue. James Walsh, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, said he saw Moylan, without a shirt, running up the street after Miss Duggan. She fell to the ground and Moylan started kicking her in the head and body. Witness asked Moylan to leave her alone and she was taken to the hospital. Moylan also followed her up O'Connell Street where he saw Miss Duggan being mocked by Gerard Moylan and Costigan. Tallow's hopes of winning their first county senior hurling title in forty years were rubble when they were beaten by Portlaoise in a replay at Fraher Field, Dungarvan, on Friday last. A near record crowd witnessed the total annihilation of Tallow's challenge in a clash of hurling fines which resulted in a twenty-five point winning margin. C.I.E. REP'S REPLY TO COUNCILLORS' CRITICISMS

In his reply to the criticisms and complaints, Mr Ahearn pointed out that in regard to the school bus service, this was administered by C.I.E. for the Minister for Education who made all the regulations for the service. C.I.E. had to go by these regulations and he said that the problems referred to by the various Councillors were all due to these and in the circumstances there was nothing C.I.E. could do about them...

In regard to the regular service, he pointed out that a daily bus service operated between Waterford and Mallow but this was losing money as it was not being supported. In regard to the services from Waterford for boat passengers he said that they found that most people travelled at weekends and they had a service on Friday and Saturday nights to meet this demand. It would be uneconomic to run such a service on week-end evenings...

WATERFORD-ROSSLARE LINE Before the discussion ended the Co. Manager, Mr C. A. O'Connor, said that he had attended a meeting in Waterford with the General Manager of C.I.E. at which the proposed closure of the Waterford-Rossare line was discussed. The General Manager had indicated to them that so far no decision had been taken in this matter but had pointed out that the losses in running the line at present were such that its retention could not be justified on economic grounds. He added that they had been assured that the services on the line would not be discontinued until C.I.E. were able to provide a suitable alternative service and this regard the use of the Barrow Bridge as a toll bridge was being considered...

CONSERVATION ORDER FOR HELVICK HEAD Before their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday members of Waterford County Council unanimously approved the making of a Conservation Order for Helvick Head. The County Secretary, Mr B. J. McNally, said that the order would prohibit the shooting or molesting of birds and fauna which frequented Helvick Head.

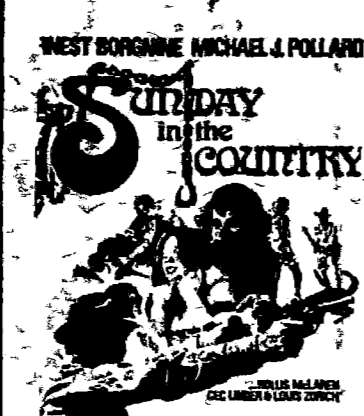

## COUNCILLORS CROSS SWORDS ON BEACH POLLUTION ISSUE

When Mr. F. King insisted on moving a motion in his name at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday that due to serious pollution and raw sewage which is visible in Woodstown, Passage East, Dunmore East and Tramore, a firm of specialist Sewage Consultants be employed to report on the position, he was told by the Co. Manager Mr. C. A. O'Connor, that this was a very serious motion.

Mr. O'Connor pointed out that the Council had or were providing new sewerage schemes in the Dunmore and other areas mentioned and in this regard were acting responsibly in this matter. There was no great discharge of sewage at Woodstown but he said that the County Council on its own did not have full control of the position.

Mr. King moving the motion said he knew that this was a serious matter and while he was not blaming anyone in particular he said that complaints had been made to him about the position and for that reason he had felt obliged to put down the motion. He agreed that some of the complainants had been denied and responsible people had said that there was no need for alarm. But he said that he had been shown

certain things as a result of which he felt that matters were not so well as they were being led to believe. As a result he felt they should ask a firm of looked into and if the harbour at Dunmore and the other seaside places were being polluted as was being suggested by people in these districts then he felt they should ask a firm of specialist consultants to examine the position.

**SENSATIONAL ISSUE**  
Mr. P. Crotty then crossed swords with Mr. King and said this matter had already hit the front pages of some of the local papers and it was obvious that some member of the Council was trying to cash in on making this a sensational issue getting publicity from it.

He said that he and his children had been swimming there all through the summer and he was sure there was no serious pollution in the area. There was a problem there for years he added but he thought it peculiar that capital was now being made of the matter at a time when sewerage schemes at Dunmore and Passage were being carried out and which would finally solve it.

It looked to him, said Cllr. Crotty that the member concerned was hoping that the matter would now hit the national papers but he personally hoped that this would not happen as it could cause immeasurable damage to tourism in the area and mean a big financial loss for people there. He pointed out that the Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Kelly had already given the assurance that no health hazard existed in the area and he felt concerned that a member of the Council should go to the Press with his complaint and then come along to the Council to discuss it. He thought it should be the other way around.

Mr. King replied that he was well able to look after himself where matters of this kind were concerned. "Mr. Crotty need not tell me who I am or am not to talk to and I will not be silenced by anyone. I feel I have a duty to bring this matter up here and I am pressing the motion for that reason," he said.

**OTHERS INVOLVED**  
The Co. Manager then pointed out that there were other local authorities involved in the areas referred to by Mr. King and he asked why the County Council should waste money appointing consultants if they were to tell them that these other bodies were responsible even allowing that what Mr. King had said was so. The Council had not full control over the position and could do nothing about it.

Mr. King said that he was no expert on these matters himself and all he wanted to know was whether or not there was pollution in these areas. He again added that he would speak to whom he liked on these matters and said that it was his democratic right to be able to do so.

Finally on the suggestion of the Chairman, Mr. C. Curran, it was agreed to adjourn the motion until the next meeting pending receipt of a report from the Chief Medical Officer on the matter.

## MOTOR CYCLIST FINED FOR CARELESS DRIVING

A collision between a truck and a motor cycle at Ballinacree, Dungarvan, on March 19 last had a sequel at Dungarvan Court when the motor cyclist, John McCarthy (26), Ballinacree, was charged with dangerous driving.

The court was told that McCarthy attempted to overtake a large truck which was in the process of turning into a road on his right.

Mr. P. King, Solr. defending, said no one had suffered more as a result of the accident than the defendant himself.

Saying that the defendant was travelling at "some speed" District Justice W. F. O'Connell convicted him on a reduced charge of careless driving. He imposed a nominal £2 fine and ordered the defendant to pay £25 expenses.

Manager said that while all would have to agree that there had been a big improvement in Ardmore in this regard in recent years he assured the members that pressure would be maintained to see that those remaining would be cleared as quickly as possible.

It would be a good thing if the same type of pressure was applied in all other areas where such ugly, old, derelict buildings still stand.

**IT HAPPENED IN 1776**  
I am indebted to an O'Connell reader for a newspaper clipping which relates what could only be described as an almost unbelievable occurrence which is claimed to have taken place in West Waterford more than 200 years ago.

The story is as follows: "What must rank as one of the world's strangest phenomena occurred in Ireland in 1776, and yet it seems to have been forgotten as no account of it, apart from a contemporary report, has since appeared."

At four o'clock on the evening of October 21, 1776, farmers working in the Piltown, Co. Waterford were astonished to see a ball appear on what, only moments before, had been a level field.
