PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

DUNGARVAN OF THE SAILING SHIPS

My reverence a few weeks back to the fate of the "Moresby," wrecked in Dungarvan harbour on Christmas Eve 1895, in connection with the recent death in San Francisco of Mr Thomas D. McCue, an old native of Abbeyside, has prompted a reader (Mr John M. Young of Dungarvan) to recall the fate of one of the many schooners which sailed out of Dungarvan at the turn of the present century. It was the "Morning Star," a two-masted topsail schooner of 111 tons which was built in 1877 and which became a total wreck off Dunabratinn on Thursday, October 6, 1915.

On its last ill-fated trip the "Morning Star" which was in the ownership of A. Maloney & Sons Ltd., Dungarvan, was captained by Abbeyside man Capt. Augustin Christopher and was crewed by Denis Flynn (mate) also from Abbeyside and two sailors from Cork while also on board was James Casey, a son of Dungarvan parents who was being given a free passage by the Captain who knew him personally.

The schooner left Cardiff on the Tuesday bound for Cork with a cargo of coal and with fair weather had reached Mine Head by Thursday afternoon. There the weather changed and the vessel was hit by a terrific storm with hurricane force winds from the south-west.

Capt. Christopher attempted to manoeuvre his ship to bring her back into the shelter and safety of his home harbour but in getting her around the sails were torn to tatters by the gale and in a helpless condition the "Morning Star" was blown along the treacherous coastline by the storm in this way she drifted for hours and at about 10 o'clock she struck a reef off Dunabratinn, or Boat-Strand, as it is sometimes called.

Had fate not been so cruel the ship might have been able to clear the reef, been beached on the sandy shore which runs to the east of the pier and on which, at the time, two warning lamps were kept alight every night.

When the schooner struck, Capt. Christopher and his crew donned their lifebelts but the vessel, pounded by the heavy seas, soon began to break up on the rocks. When the masts snapped the Capt. advised the crew to abandon ship and attempt to reach the shore which was not more than 100 yards distant.

The Mate, Denis Flynn was first to jump and after a terrific battle against the raging seas he finally managed to reach the beach safely. His fellow sailors did not follow and stayed with the ship and as he watched from the shore he saw Capt. Christopher make an effort to jump but just as he did, the vessel lurched and he was thrown into the sea and drowned. The other crew members suffered the same fate.

The storm raged all night and in the early hours of the following morning the body of James Casey was found by local people on the shore. It later transpired that no one on land saw the ship in distress as there was no Coast-guard Station within miles of where the wreck occurred.

This tragic episode in the sailing history of Dungarvan yet again highlights the hazards and the dangers which the men who followed the call of the sea in those days had to face as part of their everyday lives.

HOW MUCH OF IT GOES ON TAX

When you go to your "local" for a couple of pints or a few "half-ones" or when you buy a packet of cigarettes or a gallon of petrol at a filling station, have you any idea of how much of the prices charged goes in tax? I had a fair idea of this myself but I never realised that the tax man's hand rested so heavily on them.

The matter was the subject of a question asked in the Dail weeks and in his reply the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Finance, Mr. Michael Begg, gave details of the VAT content on each of the items mentioned as follows:

On a pint of beer of average gravity, a total of 18.85p is charged on a glass of whiskey (70 proof) a total of 35.05p, on 20 standard plain cigarettes, a total of 35.26p, on 20 standard tipped cigarettes, 28.23p, on a gallon of petrol the total tax content is 52.15p and on a gallon of fuel oil for central heating on which the VAT rating is zero the total is 2p.

FROM CHICAGO

"Chicago's Children" on the cover of which was a photograph in profile of the late Mayor seated in his office embracing a young child who had just presented him with a bouquet of flowers. The photograph was framed in a block border with a single line of type which simply stated "1902-1976".

Dr. Power informed me that the members of the Fine Arts Council had lunched with the Mayor only a week before his death and he had sat beside him and they had talked about Ireland. Incidentally Victor has written a new play called "Johnnie Willie" which will be premiered at The Body Politic Theatre at 2259, North Lincoln Ave., Chicago on St. Patrick's Day. The plot centres around family life and tensions in rural Ireland and "Johnnie" is the village quack whose counsel the father persistently insists on following.

I noted from the officially printed note, paper that the name of Chicago's new Mayor is Michael A. Bilandic but I can guess that he will have a big pair of shoes to fill in succeeding such a man as the late Richard J. Daley who for so many years was the King Of The Windy City.

CALL ON MINISTER TO DEFER SALMON NET REGULATIONS

Standing orders were suspended at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan to enable members to discuss problems created by the new regulations brought in by the Department of Fisheries reducing the depth of salmon drift nets from 60 to 30 meshes.

Mr C. Curran, Chairman said that the new regulation would put the livelihood of the drift net fishermen in Ardmore and Youghal in jeopardy and he suggested that the Council should appeal to the Minister to defer the enforcement of the regulation for a year.

Mr J. Kennedy said that if the 30 mesh depth for nets was enforced it would be useless for the fishermen in the Ardmore area to continue as the water where they fished was too deep. He said that he had had a discussion with the Minister and leading officials of the Department about the matter and they had assured him that the regulation was law already and that under no circumstances would it be changed now as it had been introduced to conserve salmon stocks.

He said he knew that they would do the fullest backing of the County Council in this.

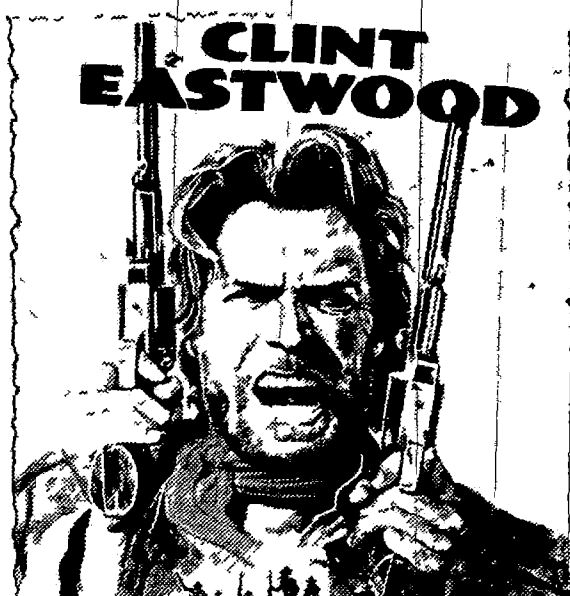

COUNCIL COMPROMISE ON C.D.O. APPOINTMENT

Compromise between the members and the Co Manager on a proposal to appoint a C.D.O. for Development Officer was reached at a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday. At a previous meeting the Council agreed to the appointment of a C.D.O. on a full-time basis but the Co Manager countered this on the grounds that there would not be sufficient work to keep such an officer employed full-time, and suggested that a senior administrative officer to whom the duties of a C.D.O. would be assigned might be created subject to sanction. He said that such an appointment would allow for a maximum flexibility in the assignment of other duties. Cllr T. Healy who opposed the Co Manager's suggestion at the last meeting said he felt that there was a decided need for a Development Officer in the county to assist the IDA to seek some small industries for the western part of the county. He said that he would discuss the matter with the IDA as these would be best suited for the area. He said he still felt that if they appointed an administrative officer he would be using that and not the Development Officer which should be the priority in the position. Mr C. O'Connor Co Manager assured the Council that if they agreed to the appointment of an administrative officer he would see to it that Development would be his top priority. Cllr Healy said that the existing assigned officer Mr McHugh was doing a good job and he suggested that they should not chase after these things until they were with the IDA. There could, he said, be a chance of getting some small industries and we should go chasing after these things until they were with the IDA. 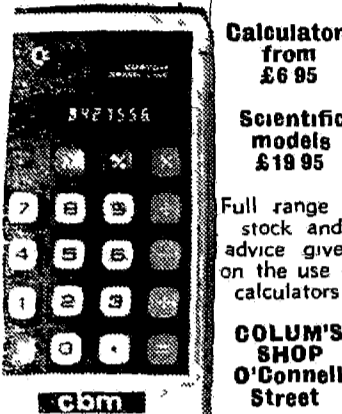
