## MAN TAKES YOU BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

### ON THE BALL

Persons on which we have focused the spotlight of this column in recent weeks were mentioned publicly at meetings of the Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday.

Our reference to the complaints of local residents of the Causeway and Strandside South in the past week was taken up by Mr. Billy Cotter at the night's meeting of the Urban Council. Both he and Deputy Tom Kyne backed up the complaints stating that there was such a plague of rats in the locality that people were literally afraid to walk there especially after dark.

The Town Engineer accepted the fact that the complaints were genuine but admitted that the poison which council workmen laid in the affected areas once a week does not effectively reduce the numbers. As he stated, when a lot of rats was killed off another lot just came along.

The only solution would appear to be an intensifying of the poison-laying operation and the removal of any food left lying around the area on which rats might be able to feed.

The second item was the problem of derelict sites which we spotlighted last week. This was taken up by the Town Engineer, Mr. Tom Healy, on Monday. He said that as a Councillor he felt alarmed at the big number of derelict sites which were to be seen all over the county. He added that it was about time that the Council had "a real go" at removing these ugly eyesores.

The County Engineer referred to a survey and estimate for demolition which had been carried out some years ago and thought that as a first step this survey with findings should now be updated.

The Council approved and hopefully something will be done on this occasion to either totally shift, repair or clean up those old derelict buildings and sites and help to remove the tattered and worn look which they give to the localities where they at present exist.

### IN PRAISE OF CO-OPERATION

Now that the calamitous bank strike is over and trade is beginning to return to normal, the business houses and traders who accumulated large volumes of cheques during the period of the strike will be saying a few silent prayers that there will be a minimum of "bouncers". They will know how good or how bad the position is this week as the accounts have now been balanced out by the banks.

Business concerns will also remember with satisfaction the many companies who continued to operate normal trading practices during the strike nor will they forget the exceptions who insisted on being paid with negotiable cheques or cash.

A special word of praise is due to the business houses in Dungarvan and other places whose trading brings them cash turn-overs and who were so helpful in cashing cheques to provide money for other firms who did not have a sufficient cash intake to meet their requirements and also for the hundreds of individuals whom they obliged by cashing pay cheques. Without their co-operation it would, at times, have been almost impossible to carry on.

On behalf of all those whom they obliged in this way over the two months of the strike I say thank you to these people who displayed a wonderful spirit of community co-operation and acted in a most responsible way in helping out by becoming "bankers" who could be relied upon while the doors of the official banks remained closed.

### THE PROVINCIAL PRESS

Writing on the above subject in "Ireland To-day" (the Bulletin of the Department of Foreign Affairs), Mr. W. P. O'Hanlon, President of the Provincial Newspapers Association, refers to the financial difficulties which many local newspapers are at present experiencing in trying to counteract rising costs of production. He points out that in addition to this problem they also have the burden of VAT to bear and states "Since VAT was introduced in Ireland in 1972, taxation on newspaper sales has almost doubled at 10% the rate of VAT on newspapers in Ireland is by far the highest in any EEC country".

In all there are about 46 provincial newspapers published weekly in the country with a total circulation in excess of 550,000. The comprehensiveness of this cover is illustrated by the fact that this circulation is greater than the number of dwellings in the country outside of the greater Dublin area and Cork city.

Mr. O'Hanlon describes the role of the local paper as follows: "It provides a valuable vehicle of communication between those governing and the governed. Through the local newspaper the Dail and Local Government representatives get very full coverage of their activities and views. The meetings and decisions of the local authorities are reported regularly and their functions and powers explained."

"The real value of this service, so necessary in any parliamentary democracy, is best appreciated by those public representatives in Dublin who have no community newspapers through which they can make themselves and their views known to their constituents. They envy their country colleagues this intimate and concerned press, not only for what it does for them in the normal reporting function, but also because it provides them with a guide to public opinion."

"Important as the local newspaper is to the functioning of national and local politics and political parties it is only one of the many facets of community life which it reflects, reports and pictures the whole activities of the area are covered with local news reports, articles of general interest and comment as well as advertisements. Thus does the local newspaper reflect and interpret its community, allowing it to see itself as it is and in a format that is an unalterable and permanent record."

In a nutshell Mr. O'Hanlon states "Each provincial newspaper is a community newspaper and its function is to report, inform, reflect, sometimes to lead but always to serve its community."

I think that we in the "Dungarvan Leader", small and all as we are, conform to this specification pretty well.

Since compiling the foregoing, Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night unanimously adopted a resolution from Mideleton Urban Council calling on the Minister for Finance to remove VAT from newspapers. It is a welcome gesture whatever the outcome will be.

### COMPLAINTS ABOUT RAT INFESTATION

Mr. W. Cotter at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night said that the Causeway and Strandside South in Abbeyside was at present infested with rats and he asked that the affected areas be laid with poison to deal with them. He pointed out that this matter had been mentioned in one of the local papers (the "Leader") and it was correct to say that people were afraid to walk in the area after dark.

The Town Engineer agreed that large numbers of rats had appeared in the area but he said that poison was being laid there once a week in an effort to control them. However, it appeared that when one lot was killed off another lot came along. Food being dumped in the locality and grain droppings from passing lorries seemed to be the attraction for the rats.

Mr. T. Kyne T.D. said that he believed that there was a terrible plague of rats in the area and people were literally afraid to pass along there at night.

Mr. D. Goode said that he would blame C.I.E. because the old house at the level crossing there had been allowed to become a derelict building. If C.I.E. had done this job properly in negotiating the sale of the line to the County Council this would never have happened. He added that the buildings at the old station had also been allowed to go derelict with the same result. "The place over there is like Mons now," he said.

It was agreed to continue laying poison in the infested areas.

### DRIVE AGAINST DERELICT SITES IN COUNTY

A matter which has been referred to previously was again raised at a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday when Cllr. F. King drew attention to a derelict fish house at Passage East and asked what was being done about it. He said that it was a danger, a health hazard as it was infested with rats and a horrible sight. He urged that if the owners did not look after it that the Council should acquire it and either demolish or repair it.

Mr. J. D. Hally County Engineer said that while he agreed that the building was unsightly in its present condition he thought it a bit of a feature in the village and he would rather see it put into proper repair than knocked down.

Senator A. Deasy said that the County Engineer must surely be joking when he said this. This old fish house was nothing but a derelict site which should be demolished.

Mr. Hally said that he would look into the matter and report to the next meeting in a month's time.

### HAVE A REAL GO

Cllr. T. Healy said that there was an enormous number of derelict sites all over the county. They were ugly and took from the tourist amenities of the county.

"I wonder" he said "is there any way we can deal with this problem I think we should have a real go at having them removed as a County Councilor."

PENSMAN TAKES behind the ANYTHING LESS WILL BE DISASTROUS

In the light of events which have taken place off the coast of Co. Waterford last week when two huge trawlers, one Bulgarian and one Russian, which were, in fact, factory ships moving with a big fleet of trawlers from those countries operating off the coast were captured for fishing within the present fishery limits, the discussion which took place at the September monthly meeting of the County Council, as reported in the last issue of the "Leader," was very much to the point.

These foreigners have acted in a most unscrupulous way, tearing through spawning beds, destroying fish stocks and showing absolutely no consideration for conservation in any shape or form. They have shown scant attention either to the existing international laws which lay down an exclusive six-mile limit around the Irish coast with an outer six-mile zone for five EEC countries and whenever they have found it possible to elude our fishery protection vessels they have come in practically to the beaches. For all these reasons the cardinal error is being caught in the act. Following the recent proposals of the EEC Commission to limit Ireland to a 12-mile fishery zone there has been an outcry from the Irish Fishermen's Organisation backed up by the Irish Fish Producers' Organisation and others against the proposal and calling for a 50-mile exclusive zone. The arrest of the two giant trawlers last week has greatly strengthened this demand and gained support for it all over the country. This support has, however, not been shared by the government, who have been more inclined, up to this, to accept the EEC proposals to limit the zone to 12 miles and to operate the scheme on a quota basis.

Now, however, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Dr Fitzgerald looks like being forced to stand his ground in Ireland's demand for a 50-mile exclusive limit against the trawlers of all nations with the crucial meeting of the EEC Council of Ministers fixed for Brussels in ten days time. He can well find himself with no other option but to go all out for the 50-mile limit whatever his private feelings may be on achieving success in this endeavour. The mood of Ireland's 6,000 fishermen at the moment is such that they would be totally opposed to the idea of quotas and nothing less than the 50-mile limit will be acceptable to them. Anything less could well prove disastrous for our fishing industry.

A DANGER POINT More than once we have drawn attention to the dangers which exist, particularly for pedestrians, at the junction of Strandside (North or South) and Sexton Street or Abbeyside. People crossing the road at this point, especially elderly people, literally take their lives in their hands, and are in constant danger of being knocked down. The same danger exists for the many school children who have to negotiate the crossing several times each day through the week. Much of the blame, without doubt, for this situation must rest with the motorists. Despite the fact that the junction is within a 30-mile speed zone, cars are driven well
