PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

ANYTHING LESS WILL BE DISASTROUS

In the light of events which have taken place off the coast of Co. Waterford last week when two huge trawlers, one Bulgarian and one Russian, which were, in fact, factory ships moving with a big fleet of haulers from those countries operating off the coast were captured for fishing within the present fishery limits, the discussion which took place at the September monthly meeting of the County Council, as reported in the last issue of the "Leader", was very much to the point.

In the course of that discussion Senator Deasy very correctly referred to the activities of these and other foreign trawlers which have grossly overfished the once-rich fishing grounds around the coast of Ireland in which, as he said, "they have swept everything away by trawling off the bottom and using the smallest possible mesh in their nets."

These foreigners have acted in a most unscrupulous way, tearing through spawning beds, destroying fish stocks and showing absolutely no consideration for conservation in any shape or form. They have shown scant attention either to the existing international laws which lay down an exclusive six-mile limit around the Irish coast with an outer six-mile zone for five EEC countries and whenever they have found it possible to elude our fishery protection vessels they have come in practically to the beaches for all these raiders the cardinal error is being caught in the act.

Following the recent proposals of the EEC Commission to limit Ireland to a 12-mile fishery zone there has been an outcry from the Irish Fishermen's Organisation backed up by the Irish Fish Producers' Organisation and others against the proposal and calling for a 50-mile exclusive zone. The arrest of the two giant trawlers last week has greatly strengthened this demand and gained support for it all over the country. This support has, however, not been shared by the government, who have been more inclined, up to this, to accept the EEC proposals to limit the zone to 12 miles and to operate the scheme on a quota basis.

Now, however, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Dr. Fitzgerald looks like being forced to stand his ground in Ireland's demand for a 50-mile exclusive limit against the trawlers of all nations. With the crucial meeting of the EEC Council of Ministers fixed for Brussels in ten days time he can well find himself with no other option but to go all-out for the 50-mile limit, whatever his private feelings may be on achieving success in this endeavour. The mood of Ireland's 6,000 fishermen at the moment is such that they would be totally opposed to the idea of quotas and that nothing less than the 50-mile limit will be acceptable to them. Anything less could well prove disastrous for our fishing industry.

A DANGER POINT

More than once we have drawn attention to the dangers which exist, particularly for pedestrians, at the junction of Strandside (North and South) and Sexton Street at Abbeyde People crossing the road at this point, especially elderly people, literally take their lives in their hands, and are in constant danger of being knocked down. The same danger exists for the many school children who have to negotiate the crossing several times each day through the week.

Much of the blame, without doubt, for this situation must rest with the motorists. Despite the fact that the junction is within a 30-mile speed zone cars are driven well in

excess of this speed along the Waterford and Dungarvan road. The majority of drivers pay no attention to the speed limit signs which should be clearly visible to all along both approaches to the junction. The heavy concentration of parked cars, often two and three abreast at times, in the vicinity of the junction also adds to the dangers.

With the winter almost upon us, deteriorating weather conditions and long dark evenings will make matters worse. It has been suggested by a local resident in the area that the erection of "slow" signs, especially on the Waterford and Dungarvan approaches, would be a help. Perhaps the road authorities could come up with a better suggestion.

She writes that if such houses could be made available for this purpose they would be kept aired and saved from complete dereliction and the owners would receive some compensation by way of a small rent. She suggests that volunteers could be sought to make the houses ready and to carry out minor repairs.

The letter goes on: "The families housed would gain from the pleasant countryside and be near schools, etc. The towns and villages would gain from the improved appearance of such houses and the shops from the extra custom while the owners of the houses would have their property preserved."

The writer concludes her letter by stating: "It may not be feasible but it's a thought." I agree.

NEW ABBOT INSTALLED AT MOUNT MELLERAY

In a movingly impressive 90 minute ceremony, the Abbatial Blessing of Rev. Dom Edward Ducey O.C.S.O., the newly elected tenth Abbot of the Cistercian Monastery at Mount Mellerey in County Waterford, was performed by His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. Michael Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, at the Abbey on Wednesday, September 29.

Dr. Russell was the chief celebrant of Concelebrated Mass and the other concelebrants included His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. J. Ahearne, Bishop of Cloyne together with the Abbots of the other Irish Cistercian houses, the community at Mt. Mellerey and many other diocesan clergy.

After the reading of the Gospel the Abbot-elect came before Dr. Russell accompanied by two of his monks. Having assured himself about the regularity of the Abbot's election and worthiness, Dr. Russell addressed the packed congregation.

"The role of Abbot Ducey in life will be to lead his community here at Mellerey in a life of God," Dr. Russell said.

MOMENTOUS OCCASION

Describing the occasion as "a momentous one," Dr. Russell recalled how over the 143 years many thousands of people had come to Mount Mellerey to find peace, reconciliation, faith strength and the joys of life. Addressing Abbot Ducey His Lordship said "You are the second Ducey to whom Christ has given the office of Abbot (Rev. Dom Enda Ducey, Abbot of Mellerey Abbey is a brother of the newly elected Abbot), and the spirit that imbued you to become a priest did not come from you alone but from your family also. I hope that you will always be the forerunner of mercy and joy in this Abbey here in Mellerey."

OLD SCHOOL IN RING BURNED OUT

The old National School in Ring which was a landmark in the area for many decades was burned out in a fire which swept through the old building in the early hours of last Sunday morning leaving little beyond the four walls standing. The building was occupied by Mr. Anthony Dunne a Dungarvan man, who carried on a small furniture making business there. Last year there was a great deal of controversy in the parish when a lease for the use of the premises was granted to Mr. Dunne. Padlocks were placed on the doors and windows in an effort to prevent Mr. Dunne and his employees gaining access to the building but these were removed under Garda supervision and no incidents occurred since.

MILK ROUNDSMAN

The fire was first noticed at 6 a.m. by a milk roundsman who raised the alarm. However, the fire was so intense that it was virtually isolated the area and local Garda Sgt. D. Lucey and telephone exchange operator Mr. Jimmy Walsh had to drive the six miles to Dungarvan to alert the fire brigade. The brigade was on the scene within a very short time but by then the factory was a blazing inferno, and the firemen were powerless to save either building, the equipment or the contents. The unit remained at the scene until lunchtime when all that remained was the four walls.

GARDA INVESTIGATIONS

The matter was investigated by the Garda and it is understood that charges are pending.

CALL FOR TRAFFIC LIGHTS IN DUNGARVAN

For the second time in two years Dungarvan Urban Council at their September monthly meeting unanimously passed a resolution renewing the request to Waterford Co. Council to have traffic lights erected at the junction of Mary Street and the Square.

Proposing the resolution Senator A. Deasy said that they had passed a similar resolution two years ago but when it went to the Co. Council it was rejected by one vote. He thought that it was now time to go to the Co. Council again. He said that at times during the past summer there had been traffic chaos at the junction and accidents would have occurred only for the presence of gardai on duty. He said that they should press the Co. Council strongly on this occasion to accede to their request. It was pointed out that the main objections on the last occasion were the cost of erecting the lights and of maintaining them subsequently.

M. J. A. Murphy who seconded the proposal said that the decision of the Co. Council to turn down the resolution on the last occasion had been ill-advised.

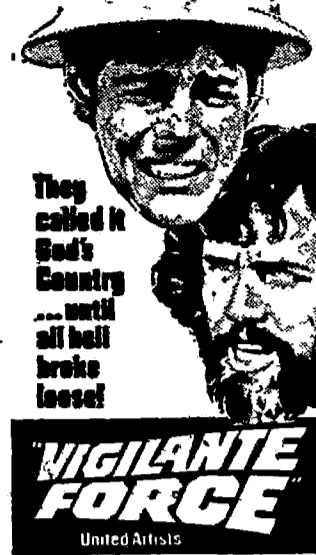
