PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

JUBILEE MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF SCOUT

The January issue of "Scout Leader," the monthly newsletter of the Catholic Boy Scouts of Ireland, contains a special message from the Chief Scout to mark the Golden Jubilee of Catholic Scouting in Ireland which is celebrated this year.

Having referred to the highlights in the growth of the Association over the past fifty years the Chief Scout's message states: "While we may justifiably take pride in the past we do so as a background to the future to which we look with confidence firmly grounded in the fact that we have now more than 260 Units operating in every one of the 32 counties of Ireland. We must always remember that the objective of the CBSI, in common with all other Scout Associations throughout the world, is to ensure that the young man who comes out at the end of his Scouting career is the better citizen and member of his community because he was a Scout."

The Chief Scout is Mr. Jim Holly, who lives at the Burgery, Abbeyside, Dungarvan and who is better known as Waterford's popular County Engineer.

I mention this extract from the Chief Scout's Message because I believe that there is no better Association which young boys can join than the CBSI. Their training is firmly based on the principles promised and laws of the Association to become members and which remains a guiding light throughout their entire lives.

At no time has fundamental training of this kind been more necessary than at present when our young people are being subjected to so many enticements which could well lead them along a road which they could well rue later on.

HEALTH MATTERS

It is the government's intention on ratification of the National Pay Agreement to make extra funds available from the exchequer for health services and amongst these in Waterford will be medical and dental facilities and workshops for mentally handicapped at Carriglea, Dungarvan.

This information is contained in the Finance Report which was placed before the South Eastern Health Board at the February monthly meeting held in Kilkenny.

Amongst the minutes of the January meetings of the various sub-committees which came up for ratification was one from the General Hospital Committee which stated that they had been informed by the Programme Manager, Mr. P. J. Ward that it had become necessary to replace or carry out major repairs to the passenger lift at Dungarvan District Hospital. The estimated cost of the immediate essential repairs was given as £2,775 with possible additional expenditure later on while it was stated that the cost of providing a new lift would be £12,000.

In view of the unsatisfactory condition of the lift the Committee has recommended that immediate steps be taken to replace it and that the work be financed by contribution from the Board's next list of minor capital works.

An item in the minutes of the same meeting referred to a proposal to provide additional beds at Lismore District Hospital in connection with which a report had been submitted by the Fire Officer. This matter was deferred until the next meeting when it will again be considered.

THE PURCHASING POWER OF £100

One of the first questions asked in the Dail after the Deputies returned from their Christmas "break" a couple of weeks ago concerned the present purchasing power of £100.

In putting the question Deputy C. Murphy asked what it was in mid-November 1976, reckoning mid-February 1977 as the base.

In his reply the Parliamentary Secretary to the Taoiseach, Deputy John Kelly said that it was estimated on the Consumer price index numbers that £183.23 would be required at mid-November, 1976 to purchase the same quantum of goods and services at retail prices as £100 would have purchased at mid-February, 1973.

In other words the value of money has shrunk to almost half its value during the three-and-a-half year period ending last November. And then they try to tell us that they have the solution to inflation!

HOW IT LOOKED IN 1839

I am indebted to Mr. John M. Young of Childers Estate for some historical background from an unstated source about how Dungarvan looked in 1839, seven years before the great famine struck the country.

Described by the source as a sea-port borough, market and post town, the locality then had a population of 12,450 of which 8,386 lived in the town and borough and the other 4,064 in the surrounding parishes of the Canons Regular of St. Augustine the extracts go on to state "Raymond de Gros one of the earliest English adventurers in 1174 brought hither the plunder he had taken in Offaly and Lismore which he put on board some vessels he found lying at anchor. But being detained by contrary winds he was attacked by men from Cork whom he repulsed with the loss of eight of their vessels with which he sailed away in triumph."

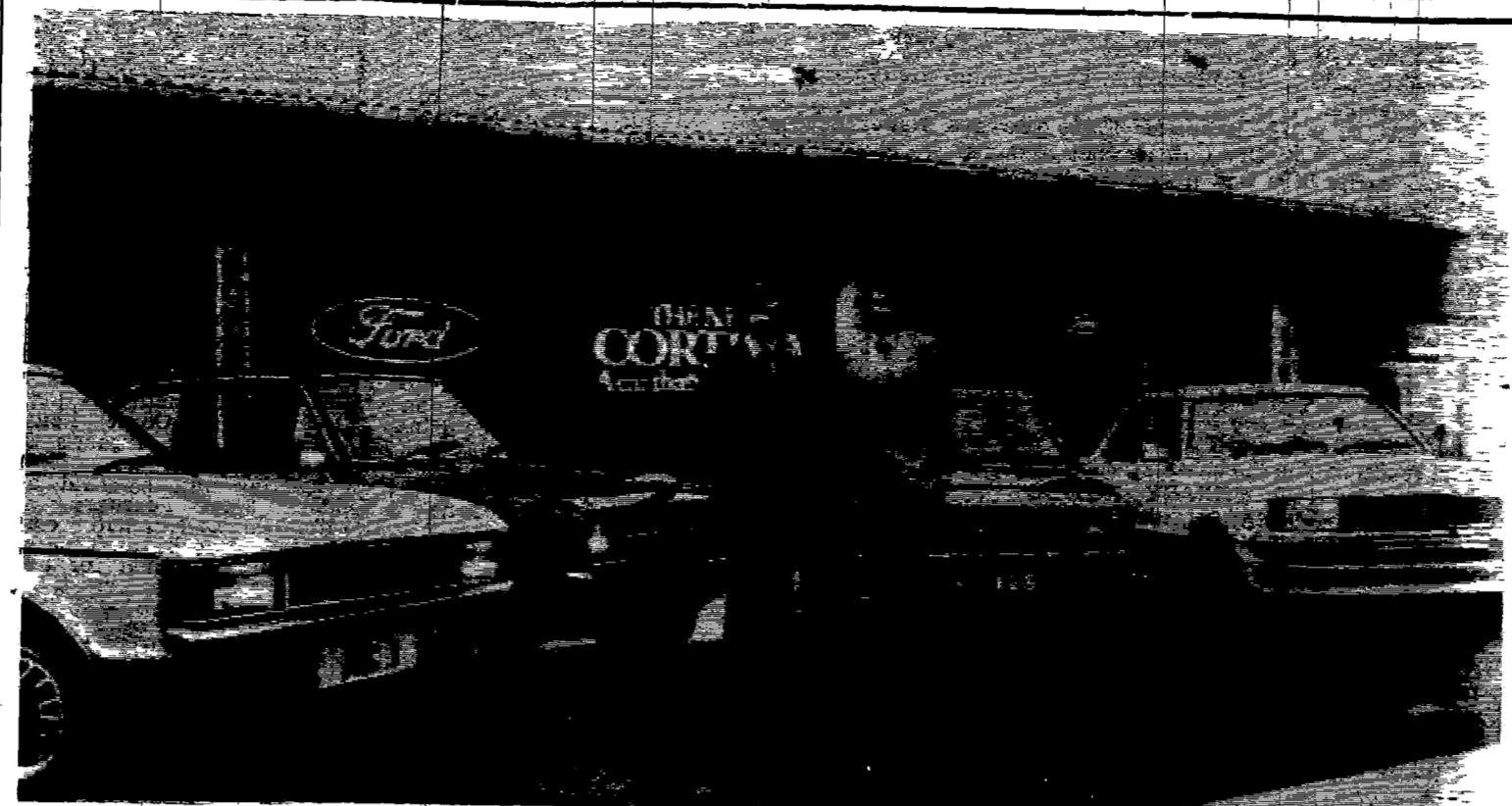
"Soon afterwards the town, which then formed the frontier barrier of the dependencies of Waterford was, together with other territories, totally surrendered to Henry II by Roderic, Sovereign of All Ireland, and a castle was erected for its defence by King John who is alleged to have also surrounded the town with a wall strengthened with towers." (The ruins of this castle still stand adjacent to the Garda Barracks in the town.)

The town was in the possession of the Royalist Party until December 1649 when Cromwell besieged it and on its surrender the inhabitants were saved from massacre when a local lady allegedly drank to the great Roundhead as he entered the town.

The extract then goes on to state that in 1839 there were 1570 houses in the town which consisted of one principal street called Mulgrave Street extending from West to East and dividing in the latter direction into two short branches and leading to the mouth of the port from there several others branch off in various directions towards the line of quays which extend along the shore on the south and west are extensive ranges of inferior houses and on the north is Devonshire Square from which a handsome street leads to the bridge across the inlet, a massive structure of one arch, 75 feet in span, erected at an expense of £50,000 by the Duke of Devonshire in 1815 and communicating by a Causeway 350 yards in length with the suburb of Abbeyside on the main shore.

This entry is interesting in that this is the bridge which Waterford County Council are now planning to demolish and replace with a wider, modern structure.

Fishermen will be denied livelihood

ALLEGATION BY FORMER PARLIAMENTARY SECRETARY

A former Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture has forecast that twenty-five County Waterford drift net salmon fishermen will be denied a livelihood as a result of a recent Government decision to reduce the depth of fishing nets from 60 to 30 meshes.

Mr. J. Fahey TD described the decision as "a disastrous one" at a meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday. He had had a weekend meeting with the fishermen in Ardmore and the livelihoods of 25 of them fishing out of Ardmore would be taken from them unless the Government was to allow 60 mesh nets.

"The Ardmore fishermen fish in very deep waters so they will be hardest hit of all," Deputy Fahey went on. "If any other section of the community had their livelihoods taken from them in this way there would be total outcry and this committee of agriculture should back the fishermen's claims to the full," he added.

Mr. O. Curran who raised the matter said the fishermen had first seen the drift net licence reduced from £20 to £10 but the reduction in the size of the nets was the biggest blow of all to them. They simply won't be able to catch salmon in nets of 30 meshes, he said.

Mr. P. Kenneally said it seemed to him that it was now official Department policy to do away with salmon fishing on their rivers. The reduction in the size of the drift nets was absolutely disastrous and predictable the fishermen were very unhappy about the situation. In addition the increase from £3 to £50 in the licence fee could only be described as "savagery".

The six gilled—that was the type caught—is brownish in colour, has six gills instead of the usual five on the side of its throat. It has a long straight tail and only one dorsal fin set far back almost over the anal fin. The gilled shark were thought to be rare visitors to these shores but of late quite a few have been taken by anglers on the South and West coasts of Ireland. They are bottom feeders and are sometimes encountered by anglers not fishing for sharks at all but for skate and other species caught by means of w e traces fished on the bottom. Many you will catch one of these six gilled sharks.
