**FISHERMAN TAKES YOU  
 behind the SPOTLIGHT**

**LITERATURE TAKES YOU  
 PROBLEM**  
 The reports of the adjudica-  
 tions on the various towns  
 and villages entered in this  
 year's Tidy Towns Competi-  
 tions showed that litter still  
 remains as big a problem as  
 ever. This has also been  
 proved by statistics recorded  
 in a recently published report  
 on the results of a student  
 research programme carried  
 out during the past summer  
 under the auspices of the  
 Tipperary Beautiful Move-  
 ment.

This survey showed that  
 the most frequently recorded  
 items of litter were sweet  
 wrappers, ice-cream wrappers  
 and sticks and metallic pieces  
 from cigarette packets  
 other than the report stated  
 that adults appeared to  
 create a peculiar double-  
 standard in that they would  
 put an ice-cream wrapper or  
 cigarette packet in a bin  
 but would throw away the  
 holder or the butt of a cigar  
 or cigarette without a second  
 thought. They also tended to  
 throw their litter by throwing  
 it over a wall, under a parked  
 car or into some convenient  
 place in an obvious "out of  
 sight out of mind" attitude  
 which was particularly applic-  
 able to the kind of litter asso-  
 ciated with "take-away" food  
 items, like plastic containers,  
 paper bags and drink cans.

In a section of the survey  
 dealing with how seriously  
 people felt about the problem  
 it was shown that married  
 people felt more strongly  
 about litter than single  
 people and that women gener-  
 ally felt more strongly about  
 it than did men.

The report did not set out  
 to criticise but rather to  
 underline the problems of  
 litter and illegal rubbish  
 dumping and to attempt to  
 influence opinion to become  
 more aware and concerned.  
 The majority interviewed  
 thought that they themselves  
 were careful about not throw-  
 ing their rubbish around  
 other people's were the main  
 cause of litter. They also  
 thought that the solution to  
 the problem lay in education,  
 particularly through schools,  
 while it was felt that local  
 authorities should do more  
 in structing and advertising it  
 was also felt that the best  
 thing the government could  
 do about the problem was to  
 pass legislation making it an  
 offence to cause litter.

Unfortunately I believe that  
 the real solution lies in the  
 latter suggestion as past ex-  
 perience has shown, not only  
 in Dungarvan where the local  
 Junior Chamber has mounted  
 several anti-litter campaigns,  
 but also in most other towns,  
 that appeals have had little  
 or no effect. It is a sad com-  
 mentary on the lack of civic  
 sense shown by the public in  
 general that we should find  
 it necessary to say that en-  
 forcement by law would  
 appear to be the only way by  
 which we can rid ourselves of  
 litter and of the "dirty Ire-  
 land" epithet by which we  
 have been dubbed by many of  
 the foreign tourists, particu-  
 larly continentalists who visit but  
 otherwise beautiful country.

**NEW DESIGN FOR IRISH  
 FIVERS**  
 The newly designed Irish  
 25 note will come into circula-  
 tion on Monday, Novem-  
 ber 1. It will, in size, be  
 approximately a sixth smaller  
 than the present note.  
 The front of the note will  
 feature a portrait of the Irish  
 philosopher Don Scotus Eriug-  
 ana, together with the  
 initial letter A of Psalm 17 in  
 the Psalter of Rímacarum.  
 The back will bear an extract  
 of the script and animal  
 illustration from the Book of  
 Kells. A particular feature of  
 the new note will be the clear  
 watermark which will show a  
 female head adapted from the  
 portrait by Sir John  
 Lavery, specially designed for  
 the first issue of Irish legal  
 tender notes in 1928.  
 Over a phased period in the  
 next few years new notes in

the other denominations of  
 £1, £10, £20 and £100 will  
 also be introduced.

## Cappoquin Priest Is New Vice-President At Maynooth

Fr Michael Oiden, Professor  
 of Ecclesiastical History has  
 been appointed Vice-President  
 of St. Patrick's College, May-  
 nooth in succession to the Most  
 Rev. Kevin McNamara, Bishop-  
 Elect of Kerry. He becomes one  
 of the Vice-Presidents of the  
 College the other is Fr Liam  
 Ryan, Professor of Sociology.

Fr Oiden was born in Cappo-  
 quin in 1935 and was educated  
 at Mt. Mellary College and  
 University College, Cork, where  
 he took his BA with first-class  
 honours in 1957 and was awarded  
 the B.D. degree in 1969 and was  
 ordained there in 1960. At the  
 Gregorian University in Rome  
 1971

He was awarded a doctorate in  
 ecclesiastical history in 1965.  
 Two new Lecturers in Dog-  
 matic Theology have been ap-  
 pointed. One is Fr Thomas  
 Marsh, St. John's College, Water-  
 ford. Fr Marsh was born in  
 Ardara and was educated at  
 Mt. Mellary College and May-  
 nooth where he was ordained  
 in 1957. He later studied in  
 Rome and Cambridge and was  
 Curate at Beckenham, Kent for  
 a year before being appointed  
 Professor of Fundamental Theol-  
 ogy at St. John's College,  
 Waterford in 1969.  
 He has been a member of the  
 Theology Commission of the  
 Irish Bishops Conference since  
 1971.

**COUNTY COUNCIL  
 WANTS FULL TIME  
 DEVELOPMENT  
 OFFICER**  
 Citing the industrially starv-  
 ed West Waterford region in  
 support of the Minister for  
 the appointment of a full time  
 County Development Officer  
 and County Development Team,  
 members of Waterford County  
 Council at a meeting in Dun-  
 garvan last Monday expressed  
 fears that in the future the  
 I.D. may be Dublin orientated  
 in the field of new job creation  
 at the expense of the provinces.  
 Mr. Tom Healy who tabled a  
 notice of motion asking that  
 he be finally opted for a position  
 of County Development Officer  
 be made full time together with  
 the setting up of a county devel-  
 opment team, said there was  
 little unemployment in every  
 area of the county at present  
 but particularly so in the west-  
 ern region. By having a full  
 time County Development Of-  
 ficer he felt they would be able  
 to procure some new and badly  
 needed industries.

Mr. Healy referred to a recent  
 statement by the Minister for  
 Labour who spoke of "the im-  
 balance in the unemployment  
 situation" in Dublin and said  
 that he would be happy to  
 address it "From that Minis-  
 terial pronouncement" Mr.  
 Healy continued "I can see a  
 situation arising whereby all  
 the new jobs will be directed  
 towards Dublin at the expense  
 of everywhere else in the  
 country.  
 In supporting the motion, Mr.  
 Jackie Fahey TD said he  
 had been advocating such an  
 appointment for some time  
 past. He had seen the tremen-  
 dous unemployment in the  
 South Tipperary Development  
 Officer and Team but West Wa-  
 terford, with the exception of  
 Dungarvan had been starved  
 of industry over the years.  
 Deputy Fahey revealed that  
 an industrialist interested in  
 setting up a plant in Waterford  
 had been refused a location  
 in South Tipperary because of  
 the assistance and co-operation  
 afforded him by the Develop-  
 ment Team there. It is deplo-  
 rable that we should be doing  
 badly needed industry like this,"  
 he said "and the money in-  
 volved in the appointment of  
 a full time county development  
 officer would be well spent."

**CRYING OUT FOR INDUSTRY**  
 Mr. Jim Quirk said that as  
 a public representative from the  
 County Council he was a  
 "unreservedly support such an  
 appointment. The whole west-  
 ern region has been crying out  
 for industry" he said.  
 Mr. Frankie King said it was  
 a fact that people who had tried  
 to establish small industries  
 had been thwarted by bureau-  
 cracy, while the Chairman Mr.  
 Charles Curran claimed that  
 he knew of one industrialist  
 who had received no encourage-  
 ment whatever when he expres-  
 sed an interest in setting up  
 an industry in County Water-  
 ford.

Mr. Norman Walsh said the  
 tragedy of the industrially  
 starved West Waterford region  
 was that industry would go  
 invariably to the places where  
 the most money was there.  
 Mr. Charles O'Connor County  
 Manager said it would be  
 wrong to say that they hadn't  
 tried to encourage industry in  
 the county. He would also hate  
 members to feel that once a  
 full time county development  
 officer was appointed all their  
 industrial problems would be  
 solved. He personally would  
 prefer that they continued with  
 their part-time officer and when  
 he was convinced of the need  
 for a full time appointment he  
 would recommend it to the  
 Council.  
 Deputy Fahey—Now is the  
 time to make the appointment.  
 We will see the fruits of it in  
 a few years.  
 Finally the meeting decided  
 unanimously in favour of ap-  
 pointing a full time appoint-  
 ment and the Manager intimated  
 that provision would be made  
 for the post in the forthcoming  
 estimates while members con-  
 sidered the matter. The meeting  
 then decided for or against put-  
 ting up the necessary money

**LISMORE TOWN  
 RATE DECREASE**  
 At the estimates meeting of  
 Lismore Town Commissioners a  
 rate of 11 6/10 a decrease of 1  
 1/2 p over the current figure,  
 was struck. The County Man-  
 ager, Mr. C. A. O'Connor told the  
 members that the fall was a  
 result of an increase in the  
 valuation figure. Receipts were  
 estimated at £378 and the  
 amount to be demanded was  
 £450.

In reply to queries from mem-  
 bers regarding revised valua-  
 tions in the area the Manager  
 said that these were carried out  
 by an independent body and  
 householders affected could al-  
 ways appeal.  
 When members stressed the  
 need for additional public lights  
 the Manager said that this  
 would depend very much on the  
 demand facing the County  
 Council when the rate had to be  
 struck.  
 The Manager told Mr. Dowd  
 that the matter of derelict sites  
 in Church Street would be  
 dealt with in the light of the  
 overall county situation.
