### NOT PLAYING FAIR

Up to last week the Department of Posts and Telegraphs had detected nearly 20,000 unlicensed television sets since the current television licence campaign began on October 25. The campaign which has been intensified continued during the past week and the Department is aware that many people who have not so far been visited have unlicensed sets.

Even though a big majority may be openly critical of the programmes which RTE puts on, the position is that once a person becomes the holder of a set he is obliged to licence it and if he shirks this duty for whatever reason he is not playing fair with the thousands who do meet their responsibilities and pay their licence fees regularly each year.

Undoubtedly there are people who may find it difficult, because of economic circumstances, to meet such a demand, but provided there is no intention of deliberate defaulting the Department inspectors should show a little leniency and allow some time to such people to meet their commitment.

But there are people who can afford to pay and who just will not do so in the hope that they will get away with it. There are many of these in all walks of life and you find them, where they own cars, failing to pay their road tax or insurance, and their attitude towards all such things is similar. It does not bother them that as members of the community they have a moral obligation to contribute their share to the general cost of the upkeep and maintenance of whatever service is involved. The cardinal error is as far as they are concerned is getting caught when they have done wrong. But again, surely this is not playing fair.

As far as the TV licence campaign is concerned, I understand that the Department inspectors will now concentrate their inspections on homes where it is known that unlicensed sets are still being held. Holders of such sets would therefore be well advised to buy a licence immediately as the risk could otherwise involve a court fine of up to £50.

### OPEN DAY AT ST JOHN'S SCHOOL

I understand that the Board of Management with the Principal and staff of St John's Special School in Dungarvan are planning an "Open Day" at the school on Sunday November 28. The idea behind the open day is to enable the parents and friends of the children of this beautiful new school which was completed and occupied for the first time after Easter and indeed anyone interested to come and visit the school and see it for themselves. Further particulars of the "Open Day" will be given in next week's "Leader".

### GETTING A BAD REPUTATION

Whether we like it or not Ireland is getting a bad reputation abroad (if it has not already got it) for its lack of economic planning and the inertia displayed by the government over a long period in coming to grips with the problems which require to be solved. Last week a well-known Belfast magazine forecast that Ireland was in for a stormy future. It based its forecast on the fact that of the nine countries in the EEC we have the highest rate of inflation, the highest rate of unemployment, we are living on borrowed money and wages have gone up faster here than in any other Common Market country. Who can deny that this does not paint a true picture of our position here.

As against this, the latest EEC Labour Force survey shows that the average Irish worker works an average working week of 46.8 hours which is well over the average for the other countries in the Community which stands at 41.3. Irish farmers and farm workers also work longer hours than their European counterparts.

But working longer hours does not mean that we are working harder or producing more. If it did, then we should find ourselves at the top of the list for economic progress. Instead we have been lagging behind for quite a while now in this field. What then can be wrong? Can we say in all conscience that when we work we put in a full and full week on our jobs. Perhaps if the time taken off for tea-breaks, and for chats and the many other interludes that take our noses away from the grindstones were taken into account, the actual hours worked would fall short of what the survey purports to show.

The fact of the matter whether we like it or not, is that we are a member country of the EEC and if we are to survive we must face up to our responsibilities and be prepared to match ourselves with the productive output of the workers in Germany, France, Holland, Belgium and the other member States of the Community. We cannot expect to be carried along by the efforts of the other countries in the Community and we must realise that we can only take out of anything as much as we put into it.

### £ A GALLON!

## Cultural Revival Movement in West Waterford Praised By Goeltocht Minister

The significance of the three years on Irish language and cultural revival movement in west Waterford was stressed by the Minister for the Gaeltacht, Mr. Tom O'Donnell when he addressed a large gathering involved in the revival movement at the Presentation Convent, Lismore, last Thursday night. The Minister's visit was made in conjunction with the current series of lectures on "Our Heritage" at present being given as part of the revival campaign by a team of Professors from University College, Cork under the auspices of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee.

Having expressed thanks to the Culture Sub-Committee of the Co. Vocational Committee for inviting him to address the gathering, the Minister said that the West Waterford movement represented the most important, most successful and most comprehensive community effort ever made at regional and local level to promote the language and culture.

### MOST SIGNIFICANT

"Where the Irish language is concerned," he continued, "the programme which you have in hand here could well be among the most significant developments in a long time in the life of the country. This language and cultural revival movement was initiated 3 years ago by County Waterford Vocational Education Committee with the setting up of a cultural sub-committee."

It was decided to make a beginning in the Deisele country, where much of the old cultural tradition continues to flourish. Experience gained in this area could be of invaluable assistance when the sub-committee came to extend its activities throughout the rest of the county. The members of the sub-committee themselves are active in various spheres in the cultural, social and economic life of the county.

"Two voluntary committees are working in co-operation with the sub-committee—the Historical and Cultural Committee and the Committee for Music, Dancing and Drama. A full time organiser is employed by the sub-committee and close liaison is maintained with those voluntary organisations which are active in the everyday life of the community—Muintir na Tíre, Macra na Feirme Irish Farmers Association, Irish Countrywomen's Association, the G.A.A. Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann, Conradh na Gaeilge, Trade Unions, Political Parties, Co-operatives and other bodies."

"Under the direction of the full-time organiser a team of 25 voluntary organisers and 20 part-time teachers are working in the area to promote the aims and activities of the sub-committee among the community."

### MAXIMUM SUPPORT

He then announced that Bord na Gaeilge were to give maximum support to the movement as it was very much in accord with the official policy of the Bord of promoting the language through voluntary community action.

Other speakers included Dr D. McCarthy, President University College, Cork; Mr. Sean de Bréide, Chief Executive, Bord na Gaeilge; Mr. S. O. Murchu, Director, Department of Adult Education; UCC Mr. P. Kennedy, M.C.C., Chairman Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee; and Mr. Seamus O'Maoldomhnaigh, Kilsheeli.

Also present were Mr. Donal O'Ceallaigh, CEO, Dungarvan; Very Rev. D. Canon McGrath, Rector, St. Mary's; Rev. Dean Gilbert Maves, Lismore; and members of the Vocational Education Committee.

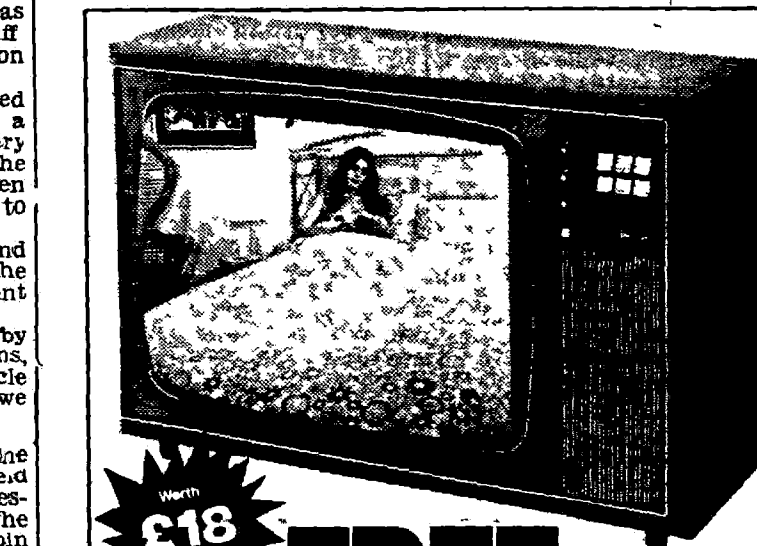

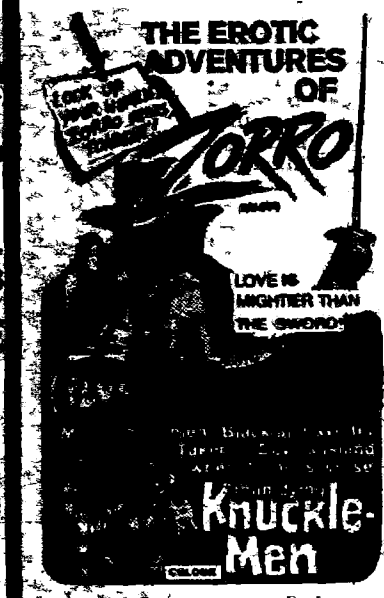

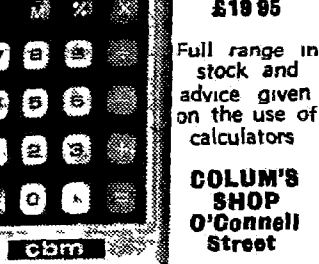

# PENSMAN TAKES

**Urban Rate Up £1 Plus** — Dungarvan Urban Council will hold their annual estimates meeting next Monday night and will deal with a budget which indicates that a general rate of £9.29 in the £ will be required to meet the Council's financial commitments for 1977. The rate shows an increase of £1.10 on the current year's rate of £8.19.

The estimates provide for a total expenditure for the year of £515,025 of which £248,395 will fall on the rates of the 110p increase the County Council demand of £2.32, accounts for 35p while additional outlay on the scavenging services accounts for 64p of the increase, so between them these two items account for 99p of the total increase.

The cost of scavenging has been going up from year to year but despite this, the overall appearance of the town is very little to reflect the increasing cost. Litter still abounds and at times, especially at week-ends, the streets of Dungarvan and of Abbeyside are covered with all kinds of disposed wrappers, papers, tins and bottles. Obviously we still have a lot to learn about keeping our town tidy despite the fact that it is costing a mint to do so!

**Open Day at St. John's Special School** — The people of West Waterford have been most generous in their support of the organization which was set up in the '60s with the object of providing educational facilities for those children in the region who require special education. For a long period the organization had to rely on the co-operation, goodwill and hospitality of the Presentation Order in Dungarvan and latterly on the local Conference of St. Vincent de Paul for making temporary premises available for the children attending the school. Thanks to these and to the many wonderful helpers the St. John's Special School operated.

However, the very active Board of Management under Chairman Mr. Norman Walsh, M.C.C., Cappoquin and School Manager Very Rev. D. O'Byrne, P.P., Fourmilet were all the time working hard at the project of getting a completely new school erected. It took a great deal of persistent pressure but the efforts of all involved were eventually rewarded when the new school was completed and occupied by the first time by the children when they returned from their Easter holidays earlier this year.

Why was there a need for such a school? Well, it is very necessary for some children not to succeed at school. They often become unhappy of themselves as a result of this. This can lead to further problems. As the pupil grows older it becomes more obvious that he needs special attention to help him cope with school life and with adult life later.

This special attention must be given in such ways as remedial help in school, tuition at home, a special class in a larger school or full time education in a "special school". A special school where children who are limited in their ability to learn in ordinary schools are taught. Here they have the benefit of small classes which allow more personal attention, they receive extra help, English there are extra facilities and services, the programme geared towards a practical social education rather than theory and academic studies with work training in senior classes.

In order to afford an opportunity for the general public to see the new school which is located at the Youghal Road entrance to the Presentation Convent Grounds in Dungarvan, an open day will be held on Monday, November 22nd, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. We were worried in the game.
