THE COUNTY ESTIMATES

Members of Waterford County Council will meet on Monday next Monday where a detailed attempt will be made to bring a rate to cover the Council's estimated expenditure for 1977. At their first meeting in Dungarvan last Monday week the meeting ended in deadlock after more than three hours when each of no less than eleven proposals failed to secure a majority vote.

The area where disagreement centred was in the provision of additional services but the total cost of these came to a mere £65,000 which, when compared with the total overall estimated expenditure for the year of £1,612,319, is but a drop in the ocean.

The biggest single item in the estimates is the cost of the roads and of £4 68 (an increase of 59 46p over the current year) it represents nearly half of the total anticipated rate of £9 72. One of the main causes for the rise in the rate under this heading in recent years is the manner in which the government has been shedding the load on to the local authorities by reducing the grant allocations in the period 1950/1970 there was an approximate divide of 50/50, with the Department putting up an equal amount with that provided from rates in the current year the cost of the road works carried out by the County Council was borne 25% from rates and 25% from State grants. In the coming year it is assumed that the apportionment will be 76% from rates and 24% from State grants.

In this regard the Co. Manager, in his report to the Council meeting last Monday week pointed out that the 1975 ratio was to some extent a reflection of the Council's policy to maintain employment. The orientation of expenditure was towards works with a maximum labour content and as such, while desirable in themselves, would not rank in the same priority as other works with a lower labour content.

While this may explain away the rising costs it takes little account of the overall economic situation of the country. We have been told time and again over the past year that one of the greatest single factors contributing to the galloping inflation which is beginning to strangle us with ever-increasing speed is the huge rise in expenditure in the public sector. If this expenditure continues to rise in the coming year as all present indications now show then there appears to be little hope of halting the inflation rate until, apparently, the bubble will finally burst. It is, indeed, a bleak and grim outlook for the year ahead.

It is only right to point out however, that the problem is not one peculiar to Waterford as rating authorities all over the country either have or are about to strike rates which show ratios of increase similar to that in this county. Closing our eyes to the situation in the hope that the problem will disappear is certainly no solution and the government should now be well aware of that.

BLOOD TESTING AGAIN THIS MONTH

PENSMAN TAKES behind the S

A NO CONTEST PRESIDENT Last week both the United States and Ireland went through the motions of acquiring new Presidents but in a vastly different manner and for posts that bear absolutely no resemblance to each other beyond the name. In America the Democrat candidate Jimmy Carter succeeded in ousting the Republican President Gerald Ford from the White House after a close and bitterly contested election and in January he will take over in Washington to become one of the most powerful men in the world. One of the reasons given for Carter's success is that he diagnosed the American political psyche more keenly than his opponents. He reached over the heads of the Democratic Party establishment, appealed directly to the people and judged their mood perfectly. But here in Ireland we are to get a new President without a contest for the second time in succession within a few years. When the nominations for the post closed on Tuesday only the Fianna Fail nominee Dr Patrick Hillery had been nominated because the government wanted the seat and by refusing to put forward a candidate preferred to play politics rather than give the people the opportunity of voting for the man of their choice. Dr Hillery who has been very successful in Europe as our EEC Commissioner for Social Affairs should prove a most suitable incumbent of Arus An Uachtaran but in this regard the attitude of the Taoiseach, Mr Cosgrave, was the case in the recent constitutional crisis involving the Presidency, must again be criticised. He did not think Dr Hillery good enough for a second term of office in Europe but by his tacit agreement to his nomination for the Presidency he has accepted that he is an acceptable holder of the highest office in the land. But it would appear that the Taoiseach does not think a great deal of the Presidency. It is now known that during the two years tenure of the office by Cearbhall Ó Dálaigh, Mr Cosgrave visited Arus An Uachtaran only four times and the last occasion on which the Taoiseach and President met, in accordance with constitutional requirements, was in May of this year. Five months before Mr Ó Dálaigh's resignation. The Constitution requires that the Taoiseach shall keep the President generally informed on matters of domestic and international policy. Previous holders of the office of Taoiseach usually went to Arus An Uachtaran once a month. All this goes to show that politics have taken over an office which was supposed to be above politics and the manner in which it has been downgraded after the recent crisis will not now be helped by the fact that there is to be no election. No matter how good Dr Hillery may prove as President he will not be freely elected by the majority of the people. This is to be regretted.

WHERE IS THE MONEY GOING? In recent weeks I have focussed the spotlight on the inadequacies of the health services provided by the Regional Board at local level. I have also referred to the manner in which public representatives and indeed members of the public themselves have become disenchanted with the system of regional administration. The main reason for this is the manner in which the administration has become almost totally divorced from the local scene. This has become so pronounced in the eyes of the locally elected public representatives that recently we
