## MUST REPAIR

COURTHOUSE Waterford Law Society was

granted a conditional order by Mr Justice McMahon in the ligh Court in Dublin directing Works to forthwith comply with a direction given by the Minis-ter for Justice to put the Courthouse at Catherine Street, Warterford, into proper repair and

The Court was told by Mr Eamonn P King, selicitor Dun-garvan, a member of the Society, that the Minister for Justice had complied with the order of the court on May 30, 1975

On that date the Waterford Law Society had obtained an

absolute order of mandamus directing the Minister to exer-cise his statutory duty under the Courthouse (Provision and Maintenance) Act, 1935 to direct, after consultation with the Minister for Finance, the Commissioners for Public Works to put the courthouse accommodation in Waterford City into

proper repair
The Chief State Solicitor by letter on February last, had informed the Society that the Minister for Justice had complied with the court order on the previous September

Mr King stated that up to May last ne saw no signs or ndications of any preparations for carrying out work on the courthouse At that time the Society's solicitors, Kenny Ste-phenson and Chapman incomed the Secretary or the Com-missioners for Public Works of the Society's intention to seek a High Court order directing the Commissioners to carry out the work £500,000 REPAIRS

Mr King stated that the Commissioners in a letter dated May 31 last stated that from investigations made since the eccipt of the direction from the Minister for Justice it had been found that the condition of the courthouse was such as to rule out any possibility of dealing with the situation by a limited

To bring the premises to acceptable accommodation standards by any practicable method would involve works of an order of over £500,000 A scheme of that magnitude could not be devised and embarked on in the present case without a considerble amount of investigation of easible alternatives

Mr King stated he inspected the courthouse on October 15 and found no work being carried out or any signs that work had been carried out In what Dapsed without Warning 12 weeks previously The roof was open to the elements in places, nd birds were flying through the courtroom




