NEWSPAPERS RENEW CALL FOR VAT REDUCTION

Proprietors and representatives of the Provincial newspapers throughout the country met in Clonmel last Friday and unanimously decided to pursue with renewed vigour their campaign to have value-added tax reduced to a minimum figure. Only four countries in the European Community apply VAT to newspaper sales and the rates in these range from 2 per cent to 4.5 per cent. Here in Ireland the rate now stands at 10 per cent in the United Kingdom and Northern Ireland the VAT rating on newspapers is nil which means that papers are not subjected to this tax in England, Scotland, Wales or N.I.

This, in a nutshell, is the position and it can be easily seen that the newspapers in Ireland are being asked to bear a burden which is either not applied at all or at very reduced comparable rates elsewhere. As a first step in their new campaign the members of the Provincial Newspapers Association are to seek urgent meetings with all government ministers to impress on them the extreme gravity of the situation and the resolve of the industry to ensure its future.

The meeting emphasised that the excessively high VAT rate on newspapers in Ireland was placing a number of provincial newspapers in jeopardy and seriously impeding investment in the industry on which its viability and job potential depended. The meeting also sent a telegram to the Franna Fair Ard Fheis seeking a commitment from the party that they would reduce VAT to the minimum level should they be returned to government.

Last Friday's meeting in Clonmel was the first occasion on which the PNA met outside Dublin (with the exception of the meeting held in Athlone some months ago) but it is proposed to hold further meetings at other provincial venues to discuss further steps in the campaign when the government's intent following the new round of representations, becomes known.

EVEN IN THE U.S. The ever-increasing problem of providing work for our young people, especially those school-leavers who will be coming out at the end of the current academic year to swell the numbers who have already been unable to find suitable jobs is not one peculiar to this country.

That of course provides little or no consolation for the young men and women concerned who seek nothing more than a suitable job which will help to give them a start in life and keep them off the dole queues. It seems to be beyond the compass of the great brains which gave us the Common Market and all that goes with it to ensure an adequate employment potential. But something will have to be done and there will have to be some shift in policies to change the present bleak outlook or else we will find ourselves with a community of dissatisfied and disgruntled young people.

I was reminded that there are similar problems in the US when I came across the following quote in a recent issue of "The Washington Spectator" in which the Mayor of Pittsburgh called on the Joint Economic Committee for just such a policy shift. He said "High youth unemployment rates are a symptom of a larger problem. We must change and make our system work. We must not allow young people to opt out of the community and leave the mainstream. We must begin to shift the mainstream itself to encompass them. We can no longer be satisfied with peace and more time. We cannot live in two worlds, the old, tired world of platitudes

£28 PER PATIENT DAY

The cost of the General Medical Services scheme in the South-Eastern Health Board region has more than doubled in the three years preceding 1976 according to figures released last week by the Board.

The scheme cost an estimated £1.5 million in 1976, compared with £625,561 in the period 1972/73. This figure for '76 includes an amount of £50,754 for dispensing fees and £44,849 for remuneration of salaried doctors. The visiting rate for the region was 5.2 compared with the national average of 5.67.

The average prescription cost in the scheme last year was £2.85 while the national figure was £3.14. The General Hospital Scheme cost the Board an estimated £5,429,600, the bulk of which was paid to the six county hospitals which gave an average cost per patient treated in these hospitals of £19.50.

The most expensive hospital was Ardkeen with a figure of £246.72 per patient treated, or £28.02 per patient day.

A DISGRACE TO REMOVE DUNGARVAN'S OLD BRIDGE SAYS COUNCIL CHAIRMAN

It was an absolute disgrace that the old bridge at the Causeway was to be removed or converted as it was a beautiful structure at the moment and valuable as a tourist attraction to the town said Cllr Riala O'Brien, Chairman at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night. She was speaking to a motion which she proposed requesting the Council to recommend to Waterford County Council that sluice gates be incorporated in the new bridge plans to provide a man-made lake at the northern side of the bridge. Cllr O'Brien said that Dungarvan was being completely bypassed by tourists. She added that it would be a shame to demolish the existing bridge but she was being forced to be realistic about the position. It will be a sad day when the bridge goes but I still hope that this will not happen," she said.

Cllr D Goode said that he had voiced a protest about the removal of the bridge at a meeting of the County Council but had withdrawn it as he was not prepared to stand in the way of progress. Cllr O'Brien said that members of the Urban and County Councils had discussed a plan for a man-made lake to the north of the bridge with the South East Tourism Organisation some time ago and the matter was still being pursued. It was decided to ask the Co-Engineer for a report on the matter and to write to the SETO for their observations.

PROPOSAL TO IMPROVE ARDMORE WATER SUPPLY

Mr. Hally County Engineer submitted a report to the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last week which outlined proposals for the improvement of the Ardmore water supply. The report stated that the main defect in the supply has been a serious shortage of water in summer time as the existing sources at Liskealy and Grange can yield only approximately 39,000 gallons per day in summer when the present summer demand is approximately 100,000 gallons. Stating that the only suitable source in the district from which an adequate supply can be obtained is the river Lickey the report went on to say "I propose pumping water from this river from near Kieley's Cross via a reservoir which would be sited at Kieley's Cross. The river has a minimum summer flow of 800,000 gallons per day at this point and I propose extending the scheme so that 150,000 gallons per day can be abstracted, thereby allowing for increased usage of water in Ardmore and for extending the supply to serve a greater area."

The cost of the entire scheme was estimated at £295,000 but Mr Hally stated that in order to have water from the Lickey available for Ardmore this summer he proposed to carry out the bare essentials of the scheme as soon as possible at an estimated cost of £19,000. The remainder of the scheme would follow as soon as Department approval was obtained and finance became available.

On the proposal of Mr C Curran, seconded by Senator Deasy the Council approved of the County Engineer's plans for the improvement of the water supply to Ardmore and extending the piped supply to Stradbally, approximately 14 miles away. The new scheme would supply 6,000 gallons per day for agricultural purposes. The estimated cost was £17,000 which gave a unit cost of £270 per house.

The Council also approved of this plan on the proposal of Mr Curran seconded by Senator Deasy.

Following the opening of the school the Minister addressed the large gathering and said that the opening of St John's was a further step on the road towards the goal of full provision of appropriate educational facilities for children who need special help in their schooling and development. Mr Barry went on to pay tribute to all associated with the building of the school, the people of the area who contributed so generously towards the cost of the school and the dedicated staff of the school. Mr Barry said that the school was a product of the help given by the Presentation Order and the local St Vincent de Paul Society in providing the school premises. He also mentioned the assistance in the form of funds and expertise provided by the Office of Public Works in the building of the school. RESIDENTS OF CHILDERS ESTATE AGAIN COMPLAIN TO COUNCIL

A deputation of residents of Childers Estate in Dungarvan attended the monthly meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night to again complain about the condition of windows and doors in their houses. Mr J Hurley spokesman for the deputation said when the repair work proposed for the houses would be started he would be sure to have a committee of their houses and the Council Engineer should come and see the position for himself. Cllr Riala O'Brien Chairman said that he had been already agreed to experiment with the windows of one of the houses and if this proved successful to do all the rest and if not to replace them entirely. However the weather had been so bad all the time since it had been impossible to do any work on them.

Cllr P Whelan said that it was a disgrace that a new housing scheme should be in such a condition and the sooner the necessary repairs were carried out the better. He said that in some of the 12 houses concerned the doors could not even be properly closed. Town Clerk told the members that the contractor had informed him that as soon as the weather was suitable all the repairs needed would be completed out and this ended the discussion.

QUERY ABOUT DUNGARVAN GROUND RENTS

Senator A Deasy proposed a resolution at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night asking that complete details of all ground rents being paid to the Council be furnished to the members. He said that the people concerned should be afforded the option of buying out their ground rents instead of having to pay them each year. The County Manager Mr C A O'Connor said that when the residents of the schemes concerned were paying ground rents the Council had control of the dwellings. He pointed out that a Bill was going through the Dail at present and when passed it would enable people to buy out their ground rents. The Town Clerk Mr B Walsh then furnished the details requested by Senator Deasy.

A RED LETTER DAY

Mr Norman Walsh M.C.C. 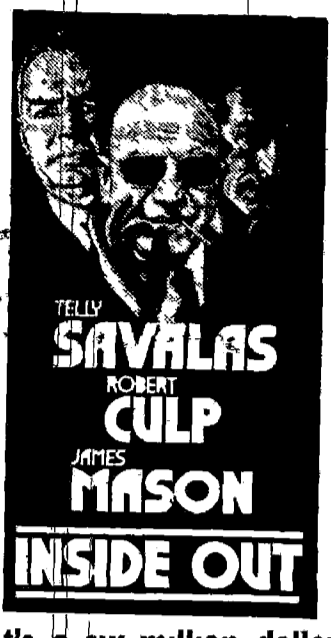

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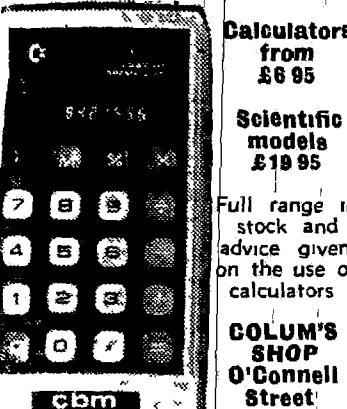
