## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**NO CONTEST PRESIDENT**  
Last week both the United States and Ireland went through the motions of electing new Presidents but in a vastly different manner and by posts that bear absolutely no resemblance to each other beyond the name.  
In America the Democrat candidate Jimmy Carter succeeded in ousting the Republican President Gerald Ford from the White House after a close and bitterly contested election and in January he will take over in Washington to become one of the most powerful men in the world. One of the reasons given for Carter's success is that he diagnosed the American political psyche more keenly than his opponents. He reached over the heads of the Democratic Party establishment, appealed directly to the people and judged their mood perfectly.  
But here in Ireland we are to elect a new President without a contest for the second time in succession within a few years. When the nominations for the post closed on Tuesday only the Fianna Fail nominee Dr Patrick Hillery had been nominated because the government faked the issue and by refusing to put forward a candidate preferred to play politics rather than give the people the opportunity of voting for the man of their choice.  
Dr Hillery who has been very successful in Europe as our EEC Commissioner for Social Affairs should prove a most suitable incumbent at Aras An Uachtairin but in this regard the attitude of the Taoiseach Mr Cosgrave, as was the case in the recent constitutional crisis involving the Presidency, must again be criticised. He did not think Dr Hillery good enough for a second term of office in Europe but by his tacit agreement to his nomination for the Presidency he has accepted that he is an acceptable holder of the highest office in the land.  
But it would appear that the Taoiseach does not think a great deal of the Presidency. It is now known that during the two years tenure of the office by Cearbhall O Dalaigh Mr Cosgrave visited Aras An Uachtairin only four times and the last occasion on which the Taoiseach and President met, in accordance with Constitutional requirements, was in May of this year, five months before Mr O Dalaigh's resignation. The Constitution requires that the Taoiseach shall keep the President generally informed on matters of domestic and international policy.  
Previous holders of the office of Taoiseach usually went to Aras An Uachtairin once a month.  
All this goes to show that politics have taken over an office which was supposed to be above politics and in the manner in which it has been downgraded after the recent crisis will not now be helped by the fact that there is to be no election. No matter how good Dr Hillery may prove as President he will not be able to claim that he was freely elected by the majority of the people. This is to be regretted.

**WHERE IS THE MONEY GOING?**  
In recent weeks I have focused the spotlight on the inadequacies of the health services provided by the Regional Board at local level. I have also referred to the manner in which public representatives and indeed members of the public themselves have become disenchanted with the system of regional administration. The main reason for this is the manner in which the administration has become almost totally divorced from the local scene.  
This has become so pronounced in the eyes of the locally elected public representatives that recently Wa-

terford County Council passed a resolution calling for the abolition of Regional Health Boards as presently constituted and a return to the previous system of local Health Authorities.  
That there is plenty of substance in this demand, is proved, if such proof were necessary, by an editorial in the "Medical Times" which opens with the following paragraph: "When one considers the many inadequacies and gaps in our health service it is incredible to learn that we are spending more of our national income to achieve our present unsatisfactory level of care than wealthy countries like West Germany, Holland and the U.K."  
The editorial then goes on: "The inescapable conclusion would seem to be that either the funds are being misdirected, that our whole system of health priorities are wrong, or that money is being wasted by bureaucrats or the medical profession or both. Whatever the answer, and it is more likely to be a combination of all three, the facts are sobering. Not even the most complacent can feel satisfied with the present deplorable conditions of our hospital service—with its ancient buildings, outdated equipment and long waiting lists. Our treatment of the old, the dying and the mentally ill is equally shameful. Too often the elderly are still herded into institutions to await death as best they can, and the shortage of beds for terminal cases makes death with dignity difficult for many who are thrown on their already overburdened relatives."  
This is, indeed, a severe indictment of the health services which are at present being provided and which are costing a world of money where the sky certainly seems to be the limit. Surely it is more than time that the whole system as we have it at present be re-examined and re-assessed. It certainly has proved a failure if for no other reason than that value for money is not being given in the services provided.

**PUBLIC TRANSPORT IN WEST WATERFORD**  
The extent of the public transport service provided by CIE in the West Waterford area at present is very small and it would appear that plans are afoot to further reduce the limited service such as is available. If statements made in the recent past by officials of CIE are to be accepted at face value, the possibility that the Dungarvan-Fermoy-Mallow bus service is to come under the economy axe seems very much on the cards. CIE say that this service is not paying its way and as far as they are concerned this would seem to be sufficient justification for them to follow this course.  
If this service is dropped it will mean that a vast area of West Waterford as well as the adjoining areas of East Cork will have no public transport and those people who avail of the service, such as it is at present, will be left isolated. This is not good enough.  
When the Waterford-Mallow rail service was shut down some years ago, CIE gave a promise that a comparable alternative transport service would be provided. This promise was never, in fact, honoured and seems to have been made at the time, simply to get over the public protests which were made about the proposed closing of the railway line.  
The reason given for the closure of the rail service was that it was not paying its way but many felt at the time that CIE deliberately ran the service down by changing the schedules and time-tables in such a way as to make it most unsuitable. Now the closing down of the bus service from Dungarvan to Fermoy and

Mallow would seem to be presaged by the same excuse—that it is not paying its way. But perhaps if a more suitable schedule was introduced more people would use the service and in this way it would not become the financial burden which CIE claims it is becoming.  
Anyway apart from the economic aspect, CIE as the national transport company, has an obligation to provide a transport service for the public and I mean for those people who do not own cars and have no other means of travelling than in the public transport vehicles.  
This is a matter which should be carefully watched before the closure of this bus service, like the rail service before it, becomes a fait accompli.

## CHAIRMAN'S CASTING VOTE DECIDES COUNTY RATE OF £9.62

At their resumed estimates meeting held in Fermoy last Monday members of Waterford Council seemed set on a similar pattern to the first meeting a fortnight earlier when, following the rejection of eleven different proposals, no agreement could be reached and after more than three hours the meeting broke up without striking a rate.  
Last Monday Council members reiterated their stand in regard to what additional services each thought should be included and following an hour's discussion at which stage five further proposals had been rejected it looked as if no agreement could be reached either. All the difficulty centred on the provision of additional public lights, scavenging, assistance to group water schemes and the cleaning of Passage Docks. No combination of these items or the approval of the lot appeared acceptable to a majority of the members.  
Cllr N Walsh said that the real criteria which should be followed in striking a rate was that it should be a figure which the people could pay and which would provide for the essential services.  
Cllr D Goode said that

people were looking for extended services and the Council should accept all the additional works included.  
Cllr S Whelan referred to the week-end statement by the Minister for Local Government concerning the possibility of a rate until they received clarification of what this would mean where the County rate was concerned. "If we don't get satisfaction from the Minister about this we should be ready to face abolition," he said.  
Mr C Curran, Chairman said that such a proposal was not in order but he said Cllr Whelan could propose a resolution of protest against the Minister's action.  
There was no seconder for the proposal.

**SECOND THOUGHTS**  
Voting then followed on various rates proposed by Cllrs Walsh, King, Healy, Coffey and Deasy but all were defeated by substantial majorities.  
The Chairman said it looked as if they had again reached a deadlock but he said that the Council had still a further week in which to reach a decision.  
At this point Cllr Healy pointed out that the resolution proposed by him and seconded by Aid W. Kennedy T.D., had been defeated by a smaller majority (12-9) of all the resolutions put and he suggested the Council might again look at this. This called for a rate of £9.62 in the £ an increase of £1.14 in the current rate and covered the cost of the four controversial additional services of public lights, group water, public scavenging and Passage docks.  
Having reconsidered this with slight variations as to the allocations to have the same vote was taken and resulted in a 10-10 tie which left the decision hanging on the Chairman's casting vote.  
The Chairman, Mr Curran giving his casting vote in favour of the proposal said that while it was not the way in which he would have liked the issue decided the position was that a rate had to be struck.  
The new rate of £9.62 includes a rate of £1.14 to cover Malicious Injury charges.

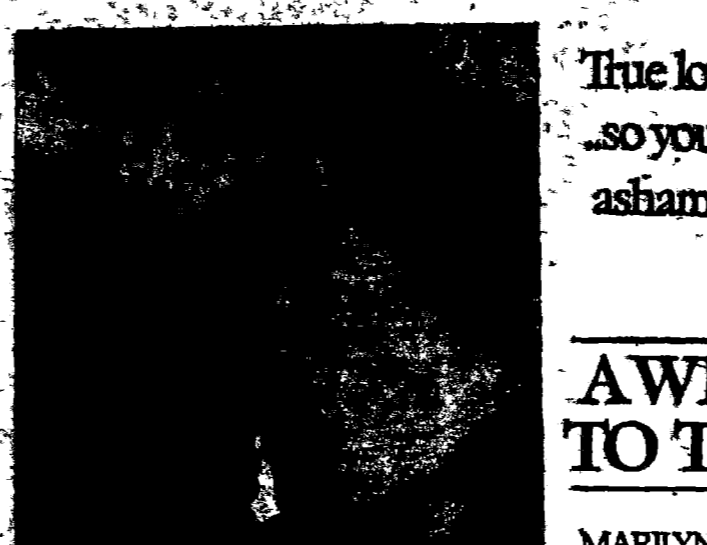
