MAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

There has been widespread in the press and at public meetings of local level in recent months about the manner in which health services, based at the District Hospital in Dungarvan, have been downgraded. Public representatives of different political colours have all spoken with one voice con- demning the Regional Health Board as being responsible for the position. The Board's response to the accusations are published elsewhere in this issue.

Whatever the intentions of the Board's Administration are now, there can be little doubt that, for whatever reason, the various health services which had been available in Dungarvan through the years were being allowed to run out. Despite the public clamour for a casualty service, particularly at week-ends, it has never been provided, existing proposals allow for the future for the maternity unit at the District Hospital while there have also been changes in the transport service for patients from Dun- garvan and West Waterford who must travel to Dublin hospitals or clinics.

Latest development in the phase out has been the almost total disappearance of the senior staff officers from the administrative headquar- ters at Arus Brugha in Dun- garvan up to this a number of the senior staff were in regular attendance here and usually able to have their queries dealt with without any undue delay. Now even these have gone, and if not entirely, they are absent on duty elsewhere for most days each week.

As a result public repre- sentatives are once more up arms as they find it in- creasingly difficult, if not impossible, to make representa- tions or to obtain adequate and speedy replies to the enquiries they make. This was one of the points pressed by deputation from the County Council which attended a re- cent meeting of the Regional Health Board in Kilkenny and the officials have now come back with an offer that a senior member of the adminis- trative staff would be avail- able in Dungarvan "on meet- ing days of the Council, Com- mittee of Agriculture and Library Committee for the convenience of public repre- sentatives".

This response will hardly be accepted as adequate. The move towards centralisation and bureaucratic control con- tinues and this means that contact at local level, in other words, with the public in general and with those they have elected to represent them is fast disappearing. It is sad that such moves should be allowed continue. The County Council at their last meeting called for the aboli- tion of the Regional Health

Health Board states case for Dungarvan

The claim by several public representatives made in recent months that health services in Dungarvan were being designed- ly downgraded by the Regional Health Board were again acti- vated at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night when Cllr D. Goode submitted a report from the Board to the monthly Committee for Waterford at their meeting held on the pre- vious Friday night.

Cllr Goode said that the re- port (which was in fact a re- sponse to points raised by a meeting of the Board) had been submitted to the Health Com- mittee (of which he is a mem- ber) and he handed it in with a request that he be kept for the information of the members of the Urban Council.

The report was then read by the Town Clerk, Mr. B. White as follows: (1) Future of Dungarvan District Hospital - The General Hospitals Development Pro- gramme adopted by the Board in 1973 stated as follows: "The present district hospital is scarcely adequate for the needs of a growing town and the West Waterford area. Nor does the building lend itself to development into a commu- nity hospital of the type which would be needed. It is suggested therefore that, in association with the Home for the Aged planned, a community hospital be designed to meet the needs of the area. This would include an X-Ray Department and facilities for Out-Patient Clinics con- ducted by visiting consultants from the main district hospitals."

The Board is still of the view that Dungarvan District Hos- pital should be considered for re-classification as a community hospital, as described in the discussion document on the role of smaller hospitals issued by Comhairle na nOspidéal. (2) Dental Service in Dun- garvan - The late Dr. Michael McCarthy worked 5 days each week in Dungarvan. The services were arranged as follows: Dr. Eleanor Power now works full time for 4 days weekly in Dungarvan and one day a week in Lismore. On the day Dr. Liam Morrissey from Waterford holds both morning and after- noon sessions in Dungarvan (in- cluding general anaesthetic cases). Interviews have recently been held for the post of Senior Dental Officer for the Waterford area and a recommendation is expected soon.

(3) Physiotherapy Services in Dungarvan - This is provided on a seasonal basis from Ardkeen Hospital where there is a com- plement of four physiothera- pists to serve in-patients and out-patients following a resig- nation earlier this year which reduced the staff to three when holidays became due it became necessary to suspend tempora- rily the service to Dungarvan but it was resumed in September. However, one of the three staff has now gone on maternity leave, reducing the staff to two and it has accordingly been necessary to suspend the Dun- garvan service again last week. Continuous efforts to recruit temporary staff have been made without success. The most recent advertisement on Sun- day last has produced a number of enquiries and it is hoped to employ two temporary physio- therapists at an early date and to resume the service to Dun- garvan without delay.

While the District Hospital at Dungarvan cannot provide a casualty service, persons pre- sented at the hospital needing an urgent service which the nurses can give, e.g. dressing cuts, etc., will not be turned away. However, the nurses can- not provide a diagnostic service and while rendering first-aid if it is required, will advise patients to seek medical atten- tion as soon as possible.

(4) General Practitioner Ser- vice in Dungarvan - There are now six doctors in general prac- tice in Dungarvan. Where a doc- tor is off duty on casual, week- end, annual or sick leave it is his responsibility to provide a sub- stitute in general practice. Any instance where such an ar- rangement is not made will be investigated if reported to the Board.

(5) Need for a Proper Materni- ty Unit in Dungarvan - There is a 4-bed maternity unit at the District Hospital, Dungarvan and in recent years the number of births has been fairly con- stant at around 150. In pur- suance of its General Hospitals Development Programme which envisages that eventually ma- ternity services would be pro- vided in general hospitals with consultant staffing the Board has approved of the planning of a new maternity/gynaecology/paediatric unit at Ardkeen as its number one priority pro- ject. A considerable amount of planning has already been done but nonetheless it is likely to be several years before such a building will be in ser- vice.

In the light of this project there is little prospect of any further development of materni- ty services in Dungarvan. Transport arrangements for West Waterford - There is no change in the service for West Waterford for patients who for medical reasons must travel by ambulance or in the transport service for patients who do not require an ambu- lance.

The only change is in the ar- rangements for patients from the County who must travel to Dublin hospitals or clinics. The ambulance service to Dublin via Waterford has now been re- placed by Dungarvan travel to Waterford, travel by train to Dublin by special arrangement with CIE and transfer from Heuston Station to the hospi- tals in Dublin. This arrange- ment is now operating since 5th August and it is considered that more comfortable travel by train more than offsets what- ever inconvenience is caused by patients being away for a longer day.

The emergency ambulance service in West Waterford is controlled from St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan. Normal patient transport services for the county is co-ordinated from Ardkeen Hospital but arrange- ments can be made through St. Joseph's Hospital where there is close liaison with Ardkeen.

(6) Administration - An in- formation service on health and welfare services is provided at the local Community Care Office. Any enquiries regarding medical cards, eligibility, etc., are attended to by the staff. Arrangements have been made for a senior member of the administrative staff to be available on the meeting days of the County Council, the County Committee of Agriculture and the Library Committee for the convenience of public representatives.

Nothing but frustration Senator Deasy resorted to in the last paragraph of the report said that the setting up of the information service had been a concession which resulted from the Co. Council's decision. Prior to that he said that the senior staff of the Board had almost all been transferred to Waterford with the result that there was nothing but frustra- tion for people who went to Arus Brugha for information and there had been absolutely

no satisfaction in regard to inquiries made about medical cards and such things. Senator Deasy said that al- locating one senior official to Dungarvan on the days of Co. Council meetings to deal with inquiries by members of the Council was ridiculous. As things were now the Health Board might just as well be up in the North Pole as in Kil- kenny. It was the public who were suffering as a result and that was the reason why he had called for the abolition of the Health Boards at the last Co. Council meeting.

Deputy Byrne agreed and said that there was nothing but frustration for everyone in the present set-up. He had to wait as long as six months in some cases where he had made in- quiries about medical cards. "This was far too long" he said.

Cllr T. Wade said that in regard to granting medical cards he felt there was too much politics. "If you're politics are right you'll get one" he said.

Cllr P. Whelan felt that the whole system was now wrong as people didn't know what they had to do when going to clinics. All this now came from Waterford and they had to wait to be told. "The people just don't know what's happen- ing," he said.

Senator Deasy said that they wanted to see the administra- tion they had returned to Dungarvan and they wanted the control of this vital service brought back to local level. It was agreed that the report be circulated to the members and that the matters referred to be discussed more fully at next meeting.

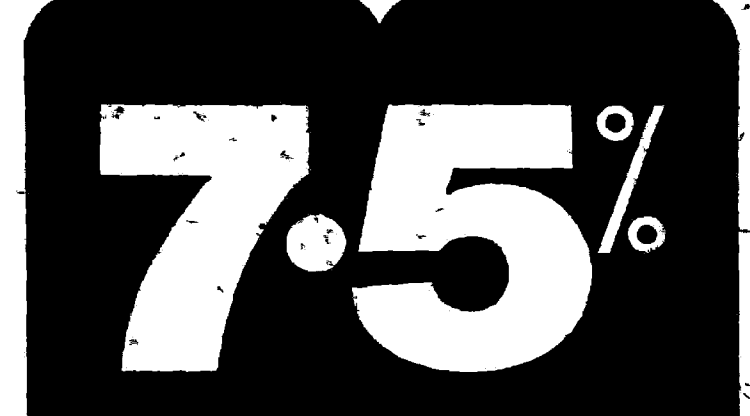

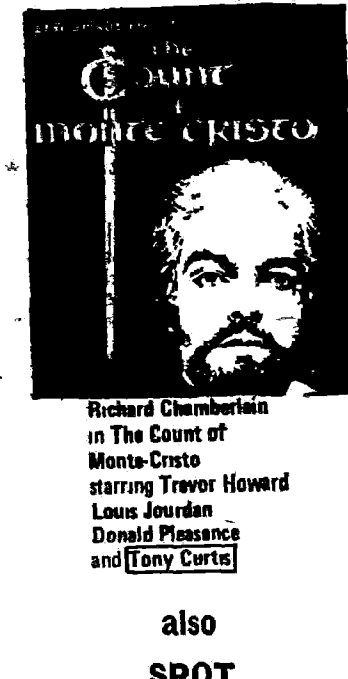

ASKED TO STATE CASE ON DRUNK DRIVING DECISION

A District Justice who acquitted a defendant on a drunk driving charge has been asked to state a case by the gardai who had not cautioned him prior to his undergoing the doctor's clinical test. The doctor's clinical test has been asked to state a case by the prosecuting Supt.

District Justice W F O'Connell dismissed the drunk driving charge at Dungarvan Court on Monday. 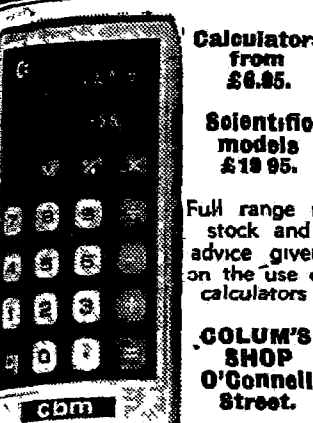

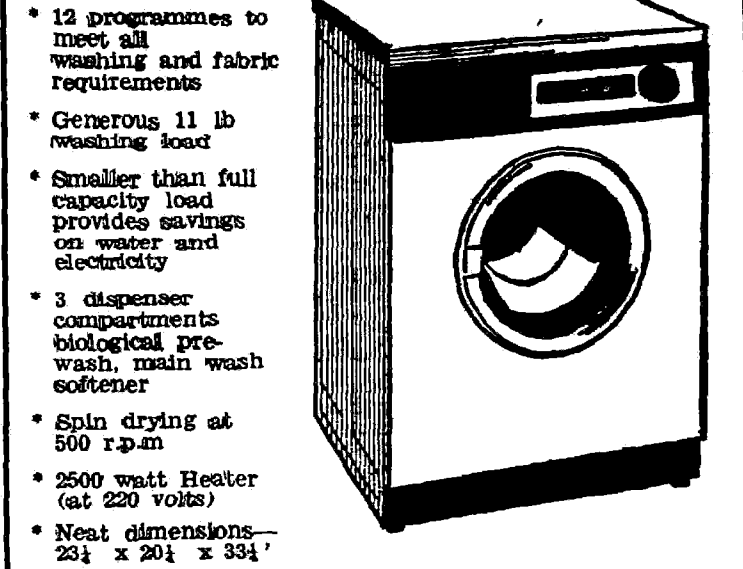

NEWSMAN TAKES 'behind the S' WITH HINDSIGHT "How that the dust has more or less settled on the major events which rocked the country last week and when President Cearbhall O'Daigh resigned following the Minister's remarks it is possible to reflect on the entire affair in a more objective manner.

Without going into detail I believe that the crisis which erupted in the President's resignation could have been avoided had it been handled properly and in the light of information which became available subsequently the fault for handling the matter wrongly must be borne by the Taoiseach, Mr. Cosgrave.

While some members of the government undoubtedly took the gravest exception both to Mr. Donagan's behaviour and the implication of his remarks, the worst aspect of the whole affair was that the Taoiseach and the government, by remaining silent, and by allowing the subsequent debate in the Dail to take place without a statement from the Defence Minister, thereby allowed themselves with the attack on the President.

During the week there have been to-ing and fro-ing in regard to the election or re-election of a new President but in the light of the happenings of last week I think it would now be opportune to consider whether it would be best for the country to scrap the office of the Presidency altogether.

At 2.30 p.m. on Monday last, 22 of the 23 members of Waterford County Council assembled at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, with the task of shinking a rate for 1977. More than three hours later the meeting ended in confusion when the frustrated Councilors, after voting no less than eleven times failed to find a proposal on which a majority could agree.
