### PHYSICIAN TAKES YOU

## behind the SPOTLIGHT

#### DERELICT SITES

Derelict sites are everywhere they are located in several towns and villages in West Waterford. They are more than anything else, a blot on the otherwise thriving and prosperous image of a locality and a greater effort will have to be made to remove them from the scene.

Reference to the position in the County Council when the Chairman, Mr C. Curran, said that although the Co. Manager had maintained that there was only one such place in the village, he was aware of three located in the Main Street and these tended to destroy the whole aspect of the very popular and busy seaside resort.

The County Secretary, Mr J. McNally, informed the Council that notice to demolish derelict buildings in the village had been served in three owners and the Co. Manager said that while all would have to agree that there had been a big improvement in Ardmore in this regard in recent years he assured the members that pressure would be maintained to see that those remaining would be cleared as quickly as possible.

It would be a good thing if the same type of pressure was applied in all other areas where such ugly, old, derelict buildings still stand.

#### BRIDGE PARAPET REPAIRED

I passed over Youghal Bridge during the week and noted that the parapet of the bridge on the Youghal side had at long last been repaired. This was damaged early last year when a laundry van plunged through it in a tragic accident in which the driver and his helper lost their lives. Since then the damaged area had been blocked off with planks and barrels. It was a grim reminder of the tragedy which had claimed two young lives. Now that the damage has been repaired the occurrence becomes just a memory and then only for those for whom, at the time, it meant bereavement or loss. It is just another example of how we can adjust even to the most stark tragedy in the course of time.

#### ON ANOTHER U.S. TRIP WITH COMHALTAS GROUP

The largest Comhaltas group ever will leave for a Concert Tour of the United States and Canada on Monday, October 4. The tour will consist of 15 concerts and will form a major Irish contribution to the U.S. Bicentennial celebrations. The twenty-three artists who form the group are all champions in their own right and include Aine Bean U. Cilleochair (nee Anne Mulqueen), An Rinn, the well-known singer of Irish ballads who has been a member of another Comhaltas group which previously toured the U.S.

We wish Aine and her colleagues good fortune and a safe journey to and from the "New World".

#### IT HAPPENED IN 1776

I am indebted to an Old Parish reader for a newspaper cutting which relates what can be described as an almost unbelievable occurrence which is claimed to have taken place in West Waterford more than 200 years ago.

The story is as follows: "What must rank as one of the world's strangest phantoms occurred in Ireland in 1776, and yet it seems to have been forgotten as no account of it apart from a contemporary report, has since appeared."

"At four o'clock on the evening of October 21, 1776 farmers working in their fields between Clashmore and Pittbowen Co. Waterford were astonished to see a hill appear on what only moments before, had been a level field

The vision came complete with a walled town consisting of houses, a round tower and a church with a steeple in front of the town walls there was a tree with a solitary cow grazing under its branches. "No one dared to approach the hill itself, although a sizeable crowd gathered on its boundaries as the news spread around the district. The phantom remained unchanged for a full hour. But during the remaining half hour the image altered several times as though it wished to illustrate the passing of a great number of years.

The first alteration was the disappearance of the cow and the tree, and the replacing of the church spire and the cap of the round tower with shimmering copper domes. Next the round tower took on the appearance of an octagonal building, and finally all buildings appeared as ruins with pieces of the fallen masonry scattered over the hillside. Then, after the spectators had witnessed the scene for a full hour, the hill disappeared leaving the ground as clear and level as it was before.

"At the time the 'Youghal Phantom' (as it came to be known) was explained as being nothing more than an example of Fata Morgana, a form of elaborate mirage. However, no mirage can portray the founding, expansion, and eventual abandonment of a town that occurred in that hour in 1766."

It is a rather strange story and I wonder whether any one in the Clashmore-Pittbowen area has ever heard of it before.

#### FRIENDS OF MAYOR DALEY IN DUNGARVAN

A doctor and his sister, a member of the Mercy Order of Nuns, both from Chicago visited Dungarvan last weekend. They were personal friends of Mayor Daley of Chicago and came to Dungarvan to call on a cousin of the Mayor, Mr Nicky Daly of Mary Street.

It was more than a coincidence that when inquiring for Mr. Daly's house they went to Mr. Con Roche's hairdressing establishment also in Mary Street and when they identified themselves, Mr. Roche was not only able to direct them to their goal but was also able to inform them that a cousin of his own, Cornelius J. Harrington, was a Justice of the Criminal Court in Chicago.

The visitors were hospitably entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Daly and left Dungarvan with happy memories of their visit to the town which I have no doubt they will relate to the Mayor who is no stranger to the town (or to Old Parish where the Daley forbears came) from their return to the "Windy City".

#### DUNGARVAN MAN IN MAJOR HOTEL PURCHASE

The International Hotel, Killarney, formerly a Trust House Forte property has been purchased by three Killarney businessmen — Liam Kelly, Sean Coyne and James Loughane, according to a report published in the Property supplement of a Dublin daily newspaper last week-end.

The report goes on to point out that the hotel enjoys a fine position in the town and has ample adjacent car parking space. It has 125 bedrooms, 85 with private baths. A substantial redevelopment programme has been planned by the new owners for the Winter season which will incorporate a new grill and lounge bar and entertainment area.

Mr. Kelly who is Managing Director of the Company was formerly Manager of the Three Lakes Hotel in Killarney and is one of the big men in the South-West Tourism Organisation. He is a member of a well-known and popular Dungarvan family who have had long associations with the hotel business being son of Mrs. A. Kelly,

### LABOUR PARTY SELECT CANDIDATE

Mr Frank King, M.C. (34), Viewmount Park, Waterford, was selected to contest the next general election on behalf of the Labour Party in the new Waterford four seater constituency at a selection conference held at the Courthouse, Dungarvan on Sunday last. The conference was presided over by Senator John Harter and Mr Seamus Scally, Asst. General Secretary of the Party, was also in attendance.

Mr King's selection has put an end to the speculation which has been rife in the area since the announcement some time ago of his retirement, at the termination of the present Deal by veteran T.D. Mr Tom Kyne, who has represented the Party in the Dail since 1948, apart from the period 1969-73 when he was ousted from the seat.

Mr King's selection came as no great surprise. What amazed the 87 delegates present at the strong bid made by Dungarvan Urban Councillor, Mr Tommy Wade of Abbey-side and the poor showing of Waterford city man Alderman Tom Brennan who got the support of only 2 branches out of the constituency's total of 24.

The following was the result of the first and only count: Total poll 88. Kings 44, Mr Brennan 48, Mr Wade 30, Mr King 8.

### DEFEATED

A proposal from the Waterford City branch that two candidates be selected was heavily defeated.

Mr King was nominated by Mr Tom Kyne, T.D. and the nomination was seconded by Mr J. Byrne on behalf of the Dungarvan Branch.

A former member of the Administrative Council of the Labour Party Mr King, is currently Chairman of the Waterford Constituency Council. A maintenance supervisor with O.E. he is married with 2 children. His wife is the former Miss Mary McCarthy, daughter of Mr & Mrs Jimmy McCarthy, Bridget's Tee Dungarvan.

He was successful in the 1974 local elections winning a seat on the County Council in the Tramore-Elector area.

He refused to speak except in Irish and the reporters were forced to pay a substantial sum of money to a friend of Behan's who was standing by to act as interpreter. It was Behan's ironic answer to men who always twisted whatever he would say to suit some sensational heading of their own.

### NEW MARRIAGE GUIDE-LINES FOR WATERFORD DIOCESE

New guide-lines for people about to marry in the diocese are contained in the following letter from the Bishop, Most Rev. Dr. Eusebius, which was read at all Masses on Sunday last. "Marriage is for most people their special vocation their lifelong source of happiness and fulfilment their own particular way to God."

"Through marriage a man and a woman form together a community of life and joy. Living together becomes for them a great adventure in human relationships. They learn about each other in a process that calls for great generosity and unselfishness, for constant consideration and courtesy for a sharing of hopes, burdens, fears and interests. Their life has to be one of true partnership, and it has to be based on mutual honesty and loyalty. By living together in this manner, their love grows and each day, each husband and wife become in a way one heart and one soul."

"But marriage is much more than that. Its meaning does not stop there. It is too, a Sacrament, in which two people consecrate themselves to carry on Christ's work. As a Christian husband and wife they will always try to represent Christ to each other, to their children, and to everyone else. Each will be the husband and father, the wife and mother, which Christ calls them to be. It means also that they will pass on to their children not only the gift of human life, God's great gift, but in addition the life of grace and of faith which Christ shared with us. This is what families are called little churches, where, as St. Paul writes the love that Christ had for us can be reflected and imitated."

"We are all familiar with the call for responsible parenthood, but you can see also how important it is to be responsible in choosing one's partner for life and in preparing properly for entering marriage. Today, getting married is big business and it involves long planning, expense, worry, especially for a bride, because in this time that

often little time is given to gaining an understanding of the deeper meaning of life together. This is to be regretted, as marriage is for life not just a day. It is only beginning with the festivities of the wedding day and preparing for lifelong marriage is much more important than arranging for the wedding celebrations.

"This preparation begins, of course, in one's own home where children see and absorb the attitudes and ideas of their parents and where they experience the 'little church' of the family in daily life and living. Added to this is the influence of their friends, teachers, relatives and neighbours. This task is also shared by civil authorities who provide the housing opportunities for employment, welfare and other amenities which families need to survive and grow. We, as priests, are conscious of our responsibility and privilege in helping towards happy marriages. We too are concerned, and are ready and willing to offer help. The prayer of the couple in the Nuptial Mass is that they may be 'living witnesses to God's divine love in the world, and it is our mission to open people's minds and hearts to this idea. To achieve it they must be happy as good partners to each other and good parents to their children."

#### PRE MARRIAGE COURSES

The letter then goes on to state: "It is to assist you to prepare for this life of sharing that I am setting out guidelines for marriage preparation. For many years in this diocese we have had available the innumerable help of Pre-Marriage Courses. These are given by specially trained persons, laymen, women and priests who give of their time nobly and generously. In Waterford City these courses are held almost every month from September to July in Dungarvan, Clonmel, Carrigrohane, Gaur at least twice each year. However less than half of those getting married each year attend these courses. But from 1976 onwards the number will increase substantially through your own appreciation of the need before God to prepare well for your marriage."

"We all have noticed that the average age at which people marry has dropped and at the same time the average life-span has increased. Because of this the average couple of this generation who give of their time together in the autumn and winter of their lives. Their happiness then will depend very much on how they have grown together over the years in love and understanding."

"I am asking now that all those under eighteen years of age who wish to marry to give at least three months notice to their priest and I ask all others to give at least one month's notice. I wish this guideline to apply to all marriages due to take place as from 1st January, 1977."

"These guidelines are not offered as an obstacle to one's freedom to marry but rather as an aid to a more happy and mature marriage. They reflect the concern of the State Law which has recently restricted marriage for all under sixteen years of age and which requires the consent of parents for all under twenty-one."

"To all the wonderful families of this diocese my prayer and wish is that the Nuptial Mass may the peace of Christ ever dwell in your homes, may the angels of God protect them and may the Holy Family of Nazareth be your model and inspiration."





## TALLOW AND ROUNDABOUT NOTES

**Tallow Shows Improvement In Tidy Towns Competition**—Tallow this year, shows an improvement of seven marks on the results in the Tidy Towns Competition of 1975. Marks awarded were 102 out of a maximum total of 150. 1975 marking was 95. Here is the full explanatory listing for Tallow in the various categories of adjudication. Maximum marks in brackets. Effort 16 (25)—Again this year it is encouraging to note that community effort has continued to grow in Tallow. Many problems still remain, and these could be tackled by the committee drawing on community support and preparing a plan of work. Many of the town's problems may be tackled over a number of years if this could be done. Tallow would make progress in the competition. Tidiness 25 (35)—Litter was noted in varying amounts throughout the town. A determined effort should be made to eliminate this problem as it can seriously detract from many other good efforts. Both the creamery and the South of Ireland Petrol Depot have been very carefully presented, this is unfortunate as due to the close proximity and large size they create a very bad impression in this area of the town. The Creamery in particular would benefit from a thorough repainting. Presentation of Buildings 14 (20)—The Church of Ireland looks very sad indeed and a party to see a state of depression. Some action will have to be taken here to at least tidy up the grounds if it is to be a credit to the source of most marks. The Garda Station has been neatly and tidily presented. The two Bn's Valley Stores seem to be in a semi-decayed state and look very tatty indeed. The Old Regal Cinema too falls into this category. Rushing corrugated sheeting to cover the joining Shell Garage look very bad. For the rest, the standard of presentation of commercial premises is generally very good and the Devonshire Arms again caught the eye of the adjudicator this year. It was also heartening to see the Grove Hotel Station has been neatly and tidily presented.

**Natural Amenities (25)**—While there have been some improvements in the area of the Grotto this year, and it was noticed that the railings were partially painted, there is more room for improvement here before this area is really looking crisp—the boundary wall in particular requires repainting. The picnic area in front of the Bn's Valley Stores is very overgrown, unattractive and definitely unwelcoming the grass at least should be cut.

**Appearance of Verges Approach Roads 13 (20)**—The dumping of road materials noted last year was still to be seen this year and this practice should be discouraged in general. The verges on all the approaches require more attention. It should be remembered that work in this area will bring results—as a neat, good approach gives a first impression to the traveller. Grass planted on to me two short but beautiful poems. Otherwise, some very good presentations were noted and this effort should be continued as there are several residential areas which would benefit from more careful maintenance and a freer use of colour. The house next to Dan Delaney's and the one opposite are very attractive houses, but need a little brightening up to really set them off at their best. It is to be hoped that the level of effort which was displayed in this category can be maintained.

**NEWS FROM CAPPOQUIN AND DISTRICT**

**Tidy Towns**—Cappoquin have scored 117 this year an increase of two on last year. There will be some disappointment with the results of the intensive summer campaign which was carried through. Nevertheless the report is objective and useful and it clearly emerges that Tidy Town activities must be an all year round affair and not merely a summer activity. Very obviously this year's judging was carried out over much of the work was done.

Effort (35)—Awarded 30

There has been another good effort here this year and the result is a tidy presentation. It was encouraging to note that many of the commercial properties had really put their best foot forward and some outstanding examples were seen. However, a greater community effort and a more co-ordinated plan of work will be required in the coming years to reach the standards that have been set in the competition.

**Tidiness (20)**—Some litter was noted throughout the town and on the approaches and the effort should be made to eliminate this problem entirely as it can seriously detract from many other good efforts. Derelict buildings continued to be a problem and it is particularly sad to see the fine stonework falling into disrepair. If a plan of work were drawn up these could be tackled over a number of years and in the meantime, perhaps remedial action could be taken such as painting, whitewashing and whitewashing. The open areas around the Bacon Factory are a big disappointment and the grass should be taken care of. The town proper and here too a determined effort is required to eliminate dumping and keep the grass clipped.

**Presentations of Buildings (20)**—The Church of Ireland was well maintained and neatly presented. The schools were also well presented but a little more attention to the boundaries would bring results. The Garda station was indifferent presented and requires further attention. The houses on the estate entrance looked well but the road surfacing here is very bad and perhaps the local Authority could help here. The standard of presentation of commercial premises was very high and some of the shopfronts look very attractive indeed. However, the unattractive and unsuitable plastic lettering and advertising hoardings should be guarded against in future. It was sad to note that the quality of nearby commercial premises was not of the same standard.

**Presentation of Natural Amenities (25)**—In general the use of small open spaces throughout the village was good and the landscaped area near the junction has been carefully thought out. However, it has not been maintained and grass and weeds were noted growing through the paving. The open space fronting the playing fields was tidy but desolate and some thought should be given to enlivening this area perhaps with the use of planting and flowers. The wall also along the road should be painted it would look much better.

**Appearance of Approach Roads (20)**—The standard of presentation of approach roads was generally fair but litter detracted from the overall appearance. The weeds and grass growing on the bridge should be removed. It was good to note that the village were generally free of weeds and grass.

**Presentation and Appearance of Residential Areas (20)**—The general standard of presentation was good and the cul-de-sac leading up the hill looked particularly well. Several houses were particularly good and caught the eye. The overall impression was however that several houses throughout the town were in need of more redecoration and a greater use of colour.

**Presentation of Street Furniture (15)**—All the water pumps looked scruffy and need repainting. Some litter bins fell into the same category and these too should be repainted. Several road signs were grimy and these were cleaned and if necessary repainted.

**Best Traditional Shopfront**—The shopfronts were particularly good and were noted the best being Lincoln, Colender, The Central Bar, Walshes Hotel, Murray's M Byrne, Fennells.

**Cappoquin Maera**—At our last meeting the Proficiency Courses to be held within the club were being planned. 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**MAN TAKES Behind the**

**ON THE BALL**

It was the spotlight of this week in recent weeks were discussed publicly at meetings of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday.

Our reference to the complaints by local residents of the terrible rat infestation at the Causeway and Strandside South Abbey was taken up by Cllr Billy Cotter at the Urban Council Both he and Deputy Tom Kyne backed the complaints stating that there was such a plague of rodents in the locality that people were literally afraid to walk there especially after dark.

The Town Engineer accepted the fact that the complaints were genuine but admitted that the poison which was used by the Council in the Causeway areas once a week did not effectively reduce the numbers. As he stated, when one lot of rats was killed off another lot just came along.

The only solution would appear to be an intensifying of the poison-laying operation and the removal of any food left lying around the area on which rats might be able to feed.

The second item was the problem of derelict sites which we spotlighted last week. This was taken up by Cllr Tom Healy, Tramore, of the County Council meeting also on Monday. He said that as a Councillor he felt ashamed at the big number of derelict sites which were to be seen all over the county. He added that it was about time that the Council had "a real go" at removing these ugly eyesores.

The County Engineer referred to a survey and estimate for demolition which had been carried out some years ago and thought that a first step this survey with costings should now be updated.

The Council approved and hopefully something will be done on this occasion to either totally shift, repair or clean-up those old derelict buildings and sites and help to remove the tattered and worn look which they give to the localities where they are present.

**IN PRAISE OF CO-OPERATION**

Now that the calamitous bank strike is over and trade is beginning to return to normal, the business houses and traders who accumulated large volumes of cheques during the period of the strike will be saying a few silent prayers that there will be a minimum of "bouncers". They will know how good a how bad the position is this week as the accounts have now been balanced out by the banks.

Business concerns will also remember with satisfaction that many companies who continued to operate normally trading practices during the strike nor will they forget the exceptions who insisted on being paid with negotiable cheques or cash.

A specific word of praise is due to the business houses in Dungarvan and other places whose trading practices were cash turn-overs and who were so helpful in cashing cheques to provide money for other firms who did not have sufficient cash intake to meet their requirements and also for the hundreds of individuals whom they obliged by cashing pay cheques. Without their co-operation it would, at times, have been almost impossible to carry on.

On behalf of all those whom they obliged in this way over the two months of the strike I say thank you, to these people. They displayed a wonderful spirit of community co-operation and acted in a most responsible way in helping out by becoming "bankers" who could be relied upon while the doors of the official banks remained closed.
